Norman Resigns, Allen Appointed To Prairiland School Board

The resignation of Dana Norman from the Prairiland CISD School Board and the appointment of John Allen to the rest of Norman's term was the primary order of business at the board's regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Norman resigned from the board for personal reasons, and delivered a statement saying the "It has been a pleasure serving with the board for the past five years. Thanks to the administration, teachers, students and parents who make up the Prairiland CISD".

John Allen was appointed to fill Norman's remaining months in office. The term will be over in May, of 1992.

Supt. Max Ballard said that he was "very pleased to have John Allen on the board because of his past interest in the school system and his work

with the youngsters of the community".

The board heard from John Applegate, a parent, concerning playground safety on the Blossom campus. Dr. L.C. Stoute, principal at Blossom, was asked to do a needs assessment on fencing the playground, and to collect some cost estimates and present it at the December board meeting.

Action on the matter will be taken at that time.

The board cast their votes for the members of the Board of the County Appraisal District. They split their votes evenly among Billy Burnett, Allen Weatherford, John Wright, Clovis Graves and Pat Bailey.

Supt. Ballard gave a report on Rural-Vision. This concerns the four channels dedicated to the school by the FCC. Rural-Vision wants to lease those channels and to enter a long-

term agreement with the school to pay for it. The school would still be allowed to use the channel a number of hours per week for educational television.

This matter is being reviewed by the school's lawyers to see if it is a feasible contract.

Counselor Fran Patterson and Diagnostician Sandra Burnett gave a report on the Scottish Rite Dyslexia Reading Program.

The board adopted policy number 5527 concerning UIL participation activities.

They accepted a bid on a 1973 International school bus from Ricky Cooper of \$257.50 and the bid from Jimmy Wylie of \$556.00 on the 1975 International School bus.

Minutes were read and approved, tax report heard and the bills paid.

Dairy Classroom Presented At Deport School

Robbie Watson presented the Dairy Classroom to youngsters at Deport Elementary School on Tuesday morning.

The program is presented by Ms. Watson from the Southwest Dairy Center in Sulphur Springs on behalf of John Senter, 4-H and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Ms. Watson travels several states including Texas demonstrating to children where milk comes from and the processes of milking.

The demonstration is literally a portable dairy with a Brown Swiss milk cow and a baby calf.

The cow is penned in a gooseneck trailer with a visible side.

Ms. Watson goes through the motions of hooking up electric milkers operated from a generator. The milk travels through a clear line to a clear holding tank to show the children how the process is carried out.

Last year Ms. Watson presented the program to 1,986 children.

Good News For Highway 271 Travelers

There's good news for people who've been shaking their cars to pieces on Highway 271 between Bogata and Paris. A contract will be let around the first of the year to resurface the seven miles between Bogata and Deport.

According to information obtained through Phyllis Chandler, public information officer for the Paris office, the project will cost about \$3 million, about one-third of the Paris District's entire budget for Fiscal Year 1992.

Work on the project is expected to begin shortly after the contract is let, according to Ms. Chandler. For readers who use the badly deteriorated road, this will be none too soon. Although routine maintenance has been plug-

ging the worst potholes--in October the paper's reporter measured one 11-foot long just north of Bogata! The road remains the worst in the area.

We are doubtless fortunate that the Bogata-Deport project has been completed before the Paris office of the Highway Department is closed. Under the new Texas Department of

Transportation that legislators approved in an effort to save money, highway construction and maintenance will be administered from Tyler.

The newspaper editors hope that the local legislators who voted for the measure will be alert to see that the savings are not always made at the expense of the area.

City Council Awards Contract For Water Lines

The Deport City Council met Monday night and awarded the contract for new water lines under Grant Contract #70084, to Joe McElreath Company. The contract with the base amount that was agreed upon was awarded unanimously after hearing Mike Donnon of Hayter Engineering make the presentation of the Joe McElreath Company as to their qualifications for the job. McElreath was also on hand to answer questions.

After that the council cast their nine votes for Lamar County Appraisal District Board for Pat Bailey

and received information only on the raises of Texas New Mexico Power company.

It was decided to repair Barham Street for 2 tenths of a mile with either red or white rock.

Discussion was made and approved for the House of Prayer church in Deport to move in a building 30'x36' to serve as Sunday School Rooms.

No action was taken in the executive session until the December meeting.

The minutes were read and approved, financial report was approved and the council voted to pay all bills.

Delaina's hobbies include reading, cooking, shopping, collecting baskets, pottery and spatter-wear, working in the yard and growing flowers. Delaina starts a new hobby this week, since she joined a sewing class in Paris. She has a goal of making curtains, however, she feels this is probably a premature goal at this point.

In the reading area, she collects Danielle Steele novels and enjoys reading Russian spy novels. She says that just anything to read, she likes.

Desserts are among Delaina's favorite things to cook. A couple of summers ago she began canning vegetables and has continued this ever since. She has filled her deep freeze with fresh vegetables and likes to try new recipe of all kinds. She enjoys cooking for special occasions and likes to surprise people with baked goods.

She has come across an outstanding cheesecake recipe called White Chocolate and Lime Ribbon Cheesecake and says this has become the

The Fruit Salad recipe came from her sister-in-law, Terri Pressley, from Paris and has used it about four years.

Daisy Biscuits

- 1-3 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 1/2 cups self rising flour
- 3/4 cup milk
- jam, any flavor

Cut cream cheese and butter into flour. Add milk and stir until moistened. Knead on floured surface 3 or 4 times. Roll dough to 1/2" thick. Cut with a 2" biscuit cutter. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 450 for 10-12 minutes.

Layered Lemon Dessert

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1-8 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1 1/2 cups sifted powdered sugar
- 1-8 oz. cool whip, divided
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 cup plus 2 T. cornstarch
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 cups water, divided
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 2 T. butter
- 1 tsp. lemon extract

Cut butter into flour until coarse, add 1/2 cup pecans. Press into 13x9 pan. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes or golden. Combine cream cheese and powdered sugar, beat until fluffy. Fold in 1/2 cups cool whip into cheese mixture. Spread over crust, chill. Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt in saucepan; add 1/4 cup water, stirring to make a smooth paste. Add eggs, vinegar, lemon juice and remaining 1 3/4 cup water, stirring well. Cook stirring constantly until boiling. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat; add butter and lemon extract. Cool. Spread over cream cheese layer and chill. Dollop each serving with cool whip and sprinkle with pecans.

Royal Chicken Breasts

- 1 pkg. boneless chicken breasts
- 1 can chopped green chilies
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. cumin
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 1/2 cups Monterey Jack cheese, shredded

Brown chicken breasts and place in oblong baking dish. Spoon green chilies on top. Whisk together whipping cream and spices. Pour over breasts and top with cheese. Bake at 325 for 45 minutes. Spoon sauce over breasts 3 or 4 times during baking.

Broccoli Chicken Enchiladas

- 1 whole chicken
- 1 stalk celery
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 Tbsp. oil
- 1-10 oz. pkg. chopped broccoli
- 1-8 oz. sour cream
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 dozen corn tortillas
- paprika
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Boil chicken and celery until tender, about 1 hr. Bone chicken and cut up and reserve 1/4 cup broth. Saute onion in 1 Tbsp. oil until tender; set aside. Cook broccoli by directions. Combine chicken, onion, broccoli, sour cream, soup and 2 Tbsp. broth in large saucepan. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 5 minutes, stirring often. Stir in salt and pepper. Remove from heat. Place 2 Tbsp. broth in 13x9 pan. Fry tortillas in hot oil for 5 seconds to soften. Drain on paper towels. Place 1/4 cup chicken mixture on each tortilla and roll tightly. Place in pan, seam side down. Spoon remaining chicken mixture over top. Bake, uncovered at 350 for 15 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese and paprika and cook until melted.

Fruit Salad

- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 2 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 cups half and half
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 4 cups pureed fresh strawberries

Combine 2 cups milk and marshmallows in saucepan, cook over medium heat until marshmallows dissolve. Gradually stir 1/4 of mixture into beaten eggs. Add to remaining hot mixture stirring constantly until it reaches 165 degrees. Remove from heat and add 2 cups milk, sugar and next 3 ingredients. Chill. Combine berries and milk mixture in 5 qt. freezer. Freeze and let ripen 1 hour before serving. Yield-1 gallon. May use peaches instead of berries.

PUBLIC NOTICE

On April 16, 1991, GTE Corporation ("GTE") and Contel Corporation ("Contel") filed a joint petition for declaratory relief with respect to the obligations or requirements of GTE or Contel and/or any of its subsidiaries relating to the merger of GTE and Contel. GTE and Contel have requested a ruling from the Public Utility Commission of Texas that neither GTE nor Contel is required to report the merger of GTE and Contel pursuant to Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"), TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c (Vernon Supp. 1991), that no investigation of the merger by the Commission is required. In the alternative, GTE and Contel seek a determination that the merger is consistent with the public interest.

The Commission is investigating the merger between GTE and Contel Corporations to determine whether the merger is consistent with the public interest. In reaching its determination, the Commission shall take into consideration the reasonable value of the property, facilities or securities to be acquired, disposed of, merged or consolidated. If the Commission finds that the merger is not in the public interest, the Commission shall take the effect of the transaction into consideration in GTE Southwest Incorporated's and Contel of Texas, Inc.'s next rate-making proceeding and disallow the effect of such transaction if it will unreasonably affect rates or services.

This filing has been assigned Docket No. 10212. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. 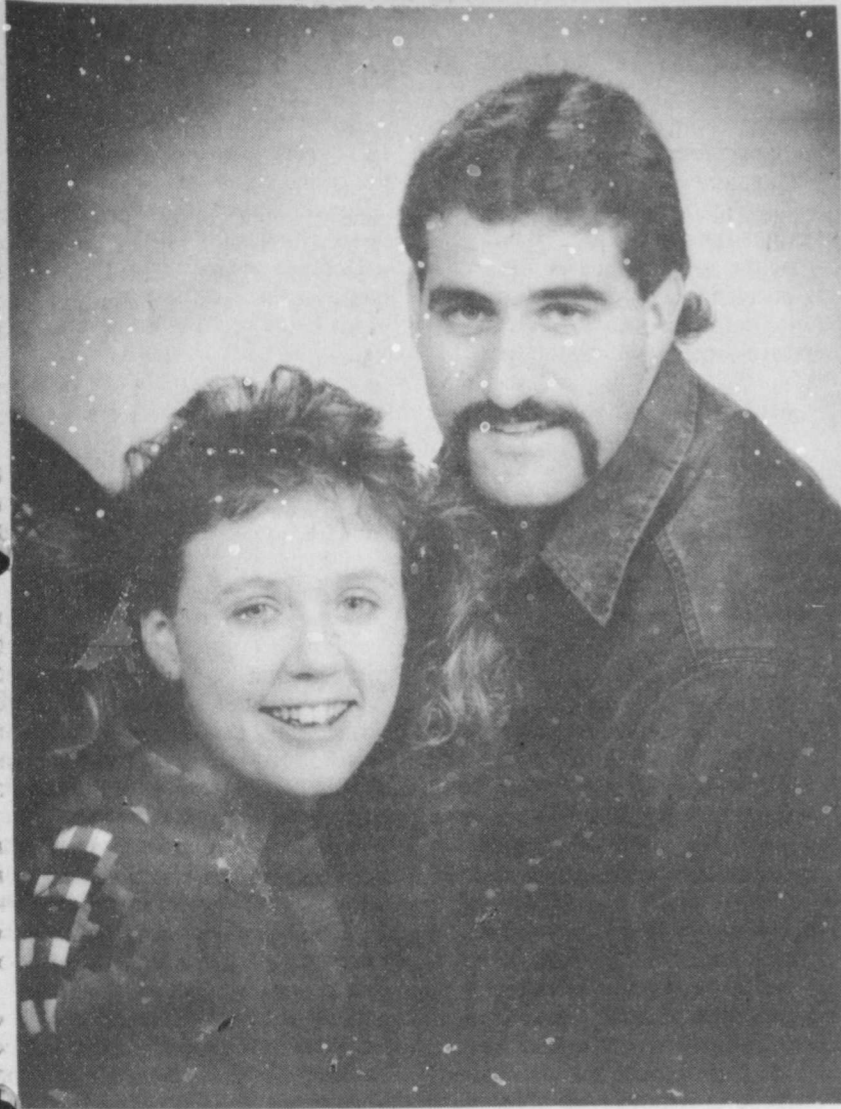

In the second quarter the Wills Point team found themselves stopped twice before another long pass to an end zone receiver made the score 14-0.

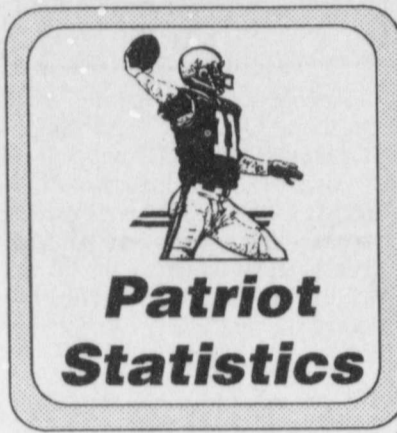
After that it was slug it out time.

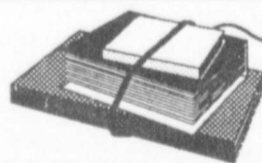

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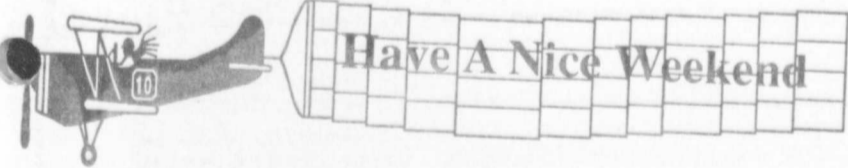

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






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LAURA HAYS paints on a sweatshirt that will be on sale at the Prairiland Home Economics arts and crafts sale at the

Former Resident Honored At Texas Woman's University

Mrs. Helen Webb Black of McLean recently visited family and friends in Deport and vicinity.

Mrs. Black is the daughter of Henry and Ida Webb, both deceased. She was born in Deport and attended public schools here. Following her graduation from Deport High School in 1922, she was a student at the College of Industrial Arts, now Texas Woman's University in Denton. In 1925 she married Robert E. (Bob) Black of Blossom and the couple made their home there for two years. In 1927 they moved to McLean where, except for a brief interval, Mrs. Black has since resided. Mr. Black died in 1969. The couple had two children, Jan, who resides in Albuquerque, NM and Bob, who lives in McLean, and accompanied his mother on her recent trip.

Enroute to Deport, Mrs. Black paid a visit to the campus of Texas Woman's University, where she was the special luncheon guest in the home of University President, Dr. Shirley Chater. Others present at the luncheon were Mrs. Elizabeth Snapp, University Librarian, who also serves as the school's archivist, and Mrs. Kathleen Gigli, University Vice-President in Charge of Institutional Advancement. Mrs. Black shared with these officials many recollections of her experiences as a student at CIA.

Mrs. Black was taken on a tour of the university library, where she showed the librarian/archivist the contents of her CIA memory books, which was found to contain photos and other items of memorabilia of special interest to the university. Mrs. Black was requested by the president to leave the books for her to examine, after which Mrs. Snapp was to make copies of some of the contents. Mrs. Snapp cited the possibility that certain of the material in the book might be included in an updated history of the school.

In the afternoon, Mrs. Black was taken on a tour of the campus, in the

course of which she had the opportunity to enter the auditorium where as a student she had attended numerous entertainment events and functions, and had herself been an on-stage participant in dramatic productions.

At Mrs. Black's commencement in 1922, she presented a musical reading entitled "The Nightingale and the Rose."

In 1924-25 Mrs. Black taught school at Rosalie. She later taught at Blossom and also gave private lessons in expression at Deport and Blossom. On moving to McLean she resumed school teaching for two years and then privately taught expression for several years more. In 1928 she served as director of the McLean High School senior play. She additionally directed a faculty play and was a cast member in community productions.

During her lengthy period of residence in McLean, Mrs. Black has made numerous presentations at various community functions, including dramatic readings of both humorous and serious nature; musical readings; book reports; stories; reports on miscellaneous subjects of interest; etc. She also worked for the McLean News, and wrote a weekly column, one column of which was picked up by a major wire service and widely published.

During Texas Public Schools Week last March, Mrs. Black was one of six former McLean teachers recognized in a high school assembly program for their teaching prior to 1950.

Although she has not lived in Deport since 1925, Mrs. Black has had a continuing love for the town of her birth and has returned for visits here as often as possible. She is a long-time subscriber to the Deport Times and follows local happenings with great interest.

Mrs. Black celebrated her 86th birthday in June.

Three members were reported AWOL. Bobby Winters, James Mann and Billy Dennis were unable to attend and were therefore unable to "defend themselves".

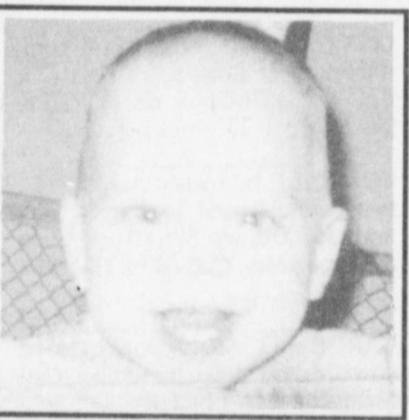

Many tales were told, and fond memories recalled. Even more memories were made at this event.

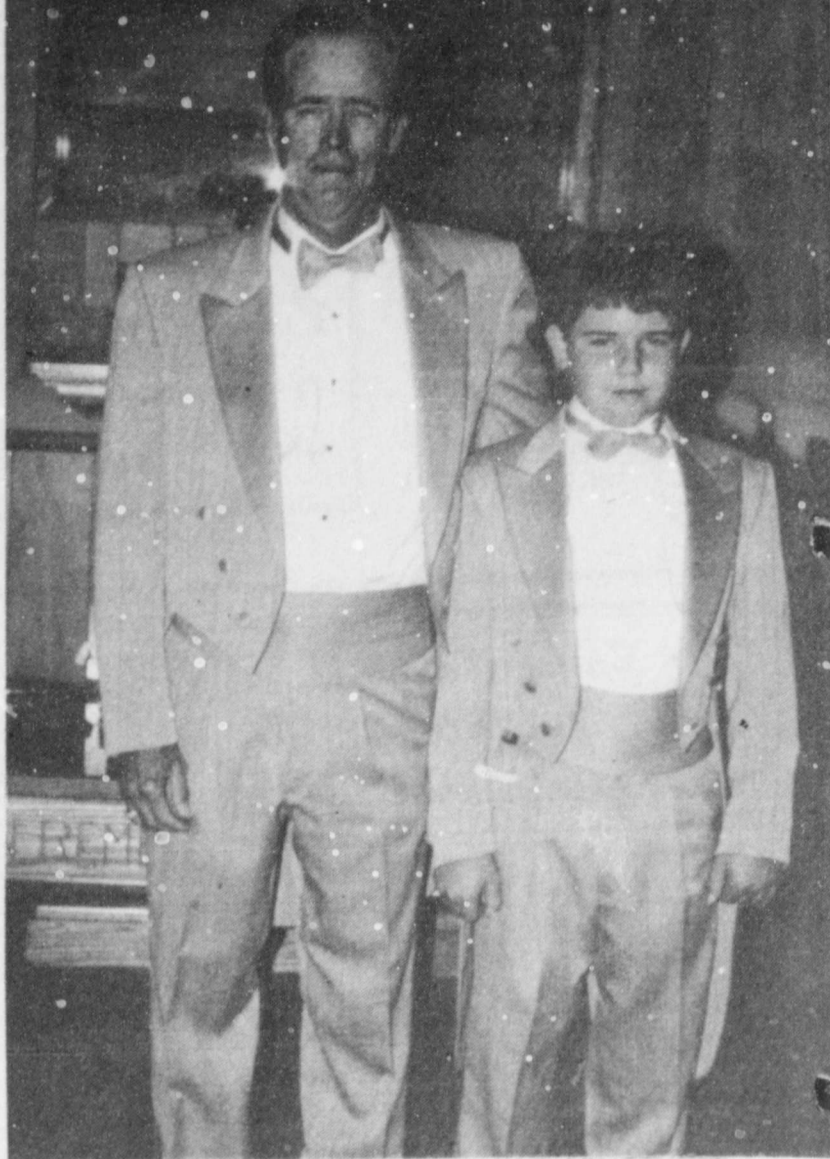
