## Social Security For Self-Employed

Social Security remeinders for the Self-Employed...I know there are many men and women in our area who would like to join the ranks of the more than 10 million self-employed Americans.

If you are wondering whether now is the right time to become an entrepreneur, I can only cite Calvin Coolidge's observation that "business will be better or worse".

If you think business will be better and take the plunge, you need to be aware that self-employed individuals have special responsibilities with regard to their Social Security coverage. For example, the self-employed pay a Social Security tax equal to the combined rate paid by employees and employers.

This year the Social Security tax rate for the self-employed is 15.3 percent on earnings up to \$55,500. Another 2.9 percent on earning up to \$130,200 pays for Medicare cover-

If you start a business and have net

earnings of more than \$400 in selfemployment, you must file a federal income tax return and pay any federal taxes due--and the Social Security tax. The tax is reported on Schedule C (Profit and Loss From Business or Profession) or, where appropriate, kSchedule F (Farm Income and Expenses) and Schedule SE (Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax.)

If you have both wages and selfemployment income, you should first figure the amount of wages on which you have paid Social Security taxes and then add your self-employment earnings up to the limits I mentioned earlier. If your wages alone exceed these limits, you do not pay Social Security taxes on the additional income earned in self-employment.

Another summer is just about upon us, and many retirees attack the out of doors with a vengeance. After all, that's the real reason they retired, isn't it? But with all these outdoor activities comes repeated exposure to the sun and it's potentially deadly ultraviolet rays. It isn't worth it. What everyone calls "premature aging" of the skin is actually produced by years and years of exposure to the sun. The sun eventually damages the deeper layers of your skin, resulting in a loss of elasticity and the sudden appearance

## Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Manger

People who are thinking about applying for Social Security or SSI disability benefits often ask if there is anything that they can do to speed up the processing of their application. The answer is yes, they can help move the process along more quickly. Sometimes, a substantial amount of information and medical evidence is needed to decide if a person is disabled under the Social Security law. Gathering the necessary evidence means that disability claims usually take longer to process than other Social Security claims.

That's why we urge applicants to bring any medical reports they may already have at home and related information with them when they apply for benefits. It can make a difference in how soon a decision can be made.....and in how quickly their Social Security benefits will start if their claims are approved.

What kind of information are we looking for?

If you are applying for Social Security or SSI disability benefits you must have medical proof that your impairment(s) meet our definitation of disability, basically, that it is severe enough to prevent you from working for at least a year, or that it is likely to result in death.

Be prepared to discuss the nature of your impairment(s), when it started, how it keeps you from working and how it affects your daily activities.

We will also ask you to provide us with specific treatment information, the names, addresses and phone numbers of all doctors, hospitals and other medical facilities where you have been treated, examined or tested; dates of medical visits; hospital or clinic account numbers, Department of Veterans Affairs claims numbers, Medicaid number and claim numbers for any other disability benefits you receiveor have applied for,

Also, bring any medical reports you already have at home and tell us about restrictions a physicial has placed on your activities.

This last item has special significance because medical reports from treating physicians or psychologists, hospitals, clinics, the Department of Veterans Affairs and similar sources of medical treatment are generally sufficient for a disability decision to be made. Such evidence provided by the "treating source" generally traces the beginning and course of the impairment(s). And, currently, more than half of all disability claims are decided solely on the basis of such "medical evidence of record".

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
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

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
