## Fatality Occurs In Haskell County

Haskell County recorded its  
 first traffic fatality of 1973 on  
 Monday night when young Rich-  
 ard Lynn Anderson, 17, died  
 about 4:15 p. m. in a Knox City  
 hospital following a one-vehicle  
 accident about 2:45 p. m. The  
 accident occurred 0.7 mile west  
 of O'Brien on FM 2229 in Has-  
 kell County.

Texas Highway Patrolman  
 James Davis investigated the  
 accident, that also critically in-  
 jured another youth, Douglas  
 Owen Frazier, 17, who was also  
 in the vehicle. Both boys live  
 in Aspermont.

The 1966 Ford Bronco pickup  
 the boys were riding in appar-  
 ently ran off the road and turned  
 over. Trailing east into O'-  
 Brien, the vehicle apparently  
 rolled over 2 1/2 times and threw  
 both passengers out.

Frazier was taken to Metho-  
 dist Hospital in Lubbock.  
 Funeral services for Ander-  
 son are pending at McCoy Fun-  
 eral Home in Aspermont.

# Bloodmobile Here Today

In the good, old summertime, unfortunately, accident and injuries don't take a holiday. And it's also an unhappy fact that while blood needs sometimes increase due to summer tragedies, blood supplies frequently decrease as regular donors go on vacation. That's why the American Red Cross urges all eligible donors to give a unit of blood during the summer months.

"Blood donors are urged to make appointments to give blood at the bloodmobile which will be on August 9 (today) from 1:30 to 6:00 before they go on vacation," said Mr. Charles Thornhill, Blood Program Chairman for Haskell.

Young people who have just reached the age of 18 might spend a few minutes of their vacations donating a unit of the 'gift of life,' he added.

"Some states will require signed parental consent forms for donors under the age of 21, but Texas and Oklahoma now have legislation which permits 18 year olds to give blood without signed forms," Mr. Thornhill added.

He emphasized that the health of the donor—as well as the needs of blood recipients—are the main concerns of the Red Cross blood program personnel. Donors may give blood only every eight weeks and no more than five times a year, he explained.

"The plasma may also be fractionated into gamma globulin, serum albumin and anti-hemophilic factor—derivatives that may be used in the treatment of a number of disorders," Mr. Thornhill added.

Blood banking, he noted has progressed from the days when blood from a donor was transfused directly into the veins of another person. Today, thanks to modern technology and medical advances, a variety of uses exist for each individual's unit of blood donated. "That's why we say giving blood saves lives," Mr. Thornhill concluded.

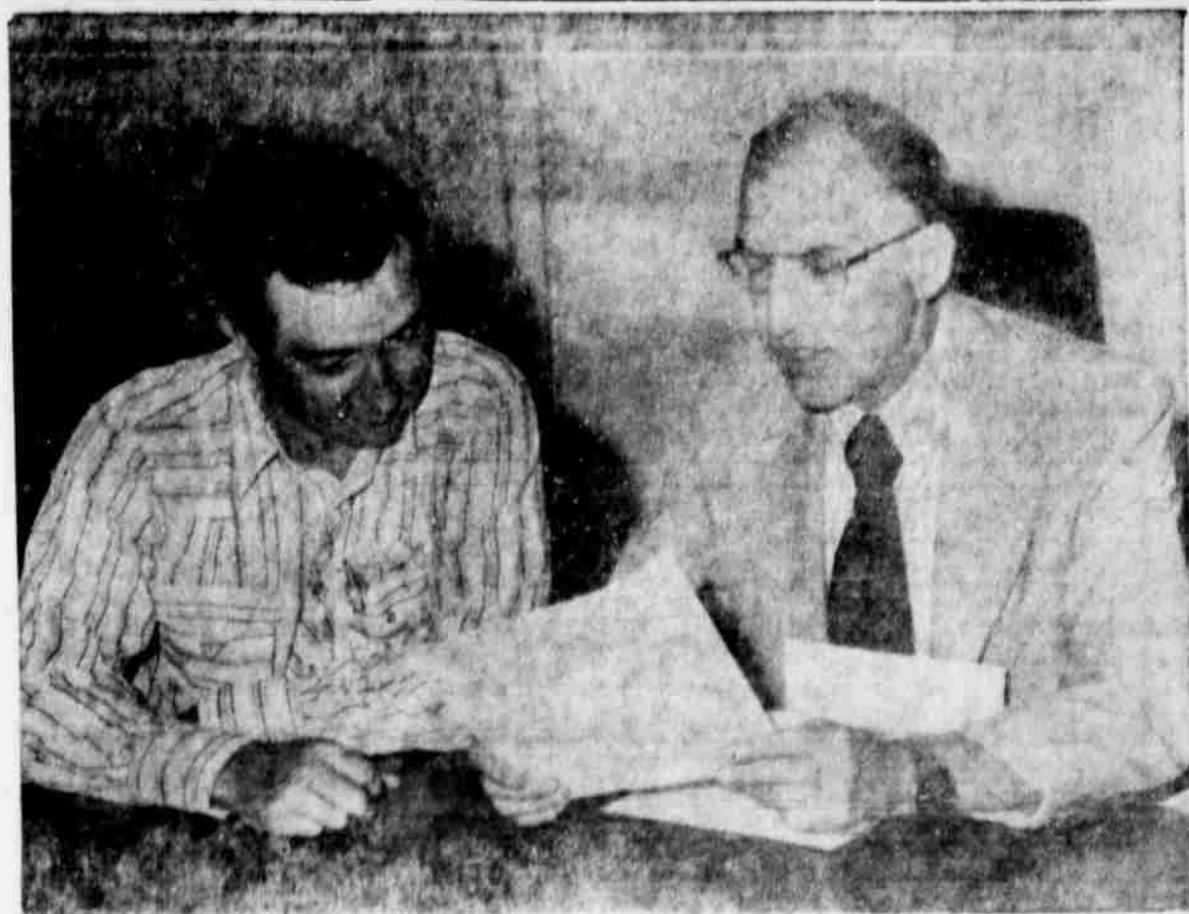

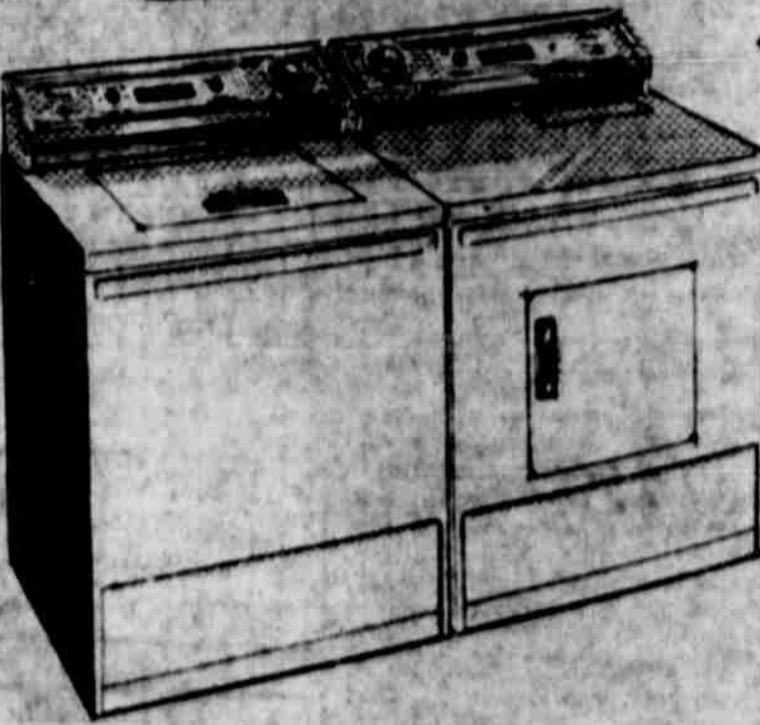

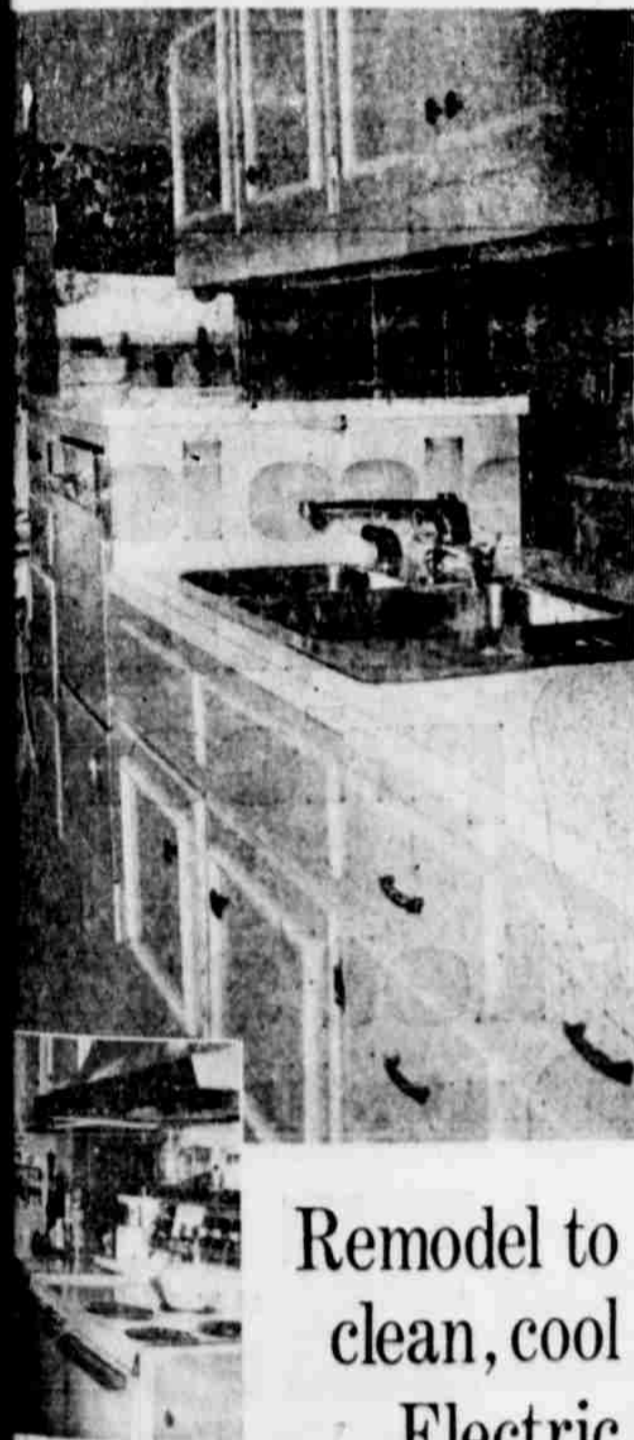

**Fed. Land Bank  
Has Increased  
Loan Interest**

Joe Harper, manager of the  
Federal Land Bank Association  
of Haskell, announced today  
that the billing rate of Federal  
Land Bank farm and ranch  
variable interest rate loans is  
being increased from 7% to  
7 3/4% effective Aug. 1, 1973. The  
rate on rural residence loans  
is being increased from 7 1/2% to  
8 1/4%. The variable interest  
rate loan plan which was intro-  
duced by the Houston Bank in  
July, 1969, lets the rate "float"  
over the variations in the money  
market.

"Continued high interest rates  
in the money market have  
made it necessary for the Bank  
to take this action. Interest  
rates have risen rapidly since  
early 1973 and the Bank has  
delayed action until this time in  
order to determine whether or  
not these rate increases were  
temporary," Harper stated. The  
Bank recently marketed an issue  
of bonds which sold at an av-  
erage effective cost of 7.0%. "It  
now appears that present inter-  
est levels will probably not  
change materially until the end  
of the year," Harper stated.

## "Watered Down" Farm Bill Loses Texas Farmers Union Support

Texas Farmers Union Presi-  
dent Jay Naman of Waco told  
a farm audience at Haskell  
Monday night that in spite of  
all the work that Farmers Union  
had done to pass a good farm  
bill, the new farm program was  
so "watered down" by action  
of the Senate-House conference  
committee that Farmers Union  
opposed the conference report  
and called on members of the  
House to reject it.

"We hope that President  
Nixon will veto the new farm  
bill because it is inadequate in  
terms of price assurances to  
farmers and lacks the escalator

clause which we considered the heart  
and soul of the new program

clause' that was in the House  
version and insisted upon by  
Secretary Butz. This clause

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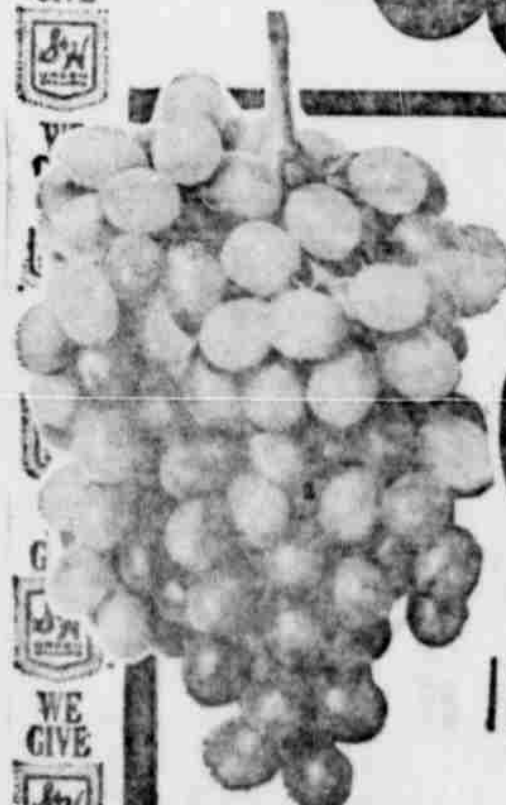

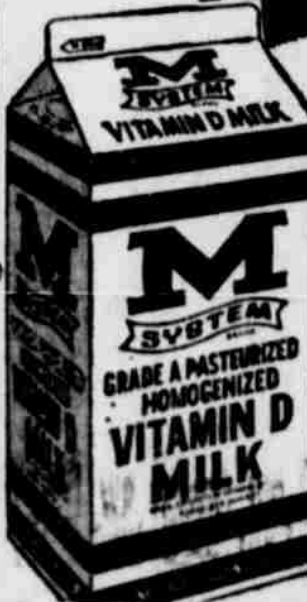
