Horse Flies Creating Serious Fly Fever Outbreak In Cattle

Over the last ten days numerous cases of Anaplasmosis (Fly Fever) have been reported. Although the severity of the disease is somewhat earlier in the season than normal, it is not unexpected since the Horse Fly population has been increasing steadily in recent days. The two go hand in hand.

Even though we have had the disease in our cattle herds for twenty five or so years, a review of the symptoms and treatment would be in order as we have new producers move to our area who are not familiar with the disease. Perhaps, there is a point or two about the disease that you are not clear on.

The common name for the disease if Fly Fever which we will use in this discussion. It is a blood disease. An animal acquires the disease from an animal who is a carrier of the disease. Since we have had Fly Fever for all these years, most herds have animals or an animal is a carrier. We can test our animals to identify these carriers and elminate them. However, this this is not a suggested management practice since your neighbor probably h;as carrier animals in his herd. Animals that have recovered from Fly Fver, though fully recovered, are carriers of the disease.

It is also possible that one will have animals that have had cases of the disease in previous years (did not really get sick and required no treatment) and they could be carriers.

Just because one has carrier animals does not necessarily mean that other animals in your herd will come down with the disease. There must be

mixing of blood of an infected animal to another animal. The most common way that this can take place is by the Horse Fly. The Horse Fly draws blood from the carrier animal and then flies to another animal and inserts his mouth part and the disease-causing agent is deposited in the disease free animal. It is also thought that the mosquito is capable of spreading the disease. This process of transmitting blood from one animal to another must take place in a very short time (perhaps less than a minute). If your cattle are completely isolated from other cattle, the likelyhood of them getting the disease from other cattle are pretty low. However, if your cattle shares a shaded fence row iwth your neighbor's cattle (and he has a carrier) then your chances increase dramati-

Humans spread the disease. This can be done while doing routine veterinary work on your cattle: dehorning and vaccination. You will want to use a new needle or a sterilized needle when vaccinating a group of animals.

Since this disease affects the red blood cells, sick animals will appear anemic. So look for yellowish appearing muzzle, teats, udder and vulva. Quite often affected animals will move at a slower pace than the rest of the herd. Milk production will drop to zero. Abortion normally occurs. They will go off feed. Affected animals are easily excited and can become violent. Of course, death can occur.

It is much cheaper to prevent the disease than treat it once the disease

breaks out in your herd. Most beef producers have elected to keep aureomycin out for the herd, so that they maintain sufficient levels of the antibiotic in their system to fight the blood organism. This works fine so long as each animal is consuming adequate levels of the material daily. If you elect to go this route, make sure that you keep out the supplement at all times. Place the supplement where the animals will find it convenient to eat. You may want to add another trough so that all animals will have a chance to eat. The point to remember is that each animal must receive the proper level daily, so you may want to do a little observ-

ing of your herd. Vaccination is now a viable management option. Information on the new vaccine from Schering-Plough Animal Health called AM-VAX was presented at an animal health program given in the county during the winter. We are getting late in the season to vaccinate, but it may be a viable option for you. It takes two shots given 21 days apart to receive immunity. If one elects to gothe vaccination route at this time, it would probably be wise to give each animal an injection of tetracycline at the time of the first shot. This will give them a thirty day immunity. The tetracycline shot will cost about\$1 a head.

Over the next few weeks check animals each day. Look for stragglers. Handle suspect animals gently. Try not to excite them. Keep sick animals away from ponds. Remember they may become violent. Stay on top of the situation and work closely with your veterinarian.

Practices 17.46:b5 If weight loss is your goal, follow the suggestions of the American Medical Association Council on Scientific Affairs which recently emphasized the importance of nutritionally-sound weight reduction diets and changes in lifestyle to promote long-term weight control.

A study in the American Dietetic Association Journal looked the longterm effectiveness and predictors of success of an intensive multi-disciplinary program including exercise, changing eating habits and using the time calorie displacement diet, a lowfat, high-complex carbohydrate diet, to promote and maintain reduced body

weight. In 213 obese adults consecutively entering the program, including drop outs, weight loss averaged about 14 pounds. Results suggest that a nutritionally sound diet, prescribed in a multi-disciplinary program and emphasizing lifestyle changes, can result in long-term weight control in


