





Ice Cream

6 eggs 1 1/2 cups sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 pint cream 1 pint half & half

Beat eggs until very thick and golden. Add sugar and salt and beat again to thickened state. Add cream and beat. Add half & half and beat. Pour into freezer and fill to 3/4 full with milk.

Extra beating makes the mixture creamier and is the secret of this recipe. Do not cut down on teh eggs. You may also put in fruit of your choice. Makes 1 gallon.

Jam Cake

1 cup raisins

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened 3 eggs 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground all spice

1 teaspoon soda 2/3 cup buttermilk 1 cup strawberry or blackberry jam or cup pineapple preserves cup chopped dates

1 cup chopped dates
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup all purpose flour
Cover raisins with boiling water; let
stand while preparing batter. When
plump, drain and pat dry on paper towels. Cream sugar and butter until light
and fluffy; add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine 1 ing well after each addition. Combine 1 1/2 cups flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Combine soda and buttermilk.

Add flour misture to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk, mixing well. Stir in jam and preserves.

Combine dates, nuts and raisins with 1/2 cup flour. Stir into batter and mix well. Spoon batter into greased and floured 10" tube or bundt pan. Bake at 300 for 1 1/2 hours or until done. Cool 30 minutes before removing from pan.

Yield: 1-10" cake.
Fresh Coconut Pound Cake cup butter, softened cups sugar 3 cups all purpose flour 1/4 teaspoon soda 1/4 teaspoon salt

carton (8 oz.) sour cream cup fresh coconut, or frozen thawed teaspoon vanilla teaspoon coconut extract

1/2 cup vegetable shortening 1 box (1 lb.) confectioners sugar 1/4 cup water 1/8 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla Cream butter for the cake, gradually adding sugar, beat until mixture is light and fluffy. Add 1 egg at a time, beating well after each addition. In separate bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt, mix well. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Stir in coconut and extracts. Pour batter in greased, floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 350 for 1 hour and twenty minutes or until a wooden pick comes out clean. Cool in pan 10-15 minutes, remove form pan and cool completely before icing or cutting. To make icing, com-bine all ingredients in large bowl of electric mixer. Mix on high until fluffy. Frost top and sides. pie mixture is added.







### Cemetery Donations Received Local Physicials, McCuistion Hospital Take Part In Screening

The most common cancer among American men and the second overall leading cancer killer, prostate cancer, will strike over 120,000 men this year, killing more than 30,000.

In cooperation with the Prostate Cancer Education Council, local urologists, J.F. LeDerer, M.D. and Donald L. Wikoff, M.D., as well as McCuistion Regional Medical Center will offer free prostate cancer screening to the men of northeast Texas and southeastern Oklahoma on Saturday, September 28 at McCuistion Regional Medical Center. The screening will be available from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. on this date with no appopintment or preparation necessary; just on a walk-in basis.

The two physicians have volunteered to be available for doing the digital rectal examination of the prostate, as well as to answer questions regarding the screening. The blood test for Prostatic Specific Antigen, PSA, also part of the screening, will be underwritten by Schering Laboratories nationally, and administered locally through other volunteer services of the hospital.


