Six Major Cities Receive Over 40% Of Local Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$98 million to 1065 Texas cities and counties with the state's six largest cities receiving 42% of all city sales taxes distributed.

Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth, San Antonio, Austin and El Paso, which comprise 29.4% of the state's population, received sales tax rebates totaling \$37 million.

"Local sales tax rebates, from Beaumont to El Paso, continue to run ahead of this time last year, an indication that the Texas economy is expanding at a steady rate," Sharp said.

In all, 960 cities received \$88 million this month for a 1991 total of \$705 million and an increase of 12% over last year's rebates at this time.

Locally, Blossom received \$1,558.45, showing a 31.79% increase over last year's payment of \$1,085.75.

Deport received \$557.86, marking a 3.82% increase from last year.

Paris received \$170,248.44 for a 1.80% increase from 1990.

Mt. Pleasant received \$106,392.83 for an 18.32% increase.

Talco received \$941.12 for a 4.02% increase over last year's payments to date.

Bogata received no payment for this period, however yearly payments to date show an increase of 15.27% over 1990.

Clarksville received \$16,830.65 for a 7.93% increase while Detroit received no payment for this period but remained with a 7.93% increase for yearly payments to date.

Fruit Cocktail Cake

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 can fruit cocktail
2 teaspoons soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs

Grease pan with butter or Crisco but do not flour.
Icing:
1 1/4 cups sugar
1 cup canned milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 stick butter

Boil slowly until cake is done. Pour over cake as soon as cake is done while still hot.

Kraut Salad

1 can kraut
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup onions
1/2 cup green peppers
1/2 cup Wesson oil
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.
Mix well and chill for 1 hour. Keep refrigerated.

Meatballs & Baked Beans

1 can (21 oz.) baked beans, drained
1 can (1 lb.) meatballs and gravy
1 T. instant minced onions
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup barbecue sauce

Combine all in a baking dish. Bake uncovered 30 to 40 minutes at 350. Serves 2-3.

Pineapple Zucchini Bread

3 eggs
2 cups sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups grated peeled zucchini

1 (8 oz.) can crushed pineapple, drained
3 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup raisins

Place first 4 ingredients in large bowl; beat well, add zucchini and other ingredients and mix well. Bake at 350 about 1 hour. Makes 3 medium size loaves.

Diabetic Applesauce Cookies

1 3/4 cups cake flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 cup reduced-calorie margarine
liquid sugar substitute to equal 1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 egg
1 cup unsweetened applesauce
1/3 cup raisins
1 cup bran cereal

Sift together flour, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves and baking soda. Combine margarine, sugar substitute, vanilla and egg; cream until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture and applesauce alternately to creamed mixture, mixing well after each addition. Fold in raisins and bran cereal. Drop 48 level tablespoons of cookie dough about 1 inch apart onto nonstick baking sheet. Bake at 375 for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown.

Nothing will be accepted without proper hanger. Pencil, pen and ink drawing, etc. must be matted on a type backing with hanger for ease of hanging the pictures. Class 1 Landscape; Class 2 Floral and Class in Still Life will be held in all the following mediums: oil, acrylic, watercolor, charcoal/pencil, marks-a-lot, pastel.

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Hay Testing Can Save Dollars

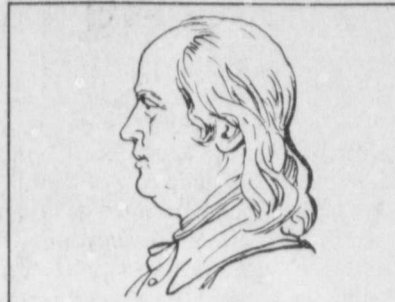

 It is difficult to determine the quality of hay by just looking at it. "Most producers were late getting the first cutting and then much of the hay was rained on," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The wet spring could turn out to be an

advantage since quality holds better in a cool moist spring than it does in a dry spring." Reeves says it is best to take samples with a forage probe. If one is not available, reach into the good part of seven to eight bales and take grab samples and mix them together. Forage testing labs are operated by

the Extension Service in Smith and Hopkins Counties. Testing labs are also located on the campus of Texas A&M and Stephen F. Austin State University. Several private labs are in the area.

The best quality hay should be fed to nursing cows while the lower quality hay is generally fed to dry cows. By properly utilizing their hay, producers should save on the cost of feed supplements. If additional hay is needed, Reeves suggests fertilizing and hoping for rain. Do not wait until it rains to fertilize.

At the heart of the community

Love me — love my demodexfolliculorum!

The unfriendly landscape is pitted with craters. There are pools of salty water filled with warm underground springs in which ugly stick-like creatures move with whiplash movements.

In dense forest areas, wormy eight-legged animals climb thorny, leafless tree trunks with their suction-padded feet.

Elsewhere, in dark, craggy caves, hordes of creatures huddle together for protection against enemies.

It sounds like a ghoulish planet from the imagination of a science fiction writer. It is certainly enough to make your skin crawl. No wonder. That is just what it is — your skin.

The skin, with all its nooks and crannies, is home to about two billion microbes and germs. The "human planet" has a constant temperature and the landscape is varied. The salt springs are our sweat glands, the tree trunks our hairs, the caves our nostrils and ears, and the craters our pores.

Microbiologist Mary Marples of New Zealand has made a lengthy study of skin. She says our guests congregate in "the desert of the forearm, the cool woods of the scalp, and the tropical forest of the armpit." Marples has found that the armpit is the most densely inhabited part of the body. Bacteria there can be as numerous as 2,500,000 per square centimeter.

The least populated areas

are the barren wastes of the shoulder blades. The population there is hundreds per square centimeter. People associate germs, microbes and bacteria with dirt and disease. That is not fair. Many do more good than harm. Most are harmless. We have even arranged a truce with many of the potentially dangerous ones as long as they stay in their proper place.

There is, for instance, a family of germs in the intestines which help deal with waste products. But if they migrate to other organs they cause violent inflammation. In the bladder they can cause cystitis.

Perhaps the oddest of our inhabitants is an animal called demodexfolliculorum.

An animal? Experts say it can be correctly described as one.

It has a long, thin body and eight legs with suction pads. It is the biggest creature on the "human planet" but harmless.

It spends most of its time in herds in the forest regions — the eyelashes, the hair follicles of the outer nose and the chin.

The mouth is the most heavily populated cave on the "human planet."

Great battles between good germs and bad take place there. It is a place the disease-producing germs would love to occupy permanently — and often dominate for prolonged periods until ousted by the soldier germs.

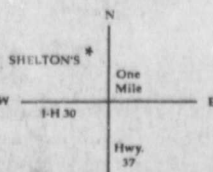
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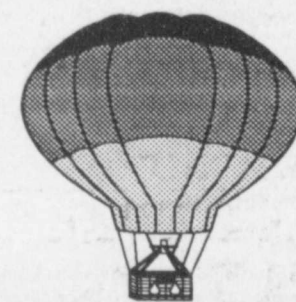
