Pecan Bars

Sift together:
1 cup of flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
Stir in:
1/3 cup sugar
Cut in:
1/4 cup oleo
Pat evenly in bottom of pan (12 x 8 x 2).
Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees.

Beat 2 eggs and add 3/4 cup white syrup, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla and pinch of salt. Pour over partially cooked mixture. Sprinkle with 1 cup or more of pecans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes. Cut in bars while warm.

Cobbler

15-20 fajita size tortillas
peach or apple pie filling
1 stick of margarine
1-1/2 cups water
2 cups sugar
Boil the margarine, butter, water and pie filling and pour over tortillas. Let set for 30 minutes to 1 hour and cook at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

Broccoli Salad

2 bunches of broccoli
1 large purple onion
1 pound of bacon-cooked crisp
Dressing:
1 cup of Miracle Whip
1/2 cup sugar

2 tablespoons vinegar

Combine the broccoli, onion and crumble bacon on top; mix well. Set aside. Mix miracle whip, sugar and vinegar. Pour over salad mixture and let set for 30 minutes in refrigerator.

Vegetable Salad

3/4 cup vinegar
1/2 cup oil 1 tablespoon water
1 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar

Bring to a boil and set aside to cool. Mix 1 can Lesur English Peas 1 can shoe peg corn 1 bunch green onions-chopped 1 cup chopped green peppers 1 cup celery 1 small jar pimento

Mix well and let set overnight.
1/2 cup white sugar
1/2 cup clear Karo syrup
Bring to a boil for 1 minute. Add 1 cup of peanut butter and 3 cups of corn flake Stir well and drop on wax paper.

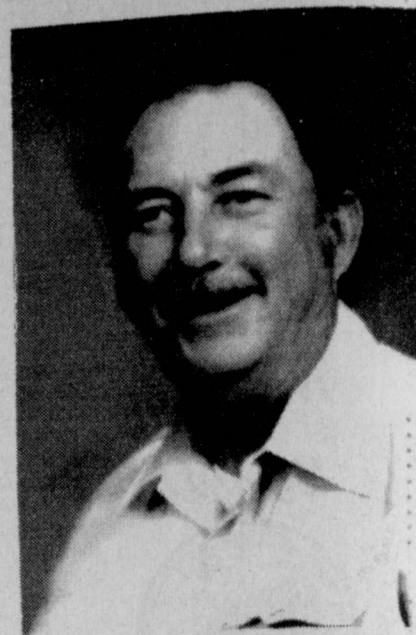
Pauline Minter Dies October 1

Lue Mantooth Dies September 30

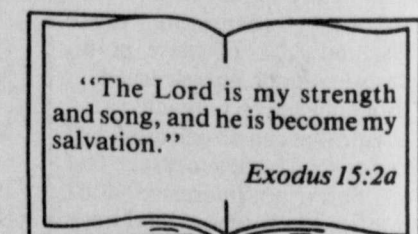
Lue Mantooth, age 58, of Irving, died September 30 in Irving Hospital in Irving.

Myrtle Ann Winn and Uvalda Landrum were married October 16, 1954 in Clarksville.

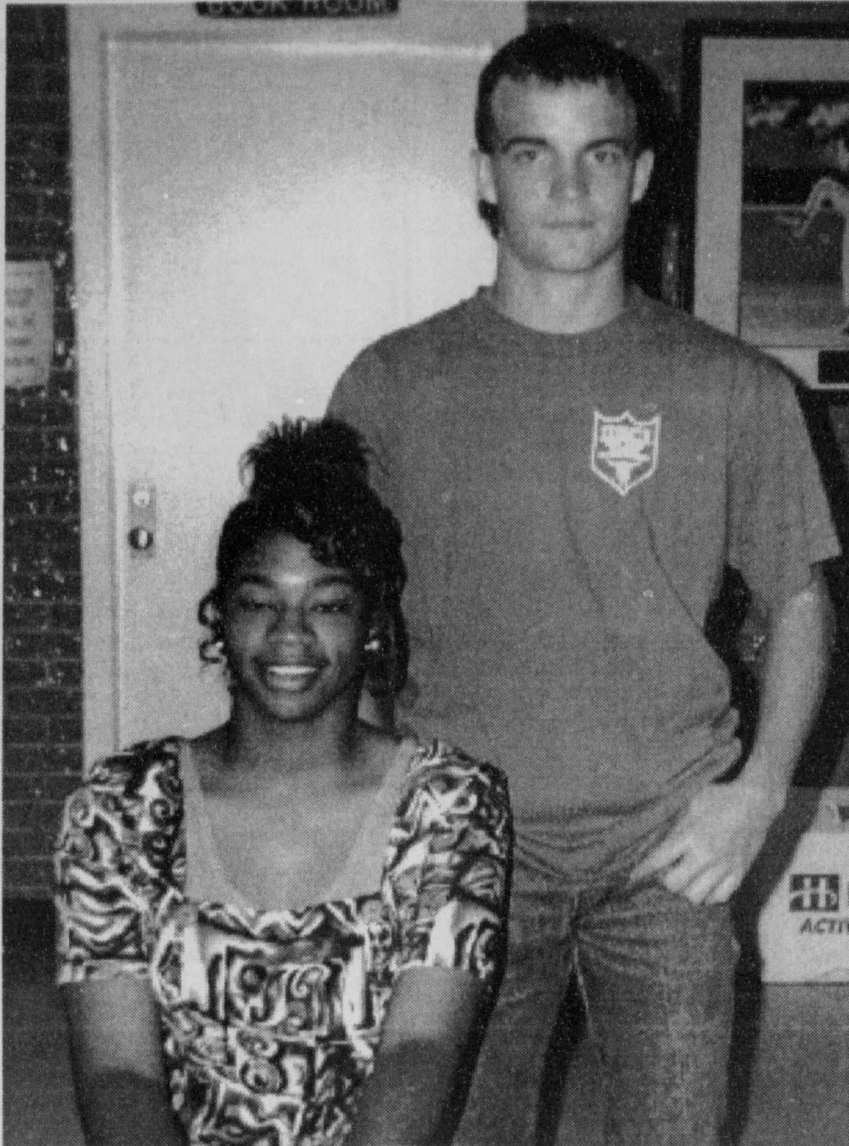

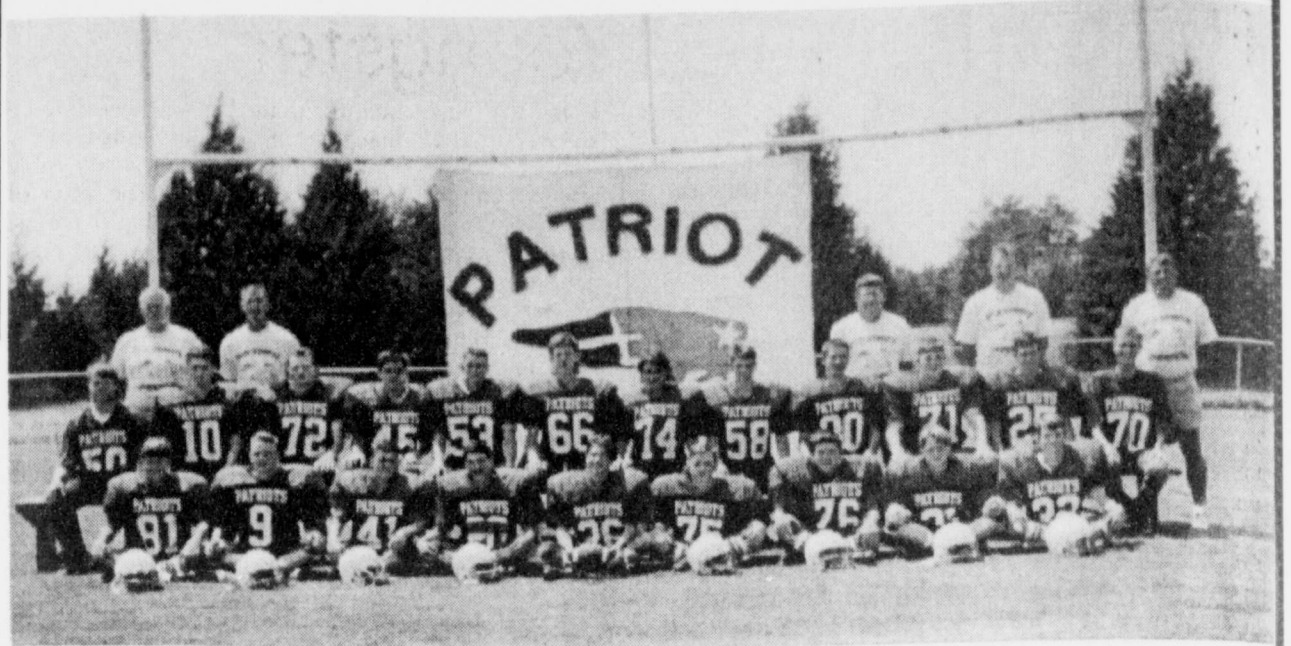
back within one touchdown.

Rodeo Dream Becomes A Reality For Area Youngster

Casey Upchurch has set his sights for the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, Nevada by the time he is 20 years old. Considering he is only 11 years old now, to some folks that seems to be a long way off. But knowing young Casey, it is going to happen!

Over the Labor Day holidays, he and his family spent several days in Ardmore, Oklahoma at the Hardy Murphy Indoor Coliseum working on the first part of that goal. He won the (Mid-South Rodeo Cowboy Association) MRCA Finals for the 10-13 year olds in bull riding. My concept in bull riding for an 11 year old was maybe a 400-500 pound steer. Not so! The steer or bull weighed

more than 900 pounds and that was around the average weight that he rode for the season. When the steers get too big for a specific age group, they are just moved up to the next age group. So, in essence, the boy and the steer grow together.

Casey is the son of Marsha and Randy Upchurch of Blossom. He is a student at Blossom in the sixth grade and maintains an "A" average. He does have other interests. He loves to hunt and fish, play basketball (he is a member of the Little Dribbler's team in Blossom), an avid baseball player and can always find a few spare minutes to play a game of Nintendo. To be a member of the MRCA, the grades are one of the first

qualifications. You see, there is more than prize money that young Casey is looking forward to. It is a possible college scholarship. The sport of rodeo has become very big in the last few years and regardless what some folks think, these kids and men, as well as the ladies, are true athletes. It takes stamina, will power and a good strong, healthy body to maintain the jars and jolts of the rodeo circuit. For you see it is not the occasional trip out of town or off to the local rodeo. It takes many weekends and many miles up and down the roads to stay on top of the circuit. Just missing one performance can cost you a place in the standings. They take the best 15 out of 20 rodeos and average the standings.

During the time that Casey was qualifying for the MRCA, he was also working on his standings in the North Texas Youth Rodeo Association when the finals will be held on the last of October in Decatur. He is currently in second place in his division with the NTYRA behind Brady Brock of Spring, Texas.

In order to qualify, a rider has to ride three head of stock and take the average of the three. By maintaining a 198 point average, Casey was named Rookie of the Year. Why rodeo, you say? Well, he comes by it honest. You see, his dad, Randy was a bull rider in high school and probably still would be riding, but was injured, so now Casey, literally, takes over the reins, or in his case the bull rope.

We talked of scholarships earlier and prize money, which can amount to several thousand dollars. Two colleges in Texas that offer top scholarship money is Tarleton State University in Stephenville and Sul Ross University in West Texas. The Mid-South is a non-profit organization and all monies go back into the association for prizes and scholarships. They give belt buckles, jackets, saddles and other prizes to the top cowboys.

For winning the MRCA, Casey won a saddle, to go with the one he won last year, a belt buckle and jacket and some prize money.

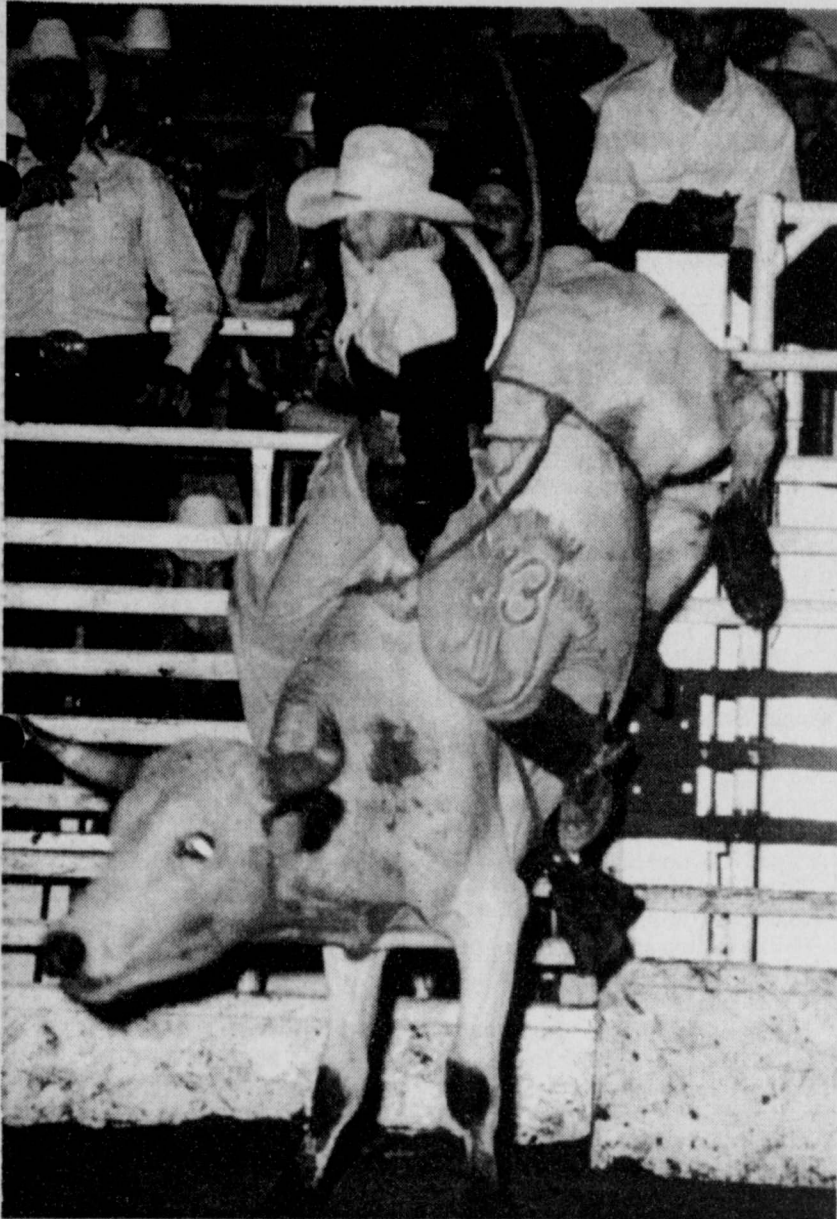
Each weekend is planned out ahead of time and the Upchurch's have made as many as three rodeos in one weekend. Riding Friday night, traveling to another sight, riding Saturday morning, loading up and riding again Saturday evening or night. This usually goes on from October to September for the MRCA and March through October for the NTYRA. So you see, dedication is one of the main stays of rodeoing.

Casey's next goal is when he reaches 15, is to be eligible to ride in the International High School Finals held each year in July in Shawnee, Oklahoma. This event is held for one week and is the elite of the high school cowboys. You must be in the top three standings from your association, maintain and have a transcript of your grade average to be eligible to compete.

How expensive is it you ask? A lot depends on how you define expensive. Is expensive, the quality time that a father and son spend together as they travel up and down the road as a team pursuing goals and dreams that they have set together?

Nichols Family Holds Reunion

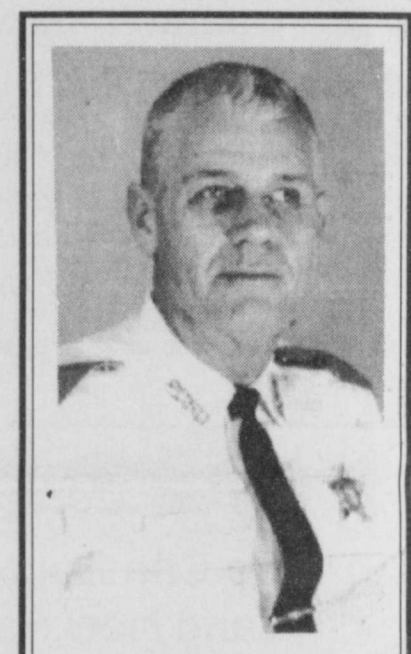
The family of Mae Nichols of Deport held a reunion on Saturday, October 1st at Walleye Park on Lake Cypress.
