



Country Cooking

The Country Cooking column is coming to you this week from the backyard of Donny Darden. Donny and his wife, Dawne, have one son, David J., age 10. They have lived in the Deport area for about 12 years and attend the First United Methodist

Church in Deport. Several of Donny's hobbies include deer hunting, watching football on TV and cooking.

Donny's deer hunting habit consists of seasonal every weekend events on local territory. He is the only one who likes deer meat in his family so when he gets one, he keeps only a few pieces and gives the remainder away.

His football watching consists of the Dallas Cowboys and Prairiland Patriots. He doesn't get to see all the games of either team, but does keep up with how both are progressing.

Donny's cooking began a few years ago when his job depended more on the weather, and he had several days during the winter where he would get bored with TV and go into the kitchen to see what he could cook up. Years ago, he says, he could manage to put a sandwich together, but his mom kept insisting he and his brothers learn more about cooking. He started practicing and he's managed to do quite well. Two main dishes Donny enjoys mixing up are okra gumbo and stew. He really has no recipe for these dishes, he just adds and tastes.

Donny is sharing some tips this week on grilling foods and some recipes he and his family enjoy.

If using either a gas or a regular grill, make sure your coals are as hot as you can get them. Wait until all briquettes are white in color, then wait a little longer until the coals start cooling back down, then put your meat on and cook it very, very slowly. The longer you cook the meat, the more smoke flavor it will have. Of couse, there is a point to start overcooking and your meat gets tough and learning this comes with prac-

If the wind is blowing, this causes meat to cook faster than normal so you have to really watch. When Donny finishes cooking the meat, he turns the burners on high for several minutes and burns the grates until all particles are burned to a crisp. Turn off and let cool completely, then take a wire brush and clean the grates.

Donny does his grill cooking on Sunday afternoons. In one cooking, he cooks Polish sausages, hamburgers, pork chops, steaks, chicken breasts and fajita meat. When all meat is cooked, he stores it in the microwave until thoroughly cooled. Then he puts them in freezer bags or foil and freezes them. The meat will last about a month in the freezer and still have a smoked flavor. It will also last for 3 or 4 days in a covered dish in the refrigerator and keep its flavor. Just thaw and heat in the microwave what you want to eat and you have it!

Donny likes to marinate foods before he cooks it. The oil free Italian dressing is a good marinate for grill cooking. Chicken breasts or chicken strips is very good using this recipe. You need to marinate at least 3 hours and then since chicken dries out so quickly, you need to spread occasionally while cooking. Donny has used this recipe about 3 years. The barbeque sauce was a basic recipe they came across but ave made several chans with it. He is stll working on improvements.

The Donny's Biscuit recipe is one he takes a lot to church suppers and youth breakfasts and everyone enjoys them. Donny says it takes aboug 15 minutes to make these biscuits, add sausage and eggs and you have a great supper.

I've also included a carrot cake and creme cheese icing recipe for diabetics and cholesterol watchers.

### Geneva, A Fascinating City

Editor's Note: For those interested in hearing about a trip to Switzerland, here's your chance. If you aren't, feel free to read something else....this article is definitely for those with travel in their hearts! (P.S. thanks for all the nice compliments on these articles)

As our bus decended from the high mountains down into the French speaking portion of Switzerland the houses began to change too.

The style became less that of a mountain chaulet and more that of a French wine province. Slate or red pan tyle roofs still prevailed, but the homes held less ornate carving or etching, and the hillsides became completely covered with vinyards.

Wine making is serious, and big, business in the French area.

While we are used to having iced tea or coffee with meals, everyone has wine or beer with their meals.

The wine making industry is labor-intensive. All up and down the terraced hillsides men and women could be seen, tying up the vines on their wires, carefully trimming or pruning, poisoning for insects or just inspecting the crops.

The vinyards are weed free, and little huts sit at the end of the fields. These are actually tool sheds and storage buildings.

Leslie, always ready to answer questions, pointed out that the custom began back in medieval days when the farmers didn't want to have to carry tools and equipment back and forth between their home within the walled towns. They locked them away for safety from the gangs of roving bandits, then retreated at night to the safety they found within the town walls.

They also, she smiled, were called the "Hanky Panky Huts"...because of their use in courting!

Fields of bright yellow rape, (yes, that's spelled right) illuminated the fields. Rape is used much as we use soy beans, for oil, food supplements and animal food.

Orchards interspersed the fields, and for the first time we began to see cattle that weren't the popular Borwn Swiss.

As we approached beautiful Lake Geneva we were struck again by the gorgeours medians of blazing flow-

We made a stop at Chillon Castle, which inspired Lord Byron's very popular poem "The Prisoner of Chil-

lon". It's water- surrounded turrents and walls were imposing, indeed.

I confess that Thomas and I both were less than thrilled with the prospect of Geneva. However, we were in for a pleasant surprise.

Geneva hadn't sounded like it would be the highlight of our trip, but it proved to be a lovely, lake side city with an international flavor and flair that was unique.

Because it is the headquarters for the European United Nations, the World Health Organizations and the International Red Cross there are embassies and people from all over the world.

After seeing the Jet 'D Eau spout it's 500 foot spray of water in the harbor of Lake Geneva we learned that we had been privileged...the

world's highest fountain has fallen prey to vandals who poured cement down it...and only moments after we saw it, it ceased to work...as the damage from the cement was not completely fixed.

We saw the Reformation Wall, with it's statues of John Calvin and the others who led the way to Europe's religious reform. Across from the somber wall was a park where university students were enjoying a holiday by lying in the warm sun, practising juggling, or reading books.

It was a holiday, Ascension Day, and many places were closed, but we still beat a path back to the water front after checking into our hotel.

There we found street kiosks, beautiful churches, swans and boats, sidewalk cafes and more.

We asked our tour guide "If you were in IGeneva for one night, where could you find something special to eat that you won't find anywhere else".

She told us how to find a tiny cafe

which has no menu.

Seated there we were brought green salad, then a sterno stove was placed on the table. The waitress soon appeared with a metal platter of sirloin steak, so tender it didn't need a knife to cut it, and topped with a baseball size mound of melting, seasoned butter.

Then, she began serving thin, hot, not-quite-crispy fried potatoes, a cross between a shoestring potatoe and a fried potato.

We ate until we could eat no more, and wandered back out onto the street.

We watched in fascination as a group of young South Americans, bedecked in woven ponchos and long hair, played lively music while they

Then we noticed a very black man dressed in dazzling white robes and pill box hat. He carefully gathered up the volumnious robes and stepped

Little children darted in and out of the crowd, making for, of all places, McDonald's!

Window shopping was a treat, and occasionally a shock. Some of the mannekins (male as well as female) were rather graphic! Some of the clothes were incredible!

We viewed a display of obviously cheap, cardboard looking and very flashy cowboy boots with horror. The price, translated from Swiss Francs, was about \$300 per pair, and no self respecting Texan would have been caught dead in them.

Weary at last we wandered back in the near-dark to our hotel.

After breakfast the next morning we travelled towards Interlaken. This area is one of the most beautiful in Switzerland.

At Brienz we stopped at a wood carvers workshop where we saw (and some purchased) inlaid music boxes, cuckoo clocks and nativity scenes. Their animal carvings were so lovely. The village is the center of Swiss woodcarving, and their take great pride in the hundreds of hours they spend on their craft.

We took home a cuckoo clock for ourselves, plus music boxes and tiny clocks for those who had stayed in our home while we were gone.

The drive fro the village got prettier and prettier. The houses had friezes of carved vines, flowers and geometric designs, and the valley below was green and lush.

We had a view of the Jungfratbefore climbing up once more, through green forests and snow capped mountain peaks.

Early in the afternoon we arrived in Lucerne, our final stop on the trip, but what a wonderful ending to the tour it proved to be!



# Agricultural Briefs By Paul D. Payne any time of the year. H

Have you ever spent a hot day cutting sprouts and brush to have it regrow the following year? That is exasperation. There must be a better way, right?

For spot treating small brush in pastures and fence rows, there is a new, do it yourself, method that works about any time of year without affecting nearby plants. It is called low volume basal bark treatment.

This method is effective on smooth barked brush plants up to about six inches in diameter. To control these plants a mixture of 20 to 30 percent Grazon ET herbicide and diesel fuel is sprayed directly on the lower 15 to 20 inches of trunk. Just enough mix is applied to thoroughly wet the bark but not to the point of runoff. You can use a low pressure, hand sprayer to apply the solution.

The plant absorbs the solution through the bark and moves it to the roots to kill the entire plant. To control multi-stemmed plants for example, brush that has grown back after shredding, spray the base of

One of the good points of this method is only the targeted plant is

treated. There is virtually no danger

of the herbicide moving via drift or

runoff, and the method can be used

any time of the year. However, best results can be expected when treating anytime from May through Septem-Demonstration work in Eastern

Oklahoma and Texas has shown a solution of 20% Grazon ET and diesel controlled post oak, blackjack oak, honey locust, bois d'arc, wild plum, Eastern persimmon, prickly ash, hackberry, greenbriar, winged elm and Texas persimmon.

For brush plants larger than six inches in diameter, consider herbicides that are applied to the foliage or to the soil. These methods may be as effective as low volume basal, but less flexible in timing and applica-

Cedars are showing up more and more on pastureland. In many part sof the county fence rows are growing up with cedars and they can also be seen in fields that are not being grazed heavily.

Cedar trees can be controlled by using picloram herbicide. Grazon PC is the common herbicide available locally that contains picloram. It may be applied undiluted to the soil under the plant. Four ml per 3 feet height applied in ate winter to early sprg is suggested. The material can be mixed with diesel and water and applied to the foliage and stems.

### Weekly Agricultural Update

By Herb Brevard Gardeners can extend the productive life of spring vegetables with

proper care and selection.

"Healthy plants are the first requirement for extending production," said Marty Baker, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Tomatoes, peppers, okra, eggplants and some vining squash will produce into the fall if properly cared for."

Another important practice is keeping the soil moixture at the correct level. Most vegetables in East Texas need about two inches of water per week if properly mulched and

weeded. Baker suggests not watering well established plants with sprinklers. During the hot summer months,

plants can be covered with muslin cloth to help protect them from the sun. It is particularly easy to shade plants being grown in cages. Baker says to follow good insect

and disease control procedures throughout the growing season. Mites and grasshoppers can be serious during mid-summer. Most vegetables need very little, if

any, fertilizer during the summer. Cut dead plant material out of tomatoes and peppers to stimulate new growth.

#### **Air Conditioning Rebate Clarification**



Texas-New Mexico Power Company recently began promoting rebates for high efficiency air conditioning units. Some customers have called with questions to see what type of system qualifies for a rebate.

Through the rebate program, only central air conditioning systems with an SEER rating of at least 11.0 qualify for the rebates. Window units, due to the lower impact they have on saving energy, do not qualify.
