Tuesday Is First Day For Curbside Recycling In Deport

Next Tuesday, October 1st, is set for the first day of a Curbside recycling program for the City of Deport.

Pickup will be Tuesday, and there are some very definite rules which must be followed. Instructions will be included in water bills issued to the city of Deport's water customers.

All items must be bagged in the special pale blue bags, available now locally except for newsprint, which may be tied in bundles or placed in brown grocer bags.

Aluminum cans must be in one bag, emptied and flattened.

Newsprint must be fresh, dry and with nothing slick in it. No magazines or telephone books will be accepted.

Plastic must be code 1 or code 2. This can be decided by checking on the bottom of the container, where there will be a code. Labels are all right, but caps and rings should be removed, the plastic container emptied and flattened.

Container glass only will be accepted. No tableware or decorative glass can be taken. Again, caps and rings should be removed, but labels

are okay. Glass should be separated by colors.

Recycling is going to become mandatory if not done voluntarily. Deport has the chance to help make the world a better place.

Yes, it's a little trouble to flatten the cans and plastic, and put them in a bag separate from regular garbage.

But oh, the difference it can make. Please, this coming Tuesday, set out your recyclables separate from the trash, and help make a difference in tomorrow.

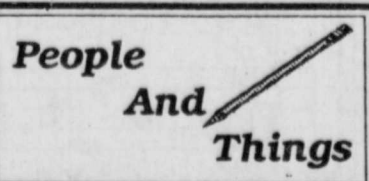

TAAS Test To Be Given In October At Prairiland

Students in grades 3,5,7,9 & 11 in the Prairiland School System and throughout the state of Texas will be taking the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills on these days. The written section of the test will be administered on October 8, the Reading section on October 9, and the Mathematics on October 10. During the same period the exit level TEAMS will be administered for eligible individuals. The English language arts test will be given October 9 and the Mathematics test on October 10. Make up sessions are not allowed for TAAS and TEAMS.

Section 101.2 of the Texas Ad-

ministrative Code sets forth the requirements for the TAAS and TEAMS testing programs at the exit level. It states that any individual must demonstrate mastery of each section of the exit level examination in order to be eligible to receive a high school diploma.

Parents are strongly encouraged to see that their children are in school on the days of the test. A good nights rest, a nutritious breakfast and arriving at school in plenty of time have proven to be most helpful.

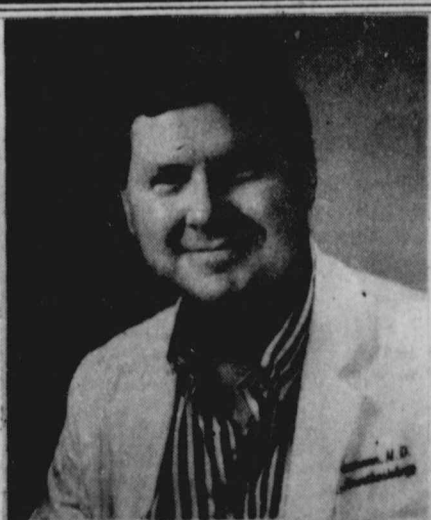

Old Time Chocolate Pie

1 1/2 cups sugar
3 heaping tablespoons flour
3 heaping tablespoons cocoa
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup water
2 egg yolks
1 small can evaporated milk
1/4 stick butter + teaspoon vanilla
Mix sugar, flour, cocoa and salt. Mix egg yolks with milk, beat slightly until yolks and milk are blended. Add to dry ingredients, add water. Cook mixture over slow heat or as grandma used to say, show flame, stirring frequently, add butter and vanilla. Pour into baked pastry shell. Top with meringue.
Meringue: 2 eggs, whites beaten until stiff, add 1/3 cup sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Spread over pie, bake until meringue is a light golden brown.

My Favorite Cheese Cake

1 pkg. jello, any flavor
1 cup boiling water
1 cup sugar
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
2 teaspoons vanilla
small container of cool whip
small can pineapple
Mix jello, cool. Cream sugar, cream cheese and vanilla. Add mixture to jello, beat in cool whip and well drained pineapple. Pour into graham cracker crust and refrigerate until set. I like strawberry or orange jello best. You can use already prepared crust or make your own.
Crust:
30 graham crackers, 3/4 stick oleo, 3 tablespoons sugar. Mix and press into pan. Save some to sprinkle on top.

Homemade Strawberry Ice Cream

4 eggs
3 cups sugar
1 pt. whipping cream

1 pt. half and half
1 can evaporated milk
1 pkg. vanilla instant pudding mix
1 pint strawberries
1 large bowl cool whip
1/8 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons vanilla and milk
a few drops of red cake coloring
Combine all ingredients, except milk in mixing bowl, beat well. Pour into ice cream freezer, add milk to fill line, freeze.

Beef and Bean Main Dish

1 lb. dried pinto beans
3 medium onions, chopped
2 green peppers, chopped
1 lb. ground beef
1/4 lb. margarine
1 teaspoon chili powder
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1 tablespoon Worcestershire saude
1/2 teaspoon mustard powder
1/2 teaspoon Tabasco
Soak beans overnight, cook until barely tender. Saute onion, green pepper and meat in margarine. Add to beans. Very good in cold weather. If in a hurry, use canned pinto beans.

My Chili

2 lbs. ground beef
1 onion, chopped
1 bell pepper, chopped
2 cans tomato sauce
2 cups water
4 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons chili powder
1 teaspoon cumin
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
3 dashes of hot sauce
Brown ground beef, onion and bell pepper. Add flour and rest of spices. Mix well, then add tomato sauce and water. Cook over low heat for at least one hour. May add beans if desired. This is good served over rice.

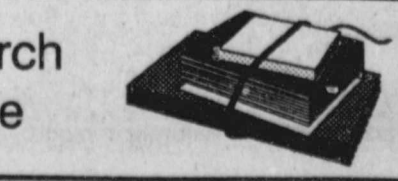
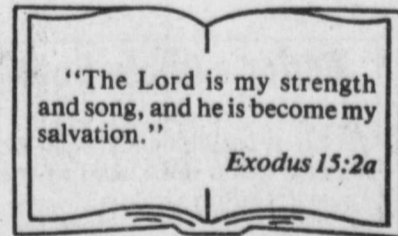
John Crenshaw Dies September 24

The Prairiland Junior High Patriots played the Chisum Mustangs Thursday night and it was a defensive battle.

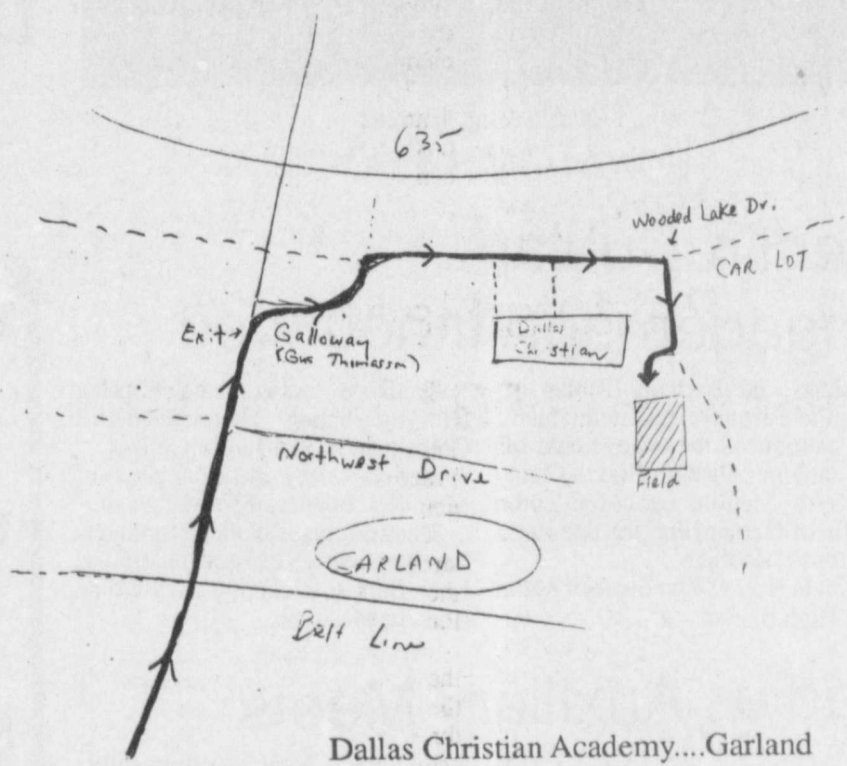
The Mustangs won the coin toss but Patriot Jeremy Day intercepted the ball. Adam Walker took it in for the only touchdown of the night.

the score was now 14-0, Warriors. The Patriots were on the move in the remaining few seconds of the half when a Honey Grove pass interception stalled the Patriot attempt.

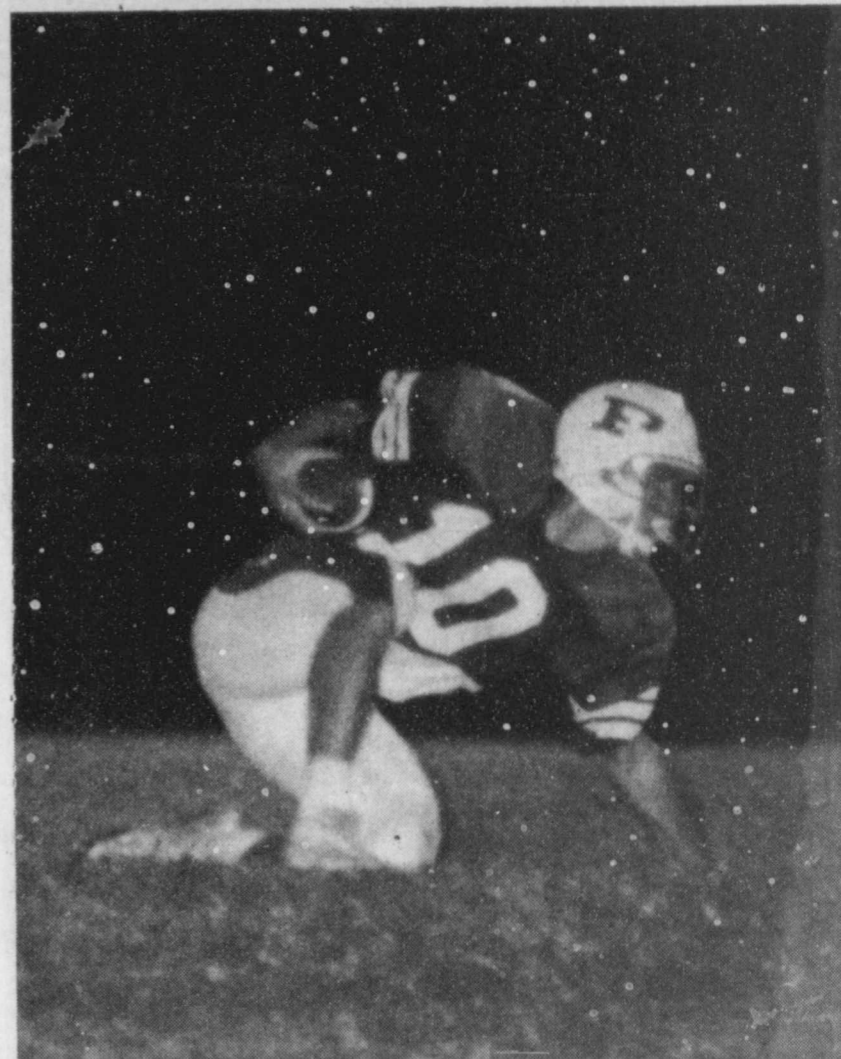
That was the way the half ended, with Honey Grove in a 14-0 lead over the beleaguered Patriots.

Brown Patch Could Be Rampant In Lawns

Recent weather patterns have produced prolonged wet periods which are ideal for brown patch development on turf grass.

"As night temperatures begin to drop below 70 degrees and high moisture continues, the fungus causing brown patch will grow even faster," said Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Brown patch primarily affects St. Augustine grass, but other lawn grasses are susceptible. Symptoms include dead circular patches up to 20 feet in diameter. At the leading

edge of the infestation, leaves turn yellow and are easily pulled off. The disease can be a problem until freezing weather stops the growth of the grass.

"Prevention is the key to effective control," Philley said. "Preventive measures, such as applying fungicide before the disease develops, should be concentrated on areas where the disease has previously occurred."

"Several fungicides are available that are effective in controlling brown patch," Philley said. "Check labels closely for application rates and intervals. Some fungicides require more than one application."

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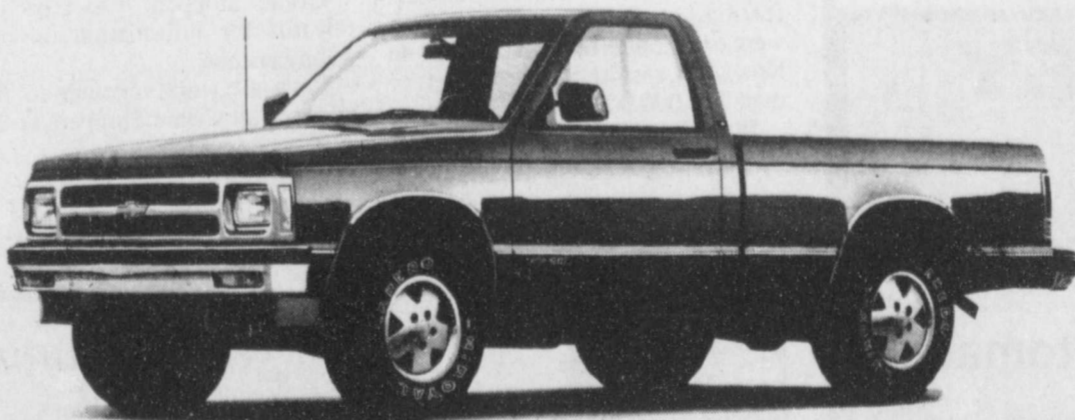

Social Security Notes

Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn S. King today proposed new rules to provide a fairer and more equitable method of determining what effect parental income has on a child's Supplemental Security Income eligibility and benefit amount.

gram and helps to establish the exact payment amount.

Under current regulations, different methods are used to compute deemed income based on whether the parental income is earned, unearned or a combination of the two. The proposed rules would standardize the method of computing deemed income thereby eliminating certain inequities that are possible under the current method.

Under the present regulations, for example, an eligible child with a mother and father whose only income was \$1,350 per month in wages

would have \$45 of that amount applied in determining his or her SSI benefit amount. However, in a similar situation where the mother and father had \$1,350 per month in wages but also received \$5 per month in interest (unearned) income, only \$25 of the total would be deemed to the child. Under the proposed rule, in the first situation, the deemed income amount would be lowered from \$45 to \$22.50. It would remain \$25 in the second situation.

"The change would ensure that no children are disadvantaged by anomalies that now exist in the current process," Commissioner King said.

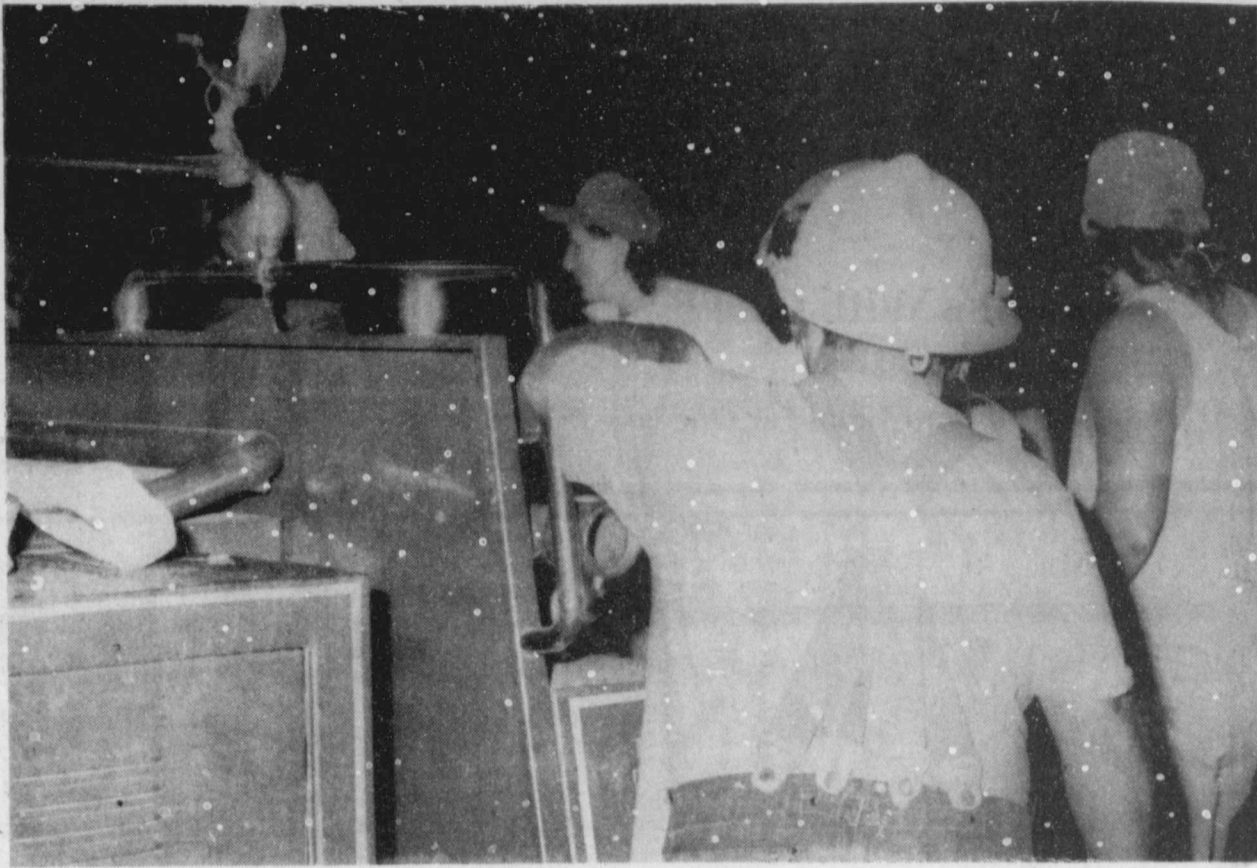
