Water Rate Increase Will Show On January 1 Billing For City

Ten scouters and three adult leaders visited the regular Tuesday night meeting of Haskell City Council, to see the workings of their city government.

Attending were Webelos Greg Brister, Mark Turner, Carl Hopkins, Wade Matthews, Kevin Strickland, Horace Abbott, Tommy Croft, Will Pace, Phillip Parker and Bernie Holder; and sub-cub Seth Pace, along with adult leaders Gertrude Hopkins and Sam and Twyla Pace.

Mayor Belton Duncan, Councilmen Guy Kennedy, Buster Gholson and Jimmy Browning, and City Secretary Desmond Dulaney attended, along with Don Smith of the Burroughs Company.

Jimmy Browning lead the prayer, and minutes were read and approved. Business machines for the city were discussed but no action was taken. Dulancy reported on the sewage work school held last week

in Haskell for area city employees. Haskell employees attending were Marvin Collins, Noble Land and Harley Potect. Council approved Christmas bonuses for City employees.

A rate increase on water was passed, with the first showing on January 1 billing, on the meter reading from Nov. 15 to Der. 15. New rate is the first rate increase since 1950, and will be \$4.50 on a minimum of 3,000 gallons, with 50 cents for each additional thousand gallons thereafter. A complete explanation of the rate increase will be in next week's Free Press.

Mayor Duncan read an invitation from Haskell Fire Department, inviting Councilmen to their annual Christmas dinner on Dec. 10; and the council canceled their second meeting in December, which fell on Christmas Day. They also heard a report on the City selling two old junk trucks for \$475.00, and approved the bills.

Industrial Foundation Is **Seeking Additional Funds**

Haskell Industrial Foundation fund drive chairman Abe Turner announced today an extended drive for additional funds. "We received a gratifying total of \$54,390.00 in the original drive to help finance the Herman-Marcus garment plant in Haskell," said Turner, "but

this time." Haskell and Big Country area businesses and businessmen responded wholeheartedly when they learned of the need, to bring Haskell it's first major industry. Since the drive ended last April, four more businesses have donated funds for the plant, including Party Port of Haskell, General Telephone Co., Stamford Federal Savings, and Olney Savings.

Delays in the beginning of construction of the building, on the Rule highway, are the major reasons for the need of additional funds. Spiraling costs of construction supplies have created a need for more funds on hand, even though the building is in the very last stages of completion. Everything is still on schedule, and Saturday is the day for its completion, with December 15 the date set for the opening of the plant. One training school has already graduated 35 women, and a tother is in progress at this time, with 37 enrolled, that will end on December 14. Another school will begin-in the plant -after the first of the year, in order to train enough people to keep the plant operating at full strength at all times.

'We do plan to make another drive for funds, in the very near future. Another \$15,000 is needed to completely finance cur share of the new industry in Haskell, and we feel sure our

people will respond to the need. If everyone who has donated to the Industrial Foundation at this time would donate another 20% of what they gave, it would fill our financial need." said Turner, "and we hope you will be looking for us to call on you in the near future. "Scotty was a month old when we brought him home from the hospital," Monta Hafen recalls, "and it was really hard not to overprotect him."

That was five years ago, and Scott, who is Monta and Gary Hafen's fifth child, was just leaving to go down the block from their modest ranch house in North Las Vegas, Nev. That may not sound unusual, unless you are aware that Scott was born with crippling birth defects, hydrocephalus (water on the brain), and spina bifida (open spine).

The first defect has been corrected by surgery. The second is painfully evident. Scott is paralyzed from the waist down and has to use braces and crutches to get around.

"It was hard at first," his mother says, "but we finally got hold of ourselves. Life had to go on. We made ourselves be less protective.

"We don't treat him as an invalid in any way. We expect things from him, and he does them. If he makes a mess with his toys, he has to pick them up and put them away in his toy box.

"Of course, with four older brothers and sisters, he gets a bit spoiled, no matter what Gary and I do. But we figure that's not so bad. After all, they only do what they want to do. We don't expect them to take care of Scotty to any greater extent than they would natur-ally take care of the littlest in the fight to prevent birth Even though one in the family."
