On the May 1 ballot, the equalizafion amendment will be worded as follows: "The constitutional amend ment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schols, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placcounty education districts, and plac- ing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."
