This has proved to be quite true. It has also saved lots of miles of travel for him.

The fax has proven to be invaluable, too.

nently attached to my ear. Our monthly phone bills, due to having papers in various towns, all of which are long-distance from one another, probably make the phone company accountants smile with joy each month.

Life without the telephone? It seems absolutely impossible!

What I just haven't managed to figure out yet is how this conversion took place.

Where did it go from being a luxury item to a necessity? Why do I now feel incomplete

and out of touch without a phone? I don't know when it all took place...it was a gradual thing. There was a time I would have scoffed at the whole idea of being so dependent on telephone servce. But...Like I said...when they made converts they really made-CONVERTS out of us!

She also likes to visit as often as possible with her 89-year old mother, who is a resident of Cherry Street



Gifted/Talented Students Participating In Wagon Train

This semester, gifted and talented junior high school students are participating as members of an imaginary wagon train which departed Fort Independence, MO in 1843 headed for the Oregon Territory. This activ-ity, called PIONEERS, is a simulation which allows students to participate in situations and events similar to those experienced by pioneers who headed west in early wagon trains. As settlers heading west during the 1840's, the students face problems, such as floods, droughts, blocked trails, snakes, Indians and a lack of food.

The would-be homesteaders must make numerous individual and group decisions, such as what to do about a lack of water, how to cross a flooded river, how to handle hostile Indians and which trail to take. These decisions and the other events provide the students with a realistic view of what pioneer life was like, why people went west, and what happened to them along the trail.

While learning about wagon trains and pioneer life, students participate in individual and small group decision-making, and they learn how to take notes, how to outline material, and how to write a brief research
