

her Date Nut Pie recipe with us.



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

PJC LVN Program **Accepting Applications**

school diploma or GED prior to admission, and be at the test center at the scheduled time to be eligible for



What Are American Children Eating?

Although two recent studies showed that there is room for improvement in the diets of American children, drastic changes are not necessary to achieve diets lower in

The National Health and Nutrition Examination Study II collected food intake data from 7.462 children ages 1 to 17 years. The consumptions of total fat averaged 35 to 38 percent of total caloric intake. Between 37 and 55 percent of American children consumed more than the recommended amount of total fat. Saturated fat made up a large proportion of this fat intake: 14 percent of calories across all age groups in black children and 13 percent of calories across all age groups in white children. Carbohydrate intake was lower than recommended levels. Protein intake was adequate (11 to 18 percent calories). However, between 20 and 24 percent of adolescent females had intakes below the recommended amount for protein.

Cholesterol intake per 1,000 calories was highest among children between the ages of 12 and 23 months. Cholesterol intake per 1,000 calories decreased with age and, except in black youngsters between the ages of 2 and 10 years, averaged out to be between 141 to 147 mg/1,000 calo-

The second more recent study examined the diets of children from the Woodlands, Texas. Dietary intakes of 138 children in the 5th to 12th grades were studied. On aver-

age, both girls and boys ate 35 percent of their calories in the for m of fat. Thirteen percent of total calories ingested were in the form of fat. Thirteen percent of total calories ingetsted were the form of saturated fat. The percent of carbohydrate ingested was about 50% of total calories, slightly less than the 55 percent recommended. Protein intakes were within recommended ranges (mean value was about 14 percent of calories). Cholesterol intake was lower in girls than in boys: 245 vs. 317 mg per day, reflecting a similar pattern in adults.

The intake of total dietary fat seemed to be the most important indicator of a healthy diet. Those who consumed higher levels of fat also consumed more saturated fat and cholesterol. If the diet contained less than 30 percent of calories from fat, it was much more likely to have less than 10 percent of calories from saturated fat, greater than 8 percent of calories from polyunsaturated fat, and less than 300 mg cholesterol per day. Distribution of fatty acids was similar at all levels of total fat intake, with about 1/3 of total fat as saturated fat.

These two studies show that the typical high fat diet eaten by American children can be improved by focusing on reducing fats.

This can be achieved by limiting rich desserts, high fat spreads and snack foods and by increasing fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and by encouraging the consumption of lowcalorie meats and dairy products.





Lt. Governor Bob Bullock made committee appointments and named State Senator Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleasasnt as chairman of the committee which will be in the forefront as the legislature addresses public education finance in Texas. As chairman of the Senate Education Committee, Senator Ratliff will share leadership in solving this ongoing problem with the chairman of the House Public Education Committee who is yet to be named by the Speaker. "There's not a more important job than chairing the Education Committee," Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said, "and Bill Ratliff is uniquely qualified to carry that responsibility.

Upon being named as chairman, Ratliff said, "Thelegislature has been attempting to reach a solution to the school funding crisis since 1988. I realize the difficulty of this challenge, but if Lt. Governor Bullock has enough confidence in me to ask that I chair this committee, I am willing to accept that responsibility and do my very best to help find a solution." Ratliff added, "Unfortunately, with the current budget situation, the

very best solution to school finance is one which will simply spread the pain as fairly as possible. That is not a chore I relish, but I will not shrink from the challenge.'

The Texas Supreme court has now declared three separate school funding plans unconstitutional, and the Austin trial court has declared that, if the legislature fails to adopt a constitutional plan by June 1, the court will order a cutoff of all state or county education district funding. Should such a cutoff occur, most schools in Texas would be faced with closing their doors.

Senator Bill Ratliff was re-elected in November to serve his second term in the Texas Senate. The Senate Education Committee is considered one of the most powerful committees of the legislature since it oversees both public education and higher education on the Senate side. Lt. Governor Bullock also appointed Senator Ratliff to a second term on the powerful Senate Finance Committee, the Committee on Natural Resources and the Subcommittee on

Beware Mail Fraud

warning consumers today not to fall prey to a nationwide mail order scam that is encouraging the underpayment of first-class postage. Promoters of the mail order scam are selling an information package at a cost ranging from \$5 to \$100 that describes how to mail first-class letters for 2¢, rather than the current rate of 29¢. The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date information, says Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader.

The information packages cite Title 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the 2¢ first-class rate. Inspector Strader advises that this section was eliminmated in August1970 under the Postal Reorganization Act. The current firstclass rate is 29¢ for the first ounce or

fraction of an ounce. Unfortunately, some letters bearing only a 2¢ stamp have been delivered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent scheme.

The Postal Inspection Service is This is because most mail is processed through automated equipment, and not because it is legal to mail at the 2¢ rate. Postal Inspectors investigating this scheme have filed administrative and criminal complaints against the promoters. It is our goal to protect the Postal Service from loss of revenue and to stop this fraudulent promotion, says Inspector Strader.

Postal employees have been alerted to the scam and are being instructed to check first-class mail for appropriate postage. Any mail carrying less than 29¢ will be delivered with a charge for the amount due as required by postal regulations.

Inspector Strader advises postal customers not to fall victim to this illegal scam. The penalty for mail fraud is a fine of not more than \$250,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. Postal customers who receive this package are asked to forward all the material to their local postmaster or to the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth Division, P. O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.



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
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


