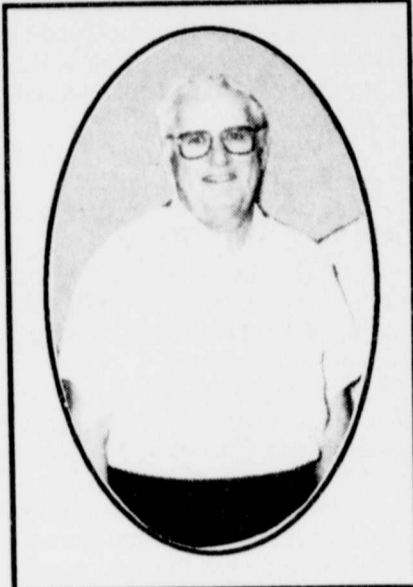

Letter To The Editor:

Dean Ricks of Cherry St. Annex in Paris has sent us a letter recalling the old radio program "Lowrys Variety Show". We don't usually publish such letters, but this one was interesting, and although too long for complete publication, we thought some of our readers might recall some of the things he does.

Mr. Ricks recalls that Fred Kinkaide was station manager back then on KPLT, and John Allen, Oak Ridge singer Duane Allen's older brother was staff announcer, and acted as MC for the Variety Show.

Anyone who could pick and sing had a chance to perform on the program.

He recalls some of the talent was really good, and some of them went on to professional careers.

Billy Gray, who worked for years with Hank Thompson and Roy Price went on to form his own band. Wanda Jackson is now a well known gospel singer.

A young man, Mr. Ricks says, whom "I thought was as near perfect playing the guitar as anyone I had ever heard" was Glen David Kenner of Pattonville.

Glen David went to Nashville and played with some of the big stars. He played with Charley Pride's band for awhile, but didn't like life in the fast lane.

But, Mr. Ricks continues, there was one young man who he especially recalls.

This curly haired, brown headed fellow sang, Ricks says "like he had a clothes pin clamped on his nose". He would sing off key and play wrong chords on his guitar and folks would "laugh and tell him he couldn't sing. He would just turn on a wide grin and keep going".

His first name was Monroe. In 1950 he recorded a number called "If you've got the money-I've got the time". At one time he had four records on the top twenty charts. This fellow was Lefty Frezzell!

James "Pee Wee" Reid is yet another personality Mr. Ricks remembers.

"Preacher" To Celebrate 50 Years Of Service

September 29 marks a special anniversary for Charles Glynn Renfro. This date marks his 67th birthday and is also a celebration of 50 years of Christian service-"preachin', marryin', and buryin'". He surrendered to preach on his 17th birthday and is concluding his active ministry as pastor of Cunningham Baptist Church.

He has asked his church members for one favor this Sunday: time for a 45 minute sermon! He says that he has been working on this sermon for 50 years and simply cannot preach it in his "usual" 15 minutes.

C.G. Renfro was the second son born to Otis and Carrie Renfro of Josephine, TX. After graduation from high school, he did some college work before marrying Dorothy Faye Rucker on May 30, 1943. During the early pastorates he fathered two children. Bobby Renfro is now pastor of Highland Terrace Baptist Church in Greenville. Glenda Loven is a teacher at Christian Fellowship Academy in Paris.

"Preacher" arrived in Deport in 1951. Right away, the townspeople knew they had a new breed of minister. This man worked many jobs: gin worker, gas station attendant, grocery clerk, and was even a cotton picker. After a time, he bought some land and became a cattleman. He also enjoyed a brief stint of farming and today counts among his many friends a bevy of farmers. His hobbies in-

cluded all kinds of hunting and coin collecting.

In addition to the above mentioned jobs, Preacher baptized, preached revivals, conducted funerals, counseled the depressed, visited the sick, married hundreds of couples, and welcomed many newborns. He is now ministering to many third generation family members!

Glynn and Dorothy will retire "officially" at the beginning of 1991 to many interests, keeping up with four grandchildren, their cattle and land, a reading collection and traveling. They will soon embark on an evangelistic tour of New Zealand, and will return to take life a little easier.

But those who know Glynn Renfro know that he will never totally retire. He'll always be there for those who need him. He wants to always take time to "sit a spell" and hopes to be a familiar figure in Deport for the rest of his days. Quit preachin'? Never! He'll always have those minute sermons to be delivered at his hang-outs, the farm store, drug store, gas station, bank, gin, etc. For his accomplishments are not monuments of stone, but ar ememories etched into the hearts and souls of his fellow man. He will always be remembered for his comforting words of wisdom and sense of humor that have helped so many people through life's turmoils.

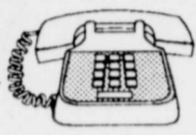

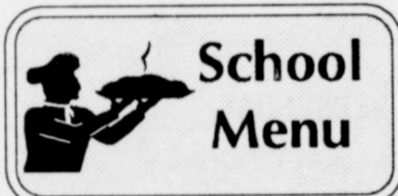

Patriot Sports Report

Patriots Extinguish Blazers, 29-0

James Freelen, with 140 yards on 19 carries, and Jackie Crawford, who averaged 11:6 yards for 8 attempts, looked all-world as runners as the Prairiland Patriots clobbered the Temple Christian School Blazers 29-0 at Dallas last Friday.

The home team had an outstanding runner of it sown in rugged Tom Laughlin (93 yards for 17 efforts), but his line was shredded and manhandled on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

Blazer quarterback Reggie Paul was sacked nine times, was forced to tuck and scramble seven times, and was under great duress on nearly all of his 18 passing attempts. He thus completed only six, with one interception.

Meanwhile, the Patriot rushing defense was limited its opponents to only 69 yards on 36 attempts—less than two yards per effort.

Not to be forgotten were a blocked punt which Greg Vickers chased down at the Blazer 15 to set up the second Patriot touchdown, a Junio Burson interception which killed the last TCA hope, and a Tommy Reiley endzone bat-away of a certain touchdown pass.

Offensively, Freelen's success up the middle spoke not only to his considerable ability as a heavy-duty runner, but also to the continuing development of B.A. Sessums, Quentin Mitchell and Brad Thomas, as interior blockers. Crawford utilized David Brown, Michael Loyd and tight end John Bratcher to open his outside thrusts.

In retrospect, it was a stranger-than-expected performance by the Patriots who were slight pre-game favorites.

The game's first score came on a sustained 71-yard drive, capped by Crawford's 2-yard counter play at 8:21 of the first. Freelen added the point for 7-0. Big plays of the drive were a 17-yard pass from Madewell to John Bratcher and a bullish 26-yard thrust by Freelen.

Vickers' recovery of the blocked punt initiated a short four-play, 15-yard drive which culminated with a one-yard dive by Freelen on the first play of the second quarter. His point try failed.

Laughlin lost a fumble at his 40 with five min-

utes lost, and it took the Pats less than a minute to raise the halftime score to 19-0.

Temple Academy could not move the ball to open the second half, but Prairiland could drive only to the Temple 33 before turning the ball over on downs.

Paul was sacked at the 10, and Vickers of the Pats jumped on a fumble at the 5.

A holding penalty set it at the 15, but three 5-yard jabs off-tackle got the score, with Crawford doing the honors at 6:17. Freelen hit the PAT for 26-0.

Substituting freely, Coach Jim Chambers found his Patriots at a fourth and one at the Blazer 19 at the :8:00 mark of the fourth quarter.

Instead of attempting a first down, he decided to test Freelen's placement range. It was just enough for the field goal to close out the scoring.

Paul, meanwhile, was doing all he could to make a dramatic change in the game with long passes.

But the Patriot sack corps was large, varied and efficient. Individual sacks were credited to Vickers (2), Dexter Baker, Cody Bowen and Thomas, while the Blazer quarterbacks were downed by team tackling on four other occasions.

Rats & Mice Are Moving Indoors

Nevertheless, one can be assured that rats and mice will be a problem this winter. Now is a good time to rat proof houses and other buildings before the migration get underway in a big way. Remember, rats and mice do not know you have a \$100,000 home, so look for possible entrances to your home. Do not forget to check for holes inside the garage and the screened ventilation openings in the attic. There screens do deteriorate over time and provide an entrance for the roof rat.

Once you have made the building as rat and mouse proof as possible, then you will want to consider the use of rodenticides. If you have not used one recently, you will be pleased to know that there are some newer chemical rodenticides on the market today, safer to use and pose very little danger to pets.

One of the new products, Trounce, is made of bromethalin, a revolutionary chemical that makes it the fastest and cheapest way to fight mice and rats.

Highway Department Says "No" To Political Signs On Right-Of-Way

Politician campaign signs may be beautiful to candidates and their supporters, but they're litter to the highway department. The highway beautification act prohibits most campaign signs within sight of the main lanes of any federally funded highway in Texas. Safety rules ban the signs from all highway rights-of-way in the state.

Campaign signs, like any advertisement, can be posted on private property if they are licensed and permitted under current billboard guidelines. However, most campaign signs don't qualify.

Signs are allowed on private property along farm to market roads and other state-funded roadways as long as they can't be seen from federally funded roads and don't violate local laws against such signs.

"We have two very legitimate concerns regarding these campaign signs," said highway department Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver. "Safety concerns and litter control laws dictate that we keep the rights-of-way free of clutter, whether it's for political candidates, real estate companies or anyone displaying advertising on the highways."

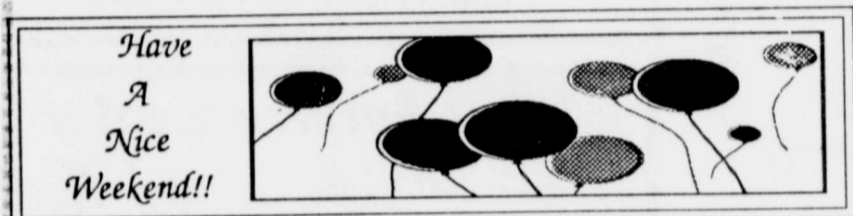

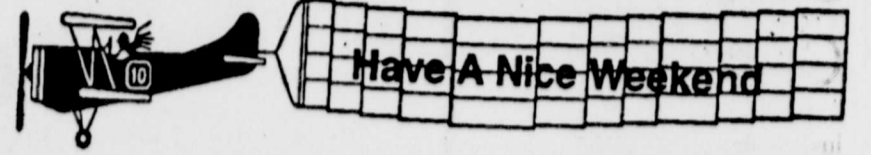

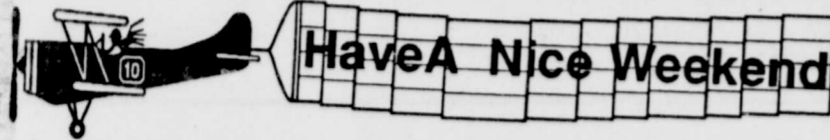
