## Phone Call Begins Odyssey To Ukraine For Geneva Norwood

It began with a mysterious phone  
call, encompassed a three weeks  
journey to do missionary work in the  
Ukraine, and isn't ended yet.

Geneva Norwood believes that  
God had a direct hand in her odyssey  
and that he was with her the whole  
trip.

It started back in May when the  
rioting in Los Angeles was going on.  
Geneva, widowed eighteen months  
ago, was at her comfortable home in  
Cunningham when the phone rang.

A man's voice, speaking broken  
English informed her that he was  
calling from the Ukraine in Russia.

The man was dialing numbers at  
random all across the U.S. as part of  
a survey to find out more about  
Americans, and specifically, what  
Americans felt about the riots.

Geneva says that she had a long,  
pleasant phone call with this man,  
who professed his Christianity, and  
was thrilled that she was also a Chris-  
tian.

Somehow, when she went to bed  
that night, she couldn't get that  
call off her mind. There was something  
different about it, something that  
caused her to turn her thoughts to  
Russia, it's trials and the major  
changes which have rocked the coun-  
try over the past year.

As the days went by she couldn't  
get the thought of that call to leave  
her.

Then she received another  
call...this time from someone she  
knew. Peggy White, a woman who  
conducts the women's retreat at Flying  
M Ranch in Cunningham, called and  
asked Geneva if she would like to go  
to the Ukraine with a group of mis-  
sionaries. Geneva said that there was  
no possible way...that she wasn't fi-  
nancially able to do something like  
that.

The next thing she knew her church,  
the Life Tabernacle in Cunningham,  
had raised the money to send her on  
the journey! In a whirlwind she was  
getting her passport and making  
preparations to embark on the big-  
gest adventure of her life.

Her family, always close, was hor-  
rificed at first, worried for her safety  
and used to having their mother and  
grandmother right on hand.

But Geneva said that she was never  
worried.

"From the very first there was a  
peace about this that I can't explain,"  
she smiles "I never worried about it a  
bit...I just knew it was something I  
was supposed to do".

On August 3 she flew to New  
Mexico to meet with Peggy White,  
and then they joined the other eight  
people in New York for the long,  
long flight to Prague, Czechoslova-  
kia, where they spent two days.

The group then flew on to Kiev in  
the Ukraine, and continued by bus to  
Vanessa, a city of 500,000.

All would have been well except  
that her luggage was lost. It didn't re-  
appear until the last day of her trip,

leaving her with two dresses for the  
whole three weeks.

"Oh, well, it didn't hurt me any...the  
Russian people sure didn't wear dif-  
ferent dresses to church each time!"

In Vanessa the group was met with  
many hugs, kisses and flowers as  
they were welcomed by members of  
the church that had invited them to  
come.

In Vanessa the group stayed in a  
hotel. It bears little resemblance to  
the one's most Americans are accus-  
tomed to, though.

"It was fifteen years old but looked  
100" she smiles.

The most difficult thing was the  
heat. The country was in the grip of a  
heat wave, and has no air condition-  
ing or even fans.

They took their meals with a  
Ukrainian family, Serjus and Angelic  
and their two and a half year old  
daughter Marina. Three women were  
hired to do all the cooking for the  
group and they ate lunch and dinner  
their every day.

Geneva's time was spent in vari-  
ous ways, and there was little leisure  
for sightseeing.

In the mornings they took turns  
conducting teaching sessions or con-  
ducting street services. She says that  
within moments of beginning to sing  
hundreds of people would crowd  
around them, smiling, listening, ac-  
cepting tracts.

Every evening they conducted  
services in a huge auditorium rented  
from the military, a major change  
from the anti-religious line of previ-  
ous years.

She says that the crowds were un-  
believable.

"The most wonderful thing" she  
states "is the numbers of young people  
anxious to come to the Lord".

They had music nightly. Before  
singing Geneva would tell the audi-

ence what she was saying (through  
interpreters) and they would then sing  
in Russian while she sang in English.

The Russian music, she reports,  
was beautiful, even if she couldn't  
understand what they were saying.

Several young black students at  
the Vanessa Medical School served  
as interpreters for the group of Amer-  
icans. They were from Africa, and a  
more helpful, polite bunch of young  
men couldn't be found.

At the home where they took their  
meals all was spotlessly clean, if a  
little crowded. The floors were  
painted bright orange, and the walls  
white. The young family had a new  
bathroom, but most homes still use  
outdoor toilets. In the whole of Van-  
essa there are only 1000 phones.

When asked what these people  
need most economically she will say  
they need food, that the grocery stores  
are virtually empty, and that they  
need a new economic system to re-  
place the one which has collapsed.

At stores there are no dressing  
rooms. Customers simply try on  
things over their own clothes. Lin-

ens, gorgeous embroidery and hand-  
work are available for only a few  
dollars of U.S. money.

Shoes are one of the hardest things  
to come by.

So are Bibles, and that's another  
area where the group did much good.  
They handed out hundreds of Bibles  
in Russian, as well as taking candy  
and gifts of toys to the orphanage  
and children's hospitals in Vanessa.

Vanessa was a retreat of Hitler's at  
one time, and Lenin was a "home-  
town boy". On Leningrad Square in  
the city there is a bare patch of earth  
where his statue was pulled down last  
year.

"I've never in my life met such  
loving, sweet people" Geneva says.  
"They brought us little gifts of fruit,  
flowers or vegetables, little home-  
made things at every opportunity, in  
spite of us begging them not to spend  
money on us".

One of the highlights of her trip  
came when she spoke with an elderly  
woman who had been a part of the  
Russian religious underground, wor-  
shipping in secret for all her life. The  
joy of this woman at having freedom  
of worship once more was truly  
something to behold.

Geneva can't say enough about the  
eagerness and joyousness of the  
people who came forward night after  
night. She recites incident after inci-  
dent of the way things worked to-  
gether, pieces falling into place with  
perfection to make meetings, wishes  
and hopes come true.

The young man whose home they  
ate in is a member of the military.

"Communism wasn't so bad" he  
says "if they would just have allowed  
us to worship".

The people she met are worried,  
worried about the future of their be-  
loved Ukraine. But they are learning  
that the American people aren't peo-  
ple to fear...as Americans are learning  
the same thing about Russians.

The day this small group of Amer-  
icans left Vanessa they were seen off  
by a huge group from the church they  
had been ministering in. They were  
given all manner of gifts, lavish, hand  
made fur hats, peasant blouses, little  
things to eat on the bus ride to Kiev.

Tears were shed on both sides as  
the group waved for as long as the bus  
was in sight. Then they were out  
gone, left behind as the group began  
it's long journey home.

"I felt sad at first" this gray haired  
grandmother says "thinking about  
leaving them to such an uncertain  
future...but I know that God has  
started something and it will get fin-  
ished".

Like a tiny stone thrown into a  
huge lake, the ten missionaries were  
a small splash...but the ripples may  
well spread far and wide, hopefully  
marking a new beginning in relation-  
ships between two nations that are so  
different yet so much the same.

For Geneva Norwood it was the  
experience of a lifetime.

The original phone call? Well, she  
will probably never know where it  
came from. Taken at face value it  
was completely disconnected from the  
following events.

Geneva knows better, however.  
"It was truly the hand of God" she  
states firmly, her faith shining forth  
as brightly as a light.

**Stuffed Dill Pickles**  
By Juanita Sparks

6 large dill pickles  
1 1/3 cups light brown sugar  
4 cloves garlic, split  
1-8 oz. carton creamed cottage cheese  
102 1/4 oz. can deviled ham  
1/4 cup chopped pecans  
1 1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin  
3 tablespoons cold water

Cut ends from pickles. Core, removing seed and some pulp using an apple corer. Put pickles in refrigerator dish; sprinkle with brown sugar and stick garlic at random around the pickles. Chill for 2-3 days. Turn pickles frequently in the juice that this makes. Press cottage cheese through fine sieve and blend with deviled ham and pecans.

Soften gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Set over boiling water until dissolved. Combine with cheese mixture. Drain pickles, standing on ends on several layers of paper toweling. Stuff pickles with filling (a butter knife works well). Wrap in plastic wrap and store until well chilled and gelatin is set. Can be for 3-4 days. Put pickles in center of each slice; slice pickles about 1/3 to 1/2 inch thick.

**Baked Chicken**

1 chicken fryer, cut up, salt if desired  
1 egg, beaten  
3 teaspoons condensed milk  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons flour

Beat egg, milk, flour and salt together. Crush 15-20 saltine crackers in a separate bowl. Grease a pyrex baking dish with shortening. Dip chicken piece by piece, in egg and milk mixture and place in cracker crumbs and roll all over. Place in baking dish, put a teaspoon of melted oleo on each piece of chicken and sprinkle with black pepper. Cover tightly with foil and bake in 400 degree oven for 1 hour, 20 minutes. When chicken is tender, you may remove foil and brown a few minutes.

**German Cookies**

1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup white sugar  
1 cup Crisco  
2 eggs  
2 cups corn flakes  
1 teaspoon soda dissolved in 1 tablespoon water  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder sifted with flour  
1 cup coconut  
1 cup raisins  
2 cups pecans  
2 teaspoons vanilla

**Stuffed Salmon Ball**  
By Mrs. R.W. Weisinger

1-15 1/2 oz. can salmon, drained and flaked  
1-8 oz. package cream cheese, softened  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
2 tablespoons grated onion  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 tablespoon prepared horseradish  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley  
lemon slices, optional

Combine first 7 ingredients; stir well, chill thoroughly. Shape into balls, and roll in chopped parsley. Serve with assorted crackers and garnish with lemon slices, if desired. To freeze, place salmon ball in airtight container in freezer. To serve, remove from freezer, let thaw completely. Yield: 1-6" ball.

**Pork and Bean Dish**

1 lb. ground meat, browned with 1/2 large chopped onion  
1 package onion soup mixed with 1/2 cup water  
add to meat mixture:  
1 tablespoon chili powder  
1-16 oz. can pork and beans  
1 cup catsup  
1 tablespoon prepared mustard  
2 teaspoons vinegar

Mix with meat and put in casserole dish and bake 30 minutes at 350.

**Strawberry Pie**  
From Best Recipes Magazine

1-9" baked pie shell  
4 cups sliced strawberries  
1 box sugar free vanilla pudding (not instant) 4 serving size  
1 box sugar free strawberry jello, 4 serving size  
2 1/2 cups cold water.

Mix jello, pudding mix and water in saucepan. Stir over medium heat until mixture comes to full boil. Cool in frig until slightly thick. Arrange strawberries in pie shell. Pour mixture over strawberries, chill until set. Serve with light whipped topping. This is a good recipe for someone on a sugar restricted diet.

**Salmon Potato Cakes**  
From Best Recipes Magazine

1 can 14 1/2 oz. salmon  
2 1/2 cups prepared mashed potatoes  
2 egg whites  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
1/2 cup sliced green onion  
oil for frying  
dry bread crumbs

Drain salmon, break in chunks, set aside. Mix potatoes, egg whites and parsley until smooth. Gently fold in salmon and green onions. Form into 1/4 cup patties, roll in bread crumbs. Fry 2-3 minutes on each side on medium high burner in large skillet.

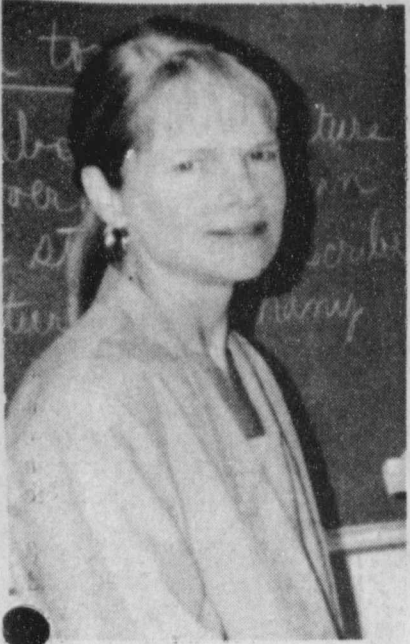

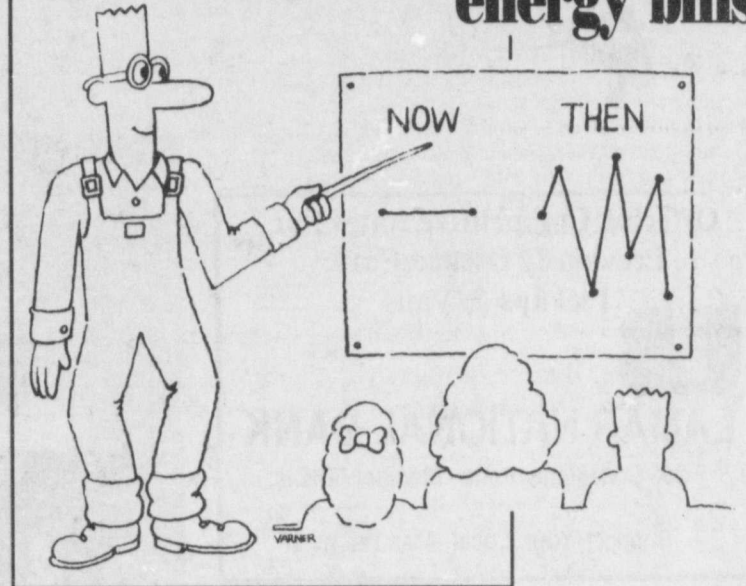

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## Free/Reduced Price Meals Available From Prairiland I.S.D.

The Prairiland School District serves meals each day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 50¢. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you get food stamps or AFDC for your child, your child can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

Officials said that on the first day of school, students were given an application to be filled out either by a parent or guardian and returned to the school. Students will need to reapply even if they received free/reduced meals last year or they will risk being excluded from the program in 30 days. If there is more than one child in the household, officials said a family must fill out one application for each child. Parents and guardians are urged to return the forms as soon as possible.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child, the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send

papers showing that your child should get free or reduced price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: L.C. Stout, Superintendent, 903/652-6476, Rt. 1, Box 200, Pattonville, TX 75468.

If your child gets free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income changes by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your child gets meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your child should get free or reduced price meals.

You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your child, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250.

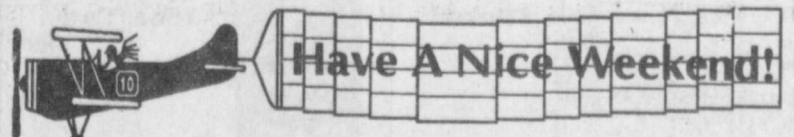

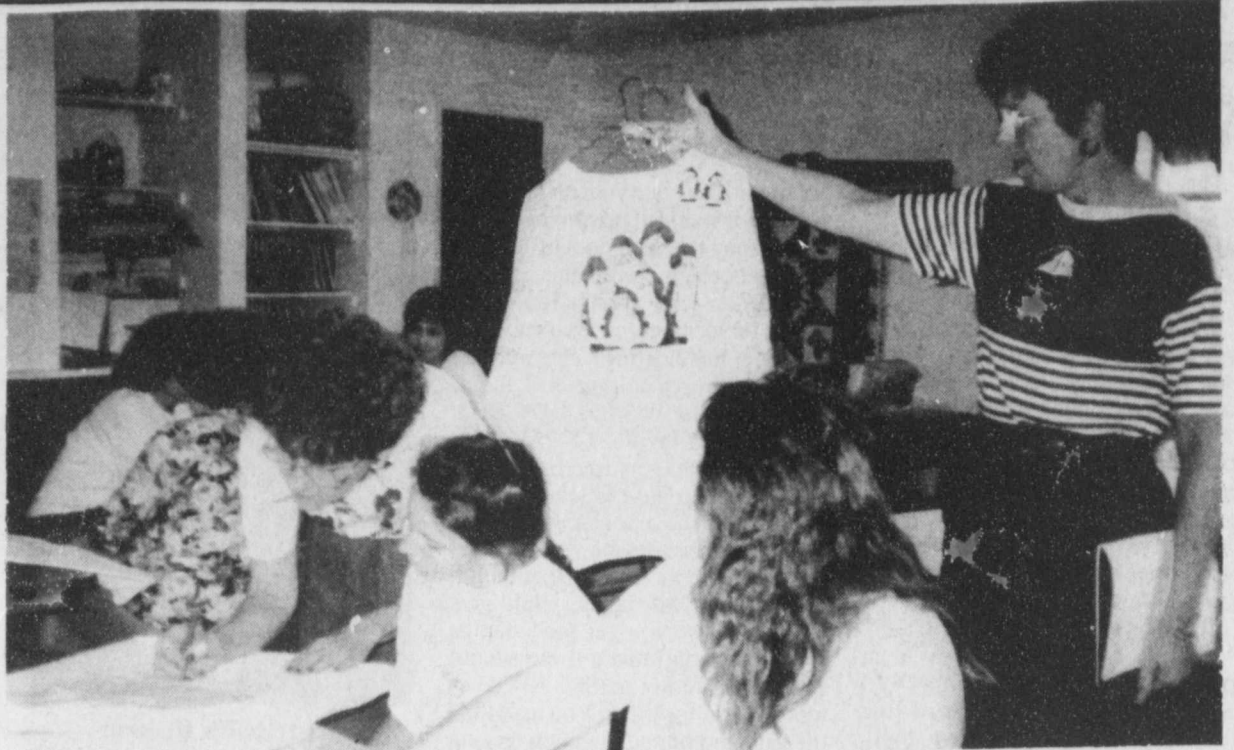
