Dairy Classroom Presented At Deport School

Robbie Watson presented the Dairy Classroom to youngsters at Deport Elementary School on Tuesday morn-

The program is presented by Ms. Watson from the Southwest Dairy Center in Sulphur Springs on behalf of John Senter, 4-H and Texas Agriultural Extension Service.

Ms. Watson travels several states including Texas demonstrating to children where milk comes from and the processes of milking.

The demonstration is literally a portable dairy with a Brown Swiss milk cow and a baby calf.

The cow is penned in a gooseneck trailer with a visible side.

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

Others present at the luncheon wee Mrs. Elizabeth Snapp, University Librarian, who also serves as the school's archivist, and Mrs. Kathleen Gigl, University Vice-President in Charge of Institutional Advancement. Mrs. Black shared with these officials many recollections of her experiences as a student at CIA.

Insects Seek Winter Home

By Herb Brevard

As cold weather intensifies, insects look for protection and a place to spend th winter, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"At this time of year most of the insects are not establishing permanent residences," said Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "They will primarioly be a nuisance and most of them present no great danger to be the homeowner. A few, however, will sting or bite if disturbed.'

Cockroaches, earwigs, wasps, spiders and beetles are a few of the pests seeking protected places to spend the winter. It might be in a stack of firewood, lumber, trash, or in the home.

'It is not uncommon for insects to enter attics or garages through cracks in the foundation, open windows or spaces around doors," Robinson said.

Some mechanical control is possible by caulking all cracks to prevent insect entry," Robinson said. "Caulking also makes the structure more air tight and should help lower

Storing firewood away from the house helps eliminate the woodpile as a hiding place for the pests. Removal of leaves, debris and other trash will also help.

"Insecticides are another alternative," Robinson said. "Many of the household insecticides are labeled for preventing insect infestation in homes. Apply a barrier of insecticide around windows, foundations and along the eaves according to label
