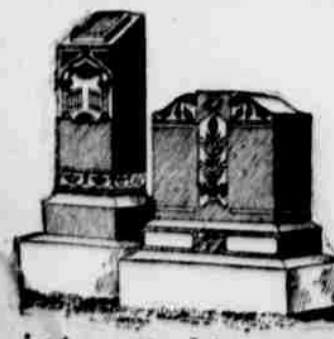

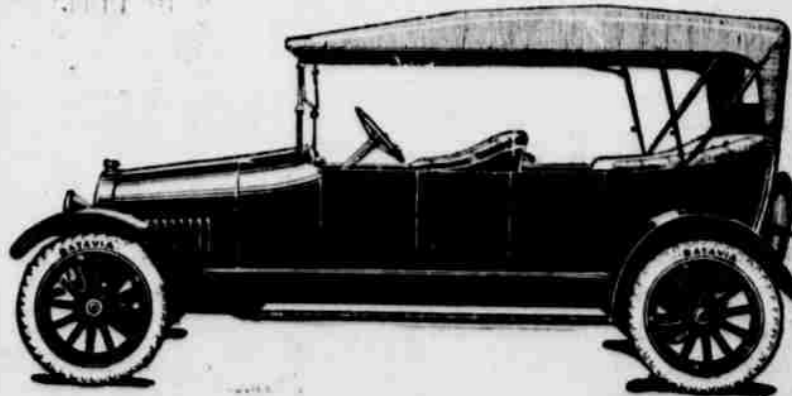

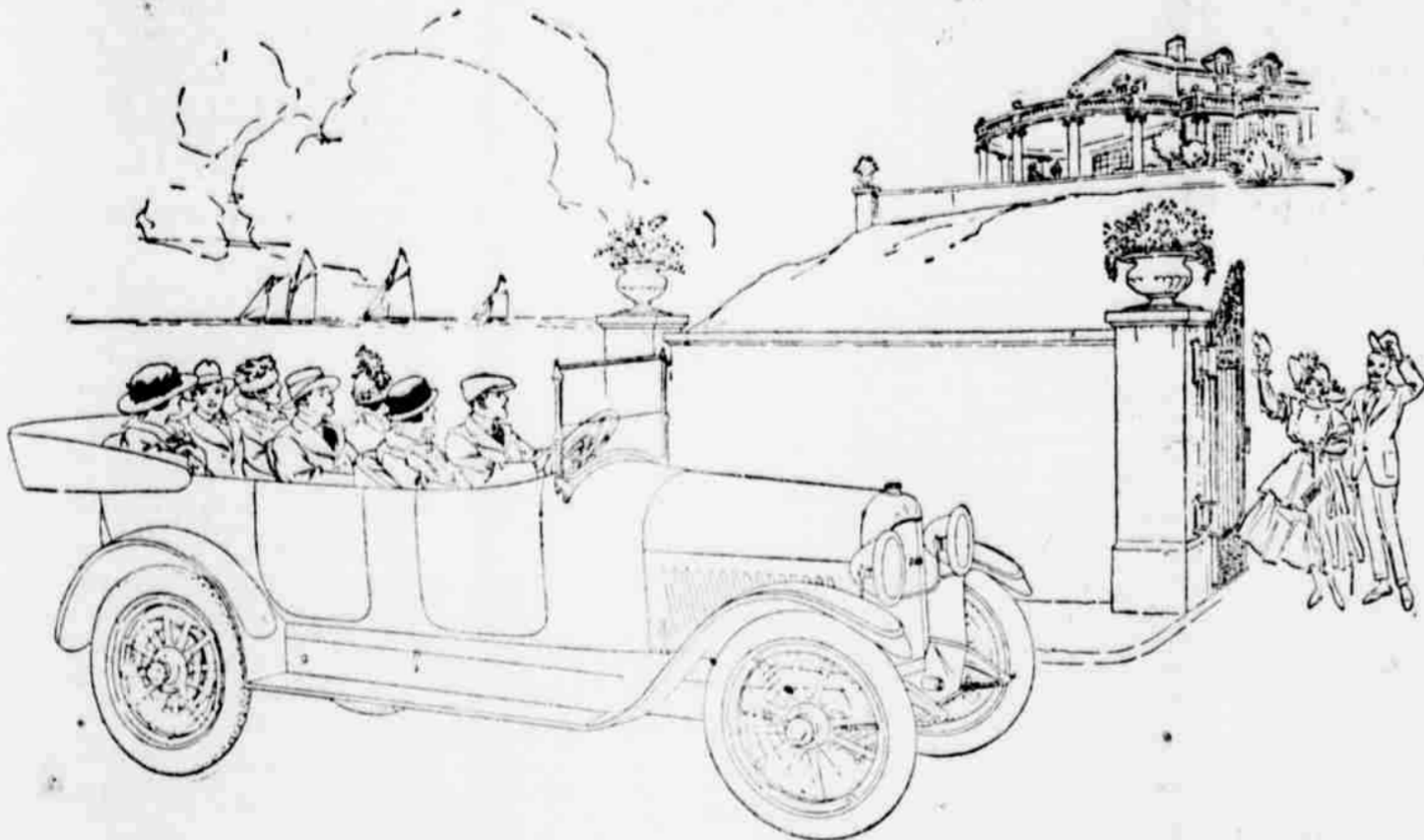

Haskell County School Items

The School Board at Rule has provided one of the best schools for the town of Rule this year that it has ever had. Supt. W. H. Yarbrough has been re-elected and the Board is planning to have even a better school another year. The people of Rule are demanding that the school be maintained for nine months.

Rochester School Board has elected H. O. Childress as principal of the Rochester school. The Board has ordered an election for the purpose of issuing bonds to make additions to the school building. Rochester school has between 400 and 500 scholars and is one of the largest schools in the county. The people of Rochester will be satisfied in the future with nothing less than 9 or 9 months schools.

Perhaps O'Brien school made greater improvements in providing equipment this year than any
