

### "Nuisance Suits"Undermine Small Firms, Job Creation

A San Antonio paving contractor recently was sued for an accident at an intersection where his company never worked. Even though the contractor provided pages and pages of proof that his company had done no work at the site, he was forced to go to court. He won, but only after spending \$3,000 to defend against a claim that had nothing to do with him in the first place.

Filing lawsuits is a major industry in Texas, and small businesses are frequent targets. A lawsuit can and often does deliver a mortal blow to a small company. "After all, the average cost to defend yourself in a nonautomotive personal injury lawsuit is \$7,500-- money that is lost even if you win the case.

This sad reality often prompts business owners to settle a suit, regardless of the merits. The threat of expensive litigation is little short of legal extortion.

The result is higher costs for businesses and consumers, not to mention emotional distress for the business owner's family and employees. Many business people, after enduring the agony of being sued, have gone out of business, costing work-

tax base, and sapping the economic vitality of our communities.

Ultimatelely, the cost of nuisance cases affects insurance rates -- a cost we all bear. U.S. companies pay liability insurance premiums 20 to 50 times higher than those paid by foreign firms. Excessive insurance costs resulting from nuisance suits thus impair our ability to compete successfully in world markets.

Perversely, the proliferation of nuisance suits has also made it less appealing for many small firms to carry liability insurance. Many say having insurance is the equivalent of hanging a "Sue Me" sigh on their backs.

Until the last session of the Texas Legislature, the mere fact that a retailer carried an insurance policy was sufficient basis to be included in a lawsuit over a product. Thus, a sporting goods store would find itself in a suit over boxing headgear even though its only involvement was the sale, not the manufacture, of the item.

At issue is something altogether different: When we allow the U.S. economy to become a hunting ground for junk suits looking for a target, we will have undermined one of out country's most sacred institutions-- our system of justice. Further, we will have plundered the entreprneurial spirit that is our country's economic mainstay.

38 yards for six carries, and Johnny White had 5.5 yards per carry for four carries. Quarterbacks Zach Allen and Michael Murphy passed only five


times, completing three for 44 yards and one touchdown. Head coach Rick Connot had noth-

ally well, and the offensive backs equalled that with their running."



He is the son of Jackie L. and Sandra K. Dodd of Bogata.




