Local's Relative Escapes During Killeen Massacre

"I had a choice...I could die lying down or I could die running...and I chose to run" that's 35-year-old Lisa Cotton's explanation on her dash for survival from the Luby's Cafeteria in Killeen on the day that a man drove his truck into the building and killed 22 people, wounding that many more.

Lisa is the sister of Jerome Chapman, and sister of Deport native Betsy Glover Chapman. Jerome and Betsy are the owners of Deport Florist. The Chapman's and Lisa and Jerome's mother, Pat, also own and operate Chapman's Nauman Florist in Paris.

Lisa and her husband and two daughters live in Conroe, where Lisa serves in a vice presidential capacity at a branch bank. The bank's head office is in Killeen, and one day a month Lisa has to be in Killeen.

When news of the massacre hit Paris, Lisa's mother Pat made the statement that "I don't have to worry about Lisa, she doesn't like cafeterias".

Little did she know that Lisa and three other business associates were, indeed, witness to the horror of the shooting.

Lisa told family members that when the pickup driven by George Jo Hennard through the Luby's Cafeteria window stopped it was only about

five feet from them, and that at first they thought it was an accident. Then Hennard opened fire.

Lisa and the three other women with her hid behind a metal tea cart.

Again, she explained to family members that it seemed as if whenever Hennard made eye contact with someone he shot at them. She witnessed him shooting about ten people.

When a man broke a window with a chair and fled through it, Lisa ran too.

Family members say that Lisa reports Hennard was so methodical about his killing that she had already accepted the fact that she was going to die. Her choice seemed to be whether to die hiding or trying to escape.

Lisa was unhurt, physically, and was among fifteen people who escaped through the broken window.

One of her associates went with her, the other two did not, but weren't injured.

It seemed, she reports, as if it took only seconds for it all to happen, and then, on the other hand, it seemed to last forever.

For Lisa Cotton the memory of that day will, undoubtedly, last forever.

For her family there is only relief that their loved one was spared.

RadioThon To Raise Funds For Ag Scholarship

A Radio-Thon on KOYN beginning at 9 a.m. Friday and ending 24 hours later at 9 a.m. Saturday, October 25th and 26th will raise money for a college scholarship to aid students who plan to pursue a career in agriculture.

The Lamar County Junior Livestock Association and other area agriculture groups, in conjunction with KOYN 93.9 FM is proposing a program to help agriculturally minded students realize their dreams.

There will be people from the Texas Animal Health Commissioner, such as Joe T. Kelsey of Bogata, Tony Douglass from the District Extension Agency, and state Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson on hand during the day for interviewing.

Musical personalities have been tentatively scheduled also.

The Youth Advancement in Agriculture Scholarship involves ag teachers and extension agents in an eight county area that includes Lamar, Red River, Fannin, Delta, Hopkins, Pushmataha, McCurtain and Choctaw counties.

The Paris Jaycees have donated \$500 to kick off the fund raiser.

There will be drop off points within the area so that folks can come by and drop off their donations, and they can call in pledges.

The guidelines for this scholarship are:

1. All applications must pass through two committees.

2. The first committee (selection) will be made up of 5 members of the board of directors of the LCJLA. These members will serve a two year term and will be appointed by the President.

The selection committee will receive all applications void of name, address and school or parent information. The applications will be sorted by social security numbers. This committee will select approxi-

mately 25 percent of the total applications to be called in for interviews.

#. The second committee (interview) will be composed of 5 agriculturally minded citizens from the community. These people will be selected by the President and two other board members (Not to include CEA's or AST's). This committee will remain anonymous.

The interview committee will hold interviews with the top candidates in a one day format. Interviews will last no longer than 15 minutes.

4. Applications will be open to the following counties in the Lamar, Red River, Delta, Hopkins, Fannin, Choctaw, McCurtain and Pushmataha. Official applications will be sent to CEA's and AST's or may be obtained by contacting the Lamar County Junior Livestock Assn. or KOYN.

5. The LCJLA board will determine on an annual basis the amount of the scholarships to be given. These will be awarded in equal amounts.

6. All monies will be dispersed directly to the college the student attends, and will be awarded at a rate of 1/2 the total per semester. Letters will be sent to the students to be presented to the college of his/her choice. Any money not used will revert to the scholarship fund.

7. Students awarded scholarships must be pursuing an agriculturally related degree. Students must be enrolled in at least 1 agriculture course per semester.

8. Applications must be post-marked no later than March 1.

9. Scholarships will be officially presented during the graduation of the recipient.

10. Students will be sent a scholarship contract after the interview process. It must be returned within two weeks of postmark of that letter. If student fails to return in allotted time the money will be awarded to an alternate.

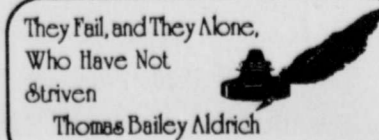

Old Fashion Tea Cakes
 By Bonnie Dougan Johnson
 1 cup shortening or butter
 1/4 tsp salt if shortening is used
 2 cups sugar
 4 eggs
 2 tsp baking powder
 1/4 tsp soda
 1/2 cup buttermilk
 2 tsp vanilla
 5 cups flour, sifted
 Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time and beat. Add milk; combine all ingredients and sift into creamed mixture. Add vanilla; roll out to 1/4 or 3/8" and cut with any sharp cutter. Bake at 400 degrees, 8-10 minutes. Lower temperature on electric oven.

Buttermilk Pie
 By Mary Barnard
 3 Tbsp flour
 2 cups sugar
 1 stick melted oleo
 Combine and add:
 3 eggs
 1 cup buttermilk
 1 t. vanilla
 Pour into an uncooked pie shell and bake at 325 until brown.

Microwave Popcorn
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 stick oleo
 1/4 cup white corn syrup
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. baking soda
 3 to 4 qts. popped corn
 Combine ingredients except soda and popcorn in a 1 1/2 to 2 qt. dish. Bring to boil, cook on full power for 2 minutes. Remove from microwave, stir in soda, put popped corn in large brown grocery bag. Pour syrup over corn. Close bag and shake. Cook in bag on high in microwave for 1 1/2 minutes. Shake and cook 1 1/2 minutes, may need another 1 1/2 minutes. Pour into pan and cool. Store in tight container to keep from getting sticky. Could add other ingredients such as peanuts, pecans, etc.

Corn Fritters
 1 cornbread mix
 1/2 can whole kernel corn, undrained
 1 egg
 1 Tbsp. onion flakes, optional
 Mix all ingredients and fry in a hot skillet like small pancakes.

Carrot Cake
 2 cups flour
 4 eggs
 1 tsp. vanilla
 2 tsp. cinnamon
 1 tsp baking powder
 2 cups sugar
 2 tsp baking soda
 3 cups grated carrots
 1 1/2 cups cooking oil
 1/2 t. salt
 chopped nuts
 Mix dry ingredients. Add and mix oil, eggs and vanilla. Blend well. Add carrots and nuts. Bake in 3 layers at 350 for 30 minutes. Cool and frost.

Frosting:
 1 cup chopped pecans
 1 stick oleo
 18 oz. cream cheese
 1 t. vanilla
 1 lb. box powdered sugar

Blackeyed Pea Dip
 1 1/2 lbs. ground meat
 2 medium onions
 3 15 oz. cans blackeyed peas, drained
 2 15 oz. cans spanish style tomato sauce
 1 can green chili peppers
 3 Tbsp. chili powder
 1 tsp garlic powder
 1 tsp black pepper
 1 tsp salt
 1 small jar pimentos, optional
 18 oz. jar cheese whiz
 2 Tbsp brown sugar
 Brown ground meat and onion in a skillet, add seasonings of chili powder, garlic salt, pepper, salt, brown sugar. Stir in tomato sauce, chili peppers and blackeyed peas. Simmer for 30 minutes or cook 2 hours in crock pot. Stir in pimentos and cheese whiz just before removing from heat. Serve with plenty of chips.

Flour Tortillas
 4 1/2 cups flour
 2 t. salt
 4 Tbsp. crisco or cooking oil
 2 cups boiling water
 Combine ingredients, mix well. Roll out on lightly floured board or between wax paper. Cook on a hot ungreased grill until brown.

Bubbles for Kids
 1 part Dawn dishwashing soap
 4 parts water
 1/2 part white Karo syrup
 Mix and blow bubbles. I used 1/2 cup as a part.

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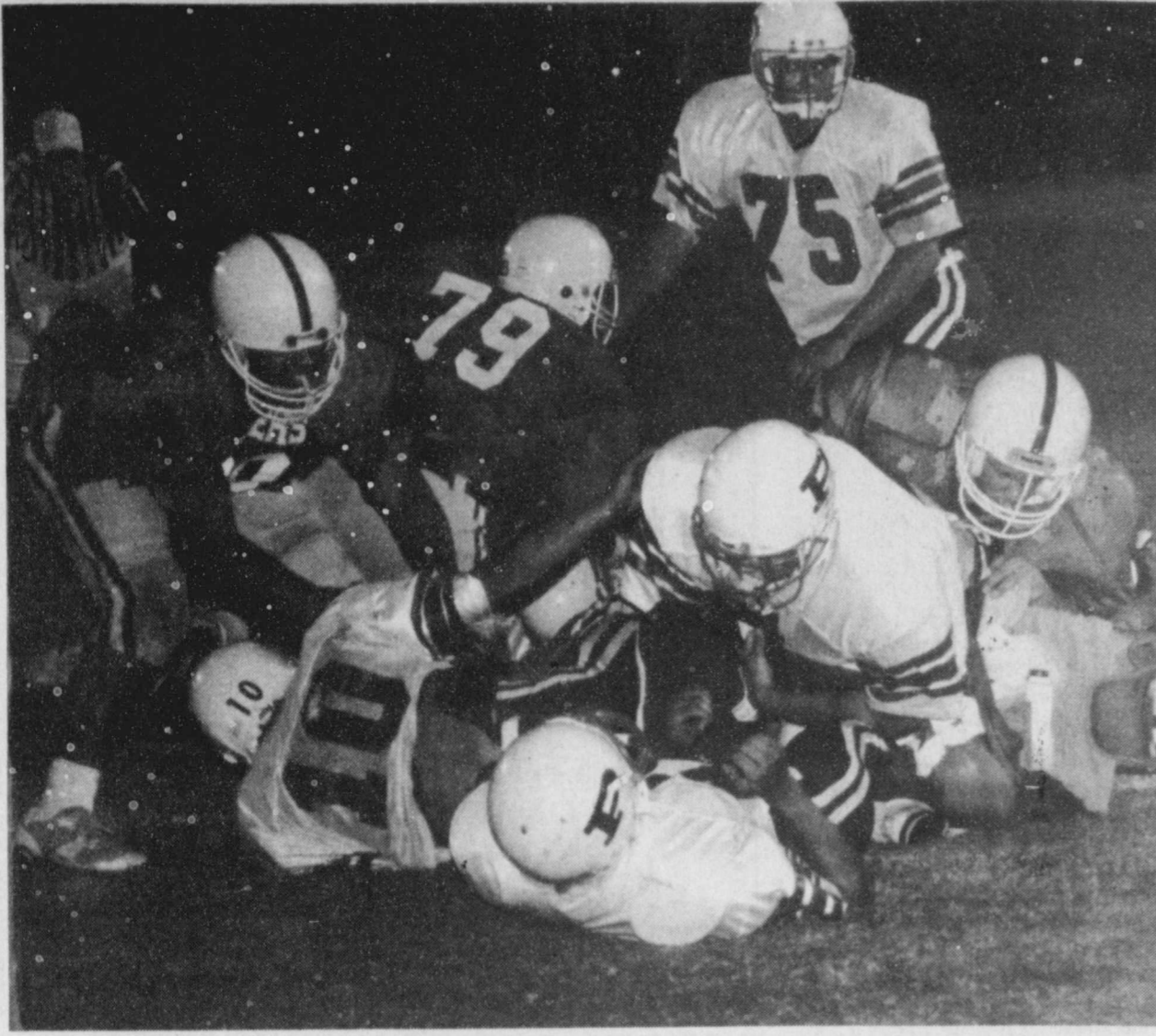

Bonham and local churches. The men were invited to the night services and to eat with the group. Tommy King from Catfish King in Paris was a guest each evening.


