Sandra Gifford Chosen State "Teacher Of The Year"

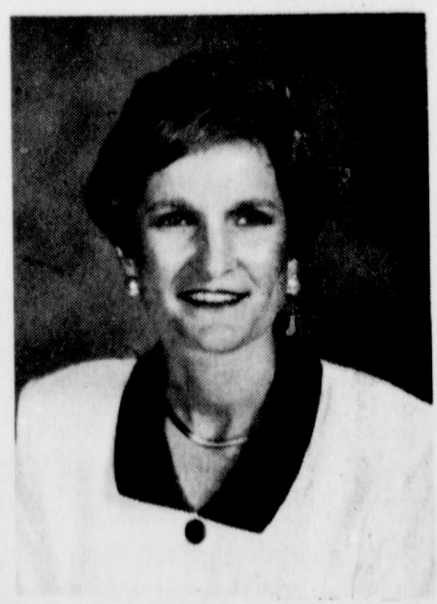

She is the daughter of Forrest and Margaret Parks of Deport.

The road to the state Teacher of the Year title began when she was named the Paris Independent School District Teacher of the Year. She then won the regional title, placing her among two other finalists for the state secondary title.

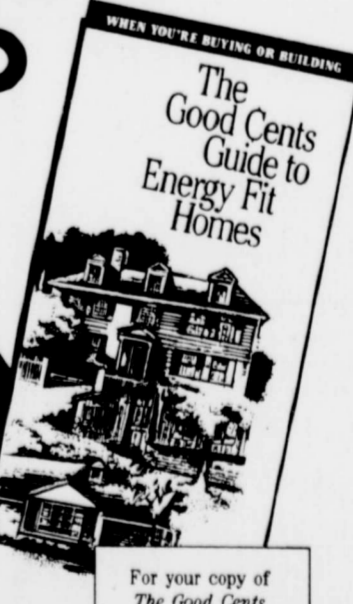

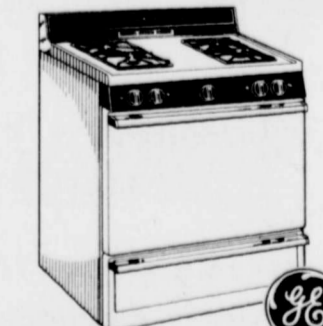


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 **Patriot Sports Report**

By halftime, the Tigers had added two more touchdowns, plus points after to send the Patriots reeling to their dressing room with a nightmare score of 41-7.

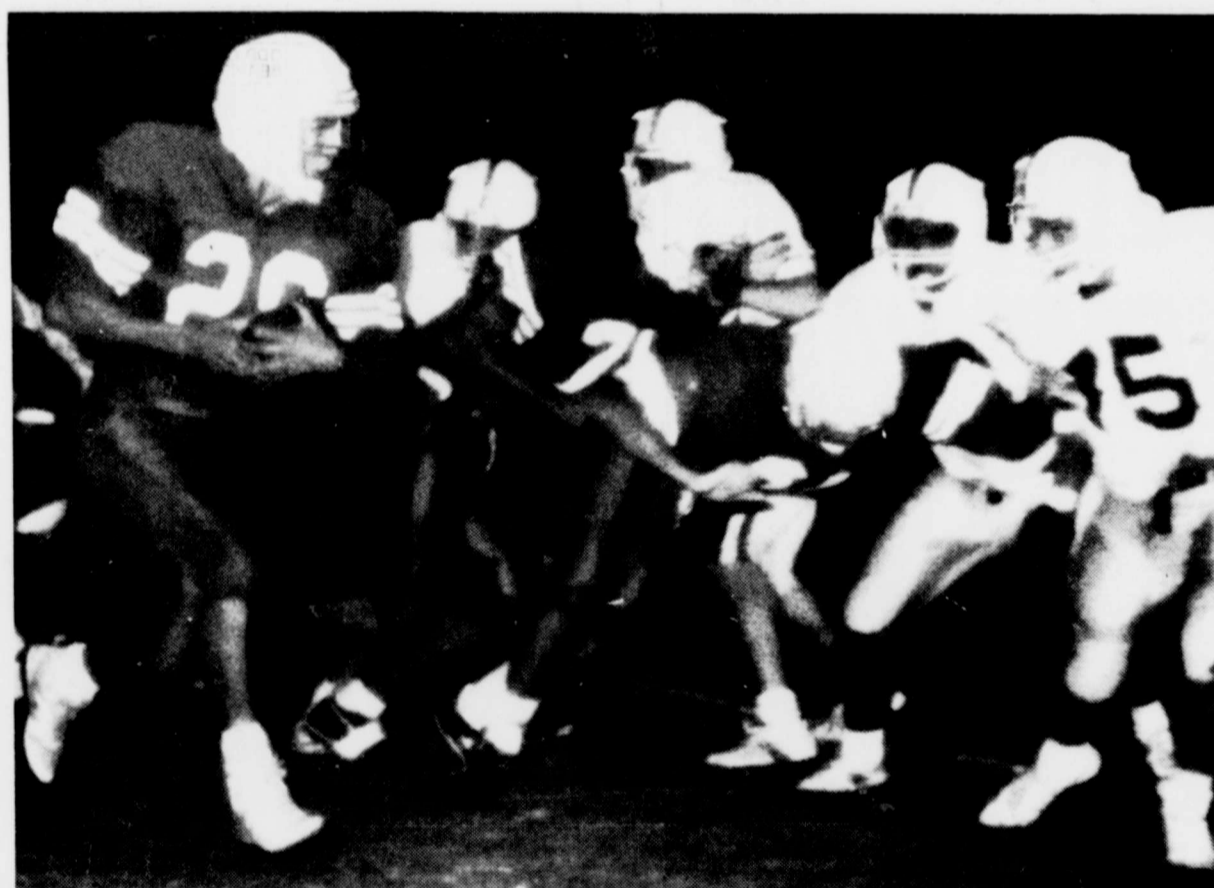
The last half of the game was scoreless for both teams. The loss leaves the Patriots without a win in district competition.

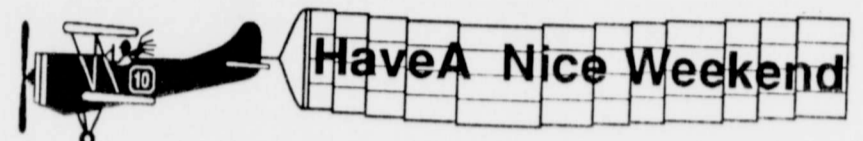

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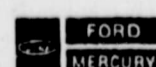

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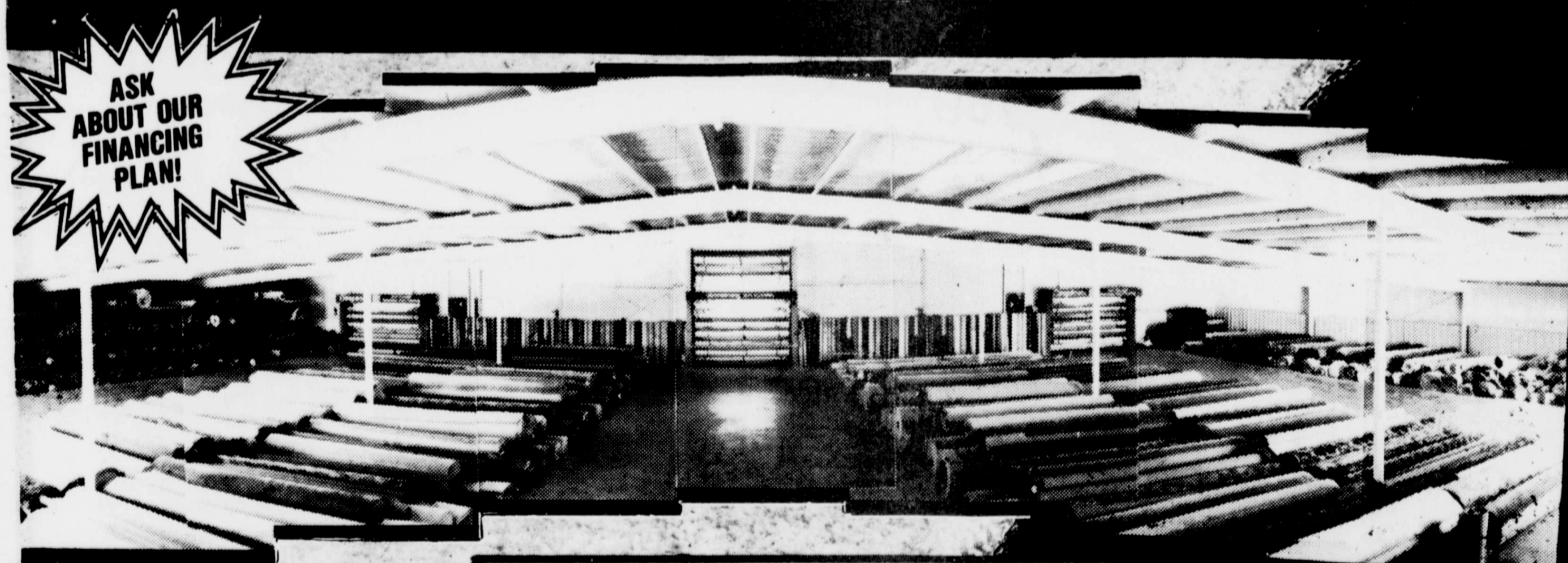

PUMPKIN PIE

- 1 unbaked 10-inch pie shell (recipe below)
- 1 egg white, lightly beaten
- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1 1/2 cups evaporated milk
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound (2 cups) mashed fresh or solid-packed pumpkin (not pumpkin-pie filling)

1. Preheat oven to 350° F.
2. If making shell from scratch, use one-half recipe Pie Pastry. Brush bottom with egg white and set aside.
3. In a large bowl, beat eggs. Add milk and evaporated milk and mix. Add sugar, cinnamon, ginger, cloves, nutmeg, and salt. Mix well. Add pumpkin and mix again. Pour mixture into prepared pie shell.
4. Bake for 1 hour, or until filling feels firm when lightly pressed with fingertip. Remove pan to wire rack and cool. Serve with whipped cream if desired.

Yield: one 10-inch pie.

The board also noted that without the publicity that the media provides, the Crime Stoppers program could not function as efficiently as it does.

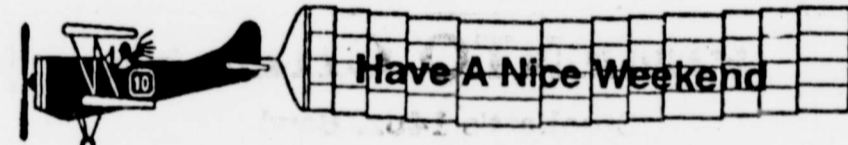

On Thursday, Sept. 127th the vehicle was recovered in the sand pits in the 4000 block of Pine Mill Road. It

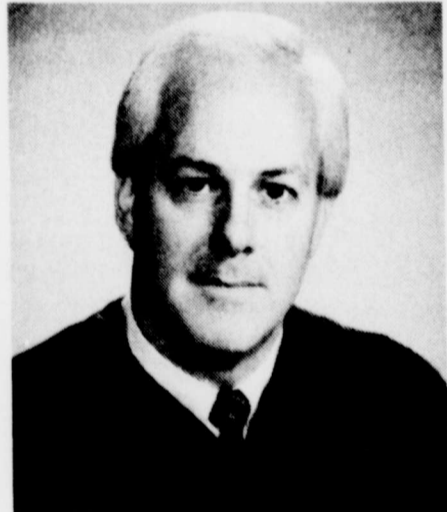

Deer Season Means Getting Prepared

In addition to the obvious rituals of the hunting season, both beginning and experienced hunters should begin planning now for the opening day of deer season, says a wildlife and fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The general gun season for whitetail deer in Texas opens Saturday, November 3," said Billy Higginbotham. "The first step is to purchase the required license. In addition to the license, persons born between September 2, 1971 and August 31, 1974, are required to attend a hunter safety shortcourse and have proof of attendance."

Firearms should be inspected for proper working order. Many scopes get out of alignment for various reasons, therefore, annual sighting-in is required.

All camping equipment and other gear used during the season should be in good condition. Replace if questionable.

If existing blinds are to be used, a pre-season inspection is a necessity to avoid surprises from rotten boards, wasps and other unexpected inhabitants.

"Pre-season scouting or time spent in the woods bow hunting provides hunters with valuable information regarding deer movement patterns," he said. "For those hunters using a new area, this time also gives them an opportunity to familiarize themselves with property lines and topography."

"By being prepared and extending courtesy to other hunters and landowners, we can make this season more successful and safer," he said.

Texas Meets USDA Brucellosis Eradication Goals

Texas ranchers may breathe easier, since federal standards have been met, allowing them to continue shipping breeding cattle out of state.

For years, Texas ranchers, veterinarians and the Texas Animal Health Commission staff have worked against the clock to meet U.S. Department of Agriculture goals for reducing brucellosis infection.

In 1988, the USDA set new stringent goals for eradicating the disease, threatening to virtually quarantine breeding cattle from Texas and five other states if infection was not

substantially reduced by October 1990. The high-incidence, or Class B states are Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Florida, all of which came under federal review earlier this month and were determined by the USDA to be making adequate eradication progress.

Brucellosis infection in Texas dropped to 698 quarantined herds during federal fiscal year 1990, down from 1,037 for FY 1989. This translates to .49 percent, or about five infected herds for every 1,000 herds in the state.

3. True. Most burglars enter casually, by way of a door, so that an observing neighbor would assume nothing was amiss.
4. True, normally they are not. Unlike armed robbers, who steal by threats and violence, burglars generally fear people. However, when surprised, burglars can be threatening.
5. False. There was a time when only the very wealthy had home security systems. But thanks to

technological advances, the cost of home security systems has been substantially reduced. This has allowed many more people to purchase affordable home security systems to help prevent burglaries and to help increase "peace of mind."

6. False. Unlike some commercial systems, ADT believes a loud noise that scares burglars away is your first defense. This noise is one of the most effective ways to avoid confrontation with an intruder. If you have special concerns about audible versus silent alarms, you should discuss them with a security company representative.

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
