Lucerne, A Truly Noble City

Editor's Note: This is the conclusion of our travel series. We appreciate all thecompliments on the

Lucerne must truly be one of the most beautiful cities in the world.

Like so many Swiss cities, it is located on the banks of a lake, and is surrounded by mountain peaks.

We first saw the Lion Monument, carved into the stone of a mountain side. It depicts a slain lion, head resting on a shield, heart run through by a spear. This commentrates the Swiss guards who lost their lives in a vain attempt to guard Marie Antoinette during the French Revolution.

Our hotel was only a block from the famous covered bridge, and we

lost no time in heading down to it. The pedestrian bridge is the oldest in the world. Roofed with wooden shingles, a watch tower sits alongside of it, adding the perfect touch to a beautifuly composed picture.

A Jesuit church stands nearby, and after the walk across the bridge one is in the pedestrian part of the city. Restaurants painted with blazes of color, odd hidden faces and bizarre figures, buildings that bear paintings of giants or medieval figures grace the narrow up and down streets.

A brightly painted fountain draws attention, and a department store boasted chocolates, tee shirts, coats, housewares and curtains.

Swans honked and swam on the lake, and leashed dogs troted after owners doing evening shopping.

We had lunch at the lake side, sitting under a bright umbrella and munching on sandwiches of bread, cheese, ham and butter.

After a little Helen and Richard went back towards the hotel, and Thomas and I proceeded to try and trace out the old walls and watch towers of the town.


It was with sadness that Thomas and I realized that tomorrow would be the end of another wonderful trip.
