Denison Announces For JP- Pct. 1

Don Denison has announced that he has filed as a candidate for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1, Lamar County.

Denison cites his desire to help people and his interest law enforcement as major reasons for seeking the position.

Denison and his wife, Sherry, live in Deport with their two daughters, Shanna, age 16 and Kandace, age 8. They attend the First Baptist Church of Deport.

He is employed by Kimberly Clark in Paris as team leader in Materials Handling. He has been there for ten years.

Denison says that he has a lot of experience with many aspects of the JP job, since he has spent sixteen years on the Deport Volunteer Fire Department, and has served seven

years as Fire Marshal and Three years as Assistant Fire Chief. This has put in a position to help others, from fire victims to wrecks and accidents of all types.

"I've worked with a number of Lamar County Law Enforcement Officials and members of the State Fire Marshall's Office and Texas Railroad Commission Investigators as Fire Marshall," Denison states.

"I've also attended two Fire Investigation Schools and if elected as Justice of the Peace will go for my training in Austin as quickly as possible."

"I just want to help people, especially young people or the elderly. I'd like to be able to work with a juvenile who has committed a minor offense and see if we couldn't make sure he didn't end up back in court with a

larger offense."

Denison has also served as the representative for the Fire Department on the Deport Ball Association, and is involved in the annual Deport Chili Cookoff, which is a major fund raiser for the fire department and the Deport American Legion. He serves as a liaison between the CASI (Chili Appreciation Society International) Cooks and the Deport group.

"If I am elected I want to be an active JP, not someone who is just drawing a check. I feel that I will be able to perform the duties of this office and work at Kimberly Clark without much conflict. The position does not demand set hours, but that you be called out at all hours of the day and night. I will be happy to volunteer as much time as possible to improve the way the office functions and to help anyone whom I can."

Volunteer Firemen's Wives Deserve Recognition, Too!

Much is written about the good work and outstanding dedication of Volunteer Firefighters. And, every word of praise they get they deserve and more. But there is another volunteer group that needs praise too-and that group is made up of the wives and mothers of those firefighters.

I am a volunteer fireman's wife, but I'm much luckier than most. I go to fires, wrecks, deaths and emergencies of all kinds because of the newspapers. That means I get to stay and watch these men in action. And, for me at least, knowing what is going on is much better than wondering what is going on.

I see, under these circumstances things that are tragic and terrible. But I'm still much luckier than those wives who are at home or at work while their husbands are performing their duties as a volunteer.

If it is night these women wake when their husbands do, and listen as they scramble into clothes and head out the door. Then, they must worry and wonder until their spouse is safely home again. Hours pass, and they have no way of knowing exactly what is happening. Is their loved one

safe? Will he be out all night? What is he having to do? Will he be home in time to go to work?

Day or night, these women worry until they have their fireman home safely. They know that he may have been inside a burning building, standing in the middle of a highway directing traffic around a wreck or freezing in an ice storm clearing downed timber. They know he may have provided comfort to those suffering a loss, done CPR on a heart attack victim, or crawled though an attic looking for a mysterious source of smoke.

Volunteer firemen's wives are prepared to see him depart in the middle of a kid's birthday party, during meals, or when they were painting the house together!

And, there is much more to their job as a volunteer fireman's wife.

Laundry can be quite a challenge when the clothes to be laundered have been soaked with smokey water, stained with ground-in dirt and soot, and smell of burnt shingles or electrical wiring! The clothing bill for a volunteer fireman can get pretty steep, since they frequently don't have time to seek out and put on "old" clothing.

And, carpets sometimes require rigorous spot cleaning after a sooty footprint finds its way onto the carpet.

These women know to never plan anything or need help around the house on fire meeting nights. That means at least two nights out of every month.

They know that when funds are needed they will be called upon to bake cakes and pies for auctions, provide sandwiches or chili and stew for meals, then work hard at these events serving, cleaning, taking tickets or conducting games and events.

Volunteer Firemen's wives are patient, understanding women. They spend more time wondering, worrying and waiting than most women do.

And, like the firemen they love, they are prepared to do it without complaint, knowing that at any time it could be their home ablaze, their child in an accident, their family in need of help.

And, like the firemen, they are deserving of respect and praise for the patience they show. For it is true that "they also serve who sit and wait".

Country Cooking

I received an invitation to enter a recipe in a contest recently. I've never had the nerve to do that because I have always been afraid I would leave out an ingredient, or that someone would make my recipe and it wouldn't taste right. I also would want to win. I'm not really a great loser. Anyway, I did not enter the contest, but I learned a couple of interesting things in the instructions they gave and in the advice they were giving to prospective contestants. They said the obvious things such as make the recipe and write down the ingredients in the order they are used. Always put in the can size, weight, brand name (if essential to the quality of the recipe), whether or not to have ingredients at room temperature, melted, softened, chopped, drained, sliced, sifted, packed, and such things. They also had some tips to help you be a better contestant. I'll share a few of them with you. *Read and re-read the entry form. *Type or clearly print a detailed version of your recipe, with instructions for all steps. Detail even the most obvious directions, such as specific equipment to use and how to test for doneness.*

Create a catchy title to attract judges' attention * Be sure your recipe showcases the sponsor's main ingredient. If the contest is sponsored by the chicken industry, you wouldn't want your main ingredient to be pork chops. * Ask a friend to prepare your recipe at home. See if it comes out as well from another kitchen. * Keep today's trends in mind (convenience, nutrition, ethnic style meals, etc). Use basic preparation methods and common ingredients that are readily available and suitable for amateur cooks. * Use simple garnishes. They should be able to stand at least 30 minutes at room temperature. * Keep trying.

1 1/2 cups Mexican Velveta
1 cup chopped chicken
1/2 cup picante sauce
1/2 cup chopped green peppers
1/2 cup chopped tomato
1/4 cup pitted ripe olive slices
Preheat oven to 350. Place tortillas on cookie sheet and sprinkle 2 Tbsps. cheese on each. Bake about 4 minutes until cheese is melted. Toss chicken with picante, and spread on tortillas. Top with remaining cheese. Bake 7 minutes or so, or until thoroughly heated. Top with remaining ingredients.

8 rye bread slices
2 (6 oz) pkgs. Corned Beef Slices
1 (8 oz) can saurkraut, drained
8 Velveta Slices
1/4 cup thousand Island or Horseradish
Cover 4 bread slices with (per slice) 1 1/2 oz. meat, 1/4 cup saurkraut, 1 1/2 oz. meat, 2 slices cheese, 1 Tbsp sauce and second bread slice. Spread

sandwich with margarine. Grill lightly until browned on both sides.

Peach Cream Pie

2 envelopes Dream Whip
1 1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 8 ounce pkg cream cheese
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 baked pie shells
1 21 ounce can peach pie filling
Prepare topping. Set aside. Cream sugar and cream cheese until light and fluffy. Fold into whipped topping. Divide into half. Sprinkle pecans on bottom of each pie shell and top each with half of the filling. Spread peaches evenly over filling. Chill several hours.

Cranberry Salad

2 pkg. 3 oz. cream cheese
2 T. sugar
2 T Mayonnaise
16 oz. can whole berry cranberry sauce
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
1 medium cool whip slightly thawed
1 cup nuts
Blend sugar and mayonnaise into softened cream cheese. Add cranberry sauce and pineapple- fold in cool whip. Chill.
