This week I decided to get a little more recent date. A lot of people can maybe remember when these things really happened.

For instance in the July 23, 1964 paper I found where James E. Jones active Superintendent for Cunningham school was announcing his retirement after eight years of duty. Taking his place was Leslie H. (Buddy) Taylor who had been teaching at the Cunningham school for eight years.

Here are some actual words from the same paper about a horse and

trailer accident: A horse belonging to W. T. Rainey was killed, and one belonging to Don Tucker, both of Paris, was injured when the double trailer in which they were being pulled, came loose from Tucker's auto and ran off the highway near the Mrs. Earl Grogan home in Rugby. Tucker said he was in route with the Lamar County Sheriff's Posse to Mt. Vernon to participate in a rodeo there. The accident occurred on U.S. Highway 271 between Rugby and Deport.

A sad note was found in the 1964

paper about a ten-month old baby being thrown from a car which was the result of a two car collision.

The mother and grandmother of the baby were in the car too.

Mrs. Barbara Franc Eaton, the mother of the child, was released from the hospital with minor bruises, but baby Lisa Michelle Eaton was killed.

Both Billie and Don share the cooking. Since most of the time, the cooking is for only two people, the cooking is very simple. Don does all the grilling of foods and Billie's specialties are cakes and ice cream. Billie shared that she never did any cooking as a youngster at home, so she had to learn everything after she married.

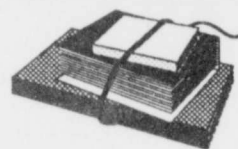
Among the recipes Billie is sharing, I asked her for her homemade ice cream recipe because I had heard it was delicious. Sure enough, Billie had made a big freezer of it and it was delicious. Billie has used this recipe for over 20 years. You can take this basic recipe and add strawberries, cherries, peaches, bananas or whatever flavor you prefer. You can also crush six Butterfinger bars or melt six Milky Ways and add to it. A good tip for homemade ice cream is to place Saran Wrap on top before you put the lid on so ice crystals do not form. Billie keeps a lot of fresh fruits frozen to use with recipes such as this.

Billie thinks the Jam Cake is the best cake she has ever tasted. It has a lot of ingredients but is well worth it. It stays moist a long time and the longer it sits, the better it gets. This is a substitute for fruit cake and is especially good during the winter month holidays. She has used this recipe since 1977.

Ice Cream

6 eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 pint cream
1 pint half & half milk

Beat eggs until very thick and golden. Add sugar and salt and beat again to thickened state. Add cream and beat. Add half & half and beat. Pour into freezer and fill to 3/4 full with milk. Extra beating makes the mixture creamier and is the secret of this recipe. Do not cut down on the eggs. You may also put in fruit of your choice. Makes 1 gallon.

Jam Cake

1 cup raisins
boiling water
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
3 eggs
1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon ground all spice
1 teaspoon soda
2/3 cup buttermilk
1 cup strawberry or blackberry jam or preserves
1 cup pineapple preserves
1 cup chopped dates
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup all purpose flour

Cover raisins with boiling water; let stand while preparing batter. When plump, drain and pat dry on paper towels. Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy; add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine 1 1/2 cups flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Combine soda and buttermilk.

Fresh Coconut Pound Cake

1 cup butter, softened
3 cups sugar
6 eggs
3 cups all purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 carton (8 oz.) sour cream
1 cup fresh coconut, or frozen thawed
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon coconut extract

Iceing:
1/2 cup vegetable shortening
1 box (1 lb.) confectioners sugar
1/4 cup water
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cream butter for the cake, gradually adding sugar, beat until mixture is light and fluffy. Add 1 egg at a time, beating well after each addition. In separate bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt, mix well. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Stir in coconut and extracts. Pour batter in greased, floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 350 for 1 hour and twenty minutes or until a wooden pick comes out clean. Cool in pan 10-15 minutes, remove form pan and cool completely before icing or cutting. To make icing, combine all ingredients in large bowl of electric mixer. Mix on high until fluffy. Frost top and sides, pie mixture is added.



Local Physicians, McCuiston Hospital Take Part In Screening

The most common cancer among American men and the second overall leading cancer killer, prostate cancer, will strike over 120,000 men this year, killing more than 30,000.
 In cooperation with the Prostate Cancer Education Council, local urologists, J.F. LeDerer, M.D. and Donald L. Wikoff, M.D., as well as McCuiston Regional Medical Center will offer free prostate cancer screening to the men of northeast Texas and southeastern Oklahoma on Saturday, September 28 at McCuiston Regional Medical Center. The screening will be available from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. on this date with no appointment or preparation necessary; just on a walk-in basis.

The two physicians have volunteered to be available for doing the digital rectal examination of the prostate, as well as to answer questions regarding the screening. The blood test for Prostatic Specific Antigen, PSA, also part of the screening, will be underwritten by Schering Laboratories nationally, and administered locally through other volunteer services of the hospital.

According to Dr. LeDerer, "Prostatic Cancer is difficult for the

patient to identify because it can and usually does begin developing without symptoms. More important, awareness of the disease is very low among men. Only 8% of men polled in a recent national survey named Prostatic Cancer, when asked about illnesses and diseases discussed with their doctor during their most recent physical. Although Prostatic Cancer becomes more common with aging, 20% of men with the disease are 65 years of age or younger, and the cancer often causes little to no symptoms for months or years after the disease has begun to spread. The physicians therefore stress the critical importance for finding the disease early.

The ultimate goal of the local participation is to better educate the public in regard to this disease, and find and treat the disease reducing the number of deaths.

This screening at no charge, will be worth all of the time and energy we are committing to it if we are able to identify even one person with the disease, whose life in turn can be changed because he took a few minutes to come in for this painless examination."

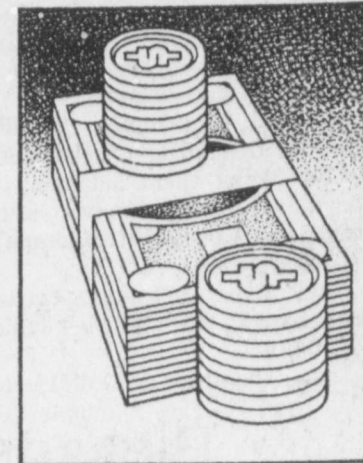
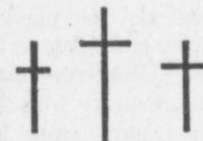
