Two Down, Remainder Up In Sales Tax Figures

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent checks totaling \$151 million to 1,167 Texas cities and counties that collect local sales taxes, with the state's top six recipients showing an average increase of 5.2 percent over last year's total rebates at this time.

"Even though some areas in Texas show only a slight increase, while others' rebates are down, overall the state's economy is strong and healthy," Sharp said.

In all, 1,062 Texas cities received \$136.6 million as their August rebates for 1991 total of \$841.6 million and an increase of 10% over last year's total rebates at this time.

Bogata received \$4,398.18 for its payment for a 13.91% increase. Clarksville received \$23,399.55 for a 4.36% increase and Detroit received \$1,766.28 for a 4.87% increase.

Mt. Pleasant received \$134,057.30 for a 13.53% increase.

Talco received \$1,669.46 as its payment, for a 2.05% increase.

Blossom received \$2,775.85 for a 22.79% increase while Paris received \$2,026.40 for a .23% decrease.

Deport showed the only other decrease locally, with a payment of \$2,026.40 for a .90% decrease in total payments to date.

Houston received the largest check statewide, \$24 million.

Council Accepts Resignation Of Trash Pick Up Crew

The Deport City Council attended to a number of important items of business in their regular meeting Monday night.

Among the first things the council considered was the resignation of Larry and Judy Whittle, the city's sanitation crew. The resignation was effective immediately, as the city had been given two week's notice prior to the Monday meeting.

Mel and Lisa Battey were authorized to pick up trash on the regular schedule until the council can take applications from anyone interested in the job and until someone can be hired on a permanent basis.

The decision to post bids on the city's 1982 GMC pickup was postponed for another month.

Cleaning and repairing the water tower was discussed but no action was taken.

An ordinance was accepted to make Sharon Francis the city's official

record keeper.

The council approved Sewer and Water Superintendent Jerry Burns to use the city's backhoe on his property. Burns in return agreed to pay the city the regular rate for hiring a comparable machine.

The council also determined that all employee salaries are to be reviewed in December.

Accepting bids on the old maintainer was postponed.

The council approved the purchase of a new tool box and some hand tools for the new city pickup.

After further review the council maintains that the city pickup must not be used except on city business. If citizens need sewer tape, etc. from city pickup after hours they will have to wait until 8 a.m. on the next work day unless it is an emergency.

Minutes were read and approved as was the finance report and payment of bills approved.

Amendment One Passes, Two Fails In Light Turnout

The confusion stemmed from lumping the homestead, elderly and disabled exemptions in with approval

of personal property taxes.

After that amendment passed, voters on a county level seem to vote against the personal property tax.

Apparently, more people "figured out" how to vote and make it count if they were against a personal property tax and for the homestead, elderly and disabled exemptions.

That meant voting yes on the state ballot, where they were combined, and no on a county level.

Many people had to vote in two locations, which added to the confusion of the situation.

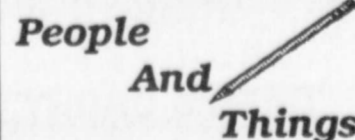
Prairiland Class Of 1971 Will Hold 20-Year Reunion

The Country Cooking column is coming this week from the kitchen of Seb and Maurine Mankins of Bogata. Seb, retired, and Maurine, semi-retired, have been married for 27 years and have lived all this time in the Bogata area where they attend the First Baptist Church.

Maurine works part time as an Inservice Coordinator at Red River Haven Nursing Home. She has made this her career for the past five years of her 22 years at the home.

Hobbies of Maurine's are cooking, yard work, gardening, going on tours, playing 42 and entertaining, painting T-shirts, sewing, shopping for a collecting cookbooks and recipes.

Maurine's favorite food to prepare is desserts. She enjoys taking desserts to the sick, church activities anywhere needed. Seb doesn't like to cook at all, but he does run errands for her. She also enjoys making snack foods to serve her 42 guests.

Painting special scenes or flowers on T-shirts is another hobby Maurine enjoys. She gives these as gifts.

Bus tours to Palo Duro Canyon and Branson, MO are enjoyed by both Seb and Maurine. They make each trip every year.

Maurine has chosen a variety of food recipes to share with you this week and we hope you enjoy them.

Her Broccoli Casserole recipe originated from a friend, Marie Early, from Longview some two years ago. The Pepper Relish recipe came from her sister-in-law, Dorothy Henderson of Longview. The Pear Preserves came from a friend, Jettie Bond of

Bogata. She says this is the best pear preserves she's ever tasted.

While attending a luncheon at Longview about a year ago, Maurine tasted a piece of the Blackberry Cake and then asked for the recipe. She says it is delicious. The Vegetable Salad recipe was given to her by her neighbor, Brenda Gunter of Bogata. Brenda made the salad and shared it with Maurine and she certainly enjoys it.

I also want to share a cake recipe that I found during my travels this summer. I've made it twice and all my family loves it. Another reason I like it is because it's so easy. I have timed myself and can have the cake completely ready to eat in nine minutes, including cleaning the strawberries.

Take a 16 oz. carton of Cool Whip, add 2 tablespoons powdered sugar (this makes it thicker), add 1 pint of sliced strawberries. Mix well. Take a bought pound cake (I like the ones that are tall and in a bundt pan), take it out of the pan and cut it in half. Make two layers. Put half your Cool Whip mixture on the first layer, put on second layer and finishing the cake. This is like a strawberry shortcake. I don't know a name for it, so I decided to call it the 9-minute cake. Keep in refrigerator. I hope you'll enjoy it. This cake is beautiful in a glass cake pan.

Broccoli Casserole

- 1 stick butter
- 1 pkg. chopped broccoli, thawed
- 1 can cream of Mushroom soup
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1 cup chopped onions

Melt butter in skillet, add chopped onion, saute until clear. Add 1 pkg. broccoli and stir thoroughly. Add soup and stir well. Add cheese whiz and simmer a few minutes to melt cheese. Add 1 cup cooked rice. Place in casserole dish, either freeze or put in refrigerator until next day if desired. Bake 25-30 minutes at 350.

- 1 qt. chopped jalapeno peppers
- 1 qt. chopped red and green bell peppers
- 1 qt. banana peppers, chopped
- 1 qt. chopped onions
- 1 qt. sugar
- 1 qt. vinegar
- 1 Tbs. salt

Mix, bring to a boil. Cook 5-10 minutes. Put in jars and seal. Makes 22 pts.

- 6 cups sugar; 3 cups water; 1 cup white syrup. Bring to a boil. Add 1 gallon of peeled, sliced pears then simmer for two hours or more if desired. Put in jars and seal while hot.

- 1 box Duncan Hines white cake mix
- 1 small box Blackberry jello (could use raspberry)
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1 cup Blackberry wine
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Grease and flour bundt pan. Put nuts on bottom. Pour batter over nuts. Bake at 350 until done.

- Glaze:
 - 3/4 cup powdered sugar
 - 1/4 cup oleo
 - 1/2 cup blackberry wine
- Bring to boil and stir 2 minutes. Sugar melt and liquid barely thickens. Turn off heat and stir 2 more minutes. Pour part of glaze over cake and let set for 15 minutes. Turn cake out of pan and coat cake with rest of glaze. Cover and let set. Better the next day.

- Vegetable Salad
- 1-16 oz. can corn, whole kernel
- 1-16 oz. can English peas, small peas
- 1-16 oz. can french style green beans
- 1 cup green onion, chopped (include tops)

- 1 cup celery chopped
- 1 small jar pimento
- Sauce:
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1/2 cup Wesson oil
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 Tbsp. water

Mix vegetables in large bowl. Bring sauce to a boil, let cool and pour over vegetables. Refrigerate.

Add water to jello, let cool slightly. Stir in apricots, pineapple and pecans. Put into serving dish. Put pineapple and apricots in refrigerator for a while and it will congeal faster. Slice bananas over mixture, whip cream, add softened creamed cheese and extract, coconut and powdered sugar. Spread over mixture, sprinkle with coconut if desired.

Once the applications are handed out, parents and guardians are urged by the school administration to return the forms within 10 days. However, applications will be received any time during the year, especially if a family's income changes significantly--someone in the household becomes unemployed--or if there is an increase in family size. 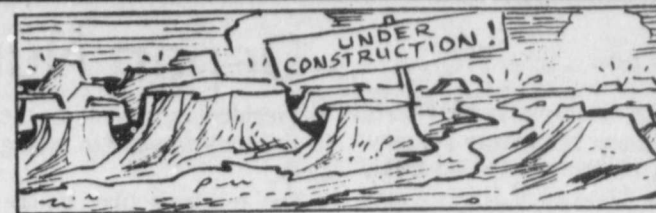



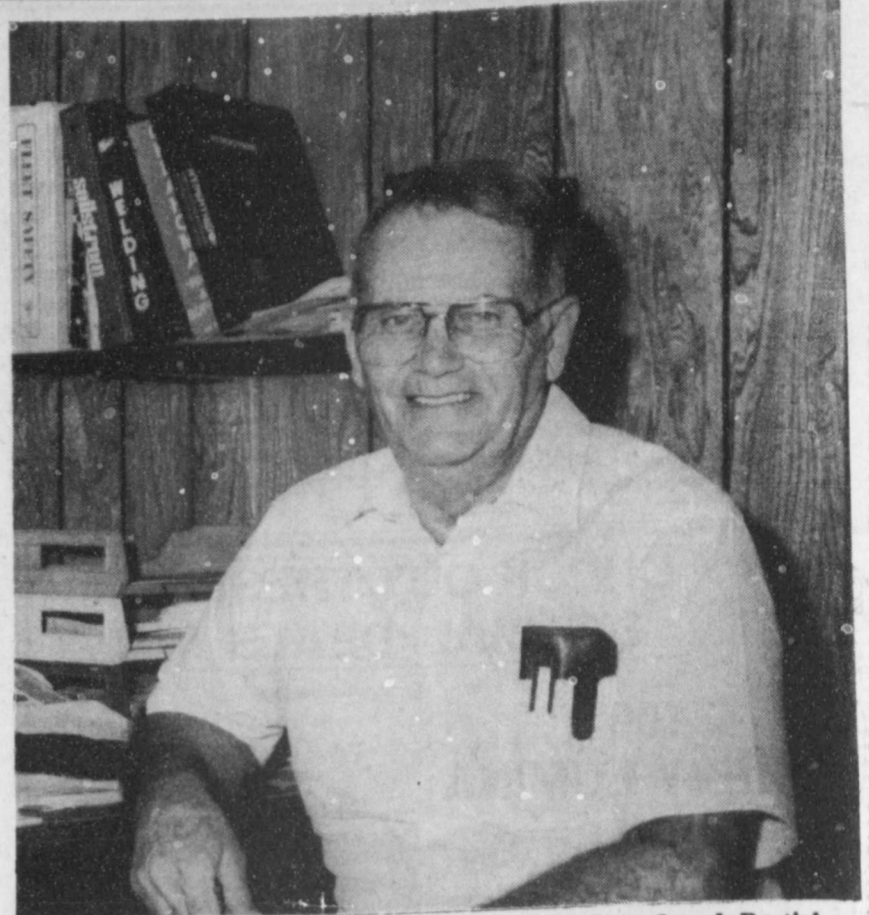

Who Goes To Rodeos?

According to a recent PRCA study, professional rodeo reaches an attractive cross section of the U.S. population.

More than 88% of professional rodeo spectators own their own homes. They have spent an average of 15 years at their current residence and as many women as men enjoy professional rodeo competition.

And rodeo fans and competitors alike have proven loyal to PRCA's sponsors' products.

Did you know that 95.4% of rodeo

fans wear western clothing; 79.4% say they wear it regularly.

More than a quarter of the survey respondents had purchased a western hat within 30 days of the poll. Nearly 48% of those questioned bought cowboy boots during the previous month. Approximately 32% had purchased a new belt buckle in the past month.

More than 19% of those surveyed said they intend to buy a new car or light truck within a year. The National Automobile Dealers Association predicts that 7.5% of the U.S. population 18 and older will purchase new light vehicles this year.

Rodeo fans attended an average of 9.76 rodeos in 1989 and an average of 86.4% regularly follow professional rodeo standings on news.

Occupationally, 28.2% of the persons surveyed are professionals; 17.8% are in technical/trade related areas; 12.8% are in agricultural fields; 12.1% are homemakers; 6.2% are in sales; with 14% in other fields.

Educationally, 47.2% of the persons surveyed attended college; 34.2% have a high school degree, 9.4% have some high school educa-

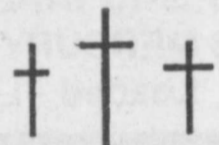

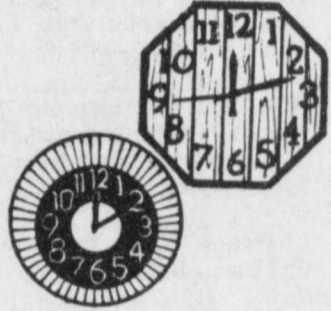

Backward Glances From 1944



This week the year 1944 was suggested to me by a real good friend of mine.

The first thing that caught my attention was an article about a man receiving \$33.45 from area merchants for bringing the first and second bale of cotton for the year of 1944 to the Deport Gin. The man was Gordan Woodard who lived one mile south of Minter. The bale was sold to Storey & Evans for 22 1/2¢ a pound.

There was an ad for the reopening of the Vogue Beauty Shop. A shampoo and set was 75¢, a manicure was \$1.00, a lash and brow was 75¢, a brow arch was 50¢, a rinse was 25¢, a set was 60¢, and oil shampoo and set was \$1.00, permanents were \$4.00 and up, a machinless permanent was \$6.00 and up, and a hair tint was \$3.50. The Vogue was ran by Pauline Merritt.

I also found an amusing little joke I thought some of you might enjoy.

Lady: "Well, well- changing a tire, young man?"

Young Man: "No, madam, not at all. I just get out every few miles and jack the car up to save rubber and gas." - Grit

Next I found some items on sale at the Crescent Drug Store. A \$1.00 easy read thermometer was on sale for 90¢, a \$1.50, 2-quart fountain

syringe comb. was on sale for \$1.10, an infant syringe could be bought for 25¢ to 35¢, \$1.00 worth of crazy crystals could be bought for 89¢, 5 pounds of epsom salts could be bought for 29¢, 5 pounds of sulphur could be bought for 29¢, and 25¢ worth of black draught could be bought for 19¢. Maybe we need to talk to our pharmacists about their prices now.

Griffin & Anderson was offering hail insurance for growing crops. In 1944 a subscription to the Deport Times for someone who lives in Lamar or Red River County was \$1.50 a year. A one year's subscription to the Deport Times for someone who lived outside of Lamar or Red River County was \$2.00 a year.

Here are some prices from the W. F. Burden & Son department store. Chenille house coats could be bought for \$6.50, dresses started at \$2.49 and went up to \$12.50, fall coats for women and children started at \$10.00 and went up to \$59.50, case of feathers pillows started at \$1.50 and went up to \$1.98, blankets started at \$1.25 and went up to \$6.75, and comforts jacked at \$5.95 and went up to \$16.50.

Playing at the Deport Theatre was "Dancing Masters," "Sweet Rosie O'Grady," "Return of the Vampire," and "Up In Mabel's Room."

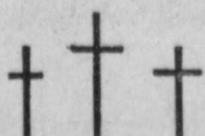
