## Tuesday Night Shooting Attempt Ends In Blossom With Crash

A high speed chase through portions of Red River and Lamar Counties ended with one suspect in custody after shots were exchanged Tuesday evening. One law enforcement official was hospitalized and another treated and released with injuries sustained during the roadblock which stopped the suspect.

According to Pct. One Constable Randy Boren he received a call from a woman who reported that the suspect, a white male about forty years old, was harassing his wife and making threats against his children.

Boren received a description of the truck the man was driving and went to try and find him.

Shortly thereafter reports indicated that "shots were fired and there were children in the house" near

Fulbright. Complete reports on this were not available at press time.

Constable Boren picked up the suspects trail on FM410 in Red River County. Other law enforcement officers were enroute to the scene at that time.

The suspect went through Detroit, and turned east on Hwy. 82. The man then turned and fled back west on Hwy. 82.

The suspect refused to stop and apparently fired shots during the ensuing chase. Officers attempted to shoot the tires out of the suspects pickup.

Road blocks were being set up as the man entered the Blossom area. At a turn off in Blossom Constable Boren's patrol car and the man's red Ford Ranger pickup collided. Boren's

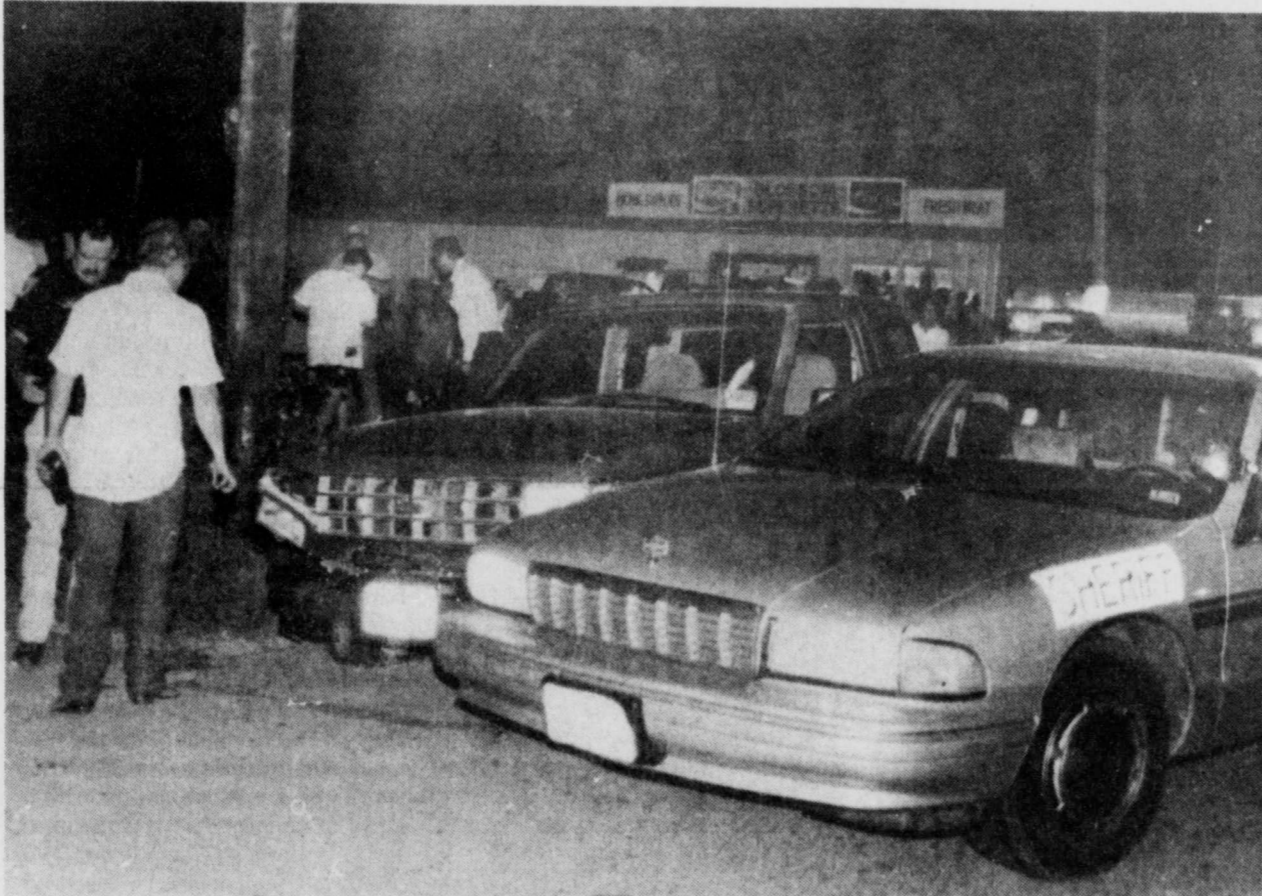
vehicle blew up and began to burn.

Lamar County Deputy Randy Ward used his vehicle to cut off the man's path, stopping it on Front street in Blossom. The man was then taken into custody.

According to reports from Deputy Ann Denny Deputy Sgt. Randy Ward received bruises to his hand and arm and was transported to the hospital to be treated and released. Constable Boren was taken by ambulance to McCuiston Regional Medical and was hospitalized for possible cracked ribs and smoke inhalation.

Deputy Denny stated Wednesday morning that charges of DWI and Attempted Murder were being filed. Further charges may be filed.

Complete reports were not available Wednesday morning at deadline.

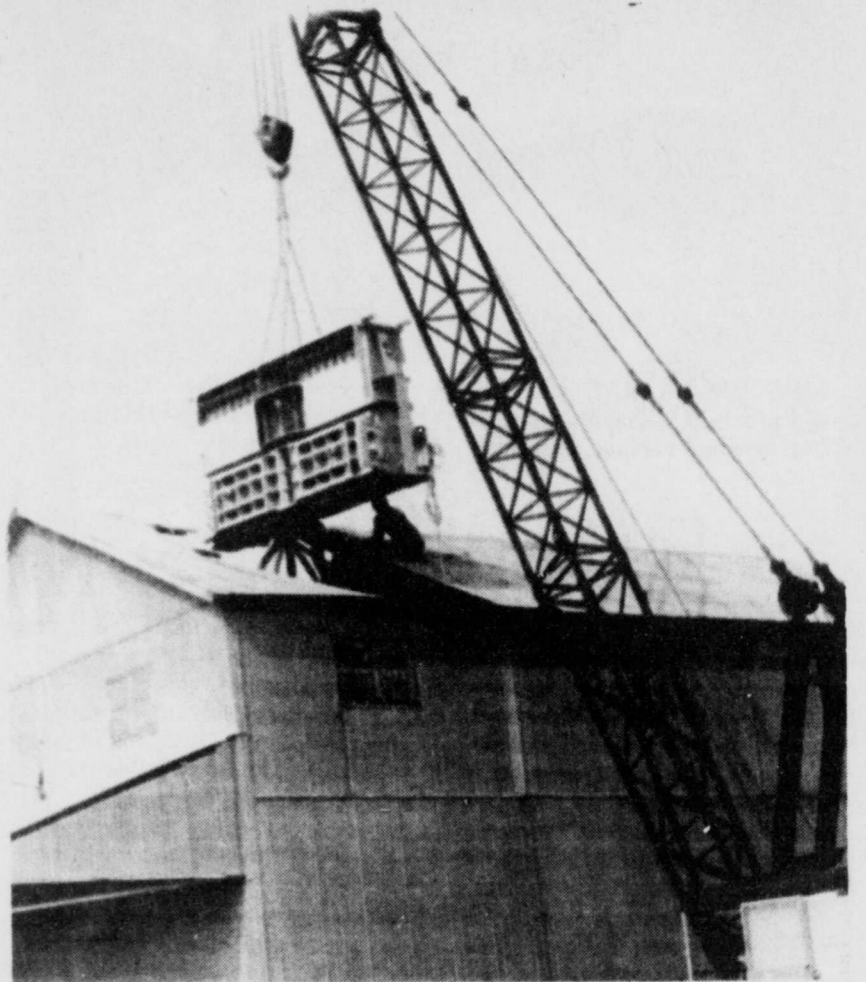

## Gin Adds Press, Plans Warehouse

Blackland Prairie Gin in Deport has plans to build a 40,500 square foot cotton warehouse in Deport.

According to owners Earl and Nancy Gresham the project is planned to get underway in the early part of 1993 and be completed in time for use in the fall of the same year.

When completed the warehouse will be able to store up to 10,000 bales of compressed cotton bales.

The gin is also undergoing some changes. It has been modified recently to accommodate a new press capable of producing a bale of cotton measuring 26 inches by 21 inches by 56 inches and weighing 500 lbs. This bale is half as thick as the bales previously produced.

The Greshams report that with this new machine the small bales will be ready to be placed in storage when it leaves the gin. Up until now the bales from the gin had to be shipped fifty

away to a compress, the shipped somewhere else to be stored.

The warehouse will be government certified, and area farmers can store their cotton until a buyer purchases it.

The proposed warehouse can be used to save farmers money, since

handling will be much reduced, and it should help make more money by selling directly to textile mills.

The warehouse will have security and safety features, including an eight inch water line with a modern sprinkler system for fire protection.

The storage facility will be the only one of it's kind anywhere in the area.

It will also be the only one in the area since the old tin warehouse located on Hwy. 271 in Deport was taken out of use as a warehouse sometime about the middle of this century.

## Country Cooking

This week we are visiting with Mrs. Vella Mae Scales of Fulbright. I really appreciate her letting me go ahead and talk with her, since when we arrived, we found that she had injured her hand and wasn't feeling very well. She was very cordial though, and said for us to just come on in and sit down and we'd visit.

Mrs. Scales has four children; Alice Perry, Milton Scales and Billy Scales, who live in Bogata and her youngest daughter, Sarah Giles, who lives in Mesquite. She has two grandchildren, Alice's two sons, Rodney and Zachary.

Mrs. Scales says she doesn't have a lot of free time anymore, and that she likes to spend the time she has on church activities and with her family. She attends the Sunset Baptist Church in Mt. Pleasant where her pastor is Rev. George Rape.

Vella Mae has been employed at Red River General Hospital in Clarksville for four years. Part of that time she held down her job at the hospital as well as working part time at the nursing home.

Mrs. Scales said that in all of her life she has never lived any farther from her parents (the late Mr. and Mrs. Simpson), than just a little way down the road. She lives next door to her sister, Darlene, and on the other side of Darlene, in their parents' home lives her sister, Berniece. I was curious to know if the three sisters got along well together since they live so close together. She said that their

schedules keep them from being at home at the same time.

The family traditionally has a reunion each year at the Simpson home. They weren't sure whether to have it this year since they had just lost their mother on May 25, but they decided that their Mom would want the rest of them to get together, so they just went ahead and had the reunion as usual. Vella Mae's favorite thing to cook is desserts. She says that when a new recipe first comes out, she will try it and if she likes it, she continues to make it. Her German Chocolate Cake with Coconut Pecan Frosting, Lady Baltimore Cake, Strawberry Salad and Italian Coconut Cream Cake recipes are all old and she doesn't remember where she got them but she enjoys making them. She doesn't use cake mixes, everything is made from scratch. For main dishes, she uses chicken most of the time. She says she has cooked chicken just about every way it can possibly be used. When I asked which dish her family enjoyed the most, she said she didn't know because they don't ever leave anything. They eat everything she cooks.

Note: On Sandy Moreno's Dirty Rice recipe, use 1/3 can of water. The fraction was on two different lines and could have caused some confusion.

### German Sweet Chocolate Cake

1 pkg. (4 oz.) Bakers German Sweet Chocolate  
2 1/3 cups sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon Calumet baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup buttermilk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 eggs  
coconut pecan filling and frosting

Melt chocolate over very low heat; cool. Sift flour with sugar, soda, baking powder and salt. Stir butter in mixer bowl to soften. Add flour mixture, 3/4 cup of buttermilk and vanilla. Mix to dampen flour; beat 2 minutes at medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Add melted chocolate, eggs and remaining buttermilk. Beat 1 minute longer. Pour batter into three 8" layer pans, lined on bottom with paper. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes. Cool in pans 15 minutes, remove from pans and cool on racks. Spread filling on layers and stack.

**Coconut Pecan Filling & Frosting**  
1 cup evaporated milk  
1 cup sugar  
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/3 cups Bakers Angel Flake coconut  
1 cup chopped pecans  
Combine milk, sugar, egg yolks, butter and vanilla in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture thickens, about 12 minutes. Remove from heat. Add coconut and pecans. Cool until spreading consistency, beating occasionally.  
**Lady Baltimore Cake**  
3 cups sifted cake flour  
3/4 tsp. salt  
3 tsp. baking powder  
3/4 c. shortening  
2 c. sugar

1/2 c. milk  
1/2 c. water  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. lemon extract  
6 egg whites, stiffly beaten  
1/4 c. each chopped pecans, raisins and cherries  
1 recipe Seven Minute Frosting  
Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Cream shortening and sugar; add flour mixture alternately with milk and water. Beat until smooth; add flavorings. Fold in egg whites. Place in 2 greased and floured cake pans. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes. Remove form pans; cool on wire racks. Add pecans, raisins, cherries to 1/3 of frosting; spread over 1 layer. Top with remaining layer; frost top and sides with remaining frosting.

### Strawberry Salad

1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1 pkg. strawberry jello  
1 can drained fruit cocktail  
1 16 oz. cool whip  
Beat milk and jello with mixer. Add the other ingredients. Chill in refrigerator for one hour. Serve.

### Italian Coconut-Cream Cake

2 cups sugar  
5 eggs, separated  
2 sticks oleo  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 cups flour  
2 box powdered sugar  
1 tsp. soda  
1 cup buttermilk  
coconut  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
2 tsp. vanilla  
1-8 oz. pkg cream cheese  
Cream sugar, egg yolks, half the oleo and shortening; stir in flour, soda and buttermilk. Fold in 2 cups coconut, pecans, 1 teaspoon vanilla and beaten egg whites. Place batter in 3 layer pans. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes. Blend cream cheese and remaining oleo; beat in powdered sugar and remaining vanilla. Spread layers with portion of the cream cheese mixture; sprinkle with coconut. Stack layers; frost sides with remaining cream cheese mixture.

### J.J. Kerbow Dies August 22

## In Memory Of Quinn

Quinn, Lamar County's first official Narcotic Drug Detector Dog, died Tuesday, August 4 at the age of 10 years, 4 months and 4 days.

Quinn devoted eight of his ten years to assisting law enforcement officials, statewide in Texas, in the fight against drugs.

Quinn was purchased from Scentry Place, Inc. in March, 1985, for the Lamar County Sheriff's Department with donations from local civic clubs, organizations, private citizens and school children.

He was returned to Scentry Place, Inc. in February, 1989, where he re-joined his handler, Pat Watson, and traveled statewide assisting law enforcement agencies, business and schools in finding drugs.

Ms. Watson purchased Quinn from Scentry Place in July, 1989. He was entered in the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association competition in Jasper, in September 1989 where he won first place in the Law Enforcement Division by locating three different narcotic substances in one minute, 20 seconds. He was sponsored by the Ladonia Police Department in the event.

For the past two years Quinn had assisted officials in Fannin and Lamar Counties.

He and his owner, Pat Watson, presented many programs and demonstrations to clubs, organizations and schools on "Prevention of Drug Abuse". When Ms. Watson would ask Quinn, "Quinn, what do you tell the kids to say to drugs?", Quinn would reply by vigorously shaking his head "NO".

Quinn was "the white drug dog" that drug dealers and users hated to see arrive on the scene with law enforcement officials. When he barked, everyone knew he had found drugs.

Quinn was "the white drug dog" that grinned, that school children and private citizens loved to watch present drug prevention programs. He was one of a kind, loved by many and will be missed by all those who knew him.

Quinn was laid to rest in the Lamar County Humane Association Pet Cemetery in Paris.

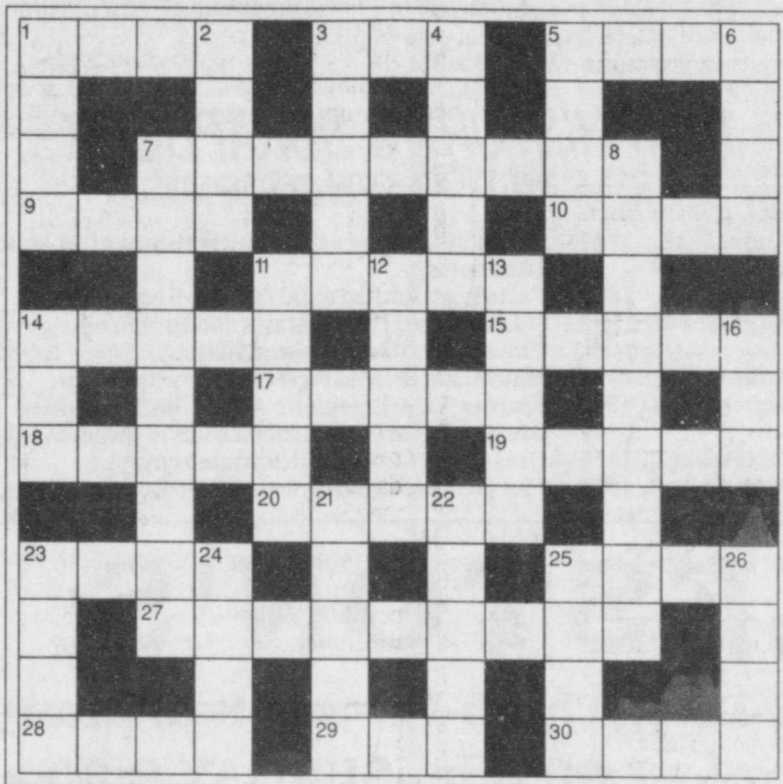

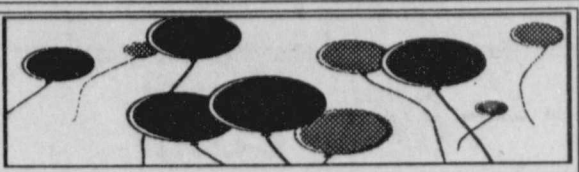

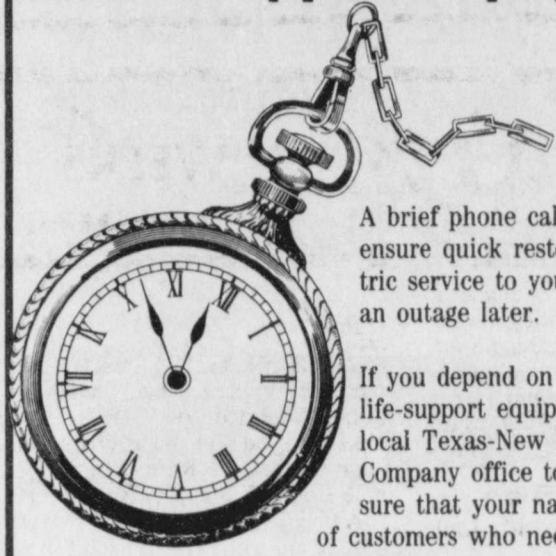

**Ag Briefs**

The 1992 soybean crop began making its way to the elevator last week, and we can anticipate a really great crop barring some catastrophe. The beans that are presently being harvested are the early planted Group III beans (Williams). Most of these were planted the last of March, and they will not be the top producing beans this year. It appears that the beans planted later in April will be out producing the extremely early planted ones this year.

Weather has so much affect on the yield of soybeans. What works one year will not necessarily work the same in succeeding years. However, it appears that most varieties and most fields will make at least 20 bushels.

There are a number of things that could still affect the yield of soybeans. A prolonged wet spell at har-

vest time can rally be devastating on the early maturing varieties. As a general rule these type beans must be harvested when ready or severe shattering of the beans will occur.

Various worms can affect the bean crop if too much of the leaf area of the plant is destroyed. An economic threshold is reached when defoliation exceeds 20% during blooming and pod fill or 35% from pod fill to harvest.

A good number of soybean producers went out to tour the county soybean variety demonstration last week. The variety signs remain up so that you can evaluate the varieties at your convenience. We anticipate harvesting the Group III and early maturing Group IV varieties in about 10 days.

Deport Mayor Charles Foster is shown here with Deport's dry fire hydrant, which was installed last summer and was one of the first of its kind. The hydrant has been featured in a color brochure published by Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D). The brochure explains the uses and installation of a dry

hydrant in a rural pond for adequate fire protection. According to the leaflet more than five million Texans live in rural areas, and many of these areas lack adequate water for protection. Dry hydrants can be used to deliver large volumes of water to fire scenes without travelling long distances. Mayor Foster also reports that the Secretary of Agriculture has approved expansion of the area from five counties to 13 counties including Fannin, Delta, Lamar, Red River, Bowie, Hopkins, Rains, Franklin, Titus, Camp, Morris, Cass and Marion. Applications for grants to find installations of dry fire hydrants are being developed in nine counties. State agencies, municipal districts, rural electric co-ops, timber companies and other are asked to help with funding to install dry hydrants.

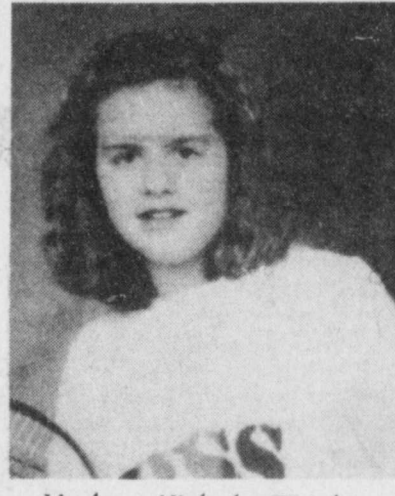
