The dictionary defines extortion as "the act or practice of extorting money or other property by force or illegal power or ingenuity". It's illegal. Isn't it?

It doesn't seem so in the case of insurance companies! What they do sure bears a close resemblance, and they have lots of tricks to boot.

I begin this by saying I mean nothing against the friendly insurance agent, who is pretty much at the mercy of the big insurance companies just as we are.

But the insurance companies...now that's another matter. While extortion may be a harsh word, I know no other that fits the situation as well.

Very few of us are unfamiliar with the practice insurance companies are currently using of cancelling insurance policies unless the amount of the policy is raised. Of course, that means that the premiums are raised too! Yet, when something happens they are very prone to say "oh, sorry, that's not worth what you have insured for...we're only going to pay half of that".

Another wonderful practice is to take insurance premiums for many, many years, then, when they have to pay off, cancel the policy. Of course, at a higher rate, (much higher) insurance CAN be had!

Here's an example.

For twenty years Mr. & Mrs. Premium have kept full coverage on their vehicles. They had no tickets...no accidents, no claims.

Then, within the space of one and a half years they two broken windshields and a damaged fender when a limb fell on it. Insurance paid out \$350 in claims.

At the end of the premium year the couple is notified that they were not going to have their policy renewed because of too many claims!

Furious they call around to other companies, and are told "If you've had three claims in that length of time you better be glad they kept you...I wouldn't try to switch".

They are told by one agent that if he got a windshield broken there was no way he would file on his insurance...it just wasn't worth it!

After paying in almost \$19,000 in premiums they are cancelled because of \$350 in claims!

We all know that this problem extends into health care...into home owners policies, into liability and so on.

We know of another case where a church was told if they didn't double the amount of their insurance they wouldn't get insurance.

I'm sure everyone out there could write a story or two of their own.

I know that there are those people who cheat insurance companies. Burning one's house down for money is pathetic. It also results in higher premiums for us all. It's disgusting.

But big companies blame all the high rates on that type of thing. They whine that they; make no money. (They also manipulate those figures, leaving off things like the amount they earn on premium money by investments). They have very, very powerful lobbies at both state and nationwide levels.

We all say "there is nothing we can do about it".

I disagree. We need to write, protest, complain... to Austin, to Washington, to insurance companies, to anyone we can.

It's for certain that nothing's going to change if we DON'T do something!

Come on, let's make a difference. Let's do a little fighting back!

## Wayne McLaren Dedicates Last Days To Helping Others

Wayne McLaren of Costa Mesa, California is dead. He was better known as the rugged, handsome "Marlboro Man" in cigarette ads. He was the father of Missy Merritt of Pattonville, and he died as an anti-smoking crusader after developing lung cancer.

McLaren was a rodeo rider, actor, Hollywood stuntman, and one of several dozen models hired in 1975 to appear in Marlboro magazine and billboard ads, evoking a tith and handsome smoker's image for the brand.

He was diagnosed with lung cancer about two years ago, and died in Newport Beach, California on July 22.

He fought a hard battle, and daughter Missy says that some of his last words were "take care of the children. Tobacco will kill you, and I am proof of it".

Last spring he appeared before a meeting of stockholders of Phillip Morris, Inc., maker of Marlboro and asked them to limit their advertising. He made other public appearances to

warn about the dangers of smoking.

He testified before the combined Senate and House of Representatives Committee on Health for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, "I know that all of you can act pretty quickly when there's a need to...just as in the serious situation of silicone breast implants; and, I know that I'm here to answer some of your questions, which I'll do the best I can to do, but I'd like to close with a question of my own for your consideration; "If it's true, as our Federal Government tells us, that 460,000 people die every year from tobacco-caused diseases, isn't that serious enough to do the same kinds of things you would for any other product with lethal consequences?"

On Wayne's last trip to Pattonville he met with a few people and explained the risk he felt they were taking when they decided to smoke. He was also able to visit with an old rodeo buddy from Deport, Frank Rhoades.

He told his six year old grandson

Jake to "always remember to say no to smoking. Jake said "I say no to drugs and now no to smoking"

Now, when young Jake is asked what smoking will do to you he says "It will kill you like it did to Pa Wayne".

Missy Merritt wants to help carry on her fathers work, urging family members to truly try hard to quit the habit, reminding them that it could add years to their life.

"In the case of my father, he didn't stop soon enough and smoking ended his life at an early age. It is hard to lose a loved one who is addicted to such a habit...smoking. I realize that it would make my father's passing a whole lot easier if our government would really act to help his kind, our young adults, and even our older citizens to never think about or experiment with or use tobacco again," she says.

The rugged cowboy image that was Wayne McLaren is gone, but his daughter hopes that he will have helped others in his final days.

## Reception Honors Rev. Chief Warden

Members of the United Methodist Churches of Deport and Cunningham had the honor and privilege of presented Rev. Chief Warden a plaque commemorating 50 years of service to God, his people and churches.

Activities began during the morning worship service at 11 a.m. on Sunday, July 26, when Mrs. Thelma Warren spoke to the congregation pointing out that Rev. Warden chose to travel with Christ over 50 years ago as well as traveling with Christian companions and becoming involved in telling others about life eternal and how to obtain it.

Rev. Warden has helped many to be able to face new experiences and new challenges as well as realize that new blessings and miracles await them. His influence, inspiration and guidance have been far reaching and this is evident when his tenure of service for Christ is seen. Rev. Warden's devoted companion on his journey for the last 48 years has been his wife, Betty. She has contributed much to the ongoing of God's kingdom.

The members of the church feel fortunate to have had Chief and Betty as their parsonage family since 1985 and there is no way they can adequately convey their appreciation and gratitude.

Following Mrs. Warren was Dr. Glover, who then pointed out that Rev. Warden completed his post-

graduate work at Perkins School of Theology and was licensed to preach in March, 1939, and since that time has pastored churches at Olden, Cisco, Friberg-Cooper, Crowley, Cedar Hill, Rockwall, Gainesville, McKinney, Greenville, Bonham, Cooper before coming to Deport and Cunningham. He has held revivals in Texas, Oklahoma, Illinois, Indiana, Nebraska, Idaho, California, Kansas and preached not only in Texas but Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina and Minnesota. Several youth have committed to full time ministries while under Chief's leadership including Dr. Joe Stacey of McMurry U, who was college Teacher of the Year in 1990.

Dr. Glover then presented Chief and his wife a plaque.

At 3 p.m. a reception was held in his honor at the church and a large number of his past and present friends attended to show their love for and appreciation for his accomplishments. Visitors were registered from Bowie, Greenville, Bonham, Cooper, Charleston, Gainesville, Deport, Minter and Cunningham, among others. One of the registrants was a member of Chief's first church at Olden when he was not only the minister of the Methodist Church but also the football coach there and this gentleman played football for Chief at that time in 1943.

## Two Arrested In Joint Law Enforcement Effort

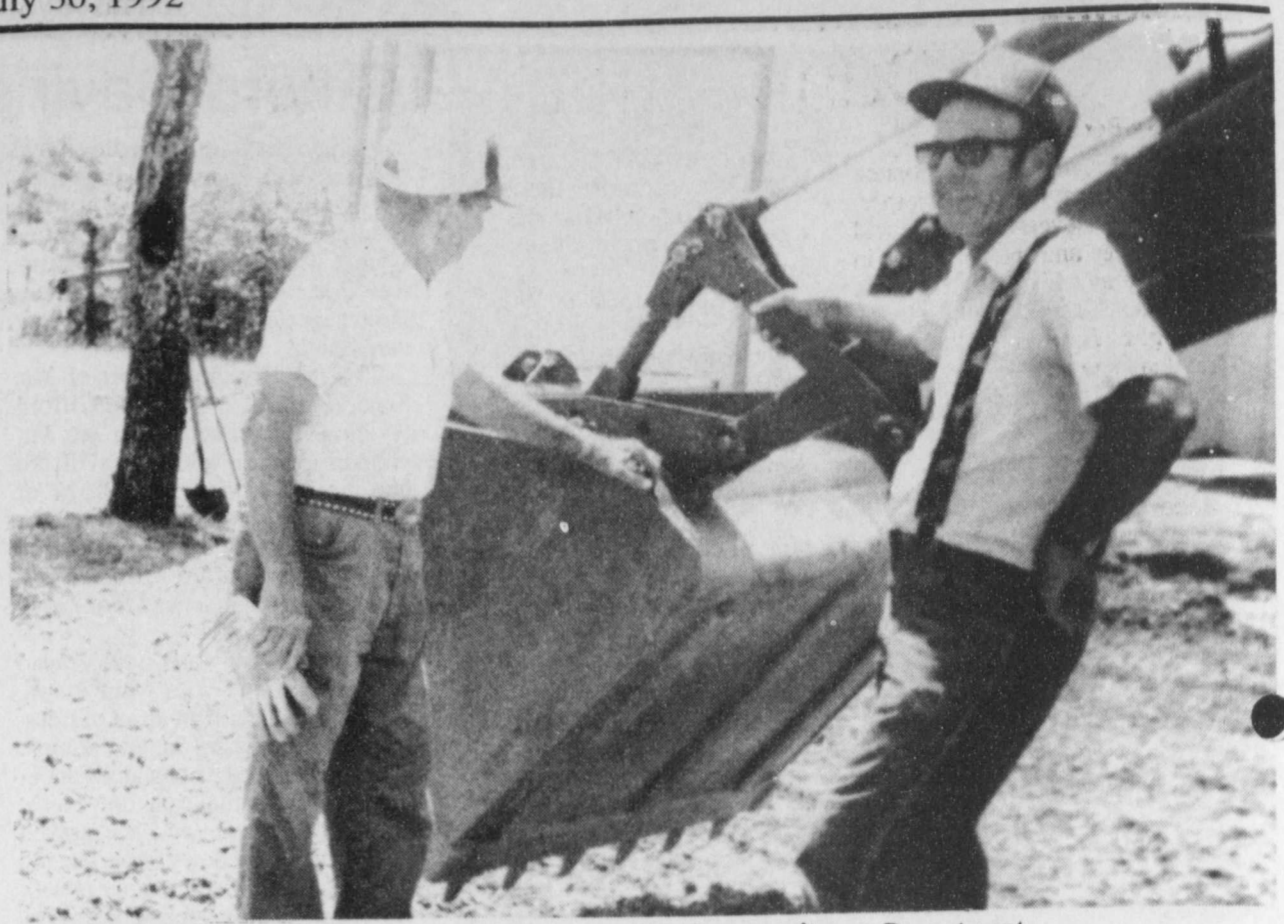



**HEAT or ICE?**

**How To Treat Those Aches & Pains**  
(Second In A Series)

A question I encounter often as a physical therapist is whether it is more effective to use ice or heat in the home treatment of everyday aches and pains. The answer is that both are effective if used at the proper time. The application of mild heat to the injured area 2 to 3 days after the injury is an effective method of assisting the healing process. By effectively increasing local blood flow, mild heat facilitates the removal of waste products and the deliverance of needed nutrients. Similar to ice, heat is effective in decreasing pain without medication. To summarize, ice is most effective if used early in the treatment process, with heat being the treatment of choice 2 to 3 days after the injury. Remember, if symptoms of pain, swelling and loss of function persist, contact your physician promptly.
