1 tsp. salt 2 1/2 cups flour l tsp vanilla Beat eggs with mixer until frothy, gradually add sugar, then Crisco, beat till creamy. Add buttermilk. Sift flour well beaten. Add vanilla, mix well. Pour cake batter into 3-9" greased and floured pans. Bake in pre-heated 350 degree oven. Check with toothpick at 25 minutes. Ice with caramel icing or any icing of your choice

Caramel Icing Place 1/2 cup sugar in iron skillet over low heat.

Mix in saucepan: 2 cups sugar stick butter or margarine

1 slightly beaten egg Stir this mixture over low heat until butter melts. Increase heat and cook until it boils rapidly. Meanwhile, the sugar in the skillet has begun to melt. When it is a light brown, pour it into the boiling mixture in saucepan, stirring fast and constantly. Cook until the soft ball stage is reached (put a few drops of icing in a cup of cold water, when icing can be rolled into a soft ball, take off burner) or you can use thermometer. Add one teaspoon vanilla and beat. Ice cake and enjoy!

They are: member of household or relationship test, citizenship test, joint return test, gross income test and support test. Each of these rules has its own criteria. If you have a question as to whether or not to claim a dependent, consult the instructions in your tax pack-

> Q. Even though my dependent did not live with me the entire year, does he or she still qualify as a dependent on my tax return?

> A. Yes, if he or she meets all of the tests mentioned above, he or she may still qualify as a dependent.

Q. How much is each exemption for a dependent worth?

A. For tax year 1990, each exemption, including youself, is \$2,050.

Q. What do I do if I need more time to file?

A. You must apply for an extension of time to file using Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time To File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return. You must file Form 4868 by the regular due date of your return, and you must enclose payment of any tax you estimate you will owe. You will then be allowed four more months to file your return. You cannot file Form 1040EZ if you get an exten-

Q. Is there any kind of income that is not taxable?

A. Yes. Some of the most common forms of nontaxable income include child support, life insurance proceeds, accident and health insurance proceeds, welfare benefits, worker's compensation and similar benefits for sickness and injury, gifts and inheritances, and, under certain conditions, gain on the sale of your home if you are 55 or older. 

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Coffee Mugs and Microbugs cup is new and fresh. There's less

The office coffee break: A time to relax and enjoy a hot, steaming cup of coffee-and bacteria? Surprisingly, many people don't realize that drinking from a reusable coffee mug instead of a clean, sanitary disposable cup, can be a good way to catch a cold or other illness.

Fact is, most people don't or can't take the time away from work to clean coffee mugs properly-they just give them a quick rinse. To properly sanitize a mug, it should be washed thoroughly and then rinsed for 30 seconds in water of 170 degrees or more. The tap water in office sinks and rest rooms rarely gets that hot.

A good detergent should also be used-something many offices don't have on hand. Sink areas in washrooms and office kitchens often harbor bacteria since so few workers bother to clean up after use. Over time-due to lack of proper cleaning-grime, residue and bacteria accumulate on the cup. Also, office workers often mishandle their cups, spreading germs from dirty hands. Cups are frequently used by more than one person and not properly cleaned. The result: You could be exposed to bacteria and viruses that cause colds and flu and even diseases like hepatitis A.

A better idea than using a reusable coffee mug at work is to use a disposable cup. Public health experts recognize the sanitary benefits of single service products. With disposables, you never have to worry about the bacteria problem or have to spend time away from your desk washing your cup in the sink. Disposables are clean because each
