For seventy-nine years, once a week, without fail, "The Deport Times" has appeared on newstands and through the mail. For seventy-eight years, without fail, "The Bogata News" has appeared in the same way. For fifty-three years "The Talco Times" has also appeared.

Now the United States Postal Authorities have decreed that that is WRONG! Wrong? How can that be? Well, continue to hear this fascinating tale of bureaucracy at it's best.

The postal auditor arrived last Thursday. During the course of his audit, in which he does things like count how many papers we throw away, check to be sure we are collecting money for our subscriptions (they think we give them away?) and various other things, not the least of which was hitting us with a TWO HUNDRED dollar a MONTH increase in postage, he sprang the name problem on us.

Now Sam C. Holloway may have been many things...but one thing he definitely was not efficient. I cannot, and will not believe that he carelessly took out a wrong authorization. I believe the post office has LOST that The.

Of course, it doesn't seem to matter to them that we aren't responsible for that authorization anyway, had no control over it.

It doesn't matter to the mighty wheels of authority that for a combined total of 147 years those three publications have had that The.

It doesn't matter to them that countless postal audits have failed to reveal this fact. Nearly eighty years of audits...and no one ever noticed this crucial, horrible, major error on our part!

Prairiland Proposes \$3,585 Million Budget

"Without a tax increase we are going to have to reduce our fund balance, to a point that would put the school's financial stability in jeopardy," Superintendent Max Ballard said, as the Prairiland School Board proposed a \$3,585 million budget.

"Our current tax rate is \$.6574. Other school districts in Lamar County include: North Lamar .8523; Paris .8554; Chisum .9473; and Roxton \$1.0352. Other school districts in 13AAA which have similar student populations to Prairiland have these tax rates," Ballard said. "Mineola \$1.15; Raines \$1.05; Winnsboro \$1.03; Quitman \$1.02; Mt. Vernon .97. This makes us with the lowest tax rate of ten schools. What makes it worse is that our taxable value per student is lower than most of those," Ballard continued.

Last week the board met to work on a budget which would take up the slack for nearly \$50,000 in state funding cuts and teacher pay raises.

The board slashed spending in every department, and still was nearly \$170,000 short of a balanced budget.

"School officials and board members made every expense reduction they could without affecting the instructional programs in the school, and we still don't have enough revenue coming in to cover it," Superintendent Ballard said.

The school board's proposed budget is \$100,000 below last year's operating expenses, but \$3.39 million in revenue from state and local sources is all that is available this year, short of what they need.

Monday night, August 21, the board met in a called meeting to propose a tax rate for 1989-90. That rate was proposed as .7490 per \$100 evaluation, and a public hearing has

been scheduled for October 31, 1989 at 7 p.m. in the Prairiland High School Library.

Superintendent Ballard said "We haven't benefited from any inflation in this area during the past year, so we will not benefit from increased tax base in the district." The \$48,000 loss of state funding, a \$22,500 increase in the district's cost for employee insurance participation and about \$150,000 in pay hikes mandated by the state.

Ballard stated that "House Bill 1019 didn't do Prairiland any favors, since the bill added \$450 million to state public school funding, but raised its valuations of Prairiland school district property, which lowered the school's share of state funds."

Because of a \$40 per month employee insurance cost increase the board voted last Thursday night to pay \$90 a month towards the insurance, leaving teachers to pay \$25.46 per month themselves.

In other action, the board accepted bids from Mrs. Baird's for bread and from Borden's Milk for dairy products, amended school board policy #4324, and voted to let bids on a 1981 Ford school bus.

A days work policy for the auxiliary personnel at the school was decided upon, and Roach Oil Company received the fuel bid.

Salaries were set for the cooks and maintenance foreman.

Gary Ballard, L.C. Stout, Larry Salter, Richard Nash, Daphne Downs and Fran Patterson were named as teacher appraisers for the 1989-90 school year.

The financial and tax reports were approved, and the minutes were approved.

If Deport Wants Doctor, We Must Be Willing To Work For One!

An Editorial

The time has come for the citizens of Deport, and yes, the surrounding area, to do something to help themselves.

Effective September 1, 1989, the town will no longer have a doctor.

There are several alternatives that the people of Deport have.

The first one is to sit around, wring our hands and regret the loss of a doctor in quick and easy reach.

That's the easiest way out, but surely not the best.

The second alternative is to quit depending on someone else to find a doctor and begin actively looking for one.

If this means committees, advertising in medical journals, courting medical students about to be through school, or indeed, personally going to beg a doctor to come, then that's what needs to be done.

McCuiston Hospital has actively sought a physician for Deport, but hasn't found one. That doesn't mean that one can NEVER be found...doctors become available, they graduate, their need for a life-style changes. Now isn't the time to give up.

It is my understanding that there is a doctor practicing through St. Joseph's Hospital who will be coming to the Deport Nursing Home. Perhaps he should be personally approached to see if he would consider practicing in Deport for a few days a week? If he isn't interested,

then perhaps we should continue to talk to doctors, asking them for help.

One thing is certain...if the people of this community do not make it known...and known loudly, that they are willing to make a commitment for keeping medical care in town, they will not have medical care!

If this town does not have something to offer, or if doctors do not know what there is to offer, there certainly won't be a doctor come to even look!

If it is necessary maybe we should consider if there are any incentives that might persuade a doctor to live here. Free office space? Free housing?

For heaven's sake, if it means baking cookies for his kids we should be willing to do it!

Why is it so important to have medical care here in town? For many, perhaps, it isn't. For those who are young enough to seldom need a doctor, a trip to Paris now and then isn't a hardship.

But we have a responsibility to our elderly people. Many of them do not have any way to go to a doctor located miles away. Many require frequent visits to the doctor.

Many may even be forced to move closer to their families so that they can be provided with proper medical care since it will no longer be available. This means that they cannot maintain their independence,

and have to leave lifelong friendships.

Young families are a lot less likely to move into a town where they cannot take their child to the doctor for a cold or virus without making an appointment days or weeks in advance. What has always been a strong point to attract families will be gone without a medical clinic.

Economically the loss of a business in a town this size is tremendous. And EVERY business in town will suffer because of it.

If you don't think that matters to you because you work out of town...think again... taxes go up, populations go down, more businesses have to raise prices or go out of business. It all results in a less attractive place to live!

We are spoiled because for years we have had a doctor to see us for six days a week, without an appointment. Perhaps we cannot realistically expect THAT anymore. But a doctor in town for only three or four days a week would be a wonderful thing, and surely that is not impossible?

It's all very well to sit back and hope that "something comes up" but it probably won't result in getting a doctor for Deport.

We need to work hard for what we want, and not expect anyone to do it for us. Come on, let's do something to help ourselves!

Deport Medical Clinic Will Close

The Deport Medical Clinic will close, effective September 1, 1989. Betsy Chapman will be on hand for two weeks more so that medical records can be collected.

"We have tried in earnest since April to recruit a doctor to come to the Deport clinic," says Anthony A. Daigle, McCuiston Regional Medical Center Administrator.

"Unfortunately, we have not been

successful in our efforts. The people of Deport have been most helpful throughout our search and we will continue, as we hope the residents of

Deport will, to work toward returning medical care to you community."

"We cannot maintain the expense of keeping the clinic open."

The last day a physician will be on hand will be September 1.

The clinic was taken over by McCuiston Regional Medical Center on May 1, 1989 upon the retirement of Dr. T.H. Glover, due to health reasons.

Hopes that a doctor may be recruited have not been given up entirely.

Deport VFD Orders New Truck

The Deport Volunteer Fire Department met in regular session Monday, August 21. The department voted to order a new fire truck from Wilson Fire Apparatus, Inc. from Van Buren, AR.

The new truck will be made up of a 2-ton GMC chassis with diesel engine, a 400 gallon tank, 400 gallon per minute pump, 18hp portable pump mounted at the rear of the truck for grass fires and electric reels.

The new truck meets N.F.P.A. 1901

standards, and can be used for a pumper truck inside the city if the department's present pumper truck should break down.

According to the department's committee to purchase a truck, this is

the department's best offer, but the department will be approximately \$16,000.00 short of funds to purchase the truck with the funds the department now has from donations. The truck chassis will cost

\$19,185.00; and the fire apparatus, \$39,591.00 for a total cost of \$58,776.00.

Members of the Deport Volunteer Fire Department voted to add \$8,000.00 to the fund, leaving approximately \$8,000.00 more to be raised to finish paying for the truck.

The committee reported that delivery of the truck will take from 120 to 150 days. The department hopes to raise more money for the truck during that time.

Cities Receive 9.8% More In Sales Tax Rebates Than In 1988

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently the cities, counties and transit authorities received 9.8 percent more in sales tax rebates this month than they did in August 1988.

"We sent more than \$193 million in sales tax money to local governments this month, and Texas businesses continue to report higher sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Bullock noted that cities received an average of 7.4 percent more income from sales tax this month than in August 1988, and year to date payments to cities are up by an average of 9.7 percent over the same period last year.

Blossom received \$2,721.19 for this period, compared to \$3,052.88 last year for a 10.86 percent decrease, while year to date payments are up by 12.33 percent.

Deport received \$2,273.65 for this period, compared to \$2,366.60, for a 3.93 percent decrease while year to date payments are increased by 14.76 percent.

Paris received \$264,652.69, showing a 6.60 percent increase.

Bogata received \$4,302.70 for this period, compared to \$3,655.15 last year for a 11.04 percent overall increase for this year.

Clarksville received \$24,074.54,

which marked a 2.30 percent decrease over last year's payments.

Mt. Pleasant received \$123,390.89 for an 8.06 percent decrease

Talco received \$4,236.74 for a 53.48 percent increase over last year's payments which marked an 8.06 percent decrease overall.

Checks totaling \$121.9 million were sent to 1046 cities that have a local sales tax rate of either one or one and one-half percent.

Houston received \$20.9 million, the largest payment in the state. Dallas' check for \$13.6 million was second largest, Bullock said.

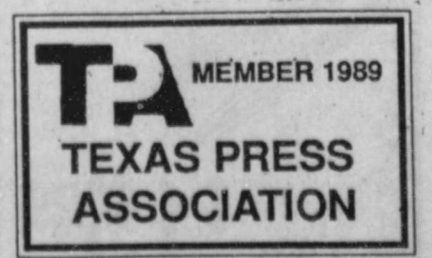
Prairiland Orientation Set

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NOTICE OF PETITION FOR APPROVAL OF DEFERRED ACCOUNTING TREATMENT FOR TNP ONE, UNITS 1 AND 2 AND ADJUSTMENT TO PURCHASED POWER COST RECOVERY FACTOR ("PCRF") CALCULATION

Texas-New Mexico Power Company ("Company") hereby publishes notice that it has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") a Petition for Approval of Deferred Accounting Treatment for TNP One, Units 1 and 2 and Adjustment to PCRF Calculation pursuant to Sections 16(a), and 27 of Article 1446, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes and Section 23.12(a) of the Substantive Rules of the Commission. TNP One is a lignite-fired generating station being constructed by the Company in Robertson County, Texas. The Company estimates that the first Unit of TNP One will be in commercial operation in June 1990. Unit 2 is estimated to be in commercial operation in June 1991. The Company's Petition has been designated as Docket No. 8880 at the Commission. In such Petition the Company seeks an order from the Commission allowing the Company to defer the depreciation, operation and maintenance expenses, tax expenses and carrying costs associated with TNP One, Units 1 and 2 from the respective commercial-in-service dates of those units until the time rates reflecting such costs are in effect. The Company is also requesting that the Commission approve an adjustment to the calculation of its PCRF factor. This change to the PCRF factor will not affect rates until the respective commercial operation dates of the units, and would be in effect from that date until each unit's costs are allowed into rate base by Commission order. Approval of this request will not result in an increase in current rates. The rate treatment afforded these costs will, however, have a bearing on overall costs which are included in rates that customers pay over the life of the plant. The Company seeks timely regulatory action to permit the deferral of these costs to be reflected in financial statements for the deferral period, which is from the date of commercial operation until each unit's costs are allowed in rate base. At a prehearing conference held on July 17, 1989, the Administrative Law Judge set a September 8, 1989, deadline for motions to intervene and scheduled the hearing on the merits of the Company's Petition for November 27, 1989, at 10:00 a.m. at the Commission offices in Austin, Texas.

visitors and three candidates. Thenext meeting will be September 5 at 7:30 p.m.

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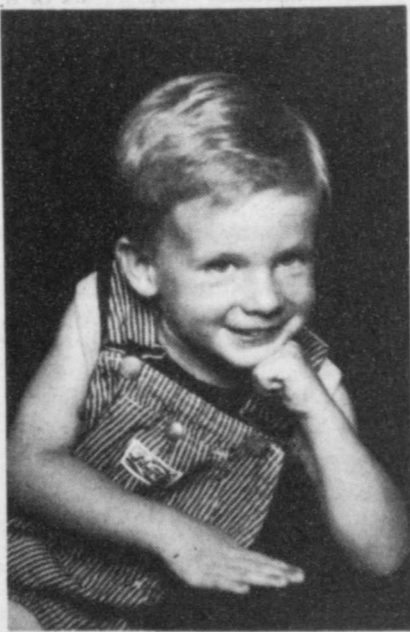

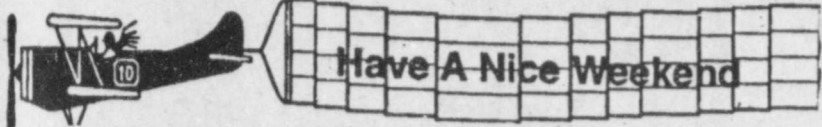

Pairiland Meal Program Information Released

The Prairiland Consolidated Independent School District will begin registering children who are eligible for the free and reduced-price meals program.

On the first day of school, students will be given an application to be filled out either by a parent or guardian and returned to the school. Instead of regular meal prices of \$1.00 for lunch and 50¢ for breakfast, students who qualify for reduced-price meals will pay 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

Children from households with incomes not exceeding the family size and income specified below are eligible for free or reduced-priced meals:

Once the applications are handed out, parents and guardians are urged by the school administration to return the forms within 10 days. However, applications will be received any time during the year, especially if a family's income changes significantly, someone in the household becomes unemployed, or if there is an increase in family size. Also, if there are foster children living in the home, they may be eligible for these benefits.

School officials said information will be kept confidential and that all information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year to verify statements made. Anyone requiring assistance in filling out the application may contact the child's school.

Mile High Strawberry Pie

- 1 Keebler Ready-Crust Graham Cracker Pie Crust
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen strawberries, thawed
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 egg whites
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- Dash of salt
- 1 cup whipped cream
- 1 tsp. vanilla

In medium bowl, combine strawberries, sugar, egg whites, lemon juice and salt. Beat for 15 minutes or until very stiff. Blend vanilla into whipped cream. Fold into strawberry mixture. Mound a "mile high" into crust. Chill 2 to 3 hours.
