The Army wants to mail checks for this back pay before Christmas. So far only a little more than one thousand have applied for their money. The checks vary from \$16 to \$240.

### Public Hearing Set In Abilene

Applications for waste control orders pertaining to the control of rainfall runoff water containing wastes from a cottonseed delinting plant and a 40,000 bird capacity turkey feedlot operation will be reviewed at a Texas Water Quality Board public hearing to be held December 4th in the Abilene City Hall Council Chamber. The hearing will start at 10:00 a.m.

Dillard & Son of Eden is making a request for a permit in connection with the turkey feedlot operation located a mile and a half northwest of Eden in Concho County. Rainfall runoff water from 20 acres of feeding pens and six acres of rangeland is collected in an earthen retention pond, and the wastewater is disposed of by application to approximately 23 acres of cropland.

The Rogers Delinted Cottonseed Company of Waco has filed application for a waste control order for the cottonseed delinting plant located on the east side of State Highway 283 approximately one mile north of Rule in Haskell County.

The wastewater control facilities consist of two lined retention ponds with a total capacity of approximately 9.7 acre-feet, and they are used as evaporation and irrigation ponds for the wastewater which consists of spent sulfuric acid from the delinting process. Twenty-six acres of adjacent cropland is available for disposal by irrigation, and sludges that collect in the retention ponds will be spread on farmland as a fertilizer.

The TWQB urges all interested parties to attend the hearing and present any relevant information for the record.

### TMA Urges Gun Safety

Some millions of American males—along with more than a few females—are taking to the woods this month, firearms in hand, in search of live targets. These are the hunters among us.

The Texas Medical Association has a note of caution for those who are planning a fall safari into the fields and woods in search of deer and other game.

Know what you're firing at before you pull the trigger.

The hunter who blazes away rapidly at everything that moves is a highly dangerous animal. His quarry might well be another hunter.

The wise Texas hunter will be wearing a "hunter orange" vest or, at the very least, a cap made in this glowing bright fluorescent color. The color sends a glowing signal to other hunters, but goes unnoticed by color-blind game such as white-tail deer, which will only be alarmed when it distinguishes motion, sound, or scent.

Each year several hunters return from fall outings via hearse. Many others return with a load of bird shot or a rifle bullet to be dug out by a doctor. Behind almost every hunting accident is one cause: carelessness.

Never cross over or through a fence or climb a tree with a loaded gun. It might fall and discharge. Don't shoot at a hard, flat surface. Glancing bullets can carry long distances. Even a small bore rifle has considerable range. Know where your bullet will stop before pulling the trigger.

Keep guns away from children. Never leave a weapon unattended without unloading it. Store guns and ammunition beyond the reach of youngsters, preferably under lock and key.

Always carry a gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle if you stumble. Keep the safety catch on until ready to shoot. Be sure the barrel is clear of mud, snow or other obstructions. A clogged barrel may burst.

Leave your liquor bottle at camp, and wait until you're through with the day's hunting and the guns are unloaded to take that first drink. And don't overdo it. You want to have a clear head for the next day's hunt.

Good luck on a successful—and safe—hunt.

**Save Money On Holiday Treats**

The holiday season is upon us. This is the time of the year that we usually look forward to holiday treats and candies. However, this year home-makers are faced with sugar prices which have increased over 200 per cent says Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Extension Agent.

When serving snacks, replace sweets with nutritious snacks such as tangy cheese, crisp crackers or fresh raw fruit. Popcorn and raisins also add variety to your informal entertaining.

Serve desserts containing small amounts of sugar such as rice pudding, coffee cake, or baked apples with honey. Substitute honey, molasses, sorghum and other sirups for sugar in your favorite baked goods.

The conversion for one cup of sugar is as follows: this is more economical if you already have your honey at home, but if you have to purchase your honey this is not very economical.

Use one cup honey reducing

**Brucellosis, Again... New Regulation Proposed... Remember Beef Clubs?.. Feed Grains Dwindle**

**HARRISON, HASKELL,** Hill and Hunt Counties have joined Grayson and Leon Counties on the list facing additional brucellosis testing before shipping beef and dairy breeding cattle, according to the USDA. Grayson and Leon had previously been on the list. However, Jefferson and Navarro Counties have been restored to the modified-certified status. Brucellosis regulations are administered by the Federal and State governments. The regulations require that cattle in counties not modified-certified be tested and found free of brucellosis within the preceding 30 days before they are shipped; and the herd from which such cattle came must also have been tested and found free of disease within the past year. Texas Animal Health Commission is the cooperating Texas agency in the brucellosis program.

**ANOTHER PROPOSAL** that may, if adopted, affect Texans has been made by the USDA. It would require custom slaughterers and processors of meat and poultry to register with the USDA. Those are the slaughterers and processors who slaughter and process meat and poultry brought to them and which is for use solely by the person who brings them in and by his family. Custom operations are not required to have full-time inspection but are subject to federal sanitation and labeling requirements. The new proposal would require registration of each owner of a custom operation and each establishment he owns. Those who want to comment on the proposal should send duplicate copies to the Hearing Clerk, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250 before May 2, 1975. Copies of the proposal may be obtained by writing APHIS, Room 1166-S, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250.

**OLDTIMERS** can recall that beef clubs used to be common in rural communities. Several families would form the club and would take turns each month in butchering a calf or other animal. The meat would then be divided among the family members. The Texas Department of Agriculture used to be active in helping organize beef clubs, or Baby Beef Clubs. This was in the early days of TDA. (It came into existence in 1907.) And Baby Beef Clubs fitted in with the Farmers' Institutes program which used to be a responsibility of TDA. However, that was in the days before refrigerators and deep freezers, when it was difficult to save meat more than a few days in the summer time. There would be a greater food shortage today if it were not for refrigerators and deep freezers, and, probably, there would be less cattle stealing today if there were no deep freezers.

the liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of honey used. If you prefer to use molasses or sorghum for 1 cup of sugar, use 1 1/2 cups molasses or sorghum and reduce the liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of molasses or sorghum used. Two cups of corn sirup, which is the most economical, can be substituted for 1 cup of sugar if the liquid is reduced to 1/4 for each cup of corn sirup used.

To insure a quality product, about half of the sugar should be retained in the recipe and sirup substituted for the other half.

Add sugar to fruits or sauces at the end of the cooking period, thus using less sugar to get the same amount of sweetness.

Learn to appreciate the natural flavor of foods such as coffee, cereals and fruit instead of using excesses of sugar which changes the flavor.

Use jellies, jams and preserves, gingerbread or molasses cookies for desserts in lieu of rich cakes and pies. Learn to appreciate the characteristic flavor of honey, sorghum and maple sirup.

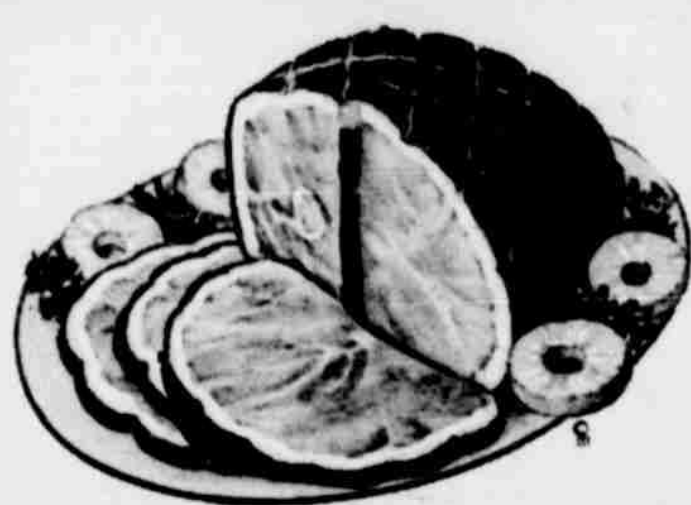
