



My husband, Donald, and I live in Bogata. He works at Campbell Soup and I work in the kitchen at Red River Haven Nursing Home. We've only been back in Bogata eight years, but it seems as though we never left. The only problem I have is that anyone who has been here less than 25 years is a newcomer to me!

Donald and I had four children. We had two sons and two daughters. Mike, our older son, went to Roxton and married Lila Fletcher, guving us a third daughter. Mike and Lila have three daughters, Bren, Kara and Hali. We lost our younger son, Kevin in a traffic accident in 1984 at the age of 23. Tana is our oldest daughter and Chris Anna is the younger one. Chris has three children: Christopher, Yolanda and Jerred.

When it was suggested to me that I introduce myself and share some of my favorite recipes for my very first colulmn I thought "How Easy". WRONG!

I really enjoy cooking. It is one of the most relaxing things I do. I tried cooking at thenursing homebut I prefer to cook at home. My cooking

is king of "hit or miss" so recipes weren't as easy to come by as I had imagined. I'll share a few this week that my family enjoys and as we go on, maybe I'll slip in one of mine every once in awhile.

So I went to his mother and asked how to make chocolate syrup and how to serve it after I made it. The Green Enchilada dish is also one which my family likes. I don't remember where I got it. The pecan cream pie was one of Mama's recipes. The fudge and Chinies Tinga.A Lings are easy and also easy to carry places so that you don't have to worry about bringing home dishes.

You can also just take them on paper plates if you like. We are also fortunate to have another chocolate chip pie recipe from Mrs. Audrey Scott in Athens, Texas, just in case you missed the earlier one.

Chocolate syrup 1 1/4 cup sugar

Pul all ingredients in a deep pan. Boil about 10 minutes. Stir often. Serve with buttered biscuits, hot. Also good over ice cream

Pecan Cream Pie

1 cup sugar 1/2 cup flour 1/2 tsp. salt egg yolks (use whites in meringue) 2 cups milk 1 tsp. vanilla handful pecans Tbsp. margarine

Mix sugar, flour, salt well. Slowly stir in milk. Start cooking on slow burner. Beat egg yolks with fork and stir them into mixture. Stir in margarine and vanilla and cook until thick. While you are cooking filling, beat egg whites until stiff. Beat in 2 TBS. sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Don't wash mixer yet. When your pie filling is thick, beat with same beaters you used for meringue to make creamier. Stir in a handful of pecans into filling. Coconut is nice, too, if you like. Put in baked pie shell and cook at 325 degrees for 15 minutes. You may sprinkle pecan pieces and coconut on top of meringue before baking.

Tollhouse Pie

/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 cup butter or margarine, melted and cooled to room temperature One 6 oz. pkg. (1 cup) Nestle TollHouse Semi-Sweet Chocolate Morsels or chips. 1 cup chopped nuts One 9 inch unbaked pie shell

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In large bowl beat eggs until foamy. kAdd Flour, sugar and brown sugar; beat until well blended. Blend in melted butter. Stir in chocolate morsels and nuts. Pour into pie shell. Bake at 325 for one hour.



### Worms and Lawn Problems On Increase

By Paul D. Payne

The Fall Webworms began constructing their webs or tents in area pecan trees about the time local Army reservists arraived back in town from Summer Military Camp; however, there is no connecting between the two events. Many call the insect a Tent Caterpillar, but these are the instects that builld tents in such trees as the persimmon.

The Fall Webworm will be with us for the remainder of the summer as there are normally two to four generations each year. Now is the best time to take control of the insect while the web is small and the numer of ebs are few.

There are three methods of controlling the worm. One mehtod is to remove the cluster of leaves where the web is located. These leaves are easily stripped off of the limb at this time. You may need to cut the end of a limb off as the web becomes larger. Anoter method is to burn the webs out of the tree. Most use a long cane with a sack or cloth onthe end. Others use a long pipe. Be careful that you do not burn yourself or that the pipe doe not come in contact with an electrical

The other method is to aply an insecticide to the weand to the immediate ea surrounding the web. For the

insecticide to be very effective it must reach the worms which will require more spray pressure than can be derived from a hose-on sprayer or gallon pump up sprayer. However, one has a chance of controlling the worms is the insecticide is applied to the leaves next to the web while the worms are eating voraciously and constantly expanding the size of the web y incorporating the leaves that have been treated.

It is not an absolutel necessity that the Fall Webworms be controlled. They are not going to kill the tree and neither will they prevent a nut crop. kSure, they can weaken the tree if a large part of the elaves are eaten, but seldom does this occur. They are unsightly and tend to take away from the attractiveness of ones landscape.

The following insecticides may be used: Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon and Bacillus Thuringensis. Keep in mind that the key to success is getting the insecticide where the wroms are lo-

Lawn Problems:

We are seeing some brown spots appear on some of our St. Augustine lawns. These could be caused by either a fungus or insect. The present weather conditions are ideal for most of our disease problems to thrive.

There are primarily two disease problems that will affect St. Augustine-Brown Patch and Leaf Spot. The insect that causes a similar symptom is the Chinch Bug. All three problems will affect grass in a circular pattern. Brown Patch fungi attacks the tissue that connects the leaf blades to the stems. Chinch bugs suck as sap from the plants while the Leaf Spot disease will cause spots on the leaves, crown, roots and rhizomes.


Since the Brown patch fungi attacks the connective tissue, the blades are easily pulled from the stems. On the other hand, the blades are not easily pulled where Chinch LBugs are working. The Chinch Bug is a relatively small black insect with a white dot in the center of it's back. They move rather fast in the grass and can be diffidult to find in a dense stand of St. Augustine.


Since the Chinch is a sucking insect, they can be controlled with Diazinon or Dursband. Brown Patch can be prevented by the application of a number of fungicides. Daconil is a good all purpose fungicide that controls all the major lawn diseases. Stop by our office and pick up a copy of bulletin L-732 "Control of Diseases in the Home Lawn.".

What should you do if

your pet has fleas? First, you must know that treating the animal alone will not get rid of the fleas. Flea control should involve treatment of the infested pet(s) and thorough environmental flea control. Anywhere the flea-infested pet has access, flea eggs will be deposited.

Treatment of the indoor environment should be conducted by using flea products and mechanical control measures. The pet's bedding or other places the pet frequents (throw rugs, behind furniture, feeding areas) should be washed, shampooed or vacuumed before treating. Then, these areas should be vacuumed weekly, and the vacuum bag discarded each time.

Treatment of the flea-infested pet should be conducted the same day the home is treated. When flea control in the home is properly conducted, the once or twice weekly application of a non-residual shampoo or short acting flea spray is often all that is needed. If treatment of the home cannot be properly conducted, or if pets are allowed to roam freely, the application of residual dips or the continued reapplication of other products will


