Haskell Industrial Foundation met with officials of Herman Marcus Inc., in Dallas Tues-

The purpose of the trip was to finalize clans for a training school in liaskell and discuss a lease agreement on the build-ing which the Industrial Found-ation will son begin construc-

The school, sponsored by the Haskell Independent School District and the Texas Industrial Commission, will give 80-100 hours of instruction to in-dividuals who want to learn to operate machines such as the ones that will be used in the HM plant.

Financing of the school will be done by the Industrial Commission and the local Industrial Foundation. No Haskell Inde-pendent School District Funds will be used in the project. The school must be sponsored by the school district to meet State requirements

Industrial | Foundation officials are currently in the process of setting an appointment with representatives of the Texas Industrial Commission to finalize plans for the training program and set a date to begin classes.

The architect employed by Herman Marcus, Inc., was ill and not able to attend Tuesday's meeting, so no formal agreement was reached on plans and specifications for the building. Plans and specifications were left in Dallas and HM officials assured the Haskell group that any needed changes would be relayed to Industrial Founda-

The doctors of these patients can also have transmitters to carry with them, even if they decide to play a round of golf on their day off, to alarm them if their patient is suddenly doing worse. Or they may have telephone link ups to the heart monitor and can find out how their patient is doing by just dialing a number.
