Promoters of the mail order scam are selling an information package at a cost ranginformation package at a cost rang- ing from $\$ 5$ to $\$ 100$ that describes ing from $\$ 5$ to $\$ 100$ that describes how to mail first-class letters for $2 \phi$, rather than the current rate of 294 . The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date inusing inaccurate and out-of-date in- formation, says Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader. Theinformation packagescite Title The information packagescite Title 39, United States Code,Section 4253 , 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the $2 \phi$ first-class as a legal basis for the $2 ¢$ first-class rate. Inspector Strader advises that rate. Inspector was eliminmated in this section was August1970 under the Postal ReorAugust1970 under the Postal Reor- ganization Act. The current firstganization Act. The current first- class rate is $29 ¢$ for the first ounce or class rate is $29 ¢$ for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce. Unfortunately, some leters bear- ing only a $2 \phi$ stamp have been deliv ered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent scheme. <br> This is because most mail is pro essed through automatedequipment, and not because it is legal to mail at and not because it is legal to mail at the $2 \Phi$ rate. Postal Inspectors investigating this scheme have filed administrative and criminal complaints against the promoters.
