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Prairiland Is Celebrating National FFA Week

This week, the Prairiland FFA is celebrating National FFA Week with a variety of events and special events, according to Ag instructors at Prairiland, Bobby Winters, Frankie Norwood and Buddy Freeman.

Prairiland High School is a consolidated school district encompassing Blossom, Clardy, Cunningham, Deport, Pattonville and the surrounding small communities. The Prairiland school district is a rural district with most of the tax dollars coming from agriculture property taxes. There is virtually no industry tax support aside from a couple of machine shops and a peanut patty factory.

Buddy Freeman is a graduate of East Texas State University and is in his seventh year at Prairiland High School.

Frankie Norwood is also a graduate of East Texas State University and is in his ninth year in the Prairiland Ag department after teaching Junior High Science for six years.

Bobby Winters is a graduate of Sam Houston State University and is in his thirteenth year at Prairiland.

Prairiland High School is a AAA school with 284 students presently enrolled. The ethnic breakdown at Prairiland is 97% white, 1% Hispanic and 2% black. There are 187 students currently enrolled in Agriculture courses for the fall semester. The courses being offered this year are Ag Science 101, 102, 221, 222, 231, 311, 321, 322, 323, 332, 334,

361, 364, 381, Ag Coop and Ag Mechanics. The most popular courses are the Ag Mechanics related courses.

The facilities at Prairiland are more than adequate with a well equipped shop which was built in 1970. The administration and school board are very supportive of the ag program and are well supplied for a poor school district.

One of the newest features to the program is the DTN Network Terminal added this year. It is very helpful in Ag 311, as students use the DTN and the Apple computers to chart commodities with a spreadsheet.

Prairiland FFA participates in all areas of competition available to members. Their motto is "They might can beat us, but they can't keep us from participating." The chapter has been very successful over the past years in leadership, having won the district sweepstakes award several times and having many teams going to Area competition and some to State. Prairiland has had two State FFA officers in the last five years, several area officers including an Area VI President, and several district officers. Their Talent Team also won the State competition in 1985.

In April of each year, they usually bring home more than their share of trophies and monies at the Lamar County Junior Livestock Show. Houston broilers have become very popular within the chapter, and last

year, they took 27 pens of broilers to Houston and 24 have ordered this year. Prairiland always fairs well at the district degree check every year and has had many Lone Star Farmers over the years and several American Farmers.

The biggest day of the year for the Prairiland chapter is the first Saturday in April when they have their local project show. They begin the day at 9 a.m. with a livestock show, followed by a barbeque cook-off. At 3 p.m., they select the winners of the cook-off and at 4 p.m. host the "World Championship Pig Wrestling Contest". This event draws more people to the school than any other event of the year. Then at 5 p.m., they start serving the barbeque cooked in the cook-off. After the meal, they provide entertainment with a country music show, followed by their fund raising auction. Items sold in the auction are ones built by the chapter and those donated by local businesses. This is Prairiland's major fund raiser for the year and is definitely the most tiring day of the year for officers and teachers, but it has always been well worth the effort.

The Prairiland Ag instructors are very proud of their accomplishments. The one main attribute which makes things run smoothly at the Prairiland Ag department is the good working relationship between the three Ag teachers.

Local Man's Uncle Helped Develop Patriot Missile

Bob Harrell of Jennings brought in a clipping concerning his uncle (his mother's brother).

Chester W. Byars, who died March 25, 1989, had a large part of developing the Patriot Missiles being used defend Israel and Saudi Arabia right now.

His widow, Bonnie M. Byars of Machipongo, Virginia says that it is so wonderful to know that he is still "helping to win the war" even though he is dead.

In a letter to the Harrell's she recalls that "Chet worked on the patriot from 1960 to 1967 when the largest government contract ever awarded to Raytheon Missile Systems was won. After that there was a lot of testing out at White Sands, N.M. and then it was put into production. I talked with one of the engineers last night, Art Franz, that

worked for Chet and he told me how excited everyone was about the Patriot's performance and they are busy building many more Patriots."

In a newspaper clipping about Chester W. Byars it is mentioned that he was born in Prosper, Texas, and was a member of the Cape Charles Coast Guard Auxiliary and a past commander of the Minuteman Power Squadron of Acton, Mass. He was a disabled veteran of World War II and served with the 9th Air Force, Third Army at the Battle of the Bulge. While with the Army at Ft. Bliss he was design engineer on the Hawk radar system. He retired from the military as lieutenant colonel in 1954. He joined Raytheon Missile Systems Division in Bedford, Mass as project engineer on the Patriot surface-to-air missile, retiring as manager of the Systems Division.

She is also sharing Breakfast Taquitas, Sweet and Sour Pork and Jackie's Cornbread.

Jackie's Cornbread
2 sticks margarine, melted
2 boxes Jiffy cornbread mix
10 oz. pkg. frozen chopped broccoli
1 small carton cottage cheese, small curd
4 eggs
1 onion, chopped
4 jalapenos, chopped
Cook broccoli and drain. Add to other ingredients and mix together. Bake in a 13"x9" cake pan, sprayed with Pam, at 350 for 40-45 minutes.

Sweet & Sour Pork
1 can 20 oz. Dole chunk pineapple
1 lb. pork shoulder, cubed
2 T. vegetable oil
1 c. sliced carrots
1/2 c. chunk green bell pepper
1/4 c. plum jam
2 T. red wine vinegar
2 T. soy sauce
1 T. corn starch
1/2 t. ground ginger
Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Brown pork in oil. Cover; simmer 20 minutes, remove. Sauté vegetables. Remove. Blend jam, reserved syrup, vinegar and soy sauce. Stir a little sauce into cornstarch and ginger. Add to skillet. Cook until mixture thickens. Stir in pork, vegetables, and pineapple.

Saucepan Brownies
1 c. sugar
1 stick butter
1 egg
3 T. cocoa
3/4 c. flour

1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. vanilla
In a saucepan, combine butter (melt) and cocoa. Remove from heat; add sugar; then egg. Mix well, then add flour and baking powder. Add vanilla. Bake in greased and floured pan at 350 for 25 minutes.

Breakfast Taquitas
Scramble eggs
Fry sausage, bacon
Break sausage and bacon into scrambled eggs.
Chop lettuce, tomatoes, onions, grate cheese. Warm flour tortillas. Add a little of all ingredients in flour tortillas and roll up. Pour picante sauce on this or just eat them plain.

Hamburger meat
Stew meat
Mixed vegetables
Green beans
Blackeyed peas
Potatoes
Onions
Tomato paste
Tomato sauce
Corn
Salt and pepper

Brown hamburger meat and drain. Cook stew meat and drain. Peel potatoes and onions and chop up into pot. Cook potatoes and onions in water until tender. Drain water. Add meats and other vegetables, salt and pepper to taste.

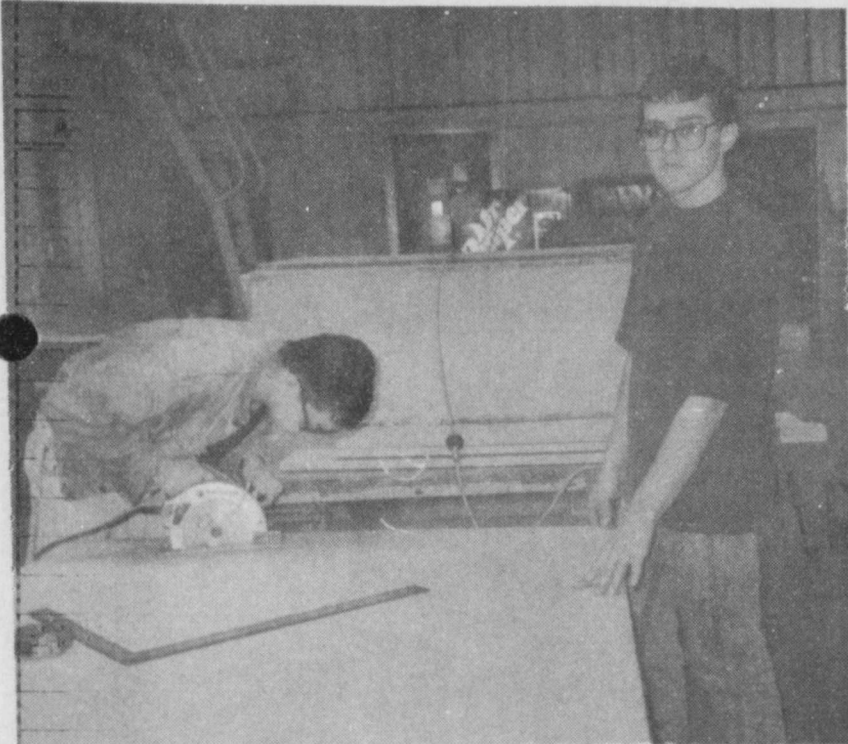

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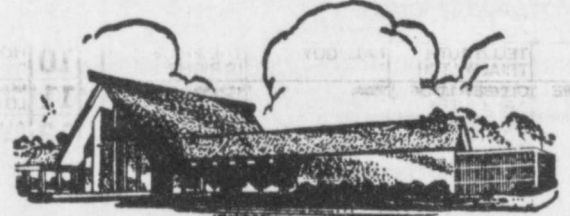

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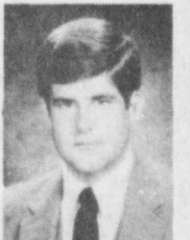


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Delbert Ballard Has Tournament Named In His Honor

Delbert Ballard is one of the few people you may know who has been honored with his own Basketball Tournament!

For thirty-four years the Clardy native has taught young girls and boys values to stay with them forever. His mother is Virgie Ballard, long-time Clardy resident.

Ballard began his coaching career at Talco, then moved on to Quitman High School.

One of the reasons for his success, a love of the game.

He began on a small dirt court on a farm at Clardy. There, Ballard would play basketball on after night fell. The only way he could tell he made the shot was by the "swish of the net".

He attended East Lamar High School, playing varsity for three years, and was the Co-Captain his senior year with a 40-5 record. He was honored on the District 45-B All-Star team, and made 1st team All-District in basketball and baseball.

He attended Paris Junior College, and in 1953 was on basketball and tennis teams. In 1954 he was Co-Captain. That team was known as the best ever at PJC.

Then he attended Stephen F. Austin State University, where he continued playing basketball.

With a 25-0 record, they were national champions and he lettered

3 years. He began his coaching career in 1958. His basketball career record is 379-148. He has had three district champs, 2 bi-district champs; 2 co-champs of district; 2 teams reached regional finals and lost in overtime.

While at Quitman he has never had a team place lower than 2nd in district. Only a very few teams won less than 20 games during the season.

In recognition of his long-time dedication and the respect and love his students feel for him, Quitman held the First Annual Delbert Ballard Basketball Tournament on January 25-26, 1991, issuing a special program for the event.

The tournament was sponsored by the Quitman Bulldog Booster Club.

The Wood County Democrat ran an entire page feature on his career, with pictures of him as a high school senior, in his first year at Quitman, and many quotations.

The one quotation that stands out, though, was one he wrote in the school annual in 1976.

"As coaches and teachers of young men and women we must teach our players how to be good sports as winners and as losers.

I often think that if I have made one boy or girl a better person while playing for me, then all the successes and failures were well worth the pressures of coaching".

Ballard was also presented a trophy and a basketball with signatures from his former players.

In 1979 the Ladds decided that there just might be a market out there for his pallets and proceeded to find out. Soon he had quit his Dallas job, moved to Pattonville, built a house and a pallet factory and put up a sign naming the business Pyramid Pallets.

The factory has expanded in the last twelve years to a modern structure with four employees. They build thousands of pallets for several large companies that ship products worldwide.

Steve is continually innovating and upgrading his business.

He has a fork lift that has replaced a small Ford Tractor with a loader.

Package cut off saws, a gang saw from Memphis Tennessee, and his latest labor-saving device, an electric chain saw from Oregon with a 7 foot bar that will cut a whole stack of lumber square and the proper length with one cut all have kept his business modern.

He no longer has to borrow nail guns, either. Driving over 10,000 pounds of nails per year in his factory, the people he buys nails from furnish him with several of the guns. He now uses lumber brokers in several states to purchase his materials from.

Steve and his wife, who is a teacher, live near their business with their two children, Craig and Shelley.

Pot luck dinners are a favorite American pastime, and an excellent way to put a good meal together for a large gathering of people. Pot luck, however, is a poor way to do business. Most doctors, dentists and other professionals will allow unannounced visits only in an emergency. They work best from an appointment schedule.

For many years Social Security offices served the public primarily on an unscheduled walk-in basis. In the last few years, Social Security has emphasized telephone and walk-in appointments as the standard way of conducting business. It has proven both more efficient and more economical.

In fact, we began appointment scheduling as an experiment. As late as two years ago, only 20-30% of our

work was conducted this way. Many offices now process over 70% of their claims by appointment.

The public has responded very well. They like not having to wait to talk to a representative, something that can happen in many offices. With an appointment, people know that on a certain day at a certain time, they will see or talk to a Social Security representative.

When we handle work by telephone, all the paperwork is sent through the mail. Claimants often do not have to visit the office at all. In urban areas, this is a real help to the public.

To make an appointment, or to conduct business, just call your local Social Security Office. A representative will be glad to assist you.

Points paid by a buyer to acquire a principal residence are considered to be home mortgage interest. (A "point" is equal to 1% of the loan amount).
However, the IRS now has a cross-check on the amount of deductible points which taxpayers claim on their returns. A new law requires mortgage companies to report this information both to the buyer and to the IRS on Form 1098.
The new rules apply only to financing provided after December 31, 1990. To be deductible by the buyer (and reportable on Form 1098), the points must be paid by the buyer for the purchase of a principal residence. The dollar amount paid must not be excessive when compared to what is normally charged as common to what is normally charged as common practice in the area.
Points paid for the following types of loans do not have to be reported by the mortgage company: home improvement, home equity or refinancing of a principal residence; loans to purchase or improve second homes, vacation homes, investment property or trade or business property. Such points may or may not be deductible by the borrower. Contact your tax advisor for assistance with these issues.
If you receive financing assistance via qualified mortgage bonds after December 31, 1990, new rules require your lender to report to the IRS your name, social security number and address of the property purchased.

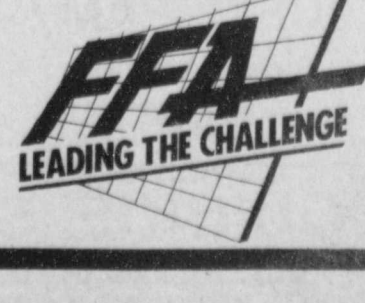

The moderator, Mrs. Reba Temple, opened the meeting with prayer.

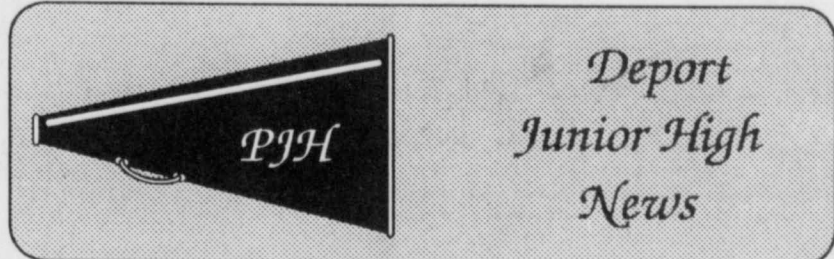
Mrs. Temple's devotional was "While I Wait" taken from "Adventures in Prayer" by Catherine Marshall.
