## River Communications Taking Chapter 11 Bankruptcy

River Communications which provides cable service for the entire area, presented letters to area city councils informing them that the company has filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy-law protection from creditors.

River is a 41 system company serving 15,000 subscribers located primarily in Texas and Arkansas.

Chapter 11 is a reorganization proceeding (versus Chapter 7, a liquidation proceeding).

The company states that it's intent

is to present a reorganization plan to the Court which will characterize the franchises as an essential contract which would be assumed and paid in full. Officials state that it is their hope that the process will be concluded quickly enough to prevent any delay past the due dates for submission of the franchise fees contained in the various franchises. They hope to emerge from Chapter 11 by mid-year.

In a letter to the various City Councils the company said that "It is one of our top priorities that the operation of the system serving your community not be negatively affected by this proceeding. This includes subscribers, the system itself and the employees who serve the subscribers. We expect and will do our best to see that there is no decrease in the quality of services provided to our subscribers."

## Deport Council Discusses City Limits

The Deport City Council discussed moving the city limit sign on the west side of the city to the north side of Highway 271. The proposal was made by Gilbert Arriaga. Mayor Charles Foster report that the move couldn't be made without annexing the property that would be included. This would include the park and old railroad right of way.

After discussion the council decided to take no action on the proposal.

Two hours additional compensation per weekend to city employees was approved. Jerry Burns and Randy Weddle check the sewer treatment plan on Saturday and Sundays.

Fees for training courses for the city Secretary, Sharon Francis, and for Water Superintendent Jerry Burns and City Employee Randy Weddle were approved.

A motion was made and passed to help pay part of Mayor Foster's expenses to attend meetings in Austin and Washington D.C. with the legislators for the Arklatex Council of Governments.

A discussion on moving street lights on Jeffus and Clarksdale streets was held.

The council heard complaints from Monty Thomas about the street in

front of his house. The council agreed that the street needed to be fixed and the Mayor reported that plans are to clean out ditches and resurface the street as soon as the weather will permit.

The council voted to officially endorse the Chili Cookoff set for March 29th and 30th of 1991.

March 30 was approved as the date for the annual Egg Hunt at 11 a.m. at the American Legion's Charles Foster Park.

A discussion of the much postponed trial over the Elrod issue was held. The trial date has been set for February 4th and 5th this time.

The council approved a resolution to support the Green Carpet Highway System.

Discussion on repairs to the water tower were held.

The mayor read a letter from River Communications pertaining to the company filing Chapter 11 Bankruptcy Proceedings.

The Mayor also reported that the 911 emergency system should be implemented by June of this year and that the city is working on replacing and repairing street signs.

Minutes were read and approved, financial report heard and council voted to pay all bills.

## Wilbur-Ellis Closing Out Deport Operation

Wilbur-Ellis/Tide Division of Deport will cease its Deport operation as of February 1, 1991.

Deport and the surrounding area farmers have been served by Tide, and later Wilbur-Ellis/Tide Division for many years.

Deport Store Manager Paul Keys said that although the store will not be operated under the name of Wilbur Ellis/Tide as of February the first, the store will continue to operate under

new ownership and will continue to serve area farmers.

Keys reports that he plans to continue the same type of service of fertilize and chemicals as in the past.

Keys says negotiations are underway with other companies for those products so that by the time Wilbur Ellis is officially gone from Deport the store will be there for farmers when they need products in the spring.

## Prairiland School Board Meets

The Prairiland School Board accepted donation from Williams Sporting Good of a scoreboard for the gymnasium.

Increased salaries of cafeteria workers by 20 cents per hour.

Appointed Dr. Richard Nash to the region 8 ESC advisory committee.

Mrs. Daphna Downs counsellor for the high school Frank Patterson for the elementary school campuses gave reports on Texas Assessment of Academic Skills tests to the board, reporting that in most cases the scores made by students were at the state average.

In other action the board approved a policy requiring that students who have failed any portion of the exit

exam must be enrolled in a remediation class in lieu of an elective.

Two sections have been created in language arts and one in math to help schedule these students and give them extra instruction in order to pass the exit level exams.

The board reviewed the student transfer policy, and made no changes.

The board voted to hire Monda Fults as a part-time instructor for the 1991-92 school year.

In final action they extended the contract of Superintendent Max Ballard's contract through June 30, 1994.

Minutes were read and approved, financial report heard and bills paid.

The next board meeting will be February 11.

### Lemon Pecan Fruit Cake

From Hontas Pettit

- 1 lb. sweet butter (no margarine)
- 1 box light brown sugar
- 3 cups flour - 1 cup flour
- 1 small bottle lemon extract
- 1 quart pecans
- 6 eggs
- 1 lb. candied cherries
- 1 box candied pineapple
- Chop cherries, pineapple, pecans and roll in the one cup flour. Mix butter and brown sugar until creamy. Mix in eggs, one at a time. Add lemon extract, flour and fruit mixture. Bake in a greased and floured tube pan at 350 for approximately 2 hours.

### Chocolate Swirl Cheese cake

- 1 pkg. chocolate chips (semi sweet)
- 1 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
- 2 pkg. (8 oz. each) cream cheese softened
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 eggs

Combine crumbs, 2 tablespoons sugar and melted butter. Press into the bottom and up one inch on the sides of a 9" spring form pan. Melt chocolate chips and add 1/2 cup of sugar. Beat cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add 3/4 cup sugar, sour cream, vanilla and eggs. Divide batter in half. Add chocolate to one bowl. Pour chocolate into crust then plain. Stir enough to marbarize. Bake 50 minutes at 350 or until only 2 or 3 inches in the center will shake. Chill before serving. This can be frozen up to two months. To serve top with chocolate leaves or curls.



### Cranberry Salad

- 1 lb. cranberries
- 2 med. apples
- juice from 1 orange
- juice from 1 lemon
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 3 oz. boxes of lemon jello orange & lemon rind (grated)

Pour 2 cups boiling water over jello to dissolve. Add 1 cup ice water, set aside to cool. In food chopper, with fine knife, grind 1/2 lemon and 1/2 orange rind. With coarse knife, grind apples and cranberries. Mix juices with cranberries, apples and sugar, after jello begins to set. Mix cranberry mixture with jello. Refrigerate until completely congealed.

### Old Time Buttermilk Pie

- 9' unbaked pie shell
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 3 rounded tsp. flour
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- dash of nutmeg (optional)

Cream butter and sugar; add flour. Stir in eggs mixing well. Add buttermilk; vanilla and nutmeg. Pour into unbaked shell; bake at 350 for 45-50 minutes. Cool before cutting.

### Party Sausage

- 1-12 oz. bottle chili sauce
- 1-16 oz. can cranberry sauce
- 2 lbs. cocktail size smoked sausage

Melt cranberry sauce on high, simmer in microwave or on low heat in sauce pan. Add chili sauce and sausages. Heat thoroughly. Serve with toothpicks.

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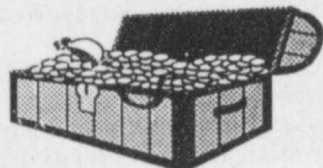

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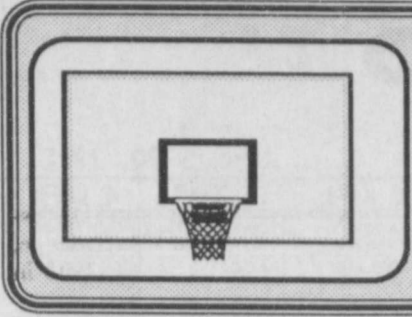
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## Patriot Sports Report

High scorer was Ruckman with 12, Scudder 11, Ladd 8, 2 each for Rhoades and Miller and Malone and Hays had one each.

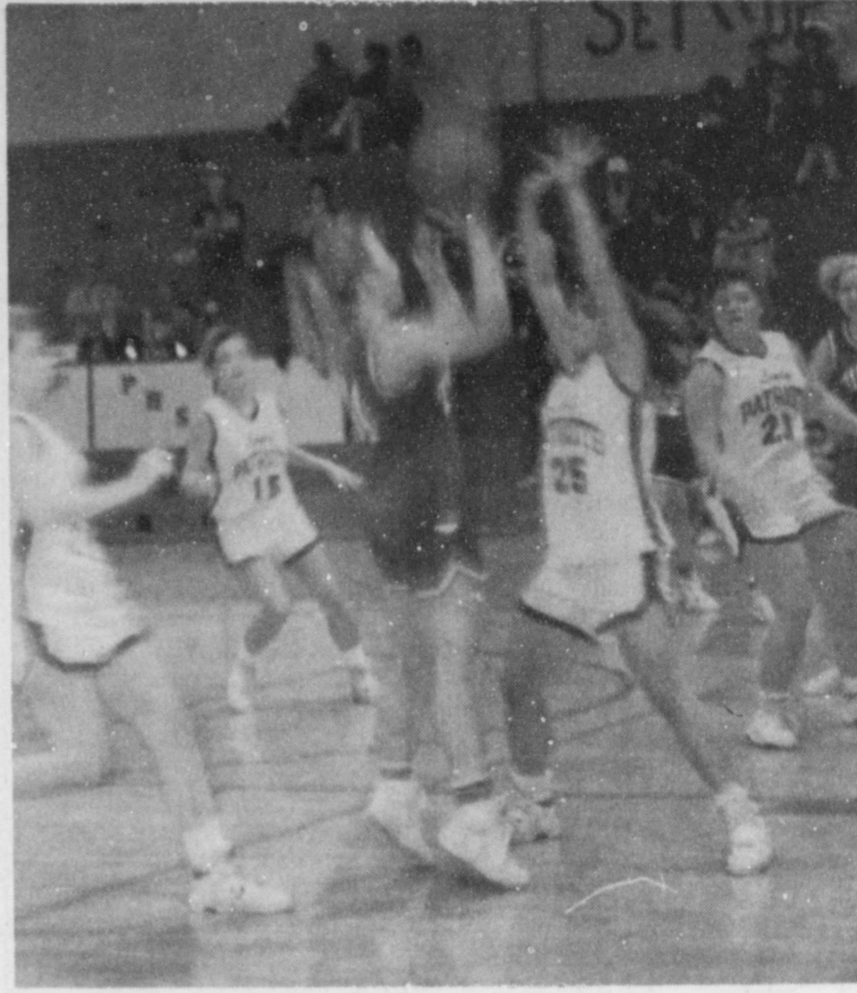
The Winnsboro Red Raiders defeated the Patriots 56-41 as the Patriots could only score seven points to Winnsboro's 15 in the first quarter.

## Crime Stoppers Compares 1990 To 1989

Based on the files that were received from the previous coordinator for Crime Stoppes in 1989, Crime Stoppers was responsible for providing area law enforcement agencies with information that led to the arrest of 34 felons clearing 61 cases; issued 294 code numbers and paid 20 rewards totaling \$4625. \$1343 of stolen property was recovered and \$1250 of narcotics was seized.

In 1990, Crime Stopper figures looked like this: 43 felons were arrested clearing 97 cases. 323 code numbers were assigned and 20 rewards were paid totaling \$8250. \$15,300 worth of stolen property was recovered and \$28,275 in narcotics

were seized as a result of the information that came in through the Crime Stoppers TIPS line.

The Lamar County Crime Stoppes program has been in operation since April, 1986. Since that time, through the end of 1990, there have been 126 felons arrested clearing 196 cases. 1,330 code numbers have been assigned and 96 rewards have been paid totaling \$17,500.

These figures prove that Crime Stoppers works. With the three elements involved in the operation, the media, the Crime Stoppers board and the coordinator all working together, the program can only get better.

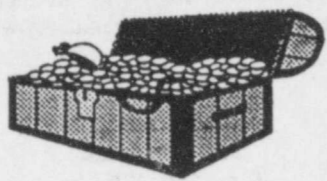

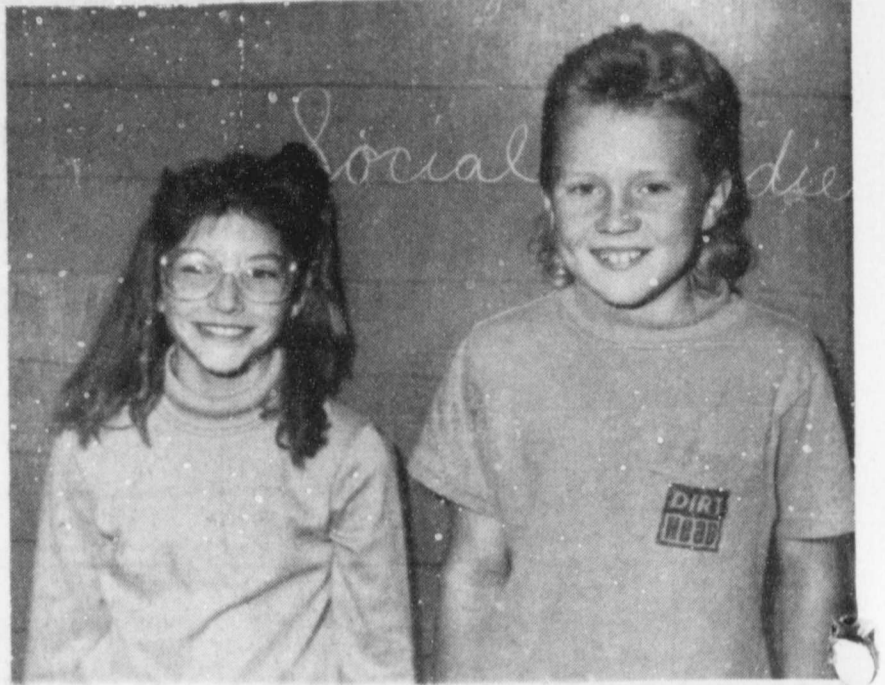

The girls team and the eighth grade boys team went to Detroit to play in the tournament last weekend. The girls won in third place and the eighth

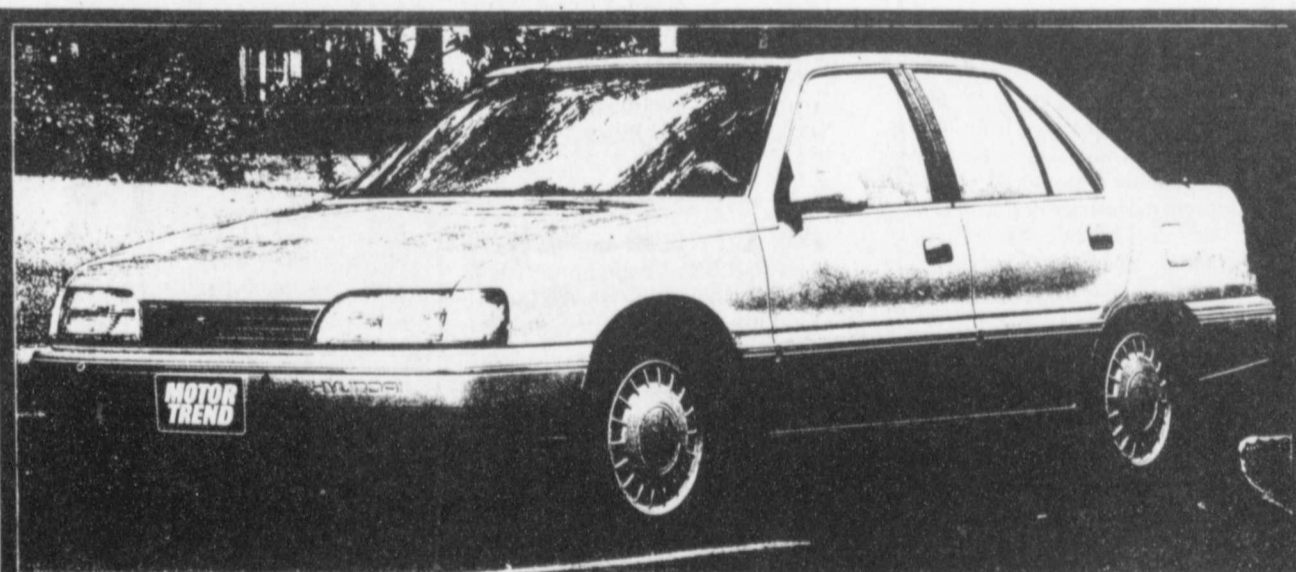
grade boys came home with the second place trophy.
