

Recycling-is it really a choice? Most towns and communities act as though we can choose whether or not to participate in addressing the solid waste dilemma. Can we honestly and conscientiously turn our backs on such a growing problem? A problem from which our children and their children will suffer the greatest consequences. Nationwide, some 3000 landfills reached capacity and were shut down between 1982 and 1987. It is estimated that 50% of the landfills now in use will likely close down within five years. In the 1970's Texas permitted 250 new landfills

but only 13 last year. The Environmental Protection Agency has mandated a 25% reduction in all solid waste by 1992. We are currently at a recycling level of only 10%. Needless to say it is going to take a total commitment from everyone to reach such a goal

in a mere number of months.

With statistics such as these can we truly believe we can continue on as always with no thought given to tomorrow. Three simple R's--reduce, reuse and recycle-can make such a change in our future. With so little effort and such a small adjustment can we conscientiously disregard our responsibilities as good citizens and good family members. Since I believe Deport is a community that cares, a community where families and heritage are important, I think we owe it to ourselves, our country and our children to recycle.

During the early morning hours of July 18, two persons escaped from the Lamar County Jail. One of the prisoners has been returned to the jail, however, one is still at large.



The man was Gordan Woodard who lived one mile south of Minter. The bale was sold to Storey & Evans for 22 1/2¢ a pound.

There was an ad for the reopening of the Vogue Beauty Shop. A shampoo and set was 75¢, a manicure was \$1.00, a lash and brow was 75¢, a brow arch was 50¢, a rinse was 25¢, a set was 60¢, and oil shampoo and set was \$1.00, permanents were \$4.00 and up, a machinless permanent was \$6.00 and up, and a hair tint was \$3.50. The Vogue was ran by Pauline

I also found an amusing little joke I thought some of you might enjoy. Lady: "Well,well-changing a tire,

young man?"
Young Man: "No, madam, not at all. I just get out every few miles and jack the car up to save rubber and gas."- Grit

Next I found some items on sale at the Crescent Drug Store. A \$1.00 easy read thermometer was on sale for 90¢, a \$1.50, 2-quart fountain

syringe comb. was on sale for \$1.10, an infant syring could be bought for 25¢ to 35¢, \$1.00 worth of crazy crystals could be bought for 89¢, 5 pounds of epsom salts could be bought for 29¢, 5 pounds of sulphur could be bought fo 29¢, and 25¢ worth of blach draught could be bought for 19¢. Maybe we need to talk to our pharmacists about their prices now.

Griffin & Anderson was offering hail insurance for growing crops.In 1944 a subscription to the Deport Times for someone who lives in LamarorRedRiverCounty was \$1.50 a year. A one year's subscription to the Deport Times for someone who lived outside of Lamar or Red River County was \$2.00 a year,

Here are some prices from the W. F. Burden & Son department store. Chenille house coats could be bought for \$6.50, dresses started at \$2.49 and went up to\$12.50, fall coats for women and children started at \$10.00 and went up to \$59.50, case of feathers pillows started at \$1.50 and went up to \$1.98, blankets started at \$1.25 and went up to \$6.75, and comforts started at \$5.95 and went up to \$16.50.
