Constable Boren Complains To Commissioners About Car Expenses

"Although I've been verbally commended numerous times by citizens and the commissioners, about the excellent job I'm doing in Precinct One, I can't keep doing this, it's not fair to my wife and kids" Precinct one Constable Randy Boren stated after appearing at the Commissioner's Court meeting Monday, Aug. 28.

According to Boren, he has had to take \$2,011 out of his annual salary of \$12,113 to cover car expenses that the current travel allowance didn't cover.

Boren says that he has been plagued with financial difficulty since taking office eight months ago.

His salary up to date has been \$7,520, maintenance, travel, gas, insurance and car payments have totalled \$3,011.08. His patrol car has 180,000 miles on it.

"In the past" Boren says "constables have mostly served papers, but now a constable must patrol his precinct, serve papers and work on his own cases."

He is on call 24 hours a day, while deputies, except in unusual circumstances, work a 40 hour work week.

Boren says that the crime rate in Precinct 1 has decreased by fifty percent since he took office, and he feels that this is directly related to the 60 or 70 hours a week he works.

He has made 130 arrests, filed 160-170 offense reports and worked 15 to 20 burglaries during that time.

Boren says that he feels that it is unfair that county road workers often make more per month than he does for their 40 hours a week.

A Lamar County Deputy, he continues, has a patrol car furnished and draws a salary of \$16,810 per month. Boren definitely feels that constables should draw as much as the deputies.

Boren stated "I love law enforcement and I want to do my job, but I'm going to have to seek other employment if I can't get some more car expenses."

This statement is a result of the Commissioners Court's decision to give constables a 10 per cent cost of living raise, and leaving car expenses at \$485 per month, where

they were set last June.

Precinct One Commissioner Troy Owens, says that Commissioners have not ruled out the possibility of a Pilot Program where a constable would be furnished a vehicle and allowed to come to a central location for fuel.

Owens stated that not all constables are in favor of having a car furnished.

Owens also said that he felt like funds could be available to furnish constables a car, but that would have to be determined by the court at a later date.

"Remember" he said "I only have one vote in the commissioners court".

Owens reported that a budget hearing is set for Friday, Sept. 1 at 5 p.m. and the budget will probably be voted on during the court's regular meeting September 11.

What is currently being proposed is that travel expenses have been set at \$5,820 per year, another \$1,200 per year for office supplies and clothes, and all county employees are to receive the ten per cent raise mentioned earlier.

Red River County Awarded Prison

Elated County Judge Says "New Jobs For Red River County!"

At last! After months, and even years of disappointments, new jobs are coming to Red River County.

An elated judge L.D. Williamson telephoned the good news from Austin on Tuesday, August 29.

A low-security to house several hundred inmates being prepared for "reentry" into the civilian economy will be located on Highway 82 west of Clarksville.

Judge Williamson, who has spearheaded efforts to attract industry or other major employers to the county, had traveled to Austin to represent Red River County's bid for the prison facility. After several years of economic decline the prison will create

new jobs and inject several million dollars into the local economy.

The initial earth-moving contract to prepare the site for prison construction was let at the courthouse on August 29, to Harrison, Walker and Harper of Paris, Texas.

Excavation will begin immediately. "This means money coming directly in to the Red River County economy" observed First Precinct Commissioner Drue Pirtle.

Next steps include invitation to contractors to bid on the general contract for prison construction. This contract, expected to reach the neighborhood of \$7 million, is scheduled to be awarded one month after issuance of the bid invitation.

Social Security Notes

Fifty percent of Social Security beneficiaries have direct deposit. When the idea of direct deposit of Social Security checks was first introduced in the middle 1970's, most people were not used to the idea of having their checks deposited directly into accounts in their financial institutions. They were used to having their checks in their hands by the third day of the month.

To prevent their checks from sitting in the mailbox for a long time, beneficiaries had to be home when the checks were delivered.

On many occasions, plans for a vacation trip scheduled to start before the third of the month, or to end many days after the beginning of the month, had to be changed out of concern for the checks. Then the idea of direct deposit began to be more attractive.

To be home on the third of the month was not always enough. Sometimes the check did not arrive on time. There was also the standing in line to cash the check.

All these concerns are solved with direct deposit. When people started discovering the advantages of this service, the number of beneficiaries with direct deposit grew. However, 50% of the 38.6 million of Social Security beneficiaries now have direct deposit.

Advantages of direct deposit include: freedom from worry, freedom to be far away from home any day of the month, freedom from waiting in line to cash the check, and the assurance that the check is safe in the bank ready to be used at any moment from any place.

And this can be supported by more than 18 million Social Security beneficiaries who are presently enjoying the advantages of this service.

To arrange for direct deposit, just contact your local Social Security office. Be sure to have your Social Security number and a copy of your deposit slip, or something that shows information about your account.

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Hot Air Ballooning At Sunrise Is Uplifting Experience!

Okay, here's a little more vacation account. Thanks for the kind words regarding the other installment of our trip!

Independence pass through the Colorado Rockies, like much of that gorgeous state, was breath-taking. As our car climbed and climbed we stopped to read the information about the pass, which can be travelled in an hour now. Back in the 1800's the pass took 15 to 24 hours, and many died in the attempt to cross. Along the way we passed the ghostly stands of aspen trees, chattering softly among themselves as the breeze stirred their heart-shaped leaves.

Wildflowers lit the side of the road in color, and the vistas of mountain ranges spread beneath us.

We found the town of Aspen sadly changed. A small ski resort, it has turned in the last few years into a big ski resort, complete with traffic problems and inflated prices.

Then we plunged down McClure pass and headed out towards the town of Delta. Fertile valleys, irrigated and filled with potatoes made the trip pleasant. Then we rounded a corner and hit an area of desolate mesas and treeless expanses.

After a number of hours of this depressing countryside it again began to become mountainous as we entered the San Juan mountain range.

We turned off for the old mining town of Telluride, our headquarters for the next few days, and went to bed early so that we could arise at 4 in the morning.

At four thirty the next day we set out for Ridgway, where our hot air balloon ride awaited us.

The drive through the dark revealed deer on the side of the mountains, and sleepy dairies just setting about the day's business.

At Ridgway we met Gary Woods and his wife, our balloonists, and our companions, Joe and Rory Gonzales of California. Hot cups of coffee went a long way towards waking us up, but nothing brought us awake as quickly as the sight of that brightly colored bag of fabric being literally poured out on the ground.

Thomas and Joe drew work detail, holding the mouth of the enormous balloon open while Gary cranked a gasoline powered fan to begin pumping cold air into the inside.

Slowly the gigantic orange and yellow envelope began to fill. Wrinkle after wrinkle slid out as the balloon began to take up the whole world. At least that's how it seemed to those of us close to it.

As soon as it was filled our pilot made a radio check, sent up a pibal (a balloon with streamers attached) to check winds aloft, and made a check of winds on the surface. Then, with a roar that made us all jump, he let loose a blast of the burners, heating the air within the balloon.

Slowly, and with a lot of grace, the structure filled and began to stand upright. All of us grabbed the edges of the wicker basket to keep the thing from simply sailing off into the sky.

Then it was time to scramble in, and quietly, without fanfare, we lifted off. As if it had been planned, the sun broke over the mountain ranges and sent shafts of sunlight streaming across the earth below. Rivers glittered, windows winked, and the world grew smaller.

Silent flight, that's what hot air ballooning offers. No wind noise, because the balloon is going with the wind, not against it. True, it's difficult to chart a route, because one's course is decided by nature, not human desire.

All too soon it was time for us to begin to descend. At 1000 feet, the world was lovely, indeed.

It was with some alarm we realised we were heading straight into a tall tree. Laughing, our pilot instructed us to pluck some leaves from the top as a souvenir, then calmly took us right out of the top of the tree and back up! He had known exactly what he was doing the whole time.

We landed between a stream and a highway. Until absolutely the last second all the passengers were convinced that we were going to get very wet, but again, Gary knew what he was doing.

On the ground once more we were handed cups of champagne, and toasted a safe flight. Then Gary recited the balloonists prayer, something he does every time. After thanking God for a safe and beautiful flight he said the closing line, one which keeps echoing through my mind "we have laughed upon the winds...and God shares in our laughter". Ballooning is one of the most inspiring, beautiful ways to fly imaginable!

Back at the balloon ranch we all had hot, home made honey muffins, and sat under a big tree, talking with the Gonzales' about their trip and ours, about odds and ends, and simply sharing the experience. The Woods went off to take another couple up, and left us there, in possession of their home, to stay as long as we pleased.

We discovered that actor Dennis Weaver has bought a ranch at Ridgway, and is building a partially underground house, insulated with old tires! The cabin he is currently staying in is tiny and looks about to fall down.

Then it was time to leave new found friends once more (again exchanging addresses) and head back to Telluride for a leisurely day of exploring this old mining town.

Telluride is also called "To Hell You Ride" because of its lusty, rowdy past. It used to boast an enormous selection of saloons and bordellos, most of which are converted to restaurants and shops now.

Butch Cassidy, the famous outlaw, used to wash dishes in the town. I guess he got tired of that, because he showed up one day and committed his first bank robbery there on main street!

The cemetery is high on a hill, and unlike most of the old cemeteries of the past holds few infant or women's graves. Instead it holds the graves of men between the ages of 20 and 40...almost all victims of mining accidents.

The town is full of beautiful victorian style homes, filled with stained glass and gingerbread work. A delight of bright paint and careful restoration, the real estate prices are absolutely unbelievable. Some homes go for up to a million dollars!

We picniced (mostly to save money, the food prices there are high, high) beneath Bridal Veil Falls, the highest waterfall in Colorado. The 389 foot waterfall is absolutely spectacular, and provided a perfect backdrop for the picnic.

We talked to hikers as they passed and then wandered back down to town to explore some more. Then we checked to make sure our trip up Black Bear Pass was still on. That's when things got scary and hairy! What a ride!

Ornamentals Suffering From Disease Infections

Many landscape ornamentals are suffering from fungal leaf spot infections or powdery mildew, according to Dr. George Philley, extension plant pathologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Service in Overton.

"Powdery mildew generally increases with cooler weather," said Dr. Philley. "A continued spray program with the proper fungicide is required to control foliar diseases."

Black spot can defoliate roses if untreated or if treatments are skipped. This causes the bushes to be unsightly, reduces flower development and decreases plant vigor. If the plants lose their leaves, new growth may begin late in the season and be highly susceptible to freeze damage.

"Other ornamentals being affected by leaf spot fungi or powdery mildew are crepe myrtle, photinia and dequonymous," Philley said. "When spraying plants with waxy leaves, use a wetting agent to make the solution spread over the leaf surface rather than balling-up and running off the leaf."

Several fungicides are available for controlling both leaf spots and powdery mildew. "Where heavy damage can occur, the most important point in controlling these diseases is a regular, uninterrupted spray schedule," Philley said.

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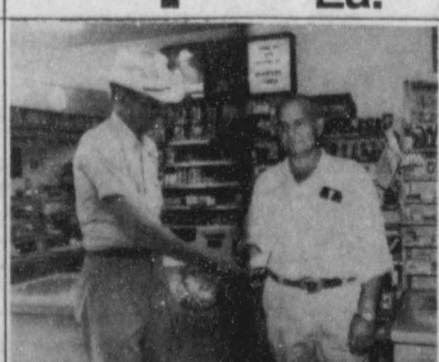

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NOTICE OF PETITION FOR APPROVAL OF DEFERRED ACCOUNTING TREATMENT FOR TNP ONE, UNITS 1 AND 2 AND ADJUSTMENT TO PURCHASED POWER COST RECOVERY FACTOR ("PCRF") CALCULATION

Texas-New Mexico Power Company ("Company") hereby publishes notice that it has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") a Petition for Approval of Deferred Accounting Treatment for TNP One, Units 1 and 2 and Adjustment to PCRF Calculation pursuant to Sections 16(a), and 27 of Article 1446e, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes and Section 23.12(a) of the Substantive Rules of the Commission. TNP One is a lignite-fired generating station being constructed by the Company in Robertson County, Texas. The Company estimates that the first Unit of TNP One will be in commercial operation in June 1990. Unit 2 is estimated to be in commercial operation in June 1991. The Company's Petition has been designated as Docket No. 8880 at the Commission. In such Petition the Company seeks an order from the Commission allowing the Company to defer the depreciation, operation and maintenance expenses, tax expenses and carrying costs associated with TNP One, Units 1 and 2 from the respective commercial-in-service dates of those units until the time rates reflecting such costs are in effect. The Company is also requesting that the Commission approve an adjustment to the calculation of its PCRF factor. This change to the PCRF factor will not affect rates until the respective commercial operation dates of the units, and would be in effect from that date until each unit's costs are allowed into rate base by Commission order. Approval of this request will not result in an increase in current rates. The rate treatment afforded these costs will, however, have a bearing on overall costs which are included in rates that customers pay over the life of the plant. The Company seeks timely regulatory action to permit the deferral of these costs to be reflected in financial statements for the deferral period, which is from the date of commercial operation until each unit's costs are allowed in rate base.

At a prehearing conference held on July 17, 1989, the Administrative Law Judge set a September 8, 1989, deadline for motions to intervene and scheduled the hearing on the merits of the Company's Petition for November 27, 1989, at 10:00 a.m. at the Commission offices in Austin, Texas.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Social Security Notes

Calling Social Security... You can contact Social Security in a variety of ways. Choose whichever is most convenient to you. You can call, write or visit. You can also make an appointment to file a claim.

Social Security recommends calling before coming to the office for a variety of reasons. You may be able to complete your business by telephone. If you do have to visit the office, you can find out what to bring with you when you come.

Before calling, you may want to have some information with you to help complete your call efficiently. You should have your Social Security number and, if you receive benefits or have Medicare, your claim number. The claim number is shown on all correspondence and is on the Medicare card. A telephone number where you can be reached is also helpful.

The best times to call Social Security are Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. The first week of each month

is a very busy time and many people try to contact Social Security on Mondays. You may want to avoid these times.

Of course, you can contact Social Security at any time. If you have a question about a specific letter, or notice, you should have it with you when you call, or bring it with you if you come to the office in person.

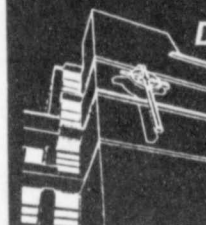
If you are calling to report an event which will affect benefits, have the information ready. For example, to report a change of address, have the full new address, including ZIP code. To report a death, have the beneficiary's Social Security and claim numbers as well as the date of death and information about the surviving spouse if there is one.

Whether you call, or visit in person, Social Security employees will try to give you friendly, efficient service. A recent study shows that most people who contact Social Security by telephone prefer to call if they have to contact us again.



Keeping Healthy

New Test For Perfume-Allergies
A sizeable percentage of people experience itching and discomfort because they are allergic to one of the fragrances found in the perfume they wear, or the products they use.

Now dermatologists are able to use relatively new tests to determine which components are causing the allergic skin reaction so the patient can avoid products that contain it, according to Wallace E. Larsen, MD, clinical professor of dermatology at the Oregon Health Sciences University.

Called a fragrance mixture, one test "is a combination of the eight most common fragrance allergens detected over the last several years." The fragrance mixture is applied to the skin. "If positive response occurs to the fragrance mixture, the eight components should be tested separately." This mixture detects between 70 and 80 per cent of sensitivity to fragrances.

Persons who have a negative response to the fragrance mixture may be tested against the individual components of the perfume or product that caused the problem.

The physician suggests that patients who have had allergic reactions can safely apply perfume to their clothing or hair, and fragrance-free cosmetics can be used on the skin.

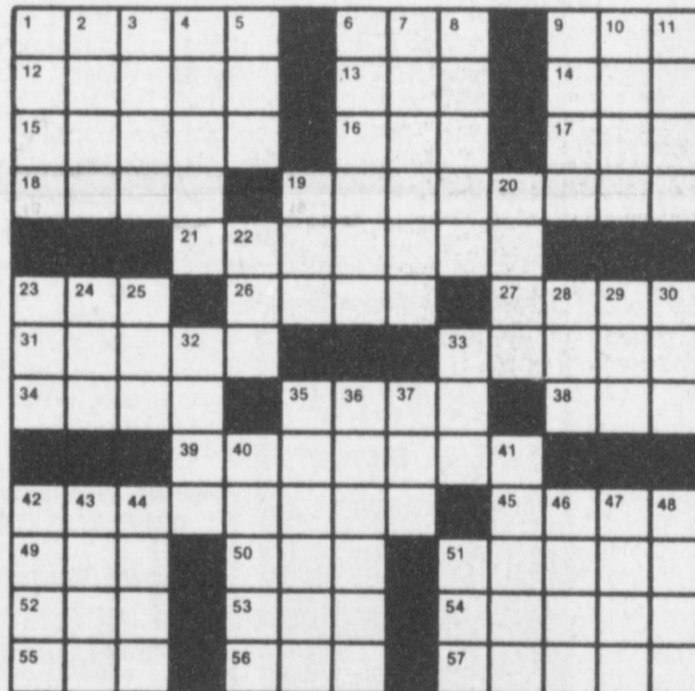

Tuna-Noodle Primavera
1/2 cup thinly sliced carrots
1/4 cup sliced green onions (with tops)
1 pkg. (10 ozs.) frozen cut green beans, thawed and drained
1 pkg. (10 ozs.) frozen peas, thawed and drained
1 can (4 ozs.) mushroom stems and pieces, drained
1/4 cup margarine or butter
