Whether it was bees or lightning bugs, chasing around the yard in erratic patterns in pursuit of the elusive little fellows was a whole world of entertainment.

Being a soft hearted youngster I always turned my "prey" loose at the end of the day.

I know from talking with other people that not all kids were so considerate...many left their bug collection until the poor things died.

All in all, of course, the insects uncaught outnumbered the insects caught by enormous amounts, and no serious population decline ever occurred.

It was nice to see the youngster in his yard with his little jar, though.

In today's Nintendo and TV oriented world-in a time when organized sports take on awesome proportions, it was nice to see evidence that the fine childhood art of bug catching hasn't suffered a serious setback!
