Work on the new 48-inmate facility adjacent to the Lamar County Jail is moving along at a fast pace. Just a matter of days ago, there wasn't even a survey stake to be seen at the site. The \$190,000.00 facility is projected to be up and operating by June 1, 1994.

According to Chief Deputy J.D. Clark, Sheriff McCoy was notified by State officials in April about the possibility of building the facility in Lamar County.

Sheriff McCoy addressed the Com-

missioners Court on the subject as soon as the court got together and the project was approved.

The State pays for the \$190,000.00 facility and it is used to house first time offenders, or non-violent criminals. This will relieve some overcrowding problems created by Lamar County Jail holding T.D.C. prison-

Clark stated that after September 1, the new facility will become the property of Lamar County to use as the County chooses.



Jeremy Day (3-2), went the distance on the mound for the Pats, striking out 7, walking 4, and surrendering 4 hits.


Thursday's game saw Prairiland travel to Honey Grove to take on the Warriors. Prairiland saw the Warriors take a



This one is common throughout the nation, and has happened numerous times right here in this area.






