I had a wonderful birthday weekend. I fulfilled one of those little dreams most of us have, and went flying in a Steerman.

For those who may not know what a Steerman is, it's an open cockpit, vintage biplane.

To me, it's what flying is all about...the wind whipping the face, the earth slowly moving by below. It's a feeling of total peace and contentment, a disassociation from the world below. No panel of dozens upon dozens of instruments, just basics like altimeter, air speed and fuel. It's basic flight.

The pilot dipped and dived, diving over and generally delighted me.

When we finally landed and taxied up for fuel the awesome, AT6 was sitting out on the pad.

"Let's just give you a ride in this" the pilot grinned. I lit up like the proverbial Christmas tree.

But some things don't work out quite like planned.

The AT 6 is another vintage aircraft. It was used during World War II to train pilots, and is as different from a Steerman as can be imagined.

It possess well over 600 horse power, arrayed in radial majesty.

The AT 6 doesn't crank up without drawing a small crowd of air-craft buffs.

Soooo, I managed to scramble up on the big silver wing. The pilot points to this tiny little metal flange behind me, high up on the side of the aircraft.

"Put your foot on that, grasp the side of the cockpit and pull yourself up straight, then step down into the seat" he said.

I tried timidly. I didn't make it. I looked down on the ground, which suddenly seemed a lot further down than I realized.

Below me was a grinning circle of unfamiliar male faces.

There was one familiar face...that of my smiling husband, armed with a camera.

One of the men said "Don't worry, if you fall, just throw yourself into the cockpit head-first".

Sure. Oh, Yeah. Right. I'm going to be wedged headfirst in the seat of an AT 6 with strangers laughing their heads off. I'm going to take this risk while my spouse is merrily shooting pictures. Uh huh.

I try again, only to flop back down on the wing.

The pilot, a true gentleman, says "Oh, well, it's no problem, we've got a ladder around her somewhere".

That scene rises up before me. I've SEEN that airport ladder. It's about as old as the airplane, in fact, maybe older. It looks like it was used to scale castle walls in medieval times!

I can see my bulk wobbling up to the tip top of that structure, and leaping into the cockpit.

The potential for total humiliation was just too great.

I shake my head-stop and think, then my eyes fasten on my still smiling husband.

"Let him go instead" I say softly.

I want you to know he didn't say anything to the effect of "go ahead, it's your birthday". He didn't offer to get the ladder, or hold it, or anything else.

In fact, he almost knocked me off the wing in his hurry to get UP there!

I scrambled down, face burning in embarrassment.

That's how I came to sit on the grass and watch him taxi off in that incredible machine, to have a wonderful time.

But, I had a wonderful time too, in the biplane. So it all balanced out. But, I think we made a mistake.

If we'd taken a video camera to film my attempts to get in that plane we would, without a doubt, have become richer. No way that funniest home video program could have passed THAT one up!

Retirees Are Raising The Roof!

These Men Spend "Golden Years" Living "Golden Rule"

The scene is Cunningham, workmen toil under the Texas summer sun. Sweat glistens on brows...and faith shines from their faces.

With smooth efficiency this building crew has raised four church walls within three hours, and have the inside walls cut.

Their average age is seventy. Yet it would be difficult to find a work crew that could match them in excellence and enthusiasm.

The sign proclaims "Built for the Glory of God by Texas Baptist Men". There's a lot of joking about putting up a note that says "And One Methodist Man", for one of the twenty three workers on the job Monday morning at Cunningham was retired Methodist instead of Baptist.

They may be the hardest working group of retirees anywhere around. They work from January until October each year, building churches where ever there is a need.

Last Thursday and Friday this crew came into Cunningham. Their camping trailers are neatly rowed up, their trailer, loaded with all their tools and equipment, is on site. The slab was ready. Ten working days from now, the Cunningham Baptist Church will be complete except for sheet rock finishing and painting.

Their pay for this job is one meal a day...the rest of the time their wives, who are also on hand, will be fixing food for them.

Cunningham church members are there to assist in any way possible. Rev. Glen Renfro can't get the smile on his face quite wiped off.

And Monday morning, when the first wall went up, there was more than one tear of joy shed.

There are three other crews working in Texas right now.

They have been doing this for nearly thirteen years.

Olan Miles is the co-ordinator for this crew, and had much to do with the whole idea of retirees serving the Lord through building churches.

A soft spoken, pleasant man whose devotion is very evident, he speaks of growing up on a farm as a youngster.

"When a farmer was injured or sick, everyone pitched in and worked the crop until he was well...when the church building burned everyone came in and they built it back" he remembers.

"I got to thinking that this type of thing would be a real mission".

The groups don't build churches where a congregation is wealthy enough to just hire it done with no "pinch".

No strangers to this area, they have built the Lakeview Baptist Church after the Paris tornado, and the Emberson church after that tornado.

So far this year they have built 26 churches. In addition, they conduct revival services during the construction period!

This Sunday, six days after they began, these laymen will conduct services in the new building!

Each meeting will feature a different speaker as they witness for God.

The idea of people helping people in this manner is nationally known.

This association has been featured on CBS, NBC and many local stations.

They have built churches as far away as Hawaii and Alaska.

They hail from all over the state: Beaumont, Midland, La Mesa, Woodville, Austin, Corpus Christi and even Clovis, New Mexico.

Patience wives adjust to being "on the road" most of the year. They gather with local church women for fellowship and fun, frequently at the old church structure. They visit door to door, and carry on mission work like their men.

Tools are purchased through donations and a mission fund.

When asked what happens when a really expensive piece of equipment goes out Olan smiles "Somehow there is always a donation or fund to

meet the need". "It just happens" he continues.

Each crew consists of a lead electrician, lead plumber, lead carpenter, a superintendent of trailers, and a spiritual leader.

The plumber is that lone Methodist. He jokes that he isn't going to plumb them a Baptismal Font, and that the Cunningham Baptist will have to "sprinkle".

Their tool trailer is a masterpiece of organization. From radial saws to hammers, everything has a proper place. Their temporary electric hook-ups, and everything they need to begin work smoothly, is all on hand.

Very few of them are actually pursuing the work they spent their life time as an "employed" (it's impossible to see these men as retired) people doing.

One worked for Southwest Bell Telephone, another was a machinist. They come from varied walks of life, and spend their time now working for God.

They will be here only a short time, but in that time they do so much.

They asked that an invitation be extended to everyone to attend their services...Sunday morning at 11:00, then Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 7:00 at the new church, just west of Cunningham on the main road.

Driving off, a glance in the rear view mirror shows each and every one of them back at work again, sawing, using hammers and nail guns intent on their purpose.

It's impossible not to feel good after watching these dedicated at work.

It's also impossible not to wonder how much more could be achieved in life if more of us could learn to work together to get things done.

These so called "retirees" have added real meaning to the term "Golden Years" for their gift is beyond price...their gift is of themselves.

Proposed Tax Increase Would Gain \$397,000 For School

In special session Monday night the Prairiland CISD Board of Trustees proposed a tax rate for the 1990-91 school year of .8947.

According to Superintendent Max Ballard, at a ninety-five per cent collection rate this amount will bring in the amount of funds the state says that the Prairiland School District must collect in order to be eligible to receive all of the state funds that are available to them.

Ballard stated that "If we had not proposed going to this rate the school would stand to lose \$280,000 in state funds". This increase, Ballard said, will also bring in an additional \$117,000 in local funds.

According to Ballard "The board felt that for the overall good of the school district it was necessary to do this to make sure that these funds were available to be used for the educating of our students".

This increase would be up \$0.1456 or 19.44 percent compared to last year's taxes.

The board set the date of a public

hearing on this matter for August 30, 1990 at 7:00 p.m. in the high school library.

In other business they accepted the resignation of John Talley, assistant football and baseball coach, who has taken the head baseball coach position in Brownsboro ISD. They hired Greg Wood to teach government and economics and assist with the football program.

Three teacher's aides were hired at Blossom to replace three who have resigned in order to attend college.

They adopted board policy 5606 dealing with chemical dependency for students and employees, and discussed the student health program for Prairiland School and decided to check further about obtaining a school nurse.

Bids for bread went to Mrs. Baird's Bread and Borden's Dairies obtained the milk bid.

The board approved budget amendments for the 1989-90 school year, heard the minutes and financial report and approved payment of all bills.



GOING UP-Twenty three retired Baptist men were on hand Monday morning to begin building the Cunningham Baptist Church. The group travels all

over the state and beyond erecting churches, and the only pay they ask for is one meal a day. The men and their wives camp in camping trailers on site, and

will be through in ten working days. The average age of this efficient, co-ordinated crew is about seventy.

Large Dumpster To Be Set Up For Clean Up

The city of Deport will have a large dumpster for citizens of DEPORT only on back street on August

25. This dumpster is paid for by the city of Deport, and is for Deport residents to dispose of items that will not burn or are too large for regular trash pickup.

The City council met in regular session Monday night and discussed putting a ordinance book together which would be available for the public.

The council passed a resolution on a community development act for a grant. It would probably be used for a water study.

The tax rate was accepted at .3704 for the 1990 property taxes.

A discussion was held about a street light but no action was taken.

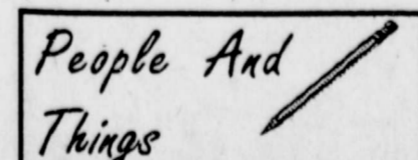
The minutes were read and approved, financial report heard and motion made and passed to pay the bills.

GTE And Contel Sign Definitive Agreement To Merge

GTE Chairman and Chief Executive Officer James L. "Rocky" Johnson and Contel Chairman Charles Wohlsetter recently signed a definitive agreement that will result in the largest merger in the history of the telecommunications industry.

The definitive agreement to merge GTE and Contel, which was approved earlier by each company's board of directors, will create a new company with a market value of \$25 billion," said Johnson.

A preliminary was announced on July 12. The merger is subject to approval by both companies' stockholders as well as various regulatory agencies. As previously announced, GTE will issue 1.27 shares of its common stock in a tax-free exchange for each Contel common share, or about 200 million GTE shares. Both companies will hold special stockholder meetings in the fall, and expect to close the merger around year end.

"We have undertaken a comprehensive review of this merger, and have unanimously agreed with our counterparts at GTE that it is clearly in the best interests of both companies," Wohlsetter said. "I am absolutely certain that the new company resulting from this merger will be even greater than the sum of its parts." GTE's Johnson said, "I am de-

lighted we have accomplished this significant step. It is clear that what we are creating here is a perfect combination of two great companies in terms of compatibility of core businesses, management philosophy and commitment to our shareholders, customers and employees. It will make the new GTE the largest U.S. based, local-exchange telephone company and the second-largest cellular-telephone operator."

The combined companies will have a total of 18 million residential and business telephone-access lines. The companies' cellular-telephone businesses serve a total of approximately 50 million POPs—the second-highest POPs served in the U.S.

Contel is a major local-telephone

and cellular-service provider. Its telephone operations serve 2.6 million access lines in 30 states, and it operates cellular systems through a 90 percent owned subsidiary, Contel Cellular, Inc. in 36 metropolitan areas and is a limited partner in 31 additional metropolitan areas. Contel's 1989 revenues were \$3.1 billion with net income of \$287 million. It employs 22,000.

GTE subsidiaries operate in 46 states and 41 countries, with combined revenues and sales of \$17.4 billion and new income of \$1.4 billion in 1989. GTE is a leader in its three core businesses, telecommunications, lighting and precision materials, providing products and service worldwide.

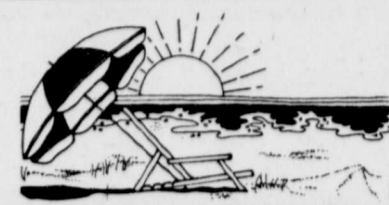

Summer Is Time To Plan Winter Pasture

As producers take inventory of their hay supply and animals to feed this winter, they may discover that winter pasture will be viable alternative, says an agronomist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.
 "The hay supply in some areas is questionable," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "If enough hay is in storage, the producer must either buy more hay, plant winter pasture or sell some cows."
 "Dairymen, stocker operators and cow-calf producers with a fall calving program probably need a small grain winter pasture," Reeves said. "For effective small grain pastures, the land should be prepared in August so that planning can be done about mid-September. Small grain planted about mid-September should be ready for grazing about mid-November if the weather cooperates. Wheat and Rye are the preferred small grains for grazing in East Texas. If the calving season is after Janu-

ary 1, clover-ryegrass may be the best choice for winter grazing. Clover and rye-grass should be planted about mid-October to have grazing available in mid-February. The key to successful clover-ryegrass pastures is having the grass sod extremely short to reduce competition for the young clover and ryegrass plants.
 "Small grain pastures will cost approximately \$125 per acre this year while clover-ryegrass pastures should cost about one-half that amount or about \$60 per acre," Reeves said.
