The bid on the 1982 GMC pickup that the city had on sale went to


Phillip Roach. The council voted to cast the City County Appraisal District Board of Directors for Rufus Merritt.

## Terry Johnson Is October Resident Of The Month


the October Resident of the Month at Deport Nursing Home.

The point after was no good but the Patriots trailed by 20 points.


Before the third quarter ended, the out of control Raiders tacked on another touchdown to bring the total to 34-7.

The Patriots take on the tough Mt. Vernon Tigers at Mt. Vernon this Friday at 7:30 p.m.


