## Council Hears Reports, Approves Tax Rate, Signs

Mike Donnan of Hayter Engineering was on the agenda of the Deport City Council meeting Monday night, and reported the new water and sewer lines replacement project was 87 percent complete.

Donnan also discussed with the council street resurfacing on First Street, which should begin this week by Joe McElreath. Although the work is scheduled to begin this week there is some concern about the oil specifications McElreath wants to use on the project.

Donnan assured the council the problem could be resolved, and the bid for the project had been submitted one and a half months ago.

The street needs resurfacing after new water and sewer lines have been completed.

The council also discussed lots that needed to be cleaned up in the city. After certified letters were sent out most property owners are making an effort to abide by the city's requests.

All but one property owner has made at least some effort. The council voted to take no fur-

ther action until next meeting, and they will evaluate what has been done then.

The new tax rate set by the Lamar County Appraisal District was approved. This new rate is .4257%, up from .3891.

A discussion on the installation of grease traps in the city was held. According to the council two businesses (Quickie Superette and Granny Mc's Cafe) have already installed the traps, while A&R Short Stop is in the process of installing a grease trap.

One business, Rollins Grocery, reportedly has elected to stop cooking in the store instead of installing the trap.

The removal of a tree on Beville Street was discussed, and the contract on the project was awarded to Steve Landers of Blossom.

Thomas Nichols, on behalf of the Deport Community Service Club discussed with the council plans to erect "Welcome to Deport" signs within the city limits.

The project was unanimously approved by the council.

The 1992-93 budget was discussed and payment of bills authorized.

City employees were discussed, and the Mayor was designated as being responsible for giving employees an authorized leave from their jobs for any reason.

The council implemented a service charge of \$15 per call during working hours, plus \$5 more for after working hours. This means that if a citizen needs the city water and sewer superintendent to turn a water meter on or off a \$15 charge must be paid if it is done during regular working hours and a \$20 charge if it is after working hours.

## Gibson Sisters Win At Rodeo

Kimberly and Tammie Gibson competed at the year-end Four States High School Rodeo Finals in Mt. Pleasant August 7 and 8, and brought home several awards.

Kimberly won the Junior All Around title and trophy saddle for having the most points in the junior events for the year. She was the top Junior Barrel Racer and the Junior Pole Bender and won trophy buckles for each event. On Friday, she won second in junior barrels and fourth in junior poles; and on Saturday she won third in barrels and first in poles and won second in the average for both nights in barrels and poles.

Tammie won a trophy buckle for finishing second for the year in total points in Senior Pole Bending and a trophy buckle for the fastest average time in pole bending for both nights. She won second in senior barrels on Friday and second in poles and on Saturday won first in poles with a record time of 19.981, the fastest time ever run in Four States.

Kimberly and Tammie Gibson are the daughters of Larry and Brenda Gibson of Pattonville. Tammie will be in the ninth grade at Prairiland this fall and Kimberly will be in the seventh grade at Deport Junior High.

Remember Miss Rena, Miss Jodie, Miss Archie, Miss Mable, Miss Christine, Miss Eva, Miss Earie, Miss May Dan, Miss Ruby, Miss Pauline, Miss Edie, Miz Holder, Miz Stubblefield, Miz Haynes, Miz Strain, Miz Cody, Miz Huddleston and Miz DeWeese. These ladies were teachers when I went to school. Please note where they change from Miss to Miz. This was when we went from elementary school to high school. At that time, they also began to have last names instead of first names. But in elementary and high school, the entire name was said in one breath, regardless of how many syllables it contained. Men teachers were either Mr. or Coach, but the ladies were Miss or Miz. The title had nothing to do with their marital status.

I visited in the home of Miss Ruby this week. She was never my teacher because in 1952 when she started teaching the third grade, I was in the fourth grade with Miss Mable, but I've always felt as though Mrs. Ruby Legate had a part in my growin' up. Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Legate moved to Bogata in 1952. He had a dry goods store and she taught school. Mr. Legate died in 1970 and Mrs. Legate retired from a 45-year teaching career in 1971. During her career, she had gone back to college and become certified to teach children with Cerebral Palsy and later on Special Education classes for children with learning disabilities and

mental impairments.

In 1974, Mrs. Legate married Mr. Oscar's cousin, Albert Legate. It was at that time she inherited a family of three daughters, nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Since then the family has increased to 21 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. Mrs. Legate said that for years she did a lot of cooking when the family came and when they went to visit the families they would also take food. She expressed how much the family has meant to her and how special they are. Since Mr. Albert died, she doesn't do much cooking.

The recipes she is sharing with us are used mostly for church dinners. She is an active member of the Church of Christ in Bogata.

The Tator Tot Casserole was given to her by her nephew's wife, Eddie Holcomb. Mr. Albert's niece, Inez Sooter gave her the Green Chilies Casserole and Connie Roach, a step-granddaughter gave her the Chicken Spaghetti and Ground Meat Casserole. Entry fees will be \$3.00 per event or four events for \$10.00. There will be nine events and four age groups.

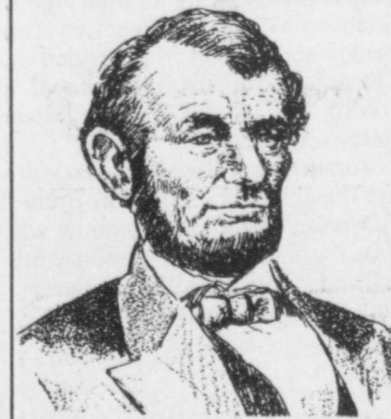
A breast collar will be awarded to the high point individual in each age group and a headstall will be awarded

Are you 7- years old or older and still working full time?

If you are, then you should know this: you don't have to retire to start getting Social Security benefits.

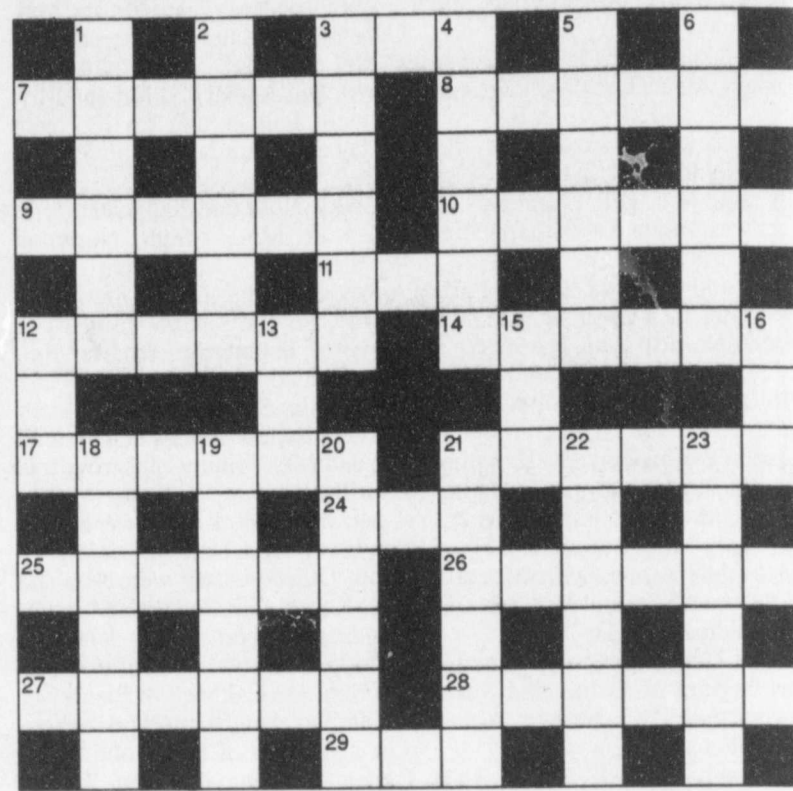
Before you turned 70, Social Security earnings limits may have kept you from getting benefits if you were a high earner. But the Social Security earnings test does not apply after you reach age 70.

The exempt amount for beneficiaries age 65-69 this year is \$10,200. For earnings above \$10,200, \$1 is deducted from the individual's Social

Security benefits for each \$3 earned up to the full amount of Social Security tax could earn over \$49,000 a year and still receive some benefits from Social Security.

If you're now 70 or older and you've never applied for Social Security retirement benefits, you should contact your nearest Social Security office. The toll free national number is 1-800-772-1213; or you can call your local office listed in the telephone directory. The benefit application process only takes a few minutes and you can get back to work.

### The Check Isn't In The Mail

For many people, a monthly Social Security check is the major portion of their income. When the check fails to arrive, a financial catastrophe can result. What do you do first? Naturally, you call your local Social Security office, or even go there so you can talk to someone face to face.

But think for a minute. That first week of the month when all the checks have been mailed is the worst time to contact any Social Security office. You will run into long lines or hours and hours of busy signals. That's because everyone else who didn't receive a check on time is there in front of you. But still you persist, and when your time finally arrives, do you know what is going to happen? They are going to tell you to wait *three days!*

As with any government program, Social Security has a set procedure

for handling problems. Generally, they won't do anything during that three-day waiting period. In most cases, the check shows up. If it doesn't, a written notice of non-receipt must be filed. In two or three weeks a replacement is usually received.

Note the word *usually*. Thousands of times people go for months without getting checks. Are you prepared for that? If you aren't, now is the time. Talk with your local financial institution about an open line of credit that comes into effect if your check is late or doesn't show up at all. Better yet, if at all possible, put away a little each month to guard against being caught with your accounts down. Even though it is a lot easier said than done, you will know that you aren't completely dependent upon a computer operator and your letter carrier to keep food in the house and the utilities turned on.

## DPS Needs Your Help

The Texas Department of Public Safety needs your help in stopping a scam artist who is pretending to be a DPS Highway Patrol trooper.

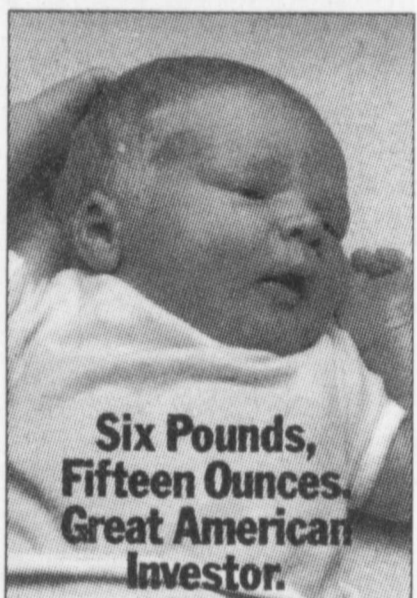
The person is telephoning individuals an identifying himself as a DPS trooper and names a family member of the person he's called and says that family member has been seriously hurt in a traffic accident. Then the caller says the hospital can't treat the injured person until someone sends a cash deposit.

In another instance, the person

posing as a trooper called a business and said one of his employees had been hurt in an accident.

The conartist then instructs the victim to wire an amount of money to a Western Union office.

According to the DPS, if you do get a call from someone who says he's a trooper and that a loved one of yours or an employee has been in an accident, verify the call by calling the DPS or the hospital where the injured person has supposedly been taken. Do not send anyone cash.

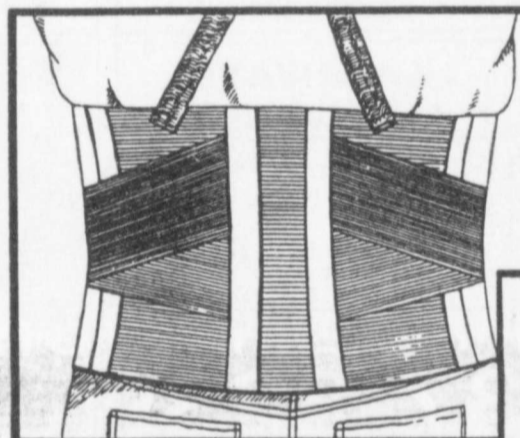

## Kids Have A Right To Healthy Bodies

By Virginia Brock, County Agent, Home Economist

Parents need to exercise authority in the home; therefore, talking about "rights of children" may rub against the grain. Where health is concerned, however, children need and deserve for parents to meet necessary standards for well-being stated Virginia Brock, Red River County Agent, Home Economist.

The critical time for well-baby check ups and immunizations against common childhood diseases is between the ages of birth to 4 years old. Parents hold the key to setting up regular visits to the doctor who is the best source for knowing when and what health practices and immunizations are necessary.

Diphtheria and polio immunizations rates among preschool children in the United States average about 60% lower than in many Western European countries. Immunizations are the most healthy and cost effective ways to control communicable diseases.

The following guidelines are provided by the American Academy of Pediatrics' Guidelines for Health Supervision II and pediatrics clinics:

**Newborns**—A complete physical examination at birth, including metabolic screening for phenylketonuria, hypothyroidism and other inborn errors is conducted. New parents need a lot of information about how to prevent injuries in the home, securing the baby in a car safety restraint seat, methods and schedules for feeding, pros and cons of breast and bottle feeding, what to do when the baby gets sick, sleep practices, bladder and bowel habits, managing the baby's crying responding to the baby's needs, the importance of holding, cuddling and talking to the baby and the importance of parents spending time together. Both Moms and Dads need special consideration and help to relieve stress during that time. It's important not to be isolated from friends, family and other support givers.

Following the birth of the baby, parents will be told when to bring in the baby for the next visit, including immunization series. Hematocrit or hemoglobin tests and urinalysis may be suggested between one and twelve months of age.

At two to four weeks, a complete physical exam is given. Parents should be informed about the benefits and risks of immunizations and that the following schedule is required at:

Two, four, six and 18 months: Four years ppDTp; OPV; HBPVB; prevents spinal meningitis; TD booster recommended every ten years following first series of shots. Parents need to know that fever and irritability are common with immunizations.

Twelve months—TB skin test; annual skin tests are recommended.

Fifteen months or at doctor's recommendation—Due to the recent surge of measles in the United States, two shots are required by everyone. First, at 15 months with a booster between 5 and 12 years old. Second, adults born after 1957 need a MMR booster. Hemophilia influenza B vaccine may be given; MMR.

Two year—Hemophilus influenza type b diphtheria toxoid conjugate vaccine, as per doctor's recommendation. Parents are encouraged to become involved in parenting education classes. Guidance from an informed leader, and support from other parents with similar concerns, relieves uncertainty at a time when the baby's needs and demands are changing rapidly.

Eight years—Mumps vaccine given if not previously or if there is no history of mumps; Rubella vaccine given to girls if there is no evidence of serologic immunity.

Summers can provide more time for parents to spend with children in relaxed, fun activities at home or away. These plans can be spoiled, however, by the unwelcome visit of childhood diseases unless parents take a necessary step to prevent them. Remember, kids deserve healthy bodies too.

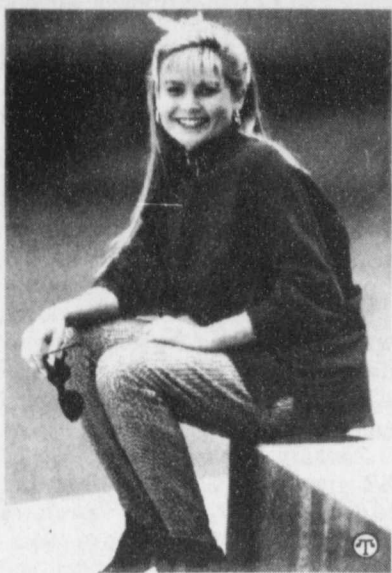

## Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1300 Highway 37 North, Clarksville. The next clinic will be held August 13 from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 2:30 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first Wednesday, second Thursday and fourth Monday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

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### Prison Pen Pals..... Handle With Caution

Pen Pals have been with us for years. Perhaps you had one when you were in school. Adults have pen pals too. Often they are jail inmates who place pen pal ads in magazines, which caters to seniors living alone, or others

who are looking for relationships. Prisoner ads have proliferated in recent years, and some prisoners may be looking for genuine contact with life outside their prison walls. However, many prisoner ads are merely a part of the sophisticated mail fraud scheme which has bilked consumers of their hard earned savings.

Be aware of the tell tale signs of this unusual scheme. If you begin to write letters to a prisoner who is attempting to cultivate you for his mail fraud scheme, he will slowly attempt to gain your trust and confidence. If you are a single woman, he may even promise to marry you upon his release. Eventually, the prisoner will ask you to deposit some money orders in your checking or savings account, because he has no one else he can trust. After sending you several money orders, usually in the amount of \$700.00 each for you to deposit in your account, the prisoner will wait long enough for the money orders to be deposited, then he will call you by telephone and urgently request most of the money be withdrawn. He will want the money to be sent by Express Mail or wired by Western Union to

another friend in order to pay an attorney to help gain the prisoner's immediate release from prison.

When the U.S. Postal Service routinely compares the cashed money orders with the original money order receipts, these money orders are found to be altered. All altered money orders will ultimately be discovered. Under current law, the person who cashes an altered money order is responsible for its total (altered) value. If you have a bank account, the U.S. Postal Service will contact your bank, and you will be made to pay the difference.

If you think you've been taken in by a prison pen pal scheme, report your experience to your local postmaster or the nearest Postal Inspector. The Ft. 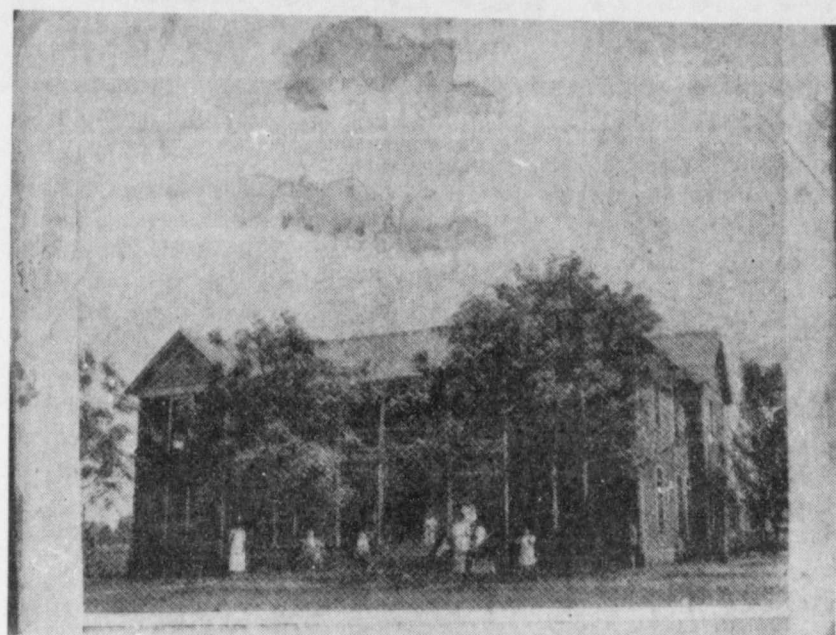
