Governor Proclaims Fire Prevention Week

Citing the loss of 271 lives and almost \$350 million in property damage to fires during 1990, Gov. Ann Richards has proclaimed the week of October 6-12 as Fire Prevention Week in Texas and announced her appointments to the new Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very young and the very old," Richards said. "Our intention is that by focusing attention and resources on this problem, we can increase the safety of all Texas citizens and fire service personnel."

Fire Prevention Week was first declared by 1922 President Warren Harding in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" on October 9, 1871. That conflagration killed 250

people and destroyed 17,430 buildings valued at the time of \$168 million. Recognizing the limitations of even the best fire suppression capabilities, the public and the fire service began thinking in terms of fire prevention as a result of the Chicago fire.

The creation of the Commission on Fire Protection will be an important tool in addressing the fire problem in Texas, Richards said. The

commission, which was established by legislation passed during the regular session of the Texas Legislature, combines several state functions that deal with fire service. The agencies or agency divisions that will be part of the commission are: The Office of the State Fire Marshal; The Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education; The Fire

Department Emergency Board; The Town Rating Unit of the Texas Department of Insurance.

"Combining the functions of these agencies into the Commission on Fire Protection will enable a more direct, efficient approach to aiding fire departments and related organizations," Richards said. "This will ultimately benefit all citizens."

The commission is composed of three chiefs from fulltime paid fire departments; three firefighters, including at least one actively involved in educating the public on fire prevention; three persons who are volunteer fire chiefs or volunteer firefighters; one certified fire protection engineer; one certified arson investigator; and one fire service instructor from a college, university or junior or community college.

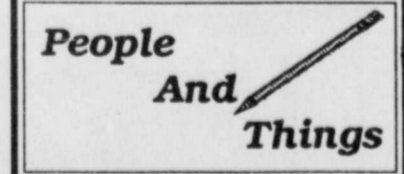
Everyone is invited to hear this inspiring group which hales from the Dallas area.

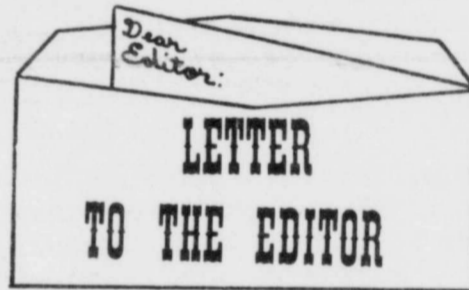

Dear Mrs. Nichols:

As predicted in my letter to you last year, the proposed foreign aid bailout of Moscow continues to develop momentum and is likely to be decided by Congress this fall. I am opposed to sending foreign aid cash to Moxcow, and would like for you to know why.

At this moment, several proposals are being circulated in the Capitol and the Administration to send cash directly to the Soviets, to earmark assistance through multinational groups as the World Bank, to provide their types of foreign aid. While nobody wants to see additional human suffering in the U.S.S.R., a Marshall Plan type bailout of a failed and disintegrating communist system simply cannot be justified while so many of our own domestic needs remain unaddressed.

The proposal most likely to be debated this Fall is a plan to provide \$3 billion in cash assistance to the Soviet government. Instead, Congress should take care of America first. Our priorities should put a balanced budget, fighting crime, improving health care, educating our kids, assisting farmers and creating new jobs ahead of bailing out the Soviet Union and its disassembled republics. These are my priorities for America, which I hope you share.

This fall, I intend to work hard to prevent the proposed Soviet bailout and to return America's priorities home again. It may surprise you to learn that it will be an uphill fight. The conventional wisdom in Washington is that a bailout will occur, the only question being which account the money will come from and how much money we will send to Moscow.

Well, I have bucked the conventional wisdom before and won. I plan on opposing the conventional wisdom of a Soviet bailout and, with your support, we will prevail. I will keep you posted as this battle, and others, develop.

We appreciate each of you for your contribution in accepting us and making us feel at home. That's what Deport is all about!

My Cajun Beans
By Bell Borders

2 cups dried pinto beans
2 slices bacon
2 tablespoons all seasons
1 tablespoon garlic salt
2 tablespoons onion flakes
2 tablespoons chili powder
1 tablespoon sugar
Bring to boil. Cook slowly, about 3 to 4 hours.

Spanish Sponge Cake

1 cup sugar
1 T. butter
1 large cup dates, quartered
1 cup boiling water
1 t. soda
1 large egg
1 t. salt
1 cup large nuts
1 1/2 cups flour
Pour water over dates and let stand. Mix soda, butter, salt and sugar together, add beaten egg. Stir in dates. Add flour, nuts, vanilla. Bake at 350 for 35-40 minutes. Makes two 9" cake pans.

Topping:
1 cup sugar
1 cup milk
1 T. butter
1 cup nuts
1 T. vanilla

Aunt Maudie's Chocolate Pie

2 egg yolks
2 cups milk
3/4 cup sugar
2 heaping T. cocoa or chocolate
2 T. flour
2 T. butter
2 t. vanilla
Mix dry ingredients. Add egg yolks, milk. Cook on top of stove until thick. Pour in 9" baked pie shell. Top with beaten egg white. Brown in warm oven.

Aunt Maudie's Sweet Potato Pie

1 1/2 cups cooked sweet potatoes
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 t. salt
1 1/4 t. cinnamon
1/2 t. ginger
1/2 t. nutmeg
1 t. vanilla

1 T. butter
1 1/2 cups milk
2 eggs
Mix ingredients, put in unbaked pie shell. Bake at 450 for 15 minutes, then at 350 for about 45 minutes. Pie is done when toothpick comes out clean.

Pecan Pie

3 eggs
1 cup white Karo syrup
1 cup sugar
2 T. melted butter
1 and 2 t. vanilla
1/2 cup pecans
Mix ingredients together. Put in unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 for about 45 minutes until toothpick comes out clean.

Scotchies
By Leah Carrell

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup margarine
Melt together in saucepan.
2 cups quick cook oats
1 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
Mix together, then add to sugar mixture. Mix all together well. Bake in 8x8x2 greased pan at 350 for 20-25 minutes. Don't overbake. When almost cool, cut into bars. Hardens as it cools.

Callie's Sweet Potato Pie
By Leah Carrell

2 cups boiled, mashed sweet potatoes
1/2 cup Karo, clear
2 T. Karo, dark
3 eggs, beaten
3/4 cups white sugar
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. all spice
dash salt
Mix all together well. Pour into crust. Bake at 350 for 40 minutes.

Crust:
1 cup flour, heaping
1/2 cup Crisco
1/2 tsp. all spice
1 T. Karo, clear
1/5 cup sugar
4-5 T. cold water
Add cold water after you mix to coarse crumbs. Knead ball well, pat out into pan.

The winner of this year's top award, James Morgan of Mills County, received a plaque and \$1,000. First runner-up, Michael Reagan of Jacksonville, received \$500.

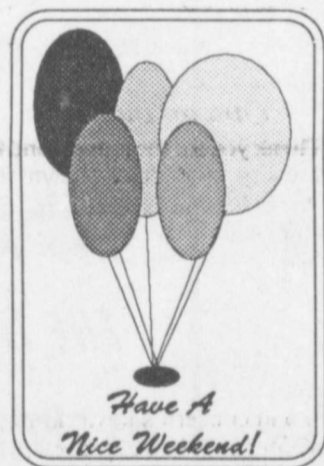

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Caterpillars Defoliating, Aphids Infesting Pecan Trees

Leaf eating caterpillars are devouring leaves on both shade and forest trees in East Texas and heavy infestations of aphids are reported on pecan trees.

"Several species of caterpillars are involved," said Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "It is not unusual for these caterpillars to completely defoliate trees. However, permanent damage is unlikely since the insects occur so late in the year."

The most noticeable evidence of the caterpillars is found on cars or other objects left under infested trees. The caterpillar droppings can stain some surfaces if left too long.

"Hickory and oak trees are most

commonly attacked," Robinson said. "Trees can be protected with various insecticides if the proper spray equipment is available."

A naturally occurring insecticide containing *Bacillus thuringiensis* is effective in controlling the caterpillars and is harmless to other insects. Insecticides are also available for

controlling aphids. Again, spray equipment capable of reaching 300 or more pounds pressure per square inch is required to fully cover larger trees.

Use only insecticides that are labeled to control the specific insect in the specific environment. Follow all label directions for use.

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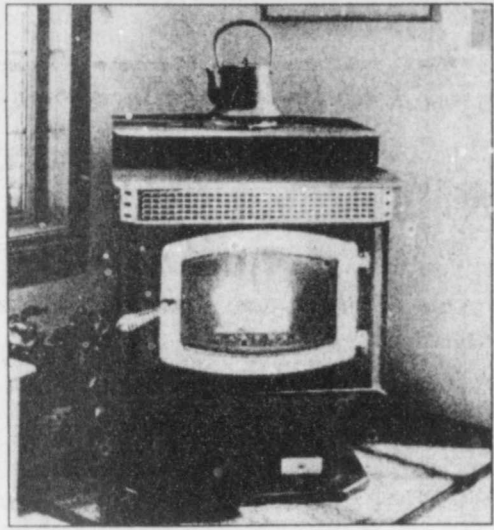

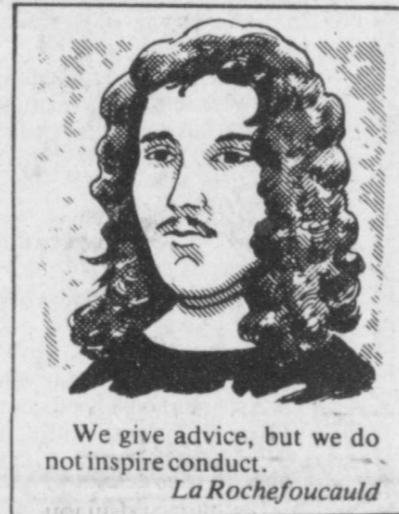
