City Council Hears Report On Sewer Lines, Canvasses Election Votes

The Deport City Council met in regular session Monday night, May 10.

The first order of business was to canvass the votes from the City Council election on May 1.

The official results were: Dana Norman 47; John L. Roach 45; Nancy Gresham 48; Pat Guest 1 write-in.

Mayor Charles Foster swore in the newly elected council members. The highlight of the meeting came with a report from Michael J. Donnan, Project Manager for Hayter Engineering Inc., who have been surveying the sewer systems in the City of Deport since the eruption of the sewer line located just off Church Street on April 30, 1993.

The clay sewer line was installed at the same time as the rest of the sewer lines in the City in 1936.

Donnan advised the Council that the clay pipe line installed in 1936 were designed to last approximately

20 years, and with ground shifting over the years, all the remaining old pipe will be brittle and cracked to the point of eruption at anytime, just like the one that erupted in April.

Donnan advised the Council to make arrangements to replace all the old sewer lines in the City. The estimated cost of the project would amount to approximately \$425,000.00.

The proposed project would replace sewer lines on Church Street, College Street, Depot Street, Kelsey Street, Beville Street, South College Street and part of Jeffus Street, part of Monroe Street and part of Fourth Street.

Since a portion of the lines in the City have been replaced, these streets would finish replacing the city lines.

The \$425,000.00 bill would include repaving the streets that would be turned on to replacing the sewer lines.

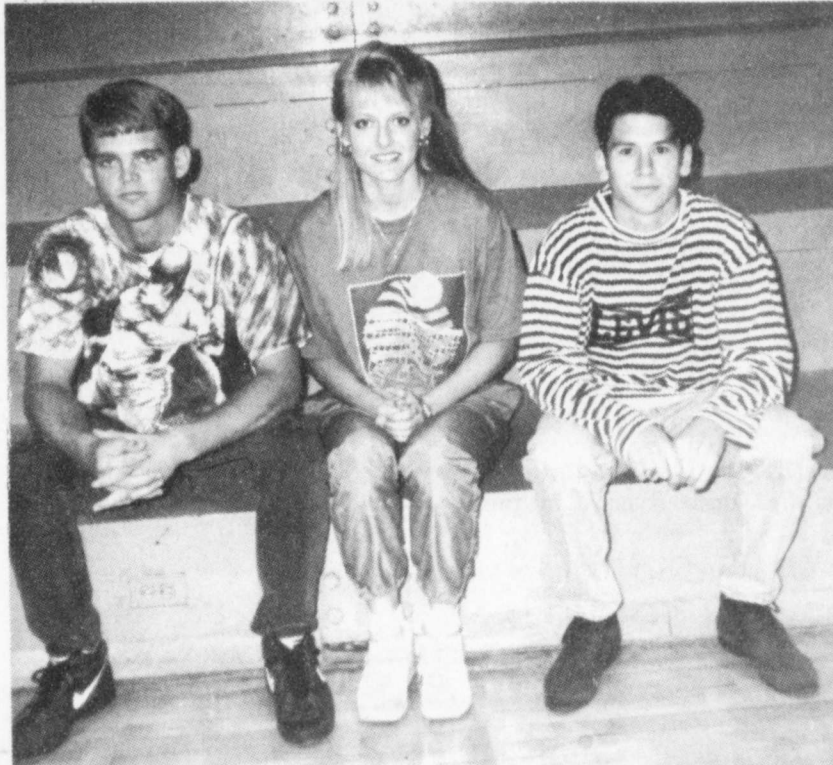
The City Council decided to seek advise from a professional financial advisor and a special meeting was set for Thursday, May 20 at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

This financial advisor can explain various means for the City to finance such a project.

In other business, the Council discussed sending letters to individuals within the City Limits who need to clean up their property.

Discussion was held on a workshop for council members. A proposal by the Ball League was discussed, to build three baseball fields on property owned by the City, located off the Tom Jeffus Reservoir. No action was taken.

The Council discussed a workshop that Mayor Foster, secretary Sharon Francis and council person Nancy Gresham attended last week in Mt. Pleasant.



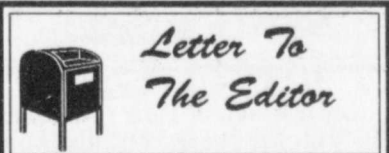
ALL AROUND athletes at Prairiland for the 1992-93 school year are Chad Whitley, Co-All

All coaches and parents are urged to turn out as promptly as possible as there will be several people on hand to take pictures, names and money to help speed the process.

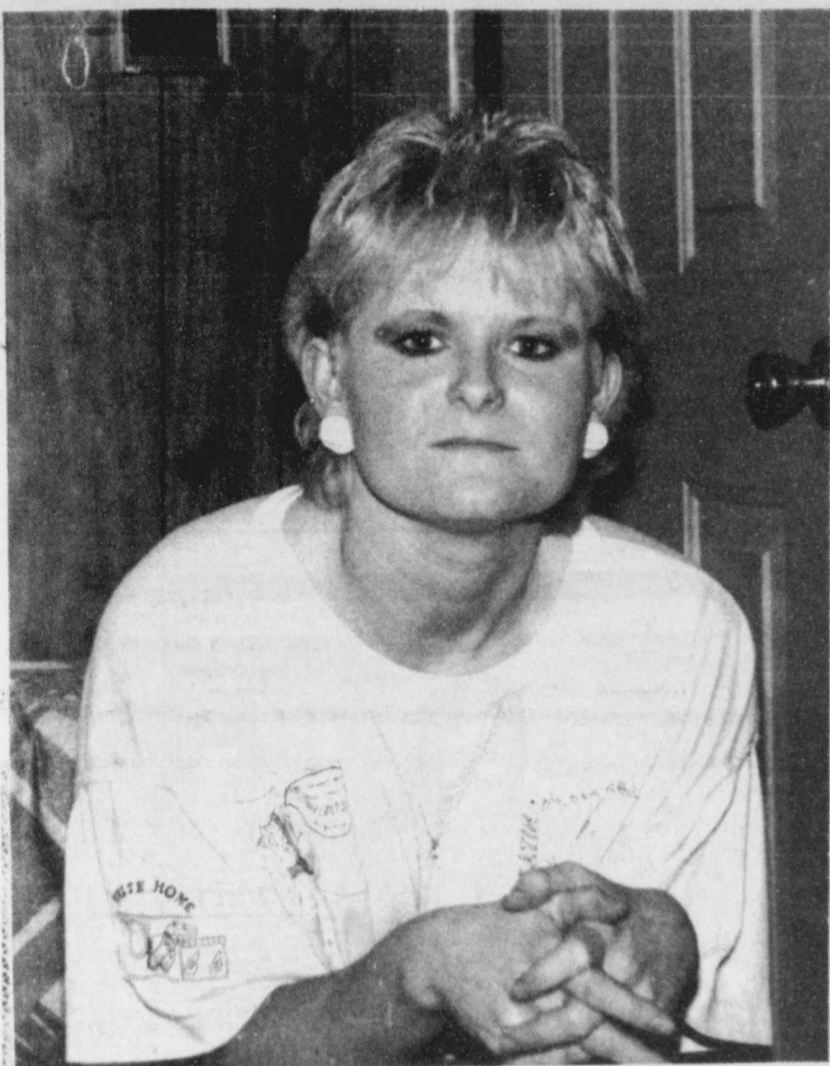

Hot Cocoa Mix
Sandy Patterson
1 (16 oz.) pkg. instant cocoa mix
1 (25 oz.) box powdered milk
1 box powdered sugar
1 (12 oz.) jar coffee-mate or cremora Mix in large container. Use 2 tablespoons per cup of hot water. Also add 1 tablespoon sugar per cup. Store in airtight container.

Ice Box Cookies
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
1/2 cup melted shortening
3 eggs well beaten
4 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp salt
2 tsp soda
1/2 tsp nutmeg
1/2 tsp cloves
1 cup chopped nuts
Cream shortening with sugar. Add eggs slowly, mixing thoroughly. Add nuts, then dry ingredients, sifted twice. Make into rolls 2 inches across, 6 or 7 inches long. Wrap in waxed paper and leave in refrigerator overnight. Slice 1/4 inch thick with sharp knife and bake in hot oven 10 minutes at 350 to 400 degrees. This amount should make 4 rolls and if wrapped with care will keep for ten days.

Peanut Brittle Candy
1 cup of white sugar
1/2 cup of water
2 cups of raw peanuts

1 cup of white Karo syrup
Cook sugar, water, and Karo until hard balls form in cold water. Add peanuts and continue to cook until golden brown. Remove from heat. Add 1 teaspoon of soda, 1 Tablespoon of butter, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. While still foaming, pour onto a well buttered cookie sheet. When cool, turn upside down and tap the bottom of the cookie sheet. Break into desired pieces.

Bob Gower's Cabbage Soup
1 medium head cabbage
6-8 medium potatoes
1 cup cooked ham, cubed
salt, pepper, & garlic salt to taste
Tobasco sauce
Quarter, then separate cabbage. Put into large pot, cover with water. Add salt, pepper, and garlic; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Keep cabbage covered with water. Do not drain. During last 1/2 hour of cabbage cooking, peel and cube potatoes. Cook just as you would for mashed potatoes. Cook 6-8 minutes. Add ham. Continue to cook until potatoes are done. Add potatoes, ham and water to cabbage. Cook 30 to 40 minutes longer. Cool slightly. Serve warm or store and serve the next day. Makes 3 quarts.

Fees for the sessions are \$50 for 3 days, \$105 for one week, \$150 for two weeks, and \$200 for the CIT course. A \$20 fee will be added to the above fees for non-Girl Scouts and members from other councils.

Currently all sessions have openings, but are filling up quickly. Several staff positions are also available, including health supervisor/nurse, waterfront staff, boating director and cook.
