Voting is a privilege and an obli-
ation. I feel at times it is difficul gation. I feel at times it is difficult
or impossible to be certain we are voting the way that we really think is best. On August 10 a general
election will be held to vote on two amendments to the state constitution.
The first amendment concerns
advalorem tax exemptions for eral groups including the elderly and the disabled. Surely, most everyone will favor this. However, to vote for this one we will also be
voting in favor of a personal propvoting in favor of a personal prop-
erty tax as this is included in the erty tax as this is included in the
first amendment. This could be a disaster for nearly everyone!
The second amendment concerns issuing three billion dollars in gen-
eral revenue bonds for student loans. This would be great if the budget were balanced. Still, at this moment, the legislature threatens to drastically reduceall educational funding. Does it make sense to loans at the same time that educational opportunity and excellence is being taken away?

After completing the state ballot, the voter will receive another
ballot for local school districts. The first issue concerns advalorem tax exemptions. The second also concerns other advalorem tax exemp-
tions. The third concerns creating tions. The third concerns creating
a personal property tax. In other words, the voter votes here for three different proposals when all three of the same are included in the first constitutional amendment. Obvi-
ously, a constitutional amendment ously, a constitutionat amendmen
would overrule a local school district resolution!
talked with a member of the state legislature who surprised me by indicating that he thought we
would be voting on three amendments. He strongly opposed a personal property tax indicating that historicaly this tax had cost more in revenue.
I am sure that we will be told that a personal property tax would be
modest. However, it seems mot that the state is trying to reduce the deficit by shirking their responsibility to education and by shiftting more responsibility down to the
local educational districts. This would mean that these small taxing units would have the ability to tax all individuals possessions--most of which have already been heavily
taxed before and when purchased. taxed before and when purchased. would not be income producing. This could be the straw to break the ranchers' and farmers' back,
