Of course, lightning bugs couldn't sting...but they had to be chased down in the dark, which meant if one wasn't careful the hunt could takea child into the "monster" filled blackness away from Mom and Dad and the safety of the house!

A jar full of the flickering bugs cast a fascinating glow over childish hands and faces.

The jar full of bees made an intriguing buzzing sound.

Of course, it became more and more difficult as the jar became fuller. Each time the jar lid was raised several bees or bugs would escape unless the catcher moved swiftly and accurately to capture the next victim!

Wheter it was bees or lightning bugs, chasing around the yard in erratic patterns in pursuit of the elusive little fellows was a whole world of entertainment. Being a soft hearted youngster I always turned my "prey" loose at the end of the day.


