Recommendations Made On Brooks Banking Case

An administrative law judge has recommended to the Controller of the Currency that Preston J. Brooks, former Chairman of the Board and President of the First National Bank Just how often does one see a price of Deport, be assessed a civil penalty of \$3,500 for technical violations of banking regulations, much less than the \$25,000 sought by the Office of

the Controller of the Currency. Judge Arthur L. Shipe also found that there were no grounds from prohibiting Brooks from continuing to participate in banking and recom-

mended that the action be dismissed. Questions also had been raised

eration of a real estate business through the bank and wire transfers of money, with the judge finding that Brooks had acted in good faith on each.

Shipe stated in his lengthy report that "it is also my opinion, after having personally viewed all the evidence, that the gravity of the violations is substantially less than originally alleged. When further considered with the fact that one of the violations is not supported by the evidence of records, and further, the Respondent has demonstrated what I consider exceptional good faith, particularly with respect to his complete candor in admitting his mistakes, I recommend assessment of

the following penalties..." Those penalties are for two banking rule violations, one with a fine

of \$1,000 and the other with a fine of \$2,500. The judge also stated that "By reason of these violations and practices the First National Bank of

Deport has suffered some financial loss and Respondent Brooks has received some financial gain." Shipe declared that he did not be-

Effort Made To Keep Six District Offices Open

State Representatives Barry Telford, D-DeKalb, and L.P. (Pete) Patterson, D-Brookston, are joining together in an effort to maintain six Texas Department of Transportation district offices, including offices in Atlanta, and Paris, scheduled for closure this summer. They have sponsored HB 195 which will keep in place the current 24 TDOT districts. The closing of these offices won't save the state money considering the logistics involved in maintaining our highway system," Rep. Patterson said.

During the first special session of the 72nd Legislature, a comprehensive bill was passed merging the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Department of Aviation to create the

Texas Department of Transportation. A provision in that legislation reduced the number of TDOT district offices from 24 to 18. The passage of this legislation stemmed from State Comptroller John Sharp's "Breaking the Mold" report which called for the restructuring of state government in an effort to reduce state spending. Realizing the effect of the district office closures, Representative Patterson, supported by other rural legislators, passed a resolution in a subsequent special session which directed the Transportation Commission to postpone the closings until

June 1, 1993. Rep. Patterson said, "I'm confident this legislation will pass during this regular session."

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



CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION

MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas

The proposed amendment will appear

Constitution

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing


the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

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



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Sorting Fact From Fiction:

The School Finance Amendments

In roughly 60 days Texans will go to the polls to vote on a series of proposed constitutional amendments that could change the ways Texas finances its public schools. Understanding what those amendments entail, what they do and don't do, is key to explaining the proposed amendments to the public. The following are some commonly asked questions about the proposed constitutional amendments and the May 1

What will Texans be voting on on May 1?

In addition to local elections and the U.S. Senate race, Texans will be asked on May 1 to vote on three separate propositions to amend the state constitution. All three relate to school finance and public education: 1(equalizing school finance; 2) funding for future state mandates; and 3) financing school facilities.

At press time, the Secretary of State's Office had yet to assign specific proposition numbers to the three proposals.

How will the 'equalization' proposition be worded?

The most publicized proposed amendment is the "equalization" or "recapture": proposition passed by the Texas House and Senate in mid-February as SJR 7.

On the May 1 ballot, the equalization amendment will be worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schols, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

What does the equalization propo-

The proposed amendment allows the state to do the following:

amound of funds from property wealthy school districts and redistribute those funds to property poor school districts to help equalize school district funding. The proposition allows the state to redistribute property tax funds directly on a statewide level, through the county education districts (CED's), or by some combination of the two. How the state chooses to redistribute funds will be determined by the enabling legislation, or school finance bill, which is currently under consideration by the Legislature.

Limits the total amount of school district dollars that can be redistributed to 2.75% of total state and local revenue in the public education system. Currently, total public education revenue is about \$15 billion. Under this scenario, the proposition would limit the amount the state can redistribute to 2.75% of that \$15 billion, or about \$410 million statewide. Currently, CED's are redistributing a total of about \$340 million.

Allows the Legislature to set a minimum tax rate or "Local Fund Assignment (LFA)." The proposition caps the rate the Legislature can set a \$1 per \$100 of valuation, unless a higher rate is approved by local voters. Currently, the LFA is set at 82 cents through the CED's, but that was scheduled to increase to \$1 in 1994-95 under SB 351.

Leaves the Available School Fund (ASF) alone, guarantee that property wealthy school districts will continue to receive their per capita distribution. The proposition prohibits changing the way the ASF currently is distributed.

Does this proposition repeal the prohibition against a state property

No. The proposition does not repeal the constitutional prohibitions

on a state property tax statewide appraisal of property. Does the equalization amendment

simply legalize CED's? No. The proposition does not ratify CED's. Rather, it allows the state to redistribute funds through CED's, on a statewide level, or by a combination of the two, whichever structure the Legislature determines is best. The enabling legislation, or school finance bill, will detail exactly how school district funds are to be redistributed.

How will passage of the equalization amendment affect my school district and the amount of funds we

Unknown. Until the Legislature passes a school finance bill (enabling legislation) to accompany the proposition and a state budget that shows how much additional state funding schools will receive, school districts can't tell exactly how they will be affected by the proposition.

As a general rule, school districts that currently are being recaptured through CED's would continue to have a portion of their local tax dollars subject to some form of redistri-

If a school district is abov ethe95th percentile of wealth, they will be subject to recapture.


Does the proposition require local voter approval of school district tax

No. During House floor debate on SJR 7 (the purpose equalization amendment), some lawmakers attempted to amend the resolution to 1) require local voter approval of school district tax rate increases, 2) create a publicly funded school voucher program, and 3) limit judicial review of school funding lawsuits. The House defeated all three measures, and none are included in the proposition.

It all started on February 14th when Crime Prevention Officer Robert (Bob) Newton, a Deputy for Delta County Sheriff's Department caught two thirteen year old juveniles "ripping off" a soft drink machine.

Newton, a Detroit resident, told the kids they could go to jail or joining the county's Junior Deputy pro-

According to Deputy Newton the first meeting of this Junior Deputy Program consisted of just those two youngster.

The next meeting seventeen youngsters appeared for the acitivities, and by the third meeting 28 kids showed up. At the fourth meeting the total was up to a whopping 49 young-

The whole concept is Officer Newton's idea, and has had an overwhelming response.

Newton says that he plans to convert as many of these kids as possible from "crime to college"

What goes on at these meetings? The junior deputies of Delta County use the third floor of the old jail to be used by them. It is being equipped with gym equipment, a boxing ring, wrestling mats and other like equip-

The youngsters will be taught gen-

eral law enforcement in classes and hands on training in self defense. They will be taught to respect others, other people's religious preference, their race and way of life.

These Junior Deputies will be issued a badge, a name plate and official I.D. with photo. The youngster and his parents will sign an agreement, and be issued the Texas Lawman Code of Conduct and Code of Ethics. They

will not, of course, carry a weapon. County Deputy Craig Betterton will assist Newton in the program.

Both Newton and Betterton are former deputies for Red River County. Funding for this program will come from local donations.

Newton has spoken with Governor Ann Richards' office about obtaining Grant Money for the program, and efforts are underway to secure grant money for the program if at all pos-

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

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


