## Fire Fanned The Flames Of Fear In Past History

Everyone fears losing their home to fire. Fire is non-discriminatory. Wealthy or poor, insured or uninsured, when the flames lay claim to a structure it knows no difference.

But the fears about fire that people today have are nothing to be compared to those of long ago.

Fire from the past were fearsome, indeed. When one structure burned it almost certainly took another, or even several others, with it.

The earliest attempts at fire fighting were bucket brigades. Anyone who has ever watched flames roaring and consuming a building even under the deluge of water from several fire trucks can imagine how futile lines of people drawing water from a well bucket by bucket and throwing it on the flames would be!

Whole business districts were wiped out because of a fire that began in some single location.

A street of houses might be destroyed, while whole miles of countryside would be ravaged by grass fires.

Around the turn of the century local communities began to get Fire Wagons, which were copper tanks holding chemicals to smother a fire with.

These wagons were pulled by horses or mules, and the tanks were fixed on pivots. When inverted they mixed soda, water and acid, creating

a foam. Two or three hundred feet of hose enabled firemen to reach the flames.

The horses or mules were always harnessed, and usually belonged to someone with a livery or transfer business.

In larger towns the fire department actually owned their own animals.

Although primitive by today's standards, the chemical wagon prevented many a conflagration.

Larger towns frequently could afford steam pumper wagons, which replaced the chemical wagons. Most volunteer departments never owned a steam pumper.

In the late 20's and early 30's fire departments began purchasing pumper trucks. These became practical when water systems were installed in towns.

While the pumper trucks have become larger, the equipment more "high-tech" and the skills required of volunteers more demanding, one thing hasn't changed.

The volunteer fire department is constantly raising money to keep their equipment functioning and at its best.

Without updating their equipment, and training, fire fighting would never have progressed beyond the bucket brigade.

Through the years they have made real progress against the ravages of fire. While the newspaper clippings from long ago record home after home

lost, it is a fairly rare occurrence now.

No longer does a structure fire automatically mean that several other houses will catch and be destroyed. Indeed, buildings that are only a few feet away from a blaze can now be saved from damage.

When electricity replaced kerosene, and ovens and stoves replaced wood cook stoves the number of fires reduced, too.

Grass fires used to ignite wooden houses, while that is a rare occurrence these days. Almost any grass fire can be extinguished by the fire department before it claims a home.

Certified fire departments keep home owners and business owner's insurance rates down, too, a fact seldom considered.

One thing is certain. A volunteer fire department is no better than the people who man the equipment.

No matter how modern the truck, or how much water it can pump per minute, without those volunteers who man the hoses and handle the equipment, no fire would ever be put out!

Yes, fire fighting has changed. Homes have changed.

Insurance rates have sky rocketed. But one thing hasn't. That's the quality of dedication that each and every volunteer fireman has to have to serve.

Fire no longer inspires the sheer horror of by gone days. And that is largely because of the volunteer fire department.

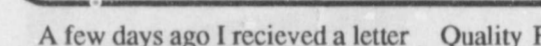

There was an ad from Whites. They had solid walnut coffee table for \$12.95. They had Kroehler Rest Rockers for \$37.50. They also had an article about them opening a new linolium department. The Challenge

Quality Felt Base was 49¢ a square yard. Also Pabco Stainless Sheen could be bought for 59¢ a square yard.

There was also an ad from House Jewelry. They had mens diamond rings for \$50.00 and wedding rings for \$9.95 a piece.

I found an article a mothers day program to be held at the 22nd Street USO Club. The soldiers had planned a Mother's Day program for the mother's of soldiers who would not be able to come home for Mother's Day.

She sent an article listing articles that were needed by the Red Cross to help the servicemen of the war. They said that anyone who had these things that they had to be in useable condition.

## Williams Hired As New Band Director

Tim Williams has been selected as the new band director at Prairiland High School. He has been a band director for 15 years, most recently at %A school Waco High School, and before that Arp. Williams was hired after Joe Watson's resignation as band director. Watson had been hired earlier in the summer.

They amended sick leave policy.

The cafeteria meal prices were set the same as last year.

\$1 for lunch, 40 cents for reduced price meals and breakfast is 50 cents regular and 30 cents reduced price.

The dyslexia program as presented by Scott Rites Hospital was adopted to assist regular education students who are having learning difficulties. It will be put into effect this year.

The resignation of Randy Dollins was accepted. He will be going to North Lamar as a counselor.

Charlie Whitten was hired as girl's basketball coach at Blossom and Junior High Football, and PE coach. Hiring was all subject to board confirmation.

Canvassing of the County Education Board election held August 10 was done.

## Scudder Blanks Giants After 51-Day Hiatus

Scott Scudder, Cincinnati Red pitcher, blanked the New York Giants recently, coming back to the mound from a 51-day hiatus as a result of shoulder tendinitis.

Scudder gave up four hits, struck out three and walked one as the Reds got consecutive shut-outs for the first time since May 18-19 of last season.

"I've never been hurt before, so I didn't know what to expect," said Scudder, who threw 71 pitches. "It's been so long since I'd been out there.

I told Jeff Reed, the catcher, to point me in the right direction to throw."

Norm Charlton pitched three innings and Ted Power finished the six-hitter.

Cincinnati has won just 12 of its last 37 games, but sent the Giants to consecutive shutout losses for the first time since April, 1988.

Nettie's hobbies are reading, cooking, sewing, gardening, canning, knitting, crochet, embroidery and walking.

One of her favorite authors is James Dobson, and she also enjoys educational books. Nettie tries to walk 3 1/2 miles every day. She has a walking partner, Melody Holland, who keeps her going.

Casseroles and traditional foods are her favorites. She bakes all her bread and is known for her famous cinnamon rolls which she is sharing with you. If you would like to purchase some, just call her. They are delicious.

Nettie learned to cook as a youngster and she still uses a lot of her mom's basic ideas and adapts them to suit her family's style. She first started making cinnamon rolls at age 12.

She sews all her family's clothes. She also makes lots of baby quilts for gifts and makes large quilts which she sells to a lady in Paris who in turn sells them all over the nation.

In canning all her fruits and vegetables, Nettie thinks green beans are the easiest. She began naming all the different foods she prepares each year and I said, "Hey, stop, I want to share this with the readers." She cans English peas, carrots, corn, beets, kraut, pickles, tomato juice, tomatoes, pizza sauce, taco sauce, ketchup, barbeque sauce, hot peppers, okra, blackberries, applesauce, etc. If you ever need a recipe for canning, just call her.

Cinnamon Rolls

1 cup warm water  
4 cups warm milk  
1 cup sugar  
4 teas. salt  
8 eggs  
1 cup melted butter  
4 Tbls. instant yeast  
20 cups flour

Mix water, milk, sugar, salt, eggs and butter in large mixing bowl. In a separate bowl, mix yeast with several cups flour. Add to the mixture and mix well. Add the rest of the flour and mix well. Cover and let rise til double. Punch down and let rise til double again. Punch down and roll out, a half of the dough at a time, on a floured surface; spread with 1/4 cup melted butter, sprinkle liberally with cinnamon and 2 cups of brown sugar. Roll up and slice. Place rolls on greased cookie sheet, let rise til they look a little puffy. Bake 20 minutes at 350. As soon as they are baked, glaze them.

Glaze:  
1/2 cup melted butter  
1/3 cup brown sugar  
1/2 teas. vanilla  
1 cup milk  
2 lbs. powdered sugar  
Makes approximately 4 1/2 dozen large rolls. Can be frozen.

Taco Cornbread  
2 lbs. hamburger  
1 large chopped onion  
Fry in large skillet and add:  
2 pkgs. taco seasoning  
3 cups chopped tomatoes  
4 cups cooked pinto beans  
cheese (optional)  
Mix well and simmer 5 minutes. Pour in 9x11 baking pan.  
Combread topping:  
3/4 cup cornmeal  
3/4 cup flour  
1/8 cup sugar

3/4 tsp. salt  
3/4 tsp. soda  
3/4 tsp. baking soda  
1 egg  
1 1/8 cup milk  
Mix and spread evenly over meat and bean mixture. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or til combread is done. Serve with additional taco sauce as desired

Banana Nut Cake  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup mashed bananas  
2 cups flour  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs, buttermilk, vanilla and bananas. Mix well. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Pour into well greased and floured 9x11 pan. Bake 30 minutes at 350. Delicious with or without frosting.

Amish Meatballs and Potatoes  
1 1/2 lb. ground beef  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
3/4 cup bread crumbs  
1 egg  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 cup milk  
Mix all ingredients thoroughly. Shape into balls the size of walnuts and brown in 1/4 cup hot fat or salad oil. Remove meat and stir into fat:  
1/4 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1 tsp. paprika  
Stir in 2 3/4 cups milk  
Return meat to gravy. Cook 10 minutes and add 8 medium potatoes, boiled and cut up. Cook another 5 to 10 minutes.

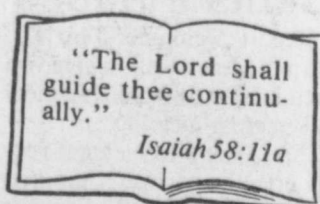

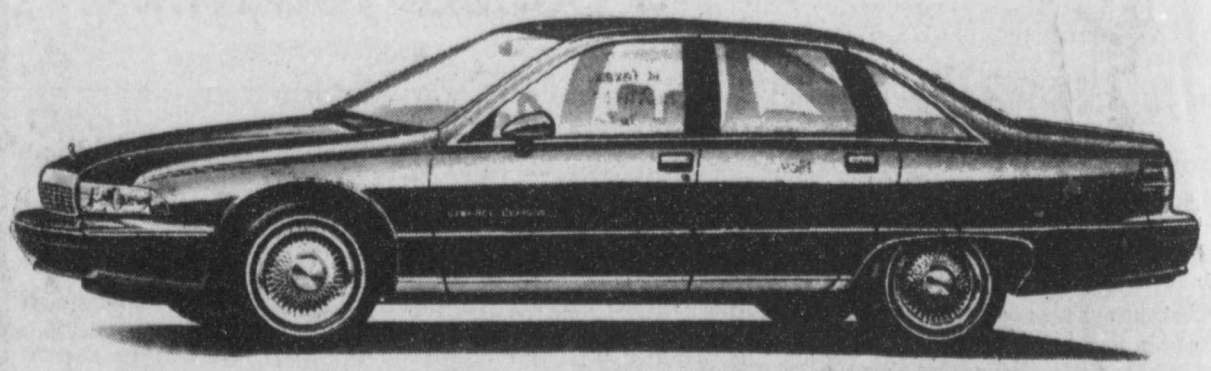

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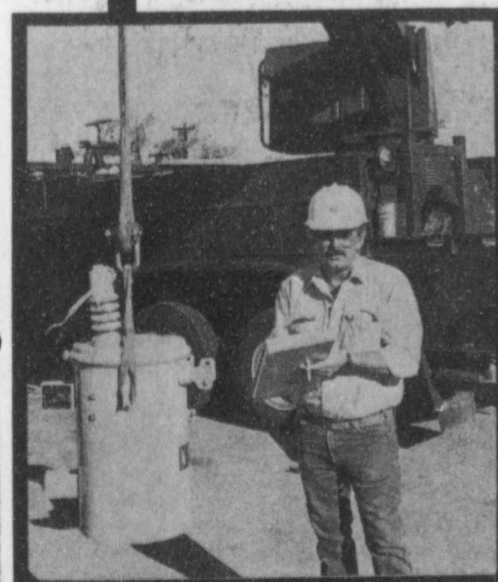

## Armyworms March Into Lamar County

Area forage producers as well as homeowners should be aware that Armyworms have arrived in the Red River Valley and that they pose a serious threat to forage crops if left unchecked. The appearance of the voracious eating worms has been expected for sometime as the cooler and wetter than normal weather pattern of the last two weeks were ideal for the development of Armyworms.

The favorite target initially for the worm will be the well managed pastured, meadows, lawns and turf areas. However, they will eat forage plants that are not lush as well as peanuts, cowpeas, alfalfa and a number of others!

The moth of the Armyworm is an intelligent creature and has the ability to deposit the eggs in an area that will have some of the best plant mate-

rial for the worm to feed. This is why one should look for Armyworms in fertilized pastures and meadows.

When checking a given area for Armyworms, look for a grayish appearing cast to the plants. However, in the advanced stage where worms have been feeding for a few days, most of the foliage will have been stripped from the plants in areas. When serious outbreaks of the insect occur, the larvae exhaust the food supply and begin crawling, literally by the thousands, seeking more plants to devour.

The worms are easily controlled by one of three insecticides-Sevin, Dibron or Parathion. There is a 15-day wait where Parathion is used, and dairy cows should not graze where Dibron is used.

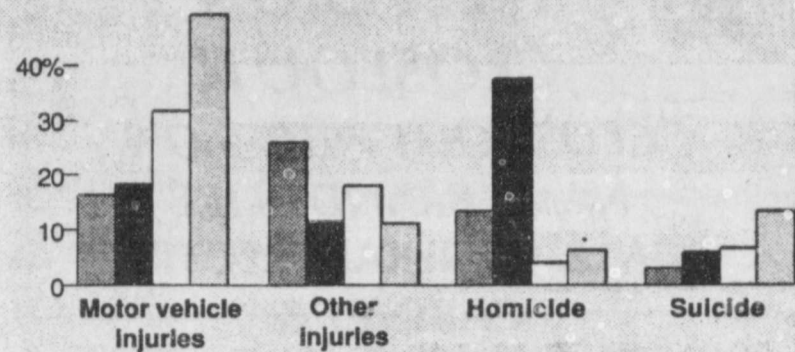

Both granddads agreed on our way home it sure wasn't our grandson's fault, but we would win the next one.

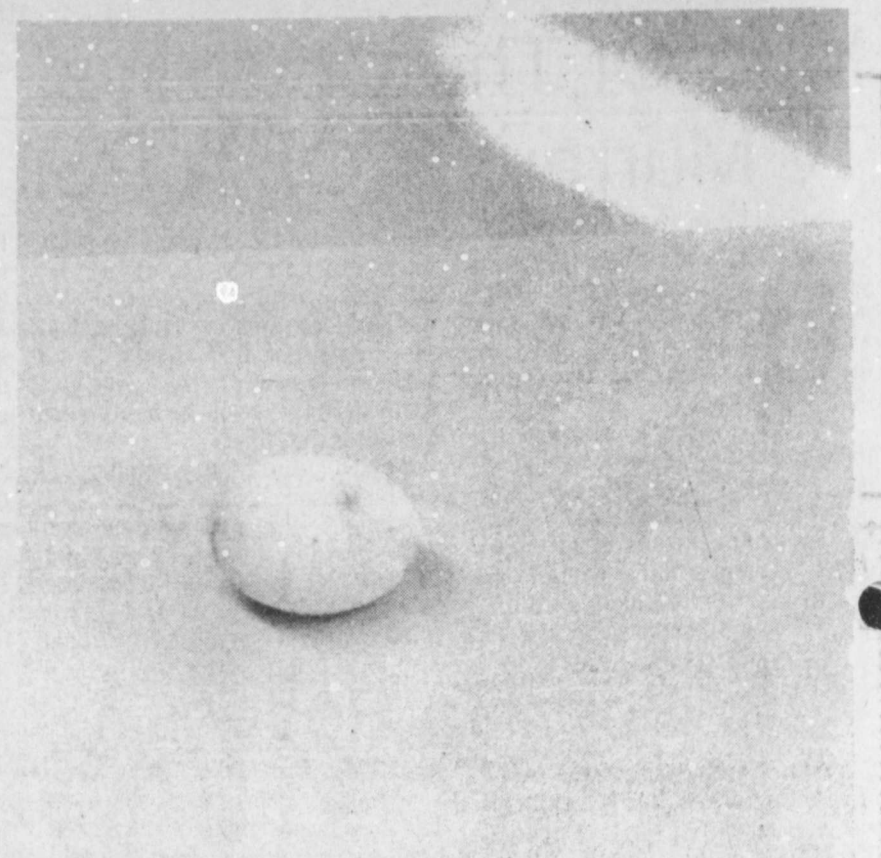
Here we were again, back in Mt. Vernon, and another team to play. It so happened Jay had called his girlfriend to see him play, she sat on the
