Tuesday Night Shooting Attempt Ends In Blossom With Crash

tions of Red River and Lamar Counties ended with one suspect in custody after shots were exchanged Tuesday evening. One law enforcement official was hospitalized and another treated and released with injuries sustained during the roadblock which stopped the suspect.

According to Pct. One Constable Randy Boren he received a call from a woman who reported that the suspect, a white male about forty years old, was harassing his wife and

making threats against his children. Boren received a description of the truck the man was driving and went to try and find him.

Shortly thereafter reports indicated that "shots were fired and there

Constable Boren picked up the suspects trail on FM 410 in Red River County. Other law enforcement officers were enroute to the scene at that

The suspect went through Detroit, and turned east on Hwy. 82. The man then turned and fled back west on

The suspect refused to stop and apparently fired shots during the ensuing chase. Officers attempted to shoot the tires out of the suspects pickup.

Road blocks were being set up as the man entered the Blossom area. At a turn off in Blossom Constable Boren's patrol car and the man's red were children in the house" near Ford Ranger pickup collided. Boren's


vehicle blew up and began to burn.

Lamar County Deputy Randy Ward used his vehicle to cut off the man's path, stopping it on Front street in Blossom. The man was then taken into custody.

According to reports from Deputy Ann Denny Deputy Sgt. Randy Ward received bruises to his hand and arm and was trasnported to the hospital to be treated and released. Constable Boren was taken by ambulance to McCuistion Regional Medical and was hospitalized for possible cracked ribs and smoke inhalation.


Deputy Denny stated Wednesday morning that charges of DWI and Attempted Murder were being filed Further charges may be filed.



Adds Press, Plans Warehouse

Blackland Prairie Gin in Deport has plans to build a 40,500 square foot cotton warehouse in Deport.

According to owners Earl and Nacy Gresham the project is planned to get underway in the early part of 1993 and be completed in time for use in the fall of the same year.

When completed the warehouse will be able to store up to 10,000 bales of compressed cotton bales.

The gin is also undergoing some changes. It has been modified recently to accomodate a new press capable of producing a bale of cotton measuring 26 inches by 21 inches by

56 inches and weighing 500 lbs. This bale is half as thick as the bales pre-

viously produced. The Greshams report that with this new machine the small bales will be ready to be placed in storage when it leaves the gin. Up until now the bales from the gin had to be shipped fifty away to a compress, the shipped somewhere else to be stored.

The warehouse will be government certified, and area farmers can store their cotton until a buyer purchases it. The proposed warehouse can be

used to save farmers money, since handling will be much reduced, and it should help make more money by selling directly to textile mills.

The warehouse will have security and safety features, including an eight inch water line with a modern sprinkler system for fire protection.

The storage facility will be the only one of it's kind anywhere in the

It will also be the only one in the area since the old tin warehouse located on Hwy. 271 in Deport was taken out of use as a warehouse sometime about the middle of this century.

This week we are visiting with Mrs. Vella Mae Scales of Fulbright. really appreciate her letting me go ahead and talk with her, since when we arrived, we found that she had injured her hand and wasn't feeling very well. She was very cordial though, and said for us to just come on in and sit down and we'd visit.

Mrs. Scales has four children; Alice Perry, Milton Scales and Billy Scales, who live in Bogata and her youngest daughter, Sarah Giles, who lives in Mesquite. She has two grandchildren, Alice's two sons, Rodney and Zachary.

Mrs. Scales says she doesn't have a lot of free time anymore, and that she likes to spend the time she has on church activities and with her family. She attends the Sunset Baptist Church in Mt. Pleasant where her pastor is Rev. George Rape.

Quinn, Lamar County's first official Narcotic Drug Detector Dog, died Tuesday, August 4 at the age of 10 years, 4 months and 4 days.

Quinn devoted eight of his ten years to assisting law enforcement officials, statewide in Texas, in teh fight against drugs.

Quinn was purchased from Scentry Place, Inc. in March, 1985, for the Lamar County Sheriff's Department with donations from local civic clubs, organizations, private citizens and school children.

He was returned to Scentry Place, Inc. in February, 1989, where he rejoined his handler, Pat Watson, and traveled statewide assisting law enforcement agencies, business and schools in finding drugs.

Ms. Watson purchasd Quinn from Scentry Place in July, 1989. He was entered in the National Narcotic Detector Dog Association competition in Jasper, in September 1989 where he won first place in the Law Enforcement Division by locating three different narcotic substances in one minute, 20 seconds. He was sponsored by the Ladonia Police Department in the event.

For the past two years Quinn had assisted officials in Fannin and Lamar Counties.

He and his owner, Pat Watson, presented many programs and demonstrations to clubs, organizations and schools on "Prevention of Drug Abuse". When Ms. Watson would ask Quinn, "Quinn, what do you tell the kids to say to drugs?", Quinn would reply by vigorously shaking his head "NO".

Quinn was "the white drug dog" that drug dealers and users hated to see arrive on the scene with law enforcement officials. When he barked, everyone knew he had found drugs.

Quinn was "the white drug dog" that grinned, that school chilren and prigvate citizens loved to watch present drug prevention programs. He was one of a kind, loved by many and will be missed by all those who knew him.

Quinn was laid to rest in the Lam County Humane Association Pet Cemetery in Paris.





Ag Briefs

By Paul D. Payne, CEA-AG **Lamar County**

The 1992 soybean crop began making its way to the elevator last week, and we can anticipate a really great crop barring some catastrophy. The beans that are presently being harvested are the early planted Group III beans (Williams). Most of these were planted the last of March, and they will not be the top producing beans this year. It appears that the beans planted later in April will be out producing the extremely early

planted ones this year. Weather has so much affect on the yield of soybeans. What works one year will not necessarily work the same in succeeding years. However, it appears that most varieties and most fields will make at least 20 bushels.

There are a number of things that could still affect the yield of soybeans. A prolonged wet spell at harvest time can rally be devastating on the early maturing varieties. As a general rule these type beans must be harvested when ready or severe shattering of the beans will occur.

Various worms can affect the bean crop if too much of the leaf area of the plant is destroyed. An economic threshold is reached when defoliation exceeds 20% during blooming and pod fill or 35% from pod fill to






