Therefore, take notice. It will be over before we have time to fully appreciate it.

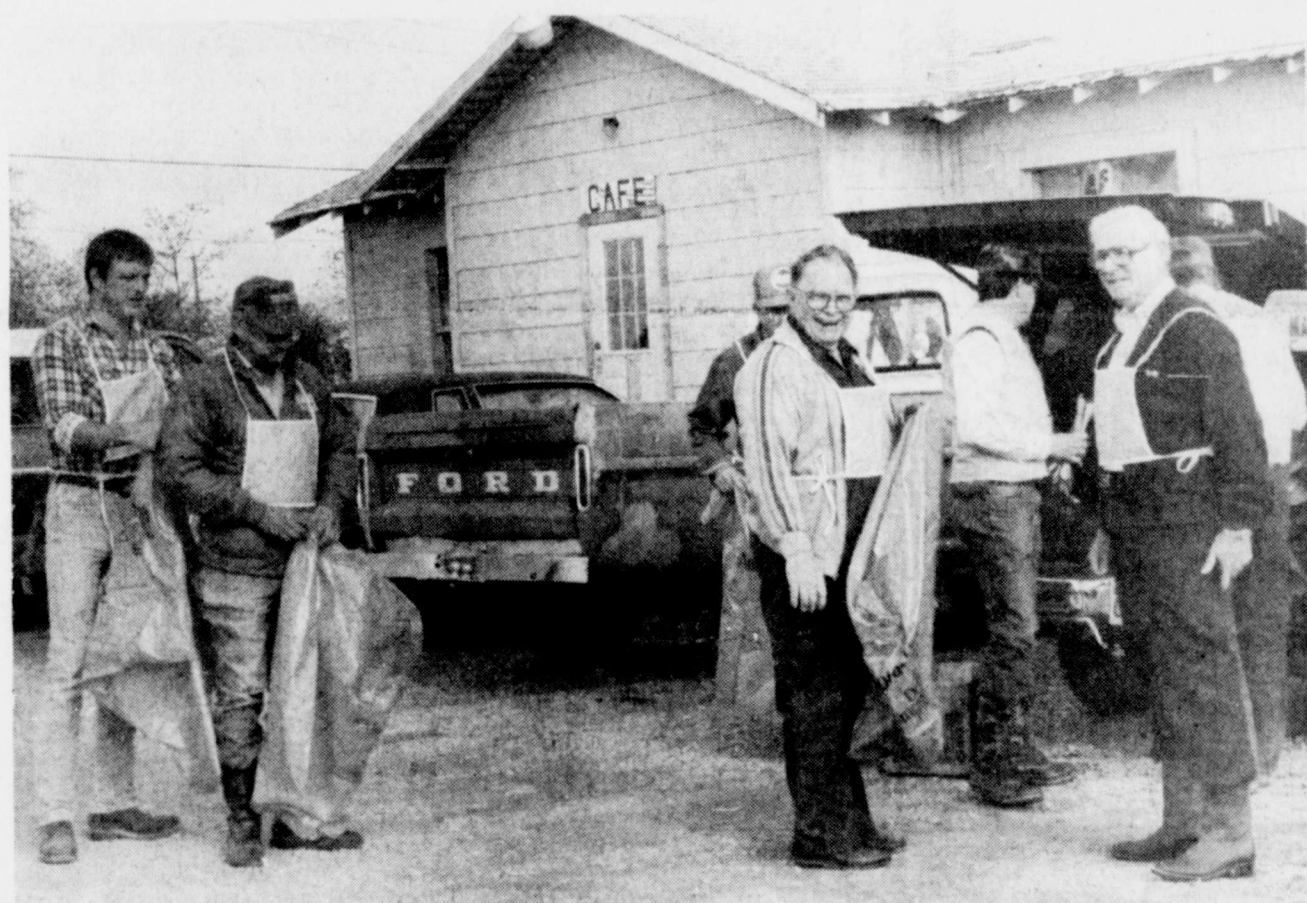
So take your glimpses now. Let indoor things slide...they will certainly be there later...and spring won't.

## Deathless Day Tops Decade Of Progress In Traffic Safety

It's official. On June 13, 1989, no one died in a Texas motor vehicle accident.

That makes for a happy ending to the Texas Coalition for Safety Belt's "One Deathless Day" campaign.

"Final 1989 traffic statistics, released this morning by the Texas Department of Public Safety, confirmed that June 13 was the first deathless day since January 5, 1977," said George R. Gustafson, coalition spokesperson and president of Texas Safety Association.

"Too often, it seems that the only news we hear is bad," Gustafson added. "This is good news, and we want all of Texas to hear it."

The safety belt coalition, representing 52 public and private sector organizations, led a statewide "One

railroad crossing safety, motorcycle, bicycle and pedestrian safety," Gustafson said.

"June 13 was just one day in a decade," he added. "But it shows that lives can be saved when Texans work together. It takes effort on many fronts, and the rewards may not be immediate. However, as we've seen today, effort eventually pays off."

"Grassroots organizations such as Traffic Safety Now Inc., Mothers Against Drunk Driving, and the Safe Kids coalitions, which began in the 1980's, have helped make traffic safety a public issue," he added. The decade also saw the development of many community education programs funded through the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"And now, this year, we're seeing automatic safety belts or air bags installed in all new cars," said Gustafson. "Our job is not finished by any means, but occupant protection in the 1990's will be a whole new ballgame."

Deathless Day" promotion in the summer months of 1988 and 1989. During the first summer, at least three traffic fatalities were recorded every day.

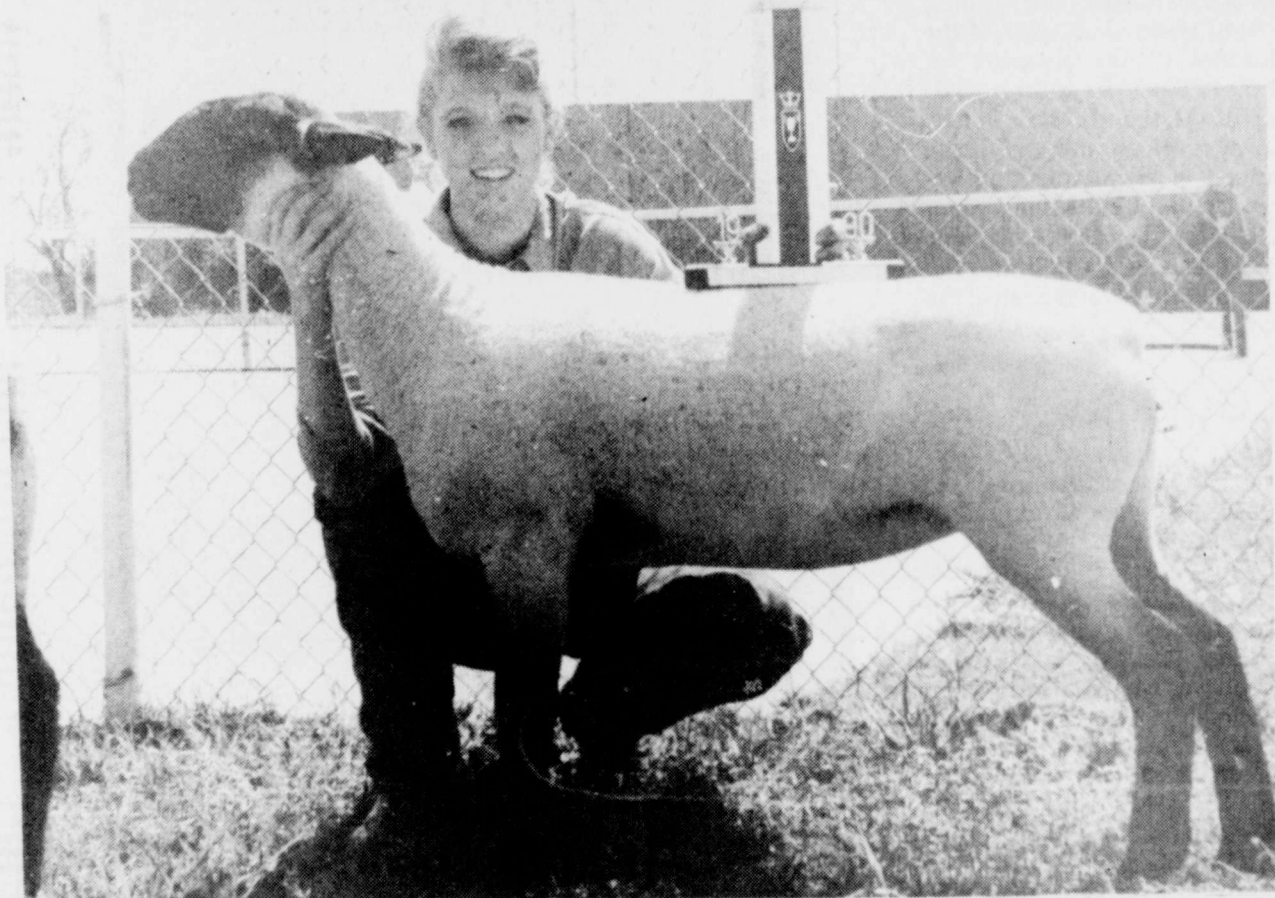

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# New Jersey Man Has Hobby That Keeps Him In Touch With The World

Some time ago, we received a letter from a man by the name of John Weite, who lives in Union City, New Jersey. Mr. Weite asked us for copies of our "flags", the heading on the front page of our papers.

We were happy to help him, but asked for some more information, plus a picture about his unusual hobby.

This week we received a reply, and found him to be a most interesting man.

Weite is a veteran of World War II Bomb Disposal Unit. He and his wife have been married for 50 years, and have one daughter and three grandchildren.

He began his flag collection in 1974, while he and his wife were on vacation. While vacationing, they would pass the time buying local papers to read. He found the small-

town papers to be the most interesting of all, and decided to save them. However, this soon began to take up a lot of space, so he settled on just keeping the names.

Soon his friends, neighbors and relatives began to help him collect newspaper flags...he was hooked!

He obtained a list of the State Association of Newspapers to get more names, and his collection now numbers upwards of 25,000!!

He has written to editors and publishers for more flags...and says that they are very cooperative.

He was even asked by a woman of the Bird City Times to guest-write on hobbies and has made lots of friends, some of whom he may never meet, but keeps in contact with.

The books he keeps the flags in are homemade, and indexed by states,

foreign and Canadian. He mounts each flag on a page with a colored border, population and any data such as birthplace, historic data, etc.

He says the hobby keeps him very busy, and he also does oil painting, which he says "clutters my home and fills my hours". His wife doesn't complain about this.

His hobby and picture have been published in both the U.S. and Canadian newspapers. He trades with two other collectors, one in England and one in California. His books are carefully indexed for easy reference.

# Arigo Riders 4-H Club To Sponsor Coggins Testing For Horses

April 7, Saturday, is the date set for the Coggins (EIA) testing for horses, sponsored by the Arigo Riders 4-H Club. The charge, per horse, will be only \$10.00.

The testing will be held at the Bogata Rodeo Arena at 1:30 p.m. for anyone having horses that would like to take this opportunity to have them tested.

Dr. Lyle Nottingham from Lamar Veterinary Clinic in Paris will be the attending veterinarian at the testing.

"There is not a vaccine for EIA," stressed Dr. Nottingham. "The only way you can find out is by testing."

Recent statistics show that in February, 1989, in Area IV (which includes Red River County), there were 96 cases of EIA. This year in February, there were 102 cases.

And, as of August 31, 1989, there were 484 EIA reactors found in the state of Texas, and most of those were found in Northeast Texas. Since September of 1989, 234 have been disclosed with 102 of these horses being in Area IV.

"State law prohibits any horse in the state being moved without a negative EIA test," said Dr. Nottingham. "You cannot take a horse across

the state line without a negative test, it is against the law." This law thusly prohibits horses being taken to horse shows or rodeos, and this includes local activities that people ride in only once a year! These horses, though they are not taken from their pastures but once a year, are not exempt from this disease.

"And please don't be fooled by the horse's appearance," Dr. Nottingham added. "The horse that looks healthy is just as likely to be a reactor. And the horse standing in the pasture that is retired, or never taken anywhere, is just as probable to be a reactor, and is more than capable of spreading the disease to other horses within your herd, or to an adjacent herd."

Recent university studies have concluded that EIA in horses is the same virus as AIDS in people. It is incurable, there is no vaccine to prevent it, and it is always fatal. And more than that, it is spreading, due to the fact that many people don't test, or won't test, because they are afraid of the results. The ONLY way to fight and wipe out the disease is for every horse owner to test every horse they own, and to accept the

results and comply with state law.

Only a licensed veterinarian can pull the blood necessary to make this test, and send it in to the state laboratory for testing, and the test is only good for six months.

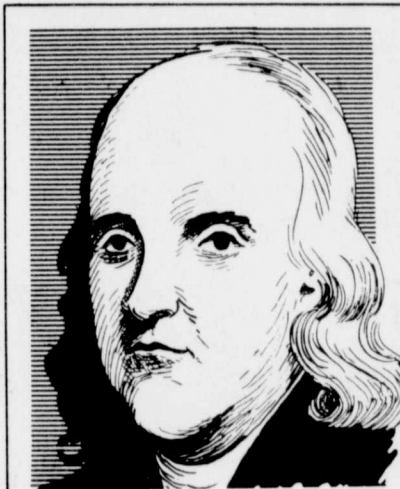
EIA can be spread by flies, mosquitoes, and vaccinating needles.

Everyone is urged to take advantage of this service, provided by your local Arigo Riders 4-H Club. The cost for the testing on April 7 is less than if a horse is carried to a veterinarian's office.

Please help fight this disease among our equine friends. We are not doing any horse a favor by not testing. We are only prolonging the problem, we are not working toward the solution.

As statistics show, this area has the highest rate of EIA reactors in the whole state of Texas. Though the end result for an EIA positive horse is not something we want to think about, or something we want to face, our apathy to the disease is only making the problem worse, and is only proving to be a fate for many generations of horses of the future. This is a fate that we can help to eradicate, but it must be stopped now.

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## In Case Of Robbery....

Citizens and the sheriff working together against crime have released facts concerning robberies that can be of major assistance to many persons placed in the circumstances of a robbery.

Before a hold up, fortify your business against robber attack. Instruct employees of actions to be taken in the event of a robbery. If you have an alarm system, show your employees how to use it. If practically, mark doorways at varying heights to facilitate subsequent identification of the robber. Booby trap your cash register with "bait money", bills that have been pre-recorded with serial numbers and series. The most dangerous times of day are opening and closing hours.

Have one person wait across the street while the other locks the store. Tell the world that you have a good cash protection system. Signs help deter burglars and robbers. Keep the absolute minimum of working cash on hand and overnight. A first time good haul for the burglar or robber increases the likelihood that you'll be hit again. Don't let large amounts of cash accumulate in your register. There are special under counter, quick deposit lockers in which money can be stored until you go to the bank. Use all precautions when you bank cash. Use armored car services if you can. Avoid routine. Bank during

daylight hours and take different routes at different times of the day. Count cash in a private area away from the public eye. Don't hesitate to call the Sheriff when you are worried about special risks or if anyone acts suspiciously. Do not use or encourage the use of firearms. No amount of money is worth the personal safety of you or your employees. Do install a daytime alarm system that silently signals a remote monitor during a holdup. If you are operating a high risk business, consider additional deterrents such as camera surveillance equipment, time locks and bullet resistant partitions.

During a hold up, take no action that would jeopardize personnel safety or your own. Treat any firearm displayed by a robber as loaded. Activate the alarm only if you can safely do so. Attempt to alert other employees by use of pre-arranged signals. Don't be a hero, follow the robber's directions but don't volunteer more than he asks for. If the robber has written a note, place it out of sight to retain as evidence. Give the robber only that money he demands. Study the robber carefully, his race, age, height, sex; clothing, the way he walks; speech characteristics, scars or deformities; and the method of operation. Note the number of ac-

complices and how they escaped; direction, type and color of the car, license number. Observe the type of weapon used.

After a hold up, call the sheriff's department. Give the exact time of robber's departure. Lock all doors and ask all witnesses to remain until deputies arrive. Do not let anyone in except deputies, and medical personnel if needed. Protect the scene of the crime, touch nothing. Jot down everything you can remember about the crime and your description of robbers. Ask all witnesses to do the same. Do not discuss details of the crime with anyone until after you have given your information to deputies. Assist investigating officers in every way you can. Don't discuss details of your security system with persons other than deputies or security equipment representatives.

There is a trained Crime Prevention officer in your Sheriff's Department who can help you—call him for a security survey and recommendation for security measures on your place of business.

Report any suspicious or unusual circumstances by calling the Sheriff's Department.

## Termites And Ants Swarming

By Herb Brevard  
Extension Specialist

Termites and ants are swarming in many parts of East Texas, says Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

"Termites and ants look similar when swarming," Robinson said. "Upon close inspection, termites are black, broad waisted and have very delicate transparent wings that come off easily. Ants can be black or red and black, have a thin thread-like waist and their wings do not come off easily."

If termites are found inside the

home, this is a strong indication that an active termite colony is in the structure. Swarms outside the home may indicate an infestation either in or outside the home.

"It is wise to have the home inspected by a trained pest control operator if an infestation is suspected," Robinson said. "If you do it yourself, look in areas around water pipes, bathrooms, soil surfaces and areas that may have water damage."

"Treatment of termite infestations should be left to a professional pest control operator," Robinson said.
