Public Hearing Set On Allegations Against Preston J. Brooks

According to a news release dated September 16 from Frank Vance, office of the Comptroller of the Currency, a public hearing will take place on September 22 in Dallas, Texas, relating to a \$25,000 civil money penalty and a permanent removal from the business of banking against Preston J. Brooks, former president and chairman of the board of directors of the First National Bank of *Deport*, Texas, the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) announced. Mr. Brooks was dismissed by the board of directors on November 5, 1990.

The OCC is the federal agency that regulates national banks. It examines national banks to determine if they are operating in a safe and sound manner and are complying with banking laws and regulations.

The hearing will address OCC

allegations that Mr. Brooks violated banking laws and regulations an engaged in unsafe and unsound banking practices and breaches of fiduciary duty. The OCC alleges that in four separate instances, Mr. Brooks manipulated bank-controlled accounts for the benefit of his mother, Jenelle Brooks, his brother, Edward Brooks, and his sister-in-law, Cynthia Brooks. In each transaction, Mr. Brooks initiated a wire transfer of funds out of the bank's correspondent account at another bank and into the accounts of his family. The amount of the transfers varied from \$300 to \$18,150. None of these wire transfers received the prior approval of the board or the loan committee nor were any of the transfers documented with the financial statements of the recipients. The OCC alleges that Mr. Brooks

tried to conceal these actions from national bank examiners. In addition, Mr. Brooks caused the bank to pay the expenses of his real estate agency.

Further, Mr. Brooks caused the bank to declare and pay an illegal dividend to the bank's holding company in 1989, of which he is a principal shareholder. The law prohibits the payment of dividends in excess of the current year's net profits plus the retained net profits of the prior two years without OCC approval.

OCC administrative hearings are public as required by the Crime Control Act of 1990.

The hearing will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the Administrative Courtroom, OSHRC, United States Courthouse and Federal Building, 1100 Commerce Street, Room 7B11B, Dallas, Texas.

Deport To Make Street In Front Of School One Way For Child Safety

At the *Deport* City Council Meeting Monday night Kathy Corso and Jalynda Mitchell appeared to plead for efforts to make the street in front of *Deport* Elementary and Junior High School safer for children.

This area becomes congested during school time, and it is difficult for children to be seen between buses and other vehicles.

It was decided that signs will be erected making Church street one way from 7 a.m. until 9 a.m. each morning and from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. in the afternoon. The street will be one way from Kelsey and Church intersection to the corner of Pecan

and Church street. Motorists are urged to heed the signs when erected and help make the school zone safer.

In other business they heard from Hayter Engineering representative Mike Donnan about paying estimate number 5 in the amount of \$12,404.14 to Joe McCreath Co. for TCDPI Grant number 700841.

Mike Donnan explained he was to have Jordan Paving make bids on First and Trail Streets Tuesday morning at 10:00 a.m.

Robert Farris asked about Rail Street.

A discussion was held about 18 wheelers parked on residential streets.

Two signs were needed, it was said, one for fifth street and Beville saying "No Large Trucks".

Discussion was held on sewer stop ups. The city is only responsible to property lines and main lines.

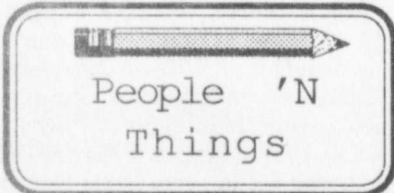
A discussion on a fire siren for the near future was held.

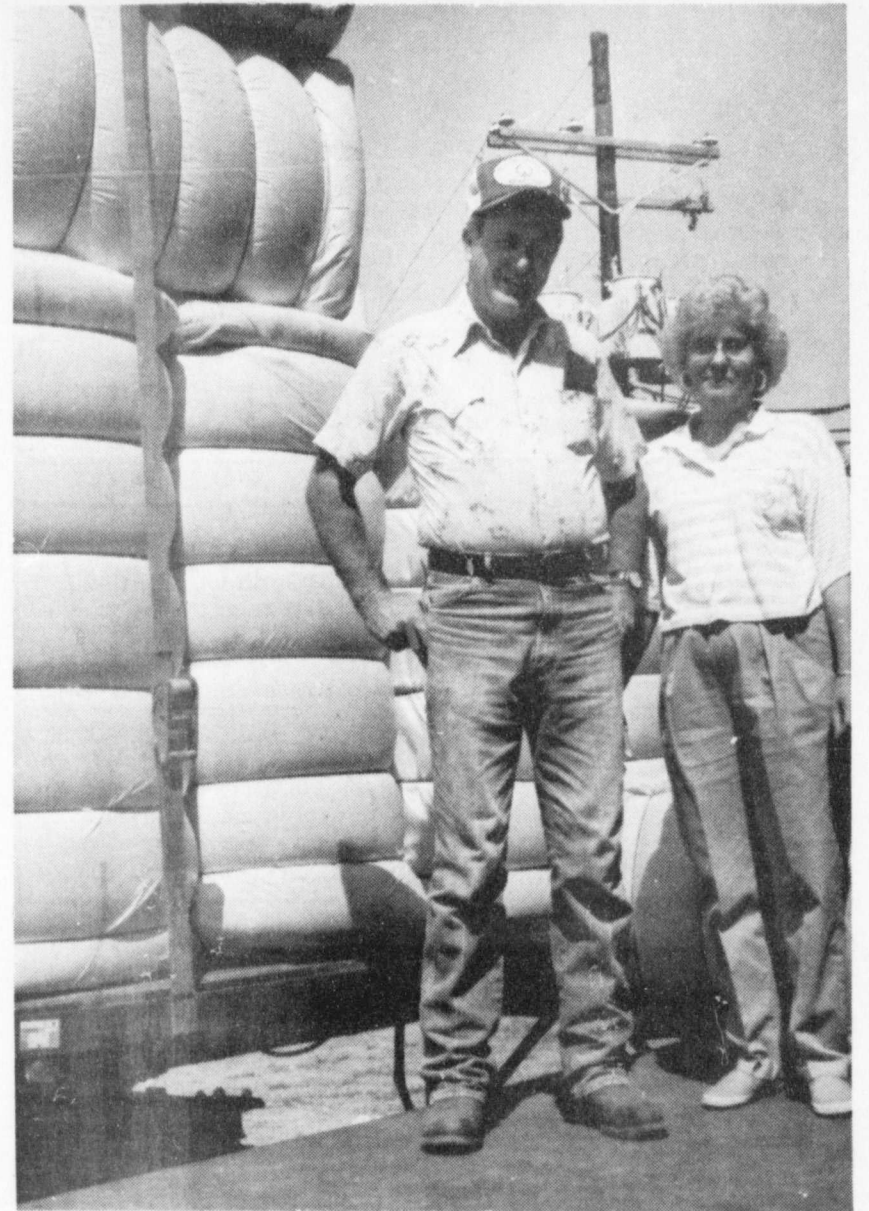
No Grandchildren Needed For Funeral Home Ad Right Now

This means that after the current grandchildren's pictures are used up

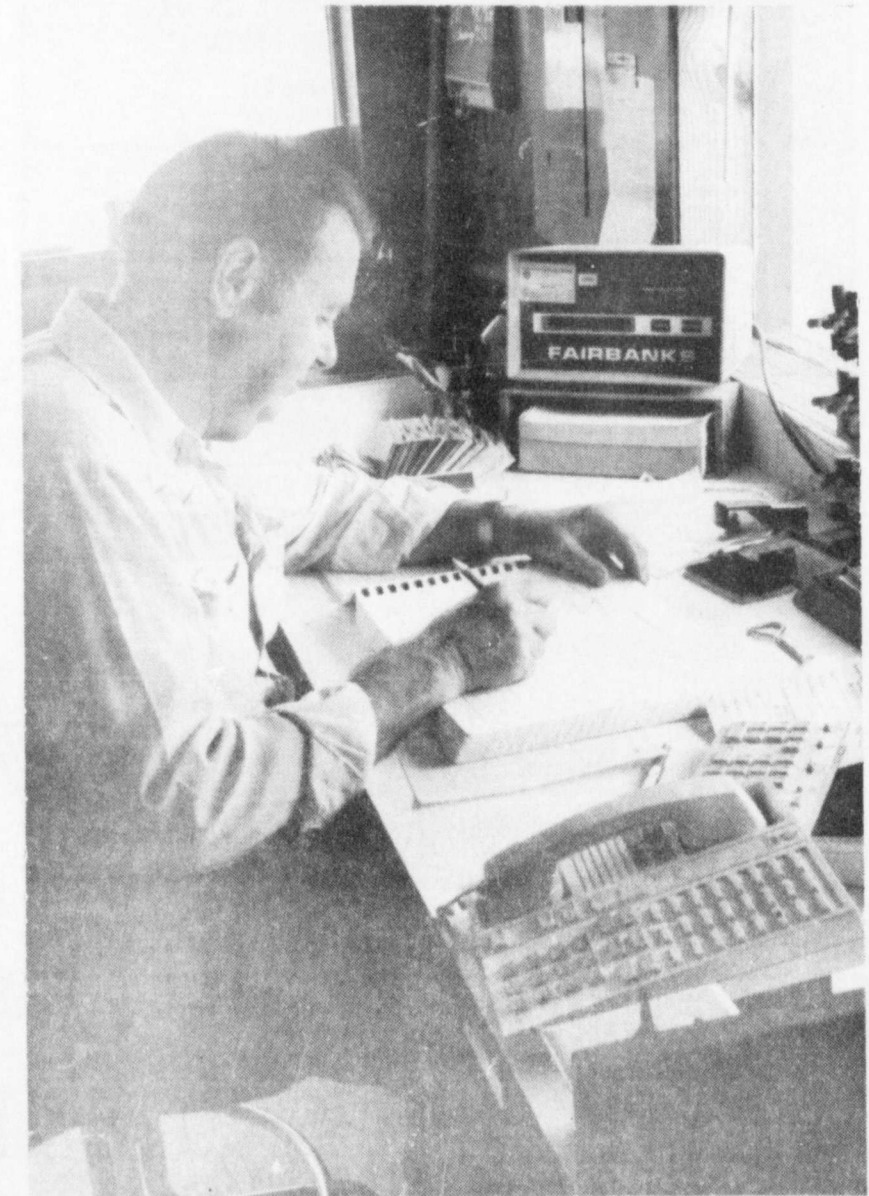
in the "Grandchild of the Week" ads no more will be needed until the campaign is started up again.

Country Cooking

The publishers of this newspaper thought that since they had just acquired the Detroit Weekly, it would be nice to feature a Detroit cook this week. It made good sense to me and seemed like a reasonable request, so I started trying to remember who I knew in Detroit. I had been given a phone number, but the lady was never at home.

Just as I was about to give it up as a lost cause, I remembered an old buddy of mine who had lived in Detroit for many years. She was able to give me a list of names to call. I called Jorene Carpenter and hit pay dirt. I've not met many people who are so helpful. Not only was she able to add to my list of names, she was also gracious enough to help me out by letting me come over and visit with her and her husband, Russell.

The Carpenters own a ranch and are active members of the Martin Memorial United Methodist Church. They, along with their three children, are involved in all sorts of activities. Nineteen-year old Rusty attends PJC where he is vice-president of the Collegiate FFA. He plans to become an Ag teacher. David, who is 18, attends Detroit High School and is a team roper. He will compete in the US Team Roping Finals this November. Karen, who is 15, is a student at Detroit High also.

I asked Jorene if she had a job. She has many. Besides helping her husband, she is superintendent of the Exhibit Building for the Red River County Fair Association, director on

the AIA Fair Board, a member of the Red River Cancer Board and was runner-up Regional Homemaker of the Year for the Soil Conservation Service. Jorene and Russell are also camp leaders and do workshops in archery. I've heard that if you want a job done, ask a busy person.

Jorene's hobbies are cooking, sewing and photography. She says that her homemade cinnamon rolls are probably her family's favorite. When I asked what she enjoyed cooking, she said that she thought she enjoyed cooking authentic Mexican food the most. She is from New Mexico and even has New Mexico green chilies shipped in to do her cooking with. I think I must just cook Texican food.

Hominy & Green Chili Casserole

1 can hominy, drained
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 small can chopped green chili
1 cup Velveeta cheese, grated
1 cup cracker crumbs or stove top stuffing
1 small chopped onion
1 tsp. butter
Saute onion in butter. Mix hominy and soup in mixture to warm. Mix in green chili, place in casserole. Place grated cheese topped with stuffing on top of mixture. Bake 20 minutes at 350. Small pyrex or corning ware dish works well.

Mother-In-Law's Impossible Buttermilk Pie

1 1/2 cups sugar
3 eggs
1/2 cup Bisquick
1 cup buttermilk
1/3 cup melted oleo
1 tsp. vanilla
Heat oven to 350. Grease pie plate. Beat all ingredients until smooth with

mixer. Pour into pie plate. Bake until center comes out clean with toothpick. Bake 30 minutes.

Cranberry-Date Muffins

1 3/4 cups unsifted all purpose flour
1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup sour cream
1 large egg
1/2 cup cranberries, coarsely chopped
1/2 cup dates, coarsely chopped
Preheat oven to 400. Grease 9-3" muffin tins. In large bowl, mix flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt. In small bowl, with fork, blend sour cream with egg. With fork, stir sour cream mixture into flour mixture just until blended. Batter will be thick. With rubber spatula, fold in cranberries and dates just until mixed.

Spoon batter into prepared tins. Bake muffins for 18 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from tins, cool on wire rack. Makes 9 servings.

The yearly Banquet was set for October 6 and committees were appointed. The meeting adjourned.

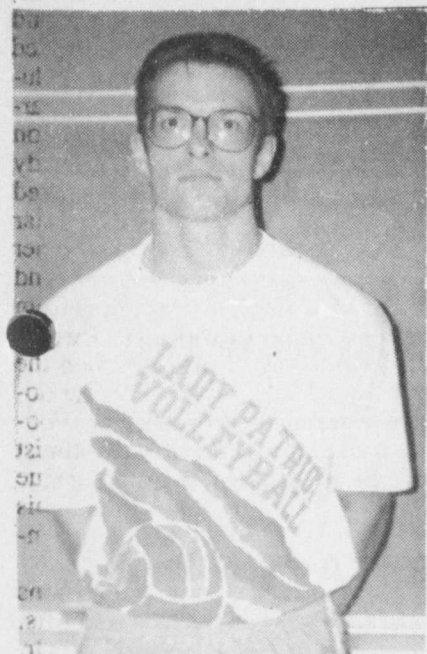

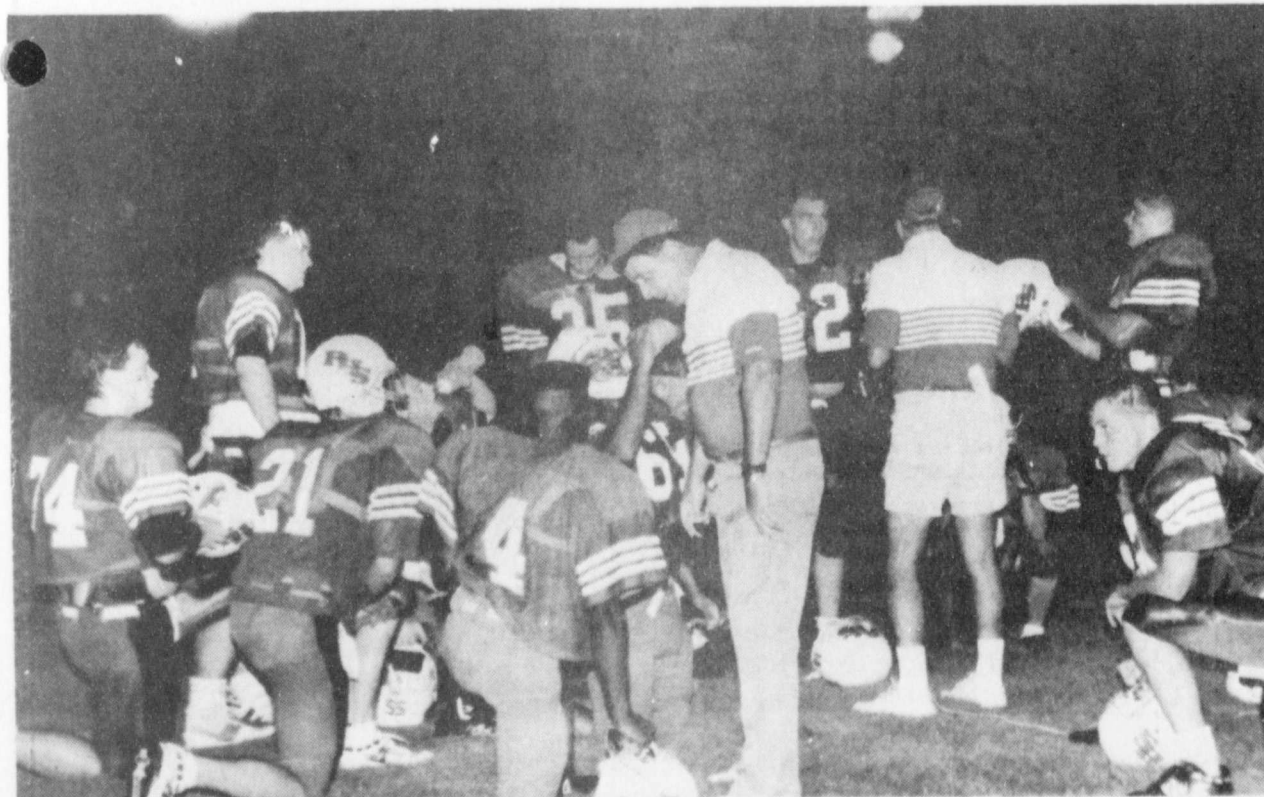

"We are excited about this new service," said Tommy Welch, vice-president of North Texas Production Credit Association. "Our customers will be able to realize a noticeable improvement in cash flow by leasing new equipment acquisitions," Welch

added, "and do it without disturbing existing loan agreements." Those who use equipment leasing find that it offers many benefits. It helps the lessee improve cash flow because a lease provides 100% financing. There is no down payment. Rental payments may be made monthly or annually, whichever, best fits cash flow patterns. 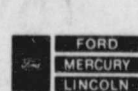

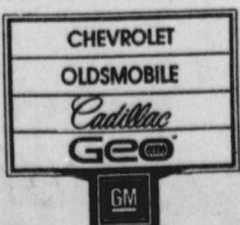

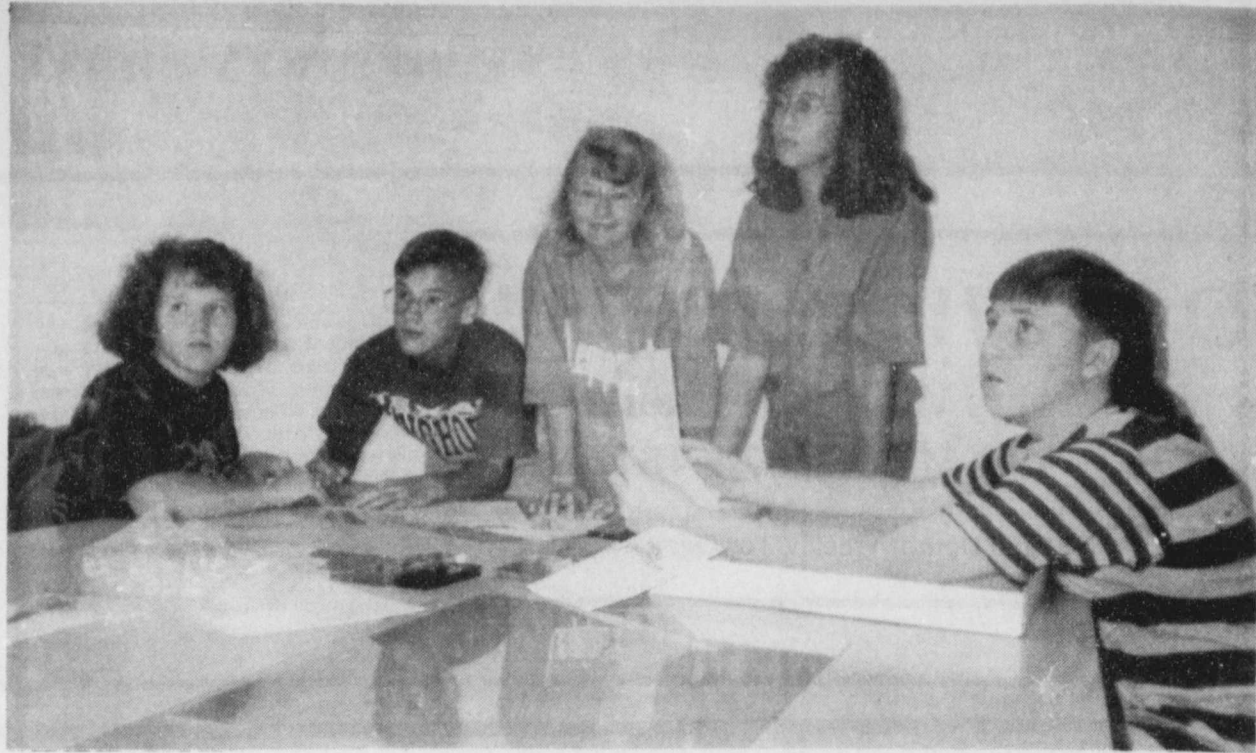
